Pennsylvania groundhog 'forecasts' 6 more weeks of winter

PUNXSUTAWNEY, Pa. The handlers of Pennsylvania's most famous groundhog, Punxsutawney Phil, say the furry rodent has forecast six more

Members of the top hat-wearing Inner Circle announced the "forecast" just before 7:30 a.m. Mon-

A German legend has it that if a furry rodent sees his shadow on Feb. 2, winter will last another six weeks. If not, spring comes early.

In reality, Phil's prediction is decided ahead of time by the group on Gobbler's Knob, the tiny hill in

the town for which he's named about 65 miles northeast of Pittsburgh.

Records going back to 1887 show Phil has now predicted more winter 102 times while forecasting an early spring just 17 times. There are no records for the remaining years.

MINDEN CRIME

Accused burglar could be key to unsolved crimes

A Minden man found by police inside a West Union residence without invitation Thursday afternoon may hold the key to solving other burglaries, including a series of vehicle break-ins, in the area, Minden Chief of Police Steve Cropper said.

Tervorious Quintel Harris, a 23-year-old resident of the 200 block of Miller Street, is

charged with simple burglary, felony simple criminal damage to property and theft, Cropper said. He also

is being held on a probation and parole warrant.

"When officers arrived at the house, they found an exterior window had been broken out. Once inside, the officers found Harris in the kitchen area," the chief said. "When questioned by Lt. Chris Cheatham, Harris admitted breaking the window and entering the house. He said he was only looking for something to eat and a place to sleep."

Lt. Cheatham, along

with Sgt. Ryan Barnette, found a cell phone in Harris' possession and learned it had been taken from a closet inside the residence, Cropper said.

Cropper said although no one currently resides a the West Union house and the property is for sale, "... the residence still has furniture and electronics inside and gives the appearance of being occupied."

One charge filed against Harris stems from the reported Jan. 23 theft of an HP tablet. Cropper said the suspect's grandmother reported a day later that her tablet had been stolen, and investigators learned Harris had pawned the item locally.

Cropper said Harris is suspected in other burgla ries in the same general area where he was arrested Thursday. Some firearms reportedly were stolen in the burglaries.

"If anyone recognizes Harris as the individual who either sold firearms or tried to sell firearms to them, we would request they please call the Minden Police Department at 371-4226 and ask to speak to an investigator," Cropper said. "We think we can clear up some cases if we can get this information."







A path toward a thriving middle class

AT A MOMENT when our economy is growing, our businesses are creating jobs at the fastest pace since the 1990s, and wages are starting to rise again, we have to make some choices about the kind of country we want to

Will we accept an economy where only a few of us do spectacularly well? Or will we build an economy where everyone who works hard has a chance to get ahead?


That was the focus of my State of the Union Address - middle-class economics. The idea that this country does best when everyone gets their fair shot, everyone does their fair share, and everyone plays by the same

set of rules. This week, I will send a budget to Congress that's built on those values. We'll help working families' paychecks go farther by treating things like paid leave and child care like the

economic priorities that they are. We'll offer Americans of every age the chance to upgrade their skills so they can earn higher wages, with plans like making two years of community college free for every responsible student. And we'll keep building the world's most attractive economy for high-wage jobs, with new investments in research, infrastructure,

manufacturing, and expanded access to faster internet and new markets.

We can afford to make these investments. Since I took office, we've cut our deficits by about two-thirds - the fastest sustained deficit reduction since just after the end of World War II.

It proposes getting rid of special interest loopholes in our tax code, and using those savings to cut taxes for middle-class families and reward businesses that invest in America. It refuses to play politics with our homeland security, and funds our national security priorities at home and

The Internet of every damn thing

FEDERAL TRADE COMMISSION head Edith Ramirez put the matter plainly: "If I'm wearing a fitness band that tracks how many calories I consume, I wouldn't want to share that data with an insurance company."

In a study last year, the FTC found that 12 mobile fitness apps shared information with 76 enterprises. Face it; personal gadgetry tied to the Internet is selling data about your habits to businesses — and in ways you have no idea about.

These devices now range from home burglar alerts to apps that turn off the porch light to toothbrushes. As of this year, there will be 25 billion such things.

Hence, the FTC has just suggested some guidelines for neat but sneaky gear. They're in a new report, titled "Internet of Things: Privacy & Security in a Connected World."

I'd sort of given up on the privacy part. The choices have become so complex that I apply a simple rule. Anything I absolutely don't want the world to see, I don't put online. Period.

My Facebook friends know they will never see a look-what-I-just-bought post. As for my Web surfing, my life is not an open book, but if someone should disclose my interests, I'd be OK. I have an excuse for everything.

The potential problems arise with those very useful apps that need my personal information to do their job. Sure, I want Google Maps to know where I am. And if I had some serious medical condition, I'd want a monitoring device communicating with my doctor. But there's a dark side: Some evil being could invade this data flow and change the medical settings.

I don't see why my movie ticket app should always know my whereabouts. Fandango gives us two choices on giving it access to our location. One is "Never," and the other is "Always.

Access to your location will be available even when this app is in the background."

Fandango thoughtfully provides a five-page privacy policy written in fluent legalese. It includes a discourse on its use of "Pixel Tags," invisible files on the Web pages you visit. The point is that few consumers wade through these privacy policies, and even fewer have the faintest idea what they're talking about.

The electric company sends me reports on my energy use and how it compares with that of neighbors. My most virtuous months seem to be those in which I'm not at home. My vacation schedule is unbeknownst to the company,

The FTC report calls for new rules governing the sort of information Internet-connected devices may collect, how it is used and how secure it is. This is a valiant effort, and I wish the regulators luck. But if hackers can break in to movie stars' private photo files, what can we realistically do to protect our secret stashes from prying eyes?

Smartphone sensors can already guess a user's sour mood, aggressive personality, pathetically low level of physical activity, sleeping difficulties and other behavioral patterns. And such snooping is perfectly legal.

In the end, consumers will have to decide: How much is the convenience of turning up the heat at home before leaving the office worth? What drives me nuts is all the thinking and research we have to do in balancing the trade-offs — and the attention that must be paid to various app settings.

The only current solution is to unscrew what you want kept private from the Internet. If you've forgotten how to use paper, you can put the information on a device not connected to the Internet — and then trip over the plug. Five minutes spent on some app's privacy policy may convince you of the wisdom of primitive

American Press, Lake Charles, on cheap gas:

The dramatic drop in the price of gasoline over the past six months is a mixed blessing for Louisiana.

Consumers are enjoying the lowest gasoline prices at the pump in years, around \$1.80 a gallon for regular at present, locally.

State government, however, is receiving a jolt from the lower price of a barrel of oil, which will result in a drop in revenue if it persists all year long.

The oil and gas industry is a big segment of the Louisiana economy and those who work in the industry are being hurt by the precipitous drop

For the overall U.S. economy, it means more disposable income for families with the decline of every penny of gasoline pumping \$1 billion back to consumers It also benefits energy-dependent transportation sectors, such as airlines and trucklines. That, too, can benefit consumers.

But in the long run there are downsides. It could mean fewer wells being drilled, which means fewer jobs for workers in the oil and gas industry.

It is hard to be enthusiastic about cheap gas when some of our fellow Louisianians are suffering layoffs.

According to a survey by S&P Ratings, if the oil price decline continues through 2015, the economies of the energy producing states, including Louisiana, will face difficulties.

Louisiana's assumed price of a barrel of oil at the time of adoption of its 2014 budget was \$97, and that share of the state budget amounts to 13 percent. Louisiana has done a much better job than some other states in diversifying its economy and reducing its dependence on oil and gas.

For example, according to the S&P analysis, Alaska is the most dependent on the price of a barrel of oil. It passed its 2014 budget based on \$105 per barrel oil, and the share of its state budget is 87 percent.

Loss of energy jobs could have a much greater economic impact than loss of other jobs. The New York Times reported that one energy job can have the purchasing power of three non-

So, consumers are now enjoying an unexpected windfall. But the lingering question is will that consumer windfall make up for a depression in the oil and gas industry?

Let us hope that a reasonable balance can be reached to keep the overall economy stable and prosperous.



Seahawks left to wonder about call

GLENDALE, (AP) — Because they didn't go into Beast Mode, the Seattle Seahawks found themselves in Spin Mode.

They were left to explain why they turned Marshawn Lynch — the running back known as "The Beast" — into a decoy with the game on the line and chose instead to pass the ball on secondand-goal from the 1. Malcolm Butler inter-

cepted that pass with 20 seconds left to preserve New England's 28-24 Super Bowl victory.

Within moments, the second-guessing had begun on what will surely be one of the most debated calls in NFL history.

"I made the decision. I said, 'Throw the ball,'" coach Pete Carroll said. "Nobody to blame but me.'

But there was plenty of blame to go around. It started with offensive coordinator Darrell Bevell, who may have gotten too cute and, as a result, found his name was a top trender on Twitter.

And the receiver, Ricardo Lockette, who Bevell said, "could have done a better job staying strong on the ball."

Ouarterback Russell Wilson wishes he had that pass back.

"I thought it was going to be a touchdown, Wilson said. "But I put the blame on me. I'm the one who threw it."

He also gave lots of credit to Butler, the rookie free agent out of West Alabama who made New England's roster, then saved the Super Bowl.

"The guy made a great play," Wilson said. But this one was hard to

explain away.

Seattle had a timeout left with the clock ticking down when Wilson fired into a cluster of blue and white shirts. Butler dug inside of Lockette and made his first career interception.

"I had a feeling I was going to make a big play today," Butler said. "But not that big."

Catch. And this from NFL career rushing leader Emmitt Smith: "Worst play call I've seen in the history of football."

It left them speechless in Seattle, too. Well, practi-

cally.
"We've got Marshawn Lynch, one of the best running backs in the league, and everybody makes their decisions and unfortunately, we didn't give him the ball," Seahawks linebacker Bobby Wagner said.

FANTASTIC FOURTH



GLENDALE, Ariz. (AP) — The final 125 seconds included a perfect possession by Tom Brady for the go-ahead points, a juggling catch that could have been the play of the year, and a victory-clinching, end-zone interception on a pass - not run from the 1.

A Super Bowl that got off to a slow start wound up with a "Whoa!" finish, a lot like the New England Patriots' entire season.

Brady threw two of his four touchdown passes in the final quarter to erase a double-digit deficit, rookie Malcolm Butler picked off Wilson's short Russell throw while Marshawn Lynch watched, and the Patriots ended a decade drought without an NFL title by beating the defendchampion Seattle Seahawks 28-24 in a taut classic Sunday night.

"Every team has a journey," said Brady, who was voted Super Bowl MVP for a record-tying third time, "and a lot of people lost faith in us early. But we held strong. We held together."

He was talking about the preceding months, not minutes. But either made sense. After all, back in late September, when New England lost 41-14 at the Kansas City Chiefs to fall to 2-2, there was a lot of talk about whether Brady was done, whether the Patriots were simply no

Yet Sûnday night, when coach Bill Belichick was asked when he knew he had a special team, he pointed to halftime of that poor performance against the

longer a powerhouse.

"We weren't having a good day, but we kept fighting," Belichick said. "To me, if there was ever a time that we were not going to compete as hard, that would have been it. ... The fight and the competitiveness was there, and that gave me a lot of confidence going into the next week's game. That was a key point in our season."

And so perhaps these

Patriots were prepared to weather the scrutiny that came with an NFL investigation into whether they deliberately deflated foot-balls in the AFC championship game two weeks ago. They compartmentalized that and focused on the Super Bowl.

Perhaps they were prepared to set aside Brady's two interceptions that helped dig a 24-14 hole in the fourth quarter. They moved into the lead after Brady connected with Danny Amendola from 4 yards out for one score with about 8 minutes left, then hit Julian Edelman from 3 yards for another TD with 2:02 remaining.

Perhaps they were prepared to not let the game get away when Seahawks receiver Jermaine Kearse made a falling, juggling, bouncing reception on his back for a 33-yard gain that set up first-and-goal from the 5 with 66 seconds to go. It was Butler who was in coverage on that play, although there was nothing more he really could have

Perhaps they were prepared for a shotgun pass by Wilson two plays later from the 1, rather than a run by the barrel-chested Lynch, who tied for the league lead in touchdown runs this season with 13.

Butler sure was ready, and his pick sealed the ultimate outcome, even if everyone had to wait while the officials cleared up a field-wide brawl.

When they passed the ball, I was kind of surprised by it," Patriots nose tackle Vince Wilfork said. "But at the same time, we made the

Lynch gained 102 yards on 24 carries and scored an earlier TD, leaving many mystified as to why Seattle wouldn't have handed off to him in that vital situation. Even some of the

With the retractable roof open on a cloudless evening, the Patriots (15-4) won the fourth Lombardi Trophy of the Brady-Belichick partnership, adding to those from the Super Bowls played in 2002, '04 and '05. They lost their last two trips to the big game, though, in 2008 and 2012, both times against the New York Giants.

This time, though, Brady and New England pulled it out — and in the process, prevented Seattle (14-5) from the ninth set of backto-back Super Bowl championships.

At age 37, Brady went 37 for 50 for 328 yards and matched his childhood idol, Pro Football Hall of Famer Joe Montana, for most Super Bowl MVP awards. also broke Montana's Super Bowl record for most career touchdown passes, getting to 13.

On the drive that resulted in the winning points, Brady went 8 for 8 for 65 yards.

"He's so calm and collected," Amendola said about his quarterback. "He's the best. He gets everybody to play at a higher level. He's our leader

emotionally."

Didn't matter that the Seahawks came in with an eight-game winning streak. Or that their defense, led by Richard Sherman and the self-styled "Legion of Boom" secondary, was the first in more than 40 years to lead the NFL in fewest points allowed three seasons in a row.

This was going to be the Patriots' day. Belichick's day. Brady's day.
"I've been at it for 15

years, and we've had a couple of tough losses in this game," Brady said. "This one came down to the end, and this time, we made the plays.

The special taping was one of the hottest events in town with tickets selling out in less than three minutes. More than 42,000 people vied for the more than 1,300 seats, according to show representatives. And for those in the Orpheum Theatre, he did not disappoint.

"The Tonight Show" host, whose collaborations with chart-topping singers have become YouTube hits, screened an a cappella ver-



sion of "We Are The Champions" in honor of the Super Bowl. The pretaped segment featured "Tonight Show" band The Roots and several artists including Underwood, Direction, Blake Shelton and Christina Aguilera.

Fallon brought out

Arnold Schwarzenegger dressed like "Terminator" persona — to segue to the show's first commercial break.

The night's biggest laughs went to a "Super Bowl of Lip Sync Battles." Fallon, actors Will Ferrell and Kevin Hart brought their best emoting to the

competition where they took turns faux-singing. Perhaps in a nod to Idina Menzel singing the national anthem earlier in the day, Ferrell put his own jazz hands on "Let It Go" from "Frozen." Kevin Hart let out a "Roar" in honor of Super Bowl half-time performer Katy Perry.

Fallon surprised the with crowd Barrymore as backup for his rendition of "Time of My Life," the theme from the film "Dirty Dancing." Their duet included a clumsy but hilarious attempt to duplicate the lift from the movie.

The Patriots players,

meanwhile, were basking in the victory that occurred just a few hours earlier. Their 28-24 win over the Seattle Seahawks was cemented when rookie Malcolm Butler made an interception in the end zone with 20 seconds left.

Fallon asked Blount what he whispered to Butler afterward.

"'You won us the game,'" Blount said.
