M6 burn panel invites sent out

Committee to look at alternative methods of disposal

Invitations have been sent to various local citizens, elected officials, scientists and others to participate in a dialogue committee tasked with finding a safe alternative disposal method for nearly 19 million pounds of M6 propellant at Camp Minden.

Frances Kelley, Louisiana Progress Action,

said the conference call went well, and the invitations were sent out Thursday. The next meeting with a named committee is expected



take place Thursday, Feb. 12 in Webster Parish to get started on finding the alternative method of disposal.

"There is a list of names of people who have been invited, but the list is not final," she said. "Some of them are elected officials, and they will either come in person or designate someone from their office."

She said the call was open and honest. Citizens from Doyline, Webster Parish and surrounding parishes have been invited to sit on the





Minden teen, dogs to compete at Westminster dog show in New York

A young lady from Minden will soon be boarding a flight to New York City where she has been invited to compete with her dogs in the 139th Annual Westminster Kennel Club All Breed Dog Show Monday and Tuesday, Feb. 16 and 17.

Megan Pruitt, 17, and her black cocker spaniel "Cole," Grand Champion PBJ's Back In Black and Parti Cocker Champion PBJ's N San Jo's Born To Rule, will be among more than 3,000 entries competing in the events of Westminster week, which includes the all-breed dog show and its second annual Masters Agility Championship at Westminster.

Megan has been invited once before, but it's her first year to go to the "big show.'

"I've shown at local shows, shows in Connecticut, Rhode Island. Tennessee – everywhere,' she said. "But this is the big show, the one everyone wants to go to."

The daughter of Jamey and Bea Pruitt is among 88 junior handlers selected to compete at WKC. She's been competing in other shows for a decade.

"I've been doing this since I was 7," she said. "My dad's dad had cocker spaniels. Then I started going to dog shows and I started showing.'

Bea Pruitt said the family breeds cocker spaniels for dog shows only.

"We don't breed to sell puppies," she said. "It's for the betterment of the breed, and it's our hobby, too. It's a family thing. Megan is showing Cole

in the Juniors category, but that group is more about Megan than Cole.

"They judge you on how well you show your

breed," Megan Pruitt said.

"It's not really about the dog at all, but I am judged on how well I present the breed, and all breeds are presented differently. I can't go too slow or too fast. It has to be in-sync."

It's an overall picture, her mother explained.

"The handlers have to be very professional. They have to dress a certain way and conduct themselves in a very business-like manner," she said. "She must have fluid movements and it all has to come together. It's also about the interaction between the two between her and the dog. It's very important to see they have fun doing it, yet still stay professional about it."

It takes a lot of disci-

pline on Megan's part. "When I'm going around the ring, I have to make sure I don't do certain things, like jerk on the lead or do anything that would get me out of the placing," she said.

Competing in the "Breed" category with Megan is her parti cocker spaniel, also known as Nefertiti (or Titi for short).

Titi loves to play, but the canine that prefers carrots as her treat of choice, knows when Megan snaps on her leash, it's time to go to work.

"When she doesn't have a leash on, she just runs," Megan said. "She's very playful - her breed is playful."

Each variety of dog has breed standards, "and the dog will be judged against that breed's standards,"

Bea Pruitt said. "Then they are judged against each other as to which one is the best possible specimen closest to the Breed standard."

All of this must be done in two and a half minutes.

"In the Breed (category), I'll be competing with professional handlers, not just junior handlers," Megan Pruitt said.

To be eligible for Westminster, Megan had to have seven Best Junior wins over the past year. Attendance in the Junior category is by invitation

Megan learned to compete by working with handlers other judges.

'Instead of going on summer vacation or summer break, she would fly to Connecticut and go to shows with friends who are handlers," Megan's mother said.

When Megan is not in school, she is with her

"She raises them from a puppy, works with them and trains them, grooms them," Bea Pruitt said. "It's a lot of work."

Next week, the Minden High School senior is competing for up to \$6,000 in scholarships.

She plans to attend college in business administration and continue a career as a professional handler after graduation.

"I'm going (to college) in business, so I will know how to handle the money situation," Megan Pruitt

said. "I know I will keep

showing Cocker Spaniels,

but I would like to show more than that. I want to be an all-breed professional handler."

Training and showing dogs has matured the Pruitt's daughter.

"It's an overall routine, and the way she has grown and matured over the years, things that she does ... she's responsible for her dogs, just like 4-H kids are responsible for their animals," Bea Pruitt said. "You can rely on Megan, you can depend on her."

Unlike some teenagers, Megan admits she has a lot to learn about life.

"When I started growing up, I realized I actually didn't know all of it," she said. "I didn't know what I was doing."

She does know what she's doing in the dog show business, though, and she is very excited about the week she will be spending in New York.

Breed competition in Westminster's famous dog show will be held during the day. One winner will be chosen from each variety. Cocker Spaniels compete in the 'Sporting Group."

The evening finals (Groups and Best In Show) will be held at Madison Square Garden and televised live from 7 until 10 p.m. CST Monday, Feb. 16 on CNBC and Tuesday, Feb. 17 on USA Network.

The dog show is preceded by the Masters Agility Trial at Westminster Saturday, Feb. 14. For the first time, The Westminster Kennel Club presents AKC Meet The Breeds by Purina Pro Plan Saturday as well, giving Westminster week a full range of informational and dogrelated activities.

productive planning meeting today with Rep (Gene) Reynolds, Dr. (Brian) Salvatore, Frances Kelley and others to talk about creating a public dialogue on alternatives at Camp Minden," he said. "Planning activities for the public engagement isn't complete. But – folks have shared a list of volunteers to participate and will reach out to them shortly. It's a big time commit-

Webster Parish when the M6 blew, sending a reported 7,000-foot plume of smoke into the air. It took a tractor-trailer with it, Subra said. Following the explosion, an investigation led to the

discovery of millions of pounds of improperly stored M6 propellant. It also led to the arrest of several officials with Explo Systems Inc., the company accused of improperly storing the munitions. It has since gone bankrupt. Officials contend that

while the propellant has been properly stored in 97 bunkers across Camp Minden, it grows more unstable by the day. The Army has been tasked with paying for the cleanup, and the open tray burn is the method of their choice and what is expected to be bid

However, with the backlash of the community due to the environmental and health threats caused from the burn, a dialogue committee is being seated to discuss an alternative method that is safe for the environment and the people who live around Camp Minden and surrounding

"It's hopeful (that a safer method will be accepted), but there's still a lot of work ahead," Kelley said. "Nothing is a done deal yet."

most No. 1 plastics are plastic drink bottles and milk jugs.'

The No. 2 plastics include detergent bottles, like empty dishwasher detergent containers, plastic laundry containers, and the like. A bin has already been set out for the collection of newspapers and magazines. She said these would be used by The Farm for their projects. They are also collecting cardboard, such as halfgallon milk cartons for planting in the greenhouse.

Right now, the bins are only for cardboard and newspaper collections.

Deshotel said "lasagna" garden has been set near the movie screen using newspapers. It's a form of "no-dig" gardening, she said. explained it is a layer of newspaper, compost and leaves. The process is repeated, layered like lasagna.

"The newspaper kills the grass beneath, and the plant will take root in the ground without disturbing anything or tilling up dirt,' she said. "I have one lasagna garden made, and it's one of the things we're going to teach the kids this spring. It's an easy way to build a raised bed with scraps."

And partnering with MAR-C Industries, she says, also helps the company create jobs.

She worked for the Office of Family





Spotlight's on Vitter

QUIETLY TUCKED AWAY in President Obama's proposed budget for the 2016 fiscal year is a provision that would strip Louisiana of hundreds of millions of dollars to be dispersed elsewhere.

You may recall that back in 2006 Sen. Mary Landrieu and then-Congressman Bobby Jindal shepherded legislation through the Congress that would provide Gulf Coast states with a larger share of tax revenues generated from oil and gas exploration in federal waters in the Gulf of Mexico. The extra money would begin flowing in 2018. The bill capped the take at \$500 million annually.

For a few years now, Louisiana has had plans in place to use its share of the new money for coastal restoration efforts. Remember, the Louisiana coast has been disappearing at a fast clip for decades. Opinions vary about why coastal marshes are washing away just about as quickly as you can say Merry Christmas. Some blame the oil and gas industry for the damage. Others claim it's a natural progression. The truth of the matter is both arguments are correct to some degree.

The future, or preservation, of the coast in Louisiana is vitally important on two fronts. No. 1, the coastal region provides a buffer against hurricanes and tropical storms. No. 2, the coastal corridor from the Louisiana/Texas state line to New Orleans is home to a very vibrant oil and gas and petrochemical industry, not to mention pipelines and ports and other supporting infrastructure, which collectively play a huge role in providing roughly one-third of the energy consumed in America on any given day.

In other words, it's a big deal.

Obviously President Obama believes otherwise. According to his own budget, the Gulf Coast states, including Louisiana, shouldn't hog the additional tax revenues, which according to Obama's budget, would total some \$5.6 billion over a 10-year period. The entire nation should share in the wealth, according to Obama. Louisiana be damned.

Sound familiar?

HANNA JR. We could chalk up Obama's proposal as petty politics. In other words, Obama is acting to the level the playing field, so to speak, in light of Sen. Mary Landrieu losing her re-election campaign in December. But even Landrieu issued a statement this week condemning Obama's


scheme. So where does that leave us?

Obama's proposed budget is simply that. It's a proposal. The Congress must entertain it, debate it and eventually vote on it. Vote on at least parts of it,

And over the coming months, it will be up to Louisiana's congressional delegation to put the brakes on Obama stealing what rightfully belongs to Louisiana and giving it away for only God knows what. More specifically, Sen. David Vitter and the man who unseated Landrieu, Sen. Bill Cassidy, must lead the charge in the Senate to protect Louisiana's interests. The burden falls especially to Vitter who is the dean of the delegation now.

Known for his unrelenting work ethic, his tenacity and his intelligence, Vitter is in the spotlight. Louisiana needs him now more than ever, but we need him on Capitol Hill, not in Baton Rouge.

Please pass the one-pot pork chops

Pork is my favorite meat whether it is ham, bacon, pork roast, ribs, sausage or pork chops. I especially like cooking pork chops because there are such a large variety of ways to prepare them.

This is the one pot KEEPER recipe meal I chose for my sister-in-law and my supper recently.

Since it was only the two of us, I used only two pork chops, two medium size potatoes and two carrots. As they simmered, they cooked down and I did have to add a bit more water.

The pork chops were so tender;

they could be cut with a fork. Since I try to avoid too much salt, I will omit the salt next time.

The seasoned meat tenderizer was adequate seasoning.


ONE POT PORK CHOP MEAL

4 pork chops (I used 2) Seasoned meat tenderizer 1 (10 ¾ oz.) can tomato soup ½ cup water 1 tsp. Worcestershire sauce ½ tsp. salt (I will omit next time)

½ tsp. salt (I will omit next time Pepper to taste

½ tsp. oregano

6 to 8 small potatoes or 3 medium



4 carrots split length wise into two inch pieces (I used 2) ½ onion, chopped

Sprinkle pork chop with the meat tenderizer. In skillet, brown pork chops; pour off

fat.

Add soup, water, Worcestershire sauce, salt, pepper, oregano, potatoes, carrots, and onion.

Cover, simmer 45 minutes or until pork chops and potatoes are tender.







BASKETBALL LSU loses to

Auburn, 81-77

BATON ROUGE - If LSU keeps playing like this against the lower end of the RPI, its NCAA Tournament hopes may

LSU lost to a lowly Ratings Percentage Index team for the second time this week by falling to No. 164 Auburn, 81-77, in front of an energetic crowd of 8,672 Thursday night at the Pete Maravich Assembly Center that did not see its Tigers return that emotion.

Instead, it was Auburn, which entered on a fourgame losing streak, that took it right to LSU on a 10-0 run midway in the first half to take a 26-19 lead and kept a lead for most of the game. Auburn (11-11, 3-6 Southeastern Conference) scored more than 71 points in a league game for just the second time all season after entering averaging 64 points a game in the SEC.

LSU, which lost 73-67 at No. 172 RPI Mississippi State on Saturday, fell to 16-6 overall and 5-4 in the league after entering with a No. 39 and falling RPI.

Asked what he would have said had someone told him a week ago that LSU would lose back-toback games to Auburn and Mississippi State (also 11-11, 4-5 SEC), LSU guard Tim Quarterman shook his head.

"I would've told you that you were crazy," he

"We came into the night with a great opportunity at finishing the first half of our conference schedule 6-3 and tied for second in our league, and we wasted a great opportunity," an edgy LSU coach Johnny Jones said. "They came in and played desperate, looking for an opportunity to win. They played with an edge. I thought we played too comfortable."

BASKETBALL LaTech falls to UAB, 80-60

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. Louisiana Tech was only down two points with 13 minutes left in the game, but UAB exploded for a 19-4 run to help down the Bulldogs, 80-60, on Thursday night in Bartow

After a stepback threepointer by Alex Hamilton and an offensive rebound and putback by Joniah White got LA Tech (17-6, 8-2 C-USA) to within one possession, 54-52, the Dogs went ice cold on offense missing 16 of their next 18 shots.

The Bulldogs scored only six points in the final 13 minutes of action.

UAB (12-11, 8-2 C-USA) won the battle of the boards, 49-34, to aid in its scoring 19 second chance points and also did damage on offense from beyond the arc (6-of-11) and at the charity stripe (16-of-19).

"They pounded us on the glass and made all the right plays," head coach Michael White said. "They were fantastic on the interior, finishing at a really high percentage. We did not execute very well at times, but I am always a lot more concerned with the way we defend and rebound.'

Brian Williams' credibility questioned after fake Iraq story

anchor Brian Williams found himself the story Thursday, his credibility seriously threatened because he falsely claimed he had been in a helicopter hit by a grenade during the Iraq war.

NBC News officials would not say whether their top on-air personality would face disciplinary action. Williams, the "Nightly News" anchor for just over a decade, had become an online punching bag overnight.

Tweets with the hashtag #BrianWilliamsMemories joked that he blew up the Death Star, saved someone from a polar bear and flew with Wonder Woman in her invisible helicopter. Photoshopped pictures showed him reporting from the moon and riding shotgun with O.J. Simpson in his Ford Bronco.

"How could you expect anyone who served in the military to ever see this guy onscreen again and not feel contempt?" wrote critic David Zurawik, of the Baltimore Sun. "How could you expect anyone to believe he or the broadcast he leads has any credibility?"

Williams apologized Wednesday for telling the story a week earlier during a "Nightly News" tribute to a veteran he had befriended during a 2003 reporting trip to Iraq. Before expressing his regrets on the air, Williams did so online and in an interview with the newspaper Stars & Stripes.

He speculated online that constant viewing of video showing him inspecting the damaged helicopter "and the fog of mem-ory over 12 years, made me conflate the two, and I apologize."

His story had morphed through the years.

Shortly after the incident, Williams had described on NBC how he was traveling in a group of helicopters forced down in the Iraq desert. On the ground, he learned the Chinook in front of him "had almost been blown out of the sky"; he showed a photo of it with a gash from a rocket-propelled grenade.

The NBC crew and military officials accompanying them spent three days in the desert, kept aground by a sandstorm.

But in a 2008 blog post, Williams said his helicopter had come under fire from what appeared to be Iraqi farmers with RPGs. He said a helicopter in front of his had been hit.

Then, in a 2013 appearance on David Letterman's "Late Show," Williams said that two of the four helicopters he was traveling with had been hit by ground fire "including the one I was in."

"No kidding?" Letterman interiected.

Williams described making a quick, hard landing in the middle of the desert.

"I have to treat you now with renewed respect," Letterman said. "That's a tremendous story.

Williams' story was first questioned in posts to the "Nightly News" Facebook page. It's a touchy topic: Members of the military who are wounded or who come under enemy fire consider themselves members of a special kind of brotherhood and don't like people who try to intrude, said retired U.S. Army Col. Pete Mansoor, a professor of military history at Ohio State University.

'It smacks of stolen valor," Mansoor said — an offense that Williams specifically denied in his online apology.

Chris Simeone, who says he piloted the aircraft that Williams flew in, told The Omaha World-Herald Thursday that "I think it's good that the truth is coming out. But I feel embarrassed for him.'

Simeone said if Williams had "just reported the facts, it would have been a great story. He was there. He didn't have to embellish it."

Many people have embellished war stories, in the local tavern or on a national stage. During the 2008 campaign, Hillary Clinton was derided for saying she came under sniper fire when, as first lady, she arrived at a military base in Bosnia. Her representatives said she had misspoken.

Williams' immediate issue is whether people believe his apology, a particular problem in an industry in which credibility is

"It's pretty difficult to believe," Mansoor said. "I remember every time I was under fire in Iraq, especially if your vehicle is an aircraft that's been hit. That's something that gets seared into your memory for all time.'

The New York Daily News labeled Williams' apology a fake.

"So what if it was 12 years ago," wrote TV editor Don Kaplan. "I remember getting hit in the head with a rock by a kid in the third grade."

Williams has an out-sized image at NBC News: The bluecollar Jersey guy and witty celebrity who slow jams the news with The Roots on Jimmy Fallon's "Tonight" show. He hasn't had credibility problems before, and he consistently leads in the ratings, making him an outlier at a network on which the "Today" show and "Meet the Press" have slipped from their lofty perches as ratings champions.

It's up to NBC News President Deborah Turness to decide whether Williams will be punished. She has the reputations of her most well-known personality and the news division as a whole to

Jason Maloni, a crisis public relations expert at Levick Strategic Communications and a regular "Nightly News" viewer, said he isn't sure whether NBC should sanction Williams, but he doesn't want to see the anchor in a war

zone anytime soon. "I feel a little let down, and I imagine that's where a lot of the (online) anger is coming from," Maloni said.

Zurawik, of the Baltimore Sun, wrote that if credibility means anything to NBC News then Williams should be out of his job by the end of the week. But Jane Hall, a
