Murder suspect due in court

Dylan Turk to face judge on accessory charges, new charges

A Minden teen connected to the murder of Omar Lott in August 2014 is due in court Monday on the case; at the same time, the District Attorney's office will be asking the judge to revoke his bond after he was arrested on several new charges.

Dylan Turk, 17, was arrested Sunday, April 5, by Minden police and charged with dis-turbing the peace disorderly, simple criminal damage to properly, interfering with medical transattempted

Hillary Clinton kicks off 2016 campaign

Presidential hopeful headed to Iowa

WASHINGTON Hillary Rodham Clinton jumped back into presidential politics on Sunday, making a much-awaited announcement she will again seek the White House with a promise to serve as the "champion" of everyday Americans.

Clinton opened her bid for the 2016 Democratic nomination by positioning herself as the heir to the diverse coalition of voters who elected her immediate predecessor and former campaign rival, President Barack Obama, as well as an appeal to those in her party still leery of her commitment to fighting income inequality.

And unlike eight years ago, when she ran as a candidate with a deep resume in Washington, Clinton and her personal history weren't the focus of the first message of her campaign. In the online video that kicked off her campaign, she made no mention of her time in the Senate and four years as secretary of state, or the prospect she could make history as the nation's first female president.


Instead, the video is collection of voters talking about their lives, their plans and aspirations for the future. Clinton doesn't appear until the very end.

"I'm getting ready to do something, too. I'm running for president," Clinton said. "Americans have fought their way back from tough economic times, but the deck is still stacked in favor of those at the top.

"Every day Americans need a champion, and I want to be that champion, so you can do more than just get by. You can get ahead and stay ahead."

It's a message that also made an immediate play to win over the support of liberals in her party for whom economic inequality has become a defining issue. They remain skeptical of Clinton's close ties to Wall Street and the centrist economic policies of the administration of her husband, former President Bill

Many had hoped Clinton would face a challenge from Massachusetts Sen. Elizabeth Warren, who has



"It would do her well electorally to be firmly on the side of average working people who are working harder than ever and still not getting ahead," said economist Robert Reich, a former labor secretary during the Clinton administration who has known Hillary Clinton for nearly five decades.

Unlike some of the Republicans who have entered the race, Clinton was scant on policy specifics on her first day as a candidate. Kentucky Sen. Rand Paul, for example, kicked off his campaign with a website and online videos that described his positions on an array of domestic and foreign policy issues.

Clinton also began her campaign for president in 2007 with a video, followed by a splashy rally in Des Moines where she said, "I'm running for president, and I'm in it to win it." This time around, Clinton will instead head this week to the first-to-vote Iowa, looking to connect with voters directly at a community college and small business roundtable in two small towns.

"When families are strong, America is strong. So I'm hitting the road to earn your vote. Because it's your time. And I hope you'll join me on this journey," she said in the video.

voter-centric approach was picked with a purpose, her advisers said, to show that Clinton is not taking the nomination for granted. Her campaign said Sunday she would spend the next six to eight weeks in a "ramp-up" period, and she would not hold her first rally and deliver a campaign kickoff speech until May.

Clinton is the first highprofile Democrat to get into the race, and she quickly won the endorse-

ment of several leading members of her party, including her home state governor, New York Gov. Andrew Cuomo, and Virginia Sen. Tim Kaine.

Still, there are some lesser-known Democrats who are considering challenging her, including former Maryland Gov. Martin O'Malley and Vermont independent Sen. Bernie Sanders.

'During this campaign, it is imperative that Secretary Clinton, like every other candidate, address the great challenges of our time: the grotesque level of income and wealth inequality that is crushing our middle class," Sanders

The GOP did not wait for her announcement to begin their campaign against her. The party's chairman, Reince Priebus, has outlined plans for a broad effort to try to undermine her record as secretary of state while arguing that her election would be like giving Obama a "third term."

Republicans have also jumped on Clinton's use of a personal email account and server while she was secretary of state, as well as her handling of the 2012 terrorist attack in Benghazi, Libya.

Former Florida Gov. Jeb Bush, in his own online video, said Sunday: "We must do better than the Obama-Clinton foreign policy that has damaged relationships with our allies and emboldened our enemies."

Should she win the Democratic nomination, Clinton will need to overcome history to win the White House. In the last half-century, the same party has held the White House for three consecutive terms only once, during the administrations of Republicans Ronald Reagan and George H.W. Bush.

As part of her launch, Clinton also will leave the board of her family's foundation.

The 2016 campaign is likely to be the most expensive in history, with total spending on both sides expected to well exceed the more than \$1 billion spent by each of the two nominees' campaigns four years ago.

This weekend, Clinton campaign fundraisers escalated their outreach to Democratic donors, who largely back her bid, with a flurry of phone calls urging them to donate as soon as possible. Her team on Sunday encouraged donors to become "Hillstarters" by raising \$27,000 for the campaign in the next 30



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Air monitoring, response preparedness topic of workshops

The Environmental Protection Agency is hosting a pair of workshops as a forum about environmental monitoring equipment and health and safety training.

The workshops will take place at the Louisiana Wildlife and Fisheries Building, located at 9961 Highway 80. The first will be from 6 until 8 p.m.,

the second from 6 until 8 p.m., Thursday, April 23.

David Gray, with EPA Region 6, says the forums, dubbed the Camp Minden Superfund Site Environmental Workshops, are about how the EPA and affiliated agencies will collect and monitor air and soil quality in and areas around Camp Minden. Before disposal of nearly 16 million pounds of M6 propellant at the military installation takes place,

Thursday, April 16, with EPA will collect samples of air and soil as a baseline sample.

"As work continues in the selection of an alternative technology for disposal of material at Camp Minden, we are continuing to develop the necessary plans to support the state's efforts," Gray said. "As part of our promise to engage the community - we are releasing a draft baseline sampling plan and asking the community for feedback.'

According to a news release, the first workshop will deal with environmental monitoring and sampling. The second will deal with response prepared-

"In the first workshop, you will learn about future site activities such as air data collection mechanisms that will be conducted on and around Camp Minden," according to the news release. "In the second workshop, you will learn about response preparedness, including how local officials will notify you if an incident occurs, who will respond and some basic actions you should be prepared to take to protect your family."

Representatives from the EPA, the Louisiana Department of Environmental Quality and the Louisiana Military Department will be on hand to discuss and answer questions regarding monitoring and sampling questions, the news release reports.

The draft plan can be found on the EPA's website. The draft plan gives a detailed, scientific plan on how and where the data will be collected. It gives samples of tables that will contain the results following testing.

violence is Sexual prominent in many communities, and there are several different kinds of abuse, according to a media packet provided to the Minden Press-Herald.

"Sexual violence is a broad term and includes rape, incest, child sexual abuse, intimate partner violence, sexual exploitation, human trafficking, unwanted sexual contact, sexual harassment, exposure and voyeurism," the National Sexual Violence Resource Center reports. "Sexual violence happens to people of all ages, races, genders, sexual orientations, religions, abilities, professions, incomes and ethnicities.

All of these are sexual acts without consent. The NSVRW goes on to define consent as "permission for something to happen or agreement to do something." Sexual violence occurs when someone is forced or manipulated into unwanted sexual activity without their consent.

Sexual Assault Awareness Month is about prevention. The NSVRW lists ways someone can prevent this type of behavior, and it includes speaking up about it when a person hears "harmful comments or witnessing acts of disrespect or violence."

It also includes communicating with legislators on the local, state and national level about supporting prevention programs. Policies against sexual violence can be created in the workplace and in schools.

Here are some facts provided by NSVRM about sexual violence

■ "Victims are never at fault for a sexual assault. Often, the media may unintentionally imply a victim is to blame by mentioning, for example, what the victim was wearing and if the victim was drinking. These comments lead to

victim-blaming.

■ "People who sexually assault usually violate someone they know and they often use coercion, manipulation or 'charm.' They may use force, threats or injury. An absence of physical injuries to a victim does not mean that a victim consented.

"Societal conditions that allow sexual violence to continue include tolerance of sexual harassment, restrictive ideas about gender, believing that women should be responsible for keeping themselves safe, rape jokes, violent pornography, the belief that alcohol will make sexual encounters better, and beliefs that certain groups are better than others (sexism, racism, heterosexism, etc.)


tion in Turk's recent arrest. Omar Lott was shot and killed Aug. 24, 2014, and J'Son and Dylan Turk were arrested along with Murphy Robertson. J'Son Turk

admitted to authorities he fired the fatal shots, but Dylan Turk reportedly helped with the body. At the time, Dylan Turk was also charged with obstruction of justice for statements made during their initial interviews.

Robertson was cleared of all charges, except a weapons charge in which a weapon was in plain view inside a vehicle in which he was a passenger.

Lott's remains were found in a wooded area off Walter Lyons Road three days after the shooting. Sheriff Gary Sexton says at the time, Lott was shot during a drug deal involv-

ing synthetic marijuana. Turk is currently incarcerated at Bayou Dorcheat Correctional Center on bonds totaling \$12,500.

Tuition-Free Community College

Ladies and Gentlemen, this is Joe Biden and I'm here filling in for President Obama, who is traveling abroad.

And I'm here with a simple message: middle-class economics works.

Our economy has gone from crisis to recovery to now to resurgence—with the longest streak of consecutive job growth ever recorded in the history of this country and more than all other advanced countries combined.

But to make sure everyone is part of this resurgence, we need to build on what we know widens the path to the middle class—and you all know what it is, access to education.

Folks, the source of our economic power and middle class strength in the 20th Century was the fact that we were among the first major nations in the world to provide twelve years of free education for our citizens.

But in the 21st Century, other countries have already caught up and twelve years is simply no longer enough—a minimum of fourteen years is necessary for families to have a surer path to the middle class and for the United States to be able to out-compete the rest of the world.

Consider that by the end of the decade, two out of three of all jobs will require an education beyond high school, from an 18-week certificate to a two-year associate's degree to a four-

year bachelor's, or a PhD.

And consider that folks with an associate's degree earn 25% more than someone who graduated just from high school. And folks who graduate with a four-year degree make 70% more.

But today, the cost of higher education is too high for too many Americans. Too many folks are priced out of a piece of the middle-class dream.

And that's why the President and I have a straightforward plan to remove that barrier and expand the pathway to the middle class—by

bringing the cost of community colleges down—down to zero.

Zero—
for anyone willing to
work for it
and for

and for the institutions that meet certain basic requirements.

Our plan is no giveaway. Students must keep up their grades and stay on track to graduate. States must contribute funding and hold community colleges accountable for the results. And community colleges must maintain high graduation and job placement rates.

placement rates.
And here's a key point—
community colleges will
have to offer courses that
are directly transferrable to

a four-year degree.

If two years of community college are free—and credits can transfer to a four-year university—that means the cost of a four-year degree will be cut in half for a lot of working families struggling to send their children to college, qualified children.

And under our plan, students from low-income families will be able to keep the benefits that flow from other financial aid, like Pell grants, to cover childcare, housing, transportation—costs that often keep them from attending class and completing a degree in the first place.

But here's another key point. Not every good-paying job will require a twoyear or four-year degree. Some of these jobs will require just a training certificate that can be earned in just a few months.

For example, you can go to an 18-week coding bootcamp—with no previous experience in computers—and become a computer programmer making up to \$70,000 a year.

There are other jobs in fields like advanced manufacturing and energy that pay \$40,000, \$50,000, \$60,000 a year—jobs you can raise a family on.

It's a simple fact that community colleges are the most flexible educational institutions we have. I've traveled all over this country, from New York to Iowa to California, to see how community colleges create partnerships with Fortune

500 companies and local businesses to generate jobs; support apprenticeships with organized labor, and prepare hardworking students for good-paying jobs in the areas in which they live.

Making community colleges free is good for workers, it's good for companies, and it's good for our economy.

Here's what we propose: Close loopholes for the wealthiest investors and levy a .07% fee on the biggest banks to discourage the kind of risky behavior that crashed our economy just a few years ago.

Doing just that would pay for free community college—and provide a leg up for working families through tax credits to cover necessities like childcare.

That's what middle-class economics is all about—giving folks a fair chance to get ahead. A fair tax code. No guarantees. Just a fair chance.

It's simple folks, two years of community college should become as free and as universal as high school is today if we're to make this economic resurgence permanent and well into the 21st Century.

So I want to thank you all for listening. I hope you have a great weekend and God bless you all and may God protect our troops.

Good people sometimes back bad laws

A law in Indiana and a bill in Arkansas making life harder for their gay neighbors have lost their wheels in a surprising smashup. Business interests, usually associated with the conservative cause, lowered the boom on "religious freedom" legislation supported by social conservatives.

But we are not here to discuss the Republican

But we are not here to discuss the Republican rift between economic and religious conservatives. Today's mission is to narrow the far wider gap between liberals and social conservatives. It's to urge liberals holding the fervent belief in the right to same-sex marriage to give the other side a little space to evolve.

Condemning these traditionalists as base bigots is unproductive. Liberals might borrow the sentiment religious conservatives have often applied to homosexuality: Hate the sin, but love the sinner.

Such laws are indeed discriminatory, and nastiness may propel some of their supporters. But many of the backers, though they regard homosexuality as immoral, are not especially hostile toward gay people. Some have been genuinely shocked to hear that they would be consid-

There's a tendency in our culture to cluster in communities of like-minded people and throw lightning bolts of disapproval over the walls into other likeminded communities. But where

possible, persuasion beats con-

ered unkind, unfriendly and big-

demnation every time.

The train to legalized gay marriage is unstoppable, so let it continue rolling at a comfortable pace. When Massachusetts first permitted same-sex marriage in 2004, pollsters asked that state's residents whether they defined

marriage as something between a man and a woman. A majority said yes.

Most of the respondents' answers in 2004 reflected not an animosity toward gay people but rather a traditional view of marriage. A poll asking the same question today would undoubtedly find a majority in Massachusetts saying "not necessari-

To my gay friends who regard the ability to marry another of the same sex as a basic human right, I hear you.

But you must concede that the path for widespread legalization of same-sex marriage — starting in liberal places, such as Massachusetts, and then expanding one state at a time as more Americans became comfortable with the idea — has been quite effective.

To my liberal friends of whatever sexual orientation, you and social conservatives share a few areas of common interest. This is territory you can meet on if you don't employ a scorched-earth policy every time you disagree.

The environment is one example. The Christian Coalition of America has fought efforts by fossil fuel interests and utilities to slap taxes on solar panels. In explaining its position, the coalition's president wrote, "We recognize the biblical mandate to care for God's creation and protect our children's future." Whatever the hearer's spiritual bent, those words are among the most beautiful statements of the environmentalist creed ever

White evangelicals may be more conservative on other issues than the population at large, but 64 percent told pollsters for LifeWay Research that they favor comprehensive immigration reform. Some of their church leaders have been among the most vocal proponents of a humanitarian approach to fixing the immigration laws.

The battle against casinos seems a lost cause, but Christian conservatives have led the good fight. Gambling as a means to raise government revenues is immoral, they say, and one reason is that it fleeces the most economically vulnerable members of the community.

What liberals and religious conservatives share is a belief that many of our most important values can't be measured in dollars. One can't paper over these groups' divergent worldviews. But while their advocates might not expect to embrace very often, they should preserve enough common ground to hold hands once in a while.

Spring is ankle sprain season

Spring is sports season for many amateur athletes and weekend warriors in the Minden area. It's also ankle sprain season for one area foot and ankle surgeon.

Stefan Lorincz, DPM, FACFAS, a foot and ankle surgeon with offices in Minden and Springhill, says ankle sprains are one of the most common sports injuries he treats this time of year.

"As people emerge from their winter hibernation and start to get active again, they can injure their ankles playing sports such as basketball, baseball, tennis and soccer," he said.

Anyone who injures an ankle requires prompt medical treatment, whether it's their first sprain or their fifth. Rest, ice, compression and elevation (R.I.C.E.) can reduce swelling and pain until the ankle can be evaluated and treated by a foot and ankle surgeon. A sprain may not always be a sprain; the ankle could be fractured.

Lorincz notes that many athletes develop chronic ankle instability from repeated ankle sprains, causing their ankle to frequently "give way." In some cases these players may require surgery. Proper rehabilitation of an ankle sprain reduces the likelihood of developing chronic ankle instability.

Lorincz shares three spring ankle sprain prevention tips from FootHealthFacts.org:

1. Perform warm-up stretches and exercises before playing sports.

2. Wear the right shoes for the sport. For example, don't wear

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running shoes for sports that involve a lot of sideto-side movement, such as tennis and basketball. is a member of the ACFAS and board certified in foot and ankle surgery. He earned his

Jordan Spieth earns redemption, green jacket

AUGUSTA, Ga. (AP) Jordan Spieth got more than redemption and a green jacket Sunday. He took his place among the best in the game with a Masters victory for the

One year after Spieth lost a bid to become the youngest Masters champion, the 21-year-old Texan turned in one of the most dominant wins ever at Augusta National. He never let anyone get closer to him than three shots after his record start. He never gave anyone much hope on Sunday.

Spieth closed with a 2under 70, missing a 5foot par putt on the final hole that would have set another record. Instead, he tied the score set by Tiger Woods in 1997 at 18-under 270.

"This was the ultimate goal in my golf life," Spieth said.

For all the talk about the Grand Slam bid by Rory McIlroy and the return of Woods, this week was about the arrival of another star.

"It's awfully impressive," McIlroy said after finishing fourth. "It's nice to get your major tally up and running at an early stage in your career. It's great to see, great for the

game, and I'm sure there will be many more."

Spieth became the first wire-to-wire winner at the Masters since Raymond Floyd in 1976, and this might have been even more special. Craig Woods in 1941 is the only other Masters champion who led by at least three shots from the opening round to the trophy presentation.

Phil Mickelson tried to make a run. So did Justin Rose. Neither got closer than three shots at any point, and it wasn't long before Spieth was making another birdie putt to take the drama out of the back

Mickelson (69) and Rose (70) tied for second. It was the 10th time Mickelson has been runner-up in a major. Woods jarred his right wrist then he struck wood under the pine straw on the ninth hole. He recovered and closed with a 73, 13 shots behind.

Spieth won for the third time on the PGA Tour and fifth time worldwide. He will rise to No. 2 in the world rankings, still a ways to go to catch McIlroy at the top. When McIlroy won back-toback majors last year to establish himself as the

game's best player, the quest was to find a rival.

Spieth provided the answer on perhaps the biggest stage in the sport with his record-setting week at Augusta.

"He has no weaknesses," Mickelson said. "He doesn't overpower the golf course, but he plays the course strategically well. He plays all the shots properly. And he has that ability to focus and see things clear when the pressure is on and perform at his best when the pressure is on.

"That's something that you really can't teach," he said. "Some players are able to do it, some players aren't. And he is.

Spieth showed early he was up to challenge. Rose, starting the final round four shots behind, rolled in a 10-foot birdie putt on the first hole, and Spieth calmly made his birdie putt from just inside him. Spieth went out in 35 to build his lead to five shots, and one putt later, the Masters effectively was over.

Spieth rolled in a 20foot birdie putt on No. 10 for a six-shot lead. It was his 26th birdie of the Masters, breaking the tournament record that Mickelson set in 2001.



Spieth managed this in only 64 holes. The next target was the 72-hole scoring record that Woods set in 1997 and he almost got there except for that bogey at the end.McIlroy had a 68-66 weekend, hurt by his slow start and put him 12 shots going into the weekend. He will

have to wait until next year to try to win the Masters and become the sixth player to complete the career Grand Slam.

The way Spieth is playing, that task just got a little harder. In his last four starts, Spieth has won twice and finished second twice.

Milo Ventimiglia talks 'Gotham' arc and 'Heroes Reborn'

YORK Ventimiglia is the new big bad villain on Fox's "Gotham," beginning an arc Monday (at 8 pm. EDT) that leads up to the season

Ventimiglia plays the Ogre, whose name may be familiar to DC Comics fanatics, but his version is different from the one already in the DC universe.

"Gotham" focuses on James Gordon (played by Ben McKenzie) as a detective, before he becomes commissioner and before Bruce Wayne becomes Batman. In this prequel, Gotham City is still corrupt and has plenty of bad guys. That's where Ventimiglia's Ogre comes in. He's an untouchable mad man who the Gotham City police department won't go near, because every time someone does, the ogre responds by killing someone that person loves.

Ventimiglia said in a recent phone interview that he was drawn to the role because, for one, Bruno Heller, the creator of "Gotham," makes "great male characters.

"They're strong, they have a purpose and a direction," said Ventimiglia. "I identify with what I am. I'm a man and want to play a great, male character. Thank god for guys like Heller or (TV show producer) Kurt Sutter who give us these great characters for



actors to play with."

He also enjoys playing bad.

"We all have it in us to be very dark individuals but hopefully we choose not to be," he said. "To play a villain, to play a bad guy, to play a killer, it's fun because it's

make-believe and it's complete pretend. At the end of the day I get to step off camera and go back to being myself but as the cameras are rolling I can be as sick as I possibly can."

Ventimiglia, 37, is best known

for playing Peter Petrelli on the NBC drama "Heroes" from 2006-2010. He already announced via Twitter that he would not be returning to the reboot "Heroes Reborn" (described as a 13episode miniseries to air later

this year). He said "I wish them all the best. I closed a chapter on 'Heroes' when it ended five years ago on the original."

He also admits he's not that curious about this new version.

"It's like, are you ever curious about your ex-relationships? Not really. Hopefully. Hopefully people can let you leave them in the past and not everybody's reminding you about that that girl you used to date."

He understands the show's fan base is interested but confesses, "It's hard being the guy that says, 'No, I'm not going back, A — because I wasn't invited, and B — I've moved past that and I grew up and I grew out of that. Had we still been making the show for the last five years it would be a different story. The truth is the show got canceled. It wasn't even that the show ended. The show got canceled."

This isn't to say he didn't appreciate the role because he stresses that he "enjoyed every minute. But, like every moment, every job, they will all end. Not to get super meta but everything comes to an end when it's supposed to and pumping new blood into a dead body won't necessarily bring it back to life. 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
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
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
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
