Minden Police were busy working multiple wrecks around lunchtime Thursday during a thunderstorm that sent two vehicles hydroplaning at the 47mile-marker on Interstate 20.

Minden Police Sgt. Chris McClaran says the first wreck was called in just a little after noon when a vehicle hydroplaned. A second vehicle hydroplaned in

Minden Medical Center earns 'A' grade in safety

Minden Medical Center received their sixth "A" grade in the Spring 2015 Hospital Safety Score, which rates how well hospitals protect patients from preventable medical errors, injuries and infections within the hospital. Minden Medical Center is the only hospital in north Louisiana to receive an A. The hospital is one of just 182 hospital in the nation to have earned "straight A's" and the only hospital in Louisiana to receive straight A's since this initiative began in 2012.

An A grade is one of the most meaningful honors a hospital can achieve, and one of the most valuable indicators for patients looking for a safe place to receive care. The Hospital Safety Score is the gold standard rating for patient safety, compiled under the guidance of the nation's leading patient safety experts and administered by The Leapfrog Group, a

national, nonprofit hospital safety watchdog. The first and only hospital safety rating to be peerreviewed in the Journal of Patient Safety, the Score is free to the public and designed to give consumers information they can use to protect themselves and their families when facing a hospital stay.

'Receiving an "A" grade from The Leapfrog Group is national confirmation that patient safety is a top priority in Minden. Our employees and medical staff deserve the national recognition for providing personalized, caring and quality oriented care each and every day," said George E. French III. LOUISIANA LEGISLATURE Senate-backed medical marijuana bill advancing in House

BATON ROUGE — Medical marijuana advocates have done this year what they failed to do in the past: push to the brink of final passage a bill that could finally make good on Louisiana's 1991 medicinal pot law.

Though the law has been on the books for over 20 years, it was essentially meaningless because the state never developed a framework to get the drug to those suffering from cancer, glaucoma and a severe form of cerebral palsy.

A bill to do just that was

approved without objection Wednesday by the House Health and Welfare Committee and could soon come up for a vote before the full House.

"It's just adding clarity to the 1991 legislation,' said Sen. Fred Mills, R-Parks, sponsor of the measure, which has already passed the Senate. "When I convince (lawmakers) that they aren't voting to legalize (marijuana) because it is legal, they are like 'OK, give me the details and the facts."

As written, Mills' proposal would have tight

controls on the use and distribution of the drug. Only 10 pharmacies in the state could fill prescriptions. The Department of Agriculture and Forestry would oversee Louisiana's sole cultivation facility and patients prescribed the drug would be closely monitored.

Another major provision specifies that the plant cannot be smoked. Patients could consume only refined forms of marijuana, such as oil.

The refinement process

Gov. Bobby Jindal says he'd sign medical marijuana bill

Gov. Bobby Jindal says he has "no concerns" about a medical marijuana bill nearing final legislative passage and would sign it into law if it reaches his desk.

A proposal by Sen. Fred Mills, a Republican from Parks, would allow marijuana use by people suffering from cancer, glaucoma and a severe form of cerebral palsy, through a limited number of heavily-regulated distributors.

The Senate has approved the bill, and the House health committee backed the measure this week. It awaits debate in the full House.

Jindal said Thursday that Mills' proposal meets his criteria that the marijuana distribution be supervised and for a "legitimate medical purpose." The Republican governor said: "We've got no concerns with it. If it got to our desk, we'd sign it."

Bistineau bill killed in Senate committee

The bill that would have generated funding to battle giant salvinia on Lake Bistineau died in the Senate Committee this week.

State Rep. Gene Reynolds says it failed by one vote, 6-5.

"It wasn't the fact that they disagreed with what it was trying to do," he said.

He says the bill died because it would have taken money from Wildlife and Fisheries that couldn't be afforded. "I'm not going to quit," he said. "We're going to come with a more reasonable approach and try to come up with more partners. We're going to get a facility up here, we just have to figure out a way to do it."

House Bill 228 would have dedicated \$300,000 of the state's mineral income from activities on certain water bottoms of Lake Bistineau to weevil production for control of giant salvinia on the lake.

The proposed law would have dedicated the funds from of the state leases, royalties, bonuses and rights-of-way from activity on Lake Bistineau for weevil production. It would have created the Lake Bistineau Management Account in the conservation fund.

Reynolds says he was looking at a public/private partnership to help cover some of these expenses, as the requested amount wouldn't have covered it all.

Reynolds says he will go back to the drawing board and hopefully have a more workable bill for the 2016 legislative session.

My dad is a police officer. Here's what it's like to grow up in a family like mine:

As a little girl, I felt so much pride knowing my dad was out protecting our city from crime; I'm now 23 years old and that pride remains, but I can't help but feel fear knowing he's out there on patrol.

Why do I feel fear? I can't get on the Internet without seeing someone bash on police officers. People say some very scary things, even going as far as, "A dead cop is the best cop."

Do you know what it's like to read that? It's earth-shattering to know someone out there thinks my dad would be better off dead.

So now, on top of already worrying about him being out on patrol, facing dangers that are part of the job, I have to worry about some nut job who put a target on my dad for simply reporting for duty.

No one seems to understand the fear that comes with being the daughter of an officer. Not many of us have ever had to hear, "Your dad was involved in an incident today. I'm not

sure what happened yet, but you need to remember how much your dad loves you."

When your dad got home from work, did he ever tell you about his day over dinner?

I'm sure it was nice, hearing what he did all day, knowing what kind of day he had. When your dad's a police officer, that's not how things are. He won't tell you

ROUND UP The Advocate on legislating school policy

EDITORIAL

A story of good intentions, if not legislative success, is the bill that aims at reducing out-of-school suspensions for the youngest children in public schools.

A measure by Sen. Sharon Broome, D-Baton Rouge, started out as a proposal to end the suspensions in kindergarten to third grade. As she said, and the Senate's education committee agreed, out-of-school suspensions of such young students can be counterproductive.

Yet Broome revamped the bill in another Senate panel to reduce its effect drastically. Under the revised version of Senate Bill 54, school authorities would only be banned from handing down out-of-school suspensions for most school uniform violations.

Those problems represent just a tiny fraction of the 7,400 instances of public school students in the earliest grades being sent home last year.

"It is a baby step," Broome said of her revamped bill.

The baby steps are justified, given that the bill attracted considerable pushback from school boards and teacher groups. The reason: discipline problems, even in the very earliest grades.

"They thought I was trying to take their authority away from them for discipline," Broome said after dialing back her measure. "That was not my motivation. My motivation was to stop the school-to-prison pipeline."

Opponents said previously that the original ban proposal would handcuff school officials, who they said sometimes have no choice but to suspend a student who is disrupting a classroom.

Disruption? It happens, even in the earliest grades. The original bill was opposed by the Louisiana Association of Principals, Louisiana Federation of Teachers, Louisiana Association of Educators and Louisiana Association of Public Charter Schools.

The revised bill now goes to the state House. While this is a well-intentioned proposal from Broome, the idea that the Legislature should set rigid rules for everyone under its broad jurisdiction ought to provoke some thought about this kind of bill. Schools, whether traditional public schools run by elected boards or charter schools run by independent nonprofit boards, are complex little societies, and children - particularly in the elementary grades - can be bundles of trouble as well as jov. The teachers and principals closest to the problem ought to have discretion in how to deal with discipline problems, even as Broome rightly points out the data that show students sent home in the earliest grades are at risk of falling behind — with serious long-term consequences for their successful schooling. Even uniform violations might be symptoms of more serious problems with elementary students. In a world in which ever-more-rigid requirements are laid down from on high, we hope that members of the Legislature should remember that the professionals closest to such problems have the authority and discretion to make judgments in difficult cases. The problem identified by Broome is a real issue, but a new law might not be the best way to approach it.

This one's for you, Daddy, for being brave enough to do what others wouldn't, for protecting even those who persecute you and for being the best dad any girl could ever ask for.

I'd also like to say thank you to all of our service men and women who put their lives on the line daily to protect the lives of others. Hanna Young is a resident of

True enough. But this was also the first Memorial Day that ISIS was beheading people in Ramadi, a city fought for and won by American troops. Mr. Obama lost Ramadi, just as he has lost large swaths of Iraq, through his determination to abandon that nation, thus leaving behind millions of vulnerable people.

As you know, President Obama recently warned our troops about that dastardly threat known as "climate change." Not to be outdone in the department of absurdity, House Minority Leader Nancy Pelosi now says we must confront ISIS on "the front of social media." She offered that wisdom from her usual perch

in Oz just as ISIS was burning human beings alive.

The madness extends beyond Iraq and Syria. Yemen, once touted by our triumphalist-in-chief as a success, has no functioning government. Neither does Libya after Barack Obama and Hillary Clinton helped oust the dictator Qadafi. He was a bad hombre, no question, as was Saddam Hussein. So now the Obama administration has just one hope of salvaging a Middle East victory, and that would be to reach a deal with Iran on nukes. But that is a bargain on which Faust himself might take a pass.

Iran's "Supreme Leader" Ali Khamenei just called the United States "a major enemy to human rights." The alwayscharming Khamenei describes Israel as "barbaric, wolflike, and infanticidal." This Holocaust-doubter has declared that there is only one cure for the cancer of Israel: total annihilation. It is not a stretch to theorize that Khamenei surveys the region and sees just one final solution.

This is the regime we are dealing with. Not so much "dealing," but cajoling, coaxing, wheedling, begging. The United States of America is

desperate to strike a bargain with a country that has long supported some of the world's most heinous terrorist organizations.

If all the world's a stage, the very worst actors are right now front and center. Iran, China, Putin's Russia, and of course ISIS are hogging the spotlight.

The question is, how did we get to this terribly ominous place? And the answer seems evident: the people of the United States elected, not once but twice, a man who disdains American power.

President Obama's security advisers know the score. The Director of National Intelligence admits that global threats are the worst in a half century. Former Secretary of Defense Leon Panetta writes that Barack Obama "avoids the battle, complains, and misses opportunities."

The president has frequently lamented that he inherited a mess, which is absolutely true. Unfortunately, his fecklessness and lack of leadership have made that situation far messier. This is not the change we were so frequently and so forcefully promised.

So let's look ahead. Inauguration Day of 2017 falls on a Friday. After a long weekend of lavish parties and balls and dinners, the new commanderin-chief will begin the process of trying to make the world just a little less mad than it is right now. It is about as daunting a challenge as that faced by any president in the history of this exceptional nation. He or she will need every hope, every prayer we can muster.

SOCCER **FIFA curruption**

case heating up ZURICH (AP) - The worst corruption crisis in soccer history stems from the governing body's decision to award Russia and Qatar the next two World Cup tournaments, FIFA President Sepp Blatter said Friday.

Blatter spoke at the FIFA congress hours before the presidential election in which he is a seeking a fifth term. He has refused calls to resign after FIFA was targeted by U.S. and Swiss authorities in separate corruption investigations.

In 2010, Russia was chosen to host the 2018 World Cup and Qatar was awarded the 2022 tournament amid widespread allegations of wrongdo-

"If two other countries had emerged from the envelope, I think we would not have these problems today," Blatter said. "But we can't go back in time. We are not prophets. We can't say what would have happened."

The United States was one of the losing bidders for the 2022 World Cup. On Wednesday, U.S. authorities indicted 14 people on bribery, racketeering, fraud and moneylaundering charges going back to the 1990s.

Seven of the officials including two serving FIFA vice presidents were arrested in Zurich on Wednesday ahead of the congress.

"I am not going to use the word coincidence but I do have a small question mark," Blatter said about the timing of the raid.

When the congress broke for a lunch a few hours later, a bomb threat was made at the venue hosting the meetings, according to Swiss police.

"New ball homer for sure," LSU director of baseball operations Nolan Cain tweeted moments after Zardon's shot.

The ball came off Zardon's bat at a speed of only 96 miles per hour. Only? Yes, only. A ball's exit speed with the old balls normally had to hit Zardon trotted around the triple digits to soar

over any walls. Zardon's towering homer was exactly what college baseball wanted. It's exactly what college baseball got.

COLLEGE BASEBALL

The game has completed its first regular season with the new lower seam baseballs, and the results are in: Home runs are up.

The college game saw an increase of homers by 41 percent - 0.39 per game last year to 0.56 this year. The average team has 30 homers this season over a 56-game schedule. It had 21 last season.

College coaches are pleased with the results, and the NCAA couldn't be happier, said Damani Leech, the NCAA direc-

tor overseeing baseball. Still, as 16 four-team regionals begin across the nation Friday, one question remains.

"The wildcard still hanging out there," Leech said, "is Omaha and how the ball performs there.'

That answer won't come until another month. For now, most involved in the game are thrilled that the lower seam ball has, somewhat, yanked college baseball from its worst hitting slump in nearly a halfcentury.

The new ball has helped bring back some of the fireworks, reignite a college baseball offense that hit the skids when the new bats — stripped of a larger sweet spot — were instituted in 2011.

Batting average is only slightly up - .270 to .274 - but home runs were the primary statisti-cal target. The 0.39 homers hit a game last season was the lowest in the recorded history of college baseball.

How does the 0.56 figure stack up to other seasons? It's the highest since the new bats were instituted in 2011, but not near the 0.94 homer rate of 2010.

The difference is evident in the local team.

LSU, 48-10 and the NCAA No. 2 overall national seed, enters Friday's Baton Rouge regional with 47 home runs - six more than the Tigers had in one fewer game played at this point a year ago.

More changes may be contingent on what unfolds on June 13-23 at the College World Series.

Since the CWS moved to TD Ameritrade from Rosenblatt Stadium, a total of 25 home runs have been hit: nine in 2011, 10 in 2012, three in 2013 and three in 2014.

NBA Crawford makes NSU Pom Line | Thibodeau fired by Bulls

CHICAGO (AP) – In five seasons under Tom Thibodeau, the Chicago Bulls soared to heights they had not reached since Michael Jordan and Scottie Pippen were collecting championships.

They never got to the top with him and now he is out.

Bulls fired The Thibodeau on Thursday, parting ways with the strong-willed coach who took the team to the playoffs in each of his five seasons only to have his success overshadowed by his strained relationship with the front office.

"It is our strong belief that there needs to be a culture of communication that builds a trust throughout this organization from the players to the coaches to the management and to the front office, a culture where everyone is pulling

in the same direction," general manager Gar Forman said. "When that culture is sacrificed, it becomes extremely difficult to evolve and to grow."

Thibodeau went 255-139, a .647 winning percentage that ranks seventh in NBA history among coaches with at least 200 games. He led the Bulls to the top seed in the playoffs his first two seasons and was the NBA's Coach of the Year in 2011, the same year Derrick Rose became the league's youngest MVP. He thanked Chicago

fans, his players, staff and their families "who have honored me and the Bulls by their effort, love, dedication and professionalism.'

"We are proud of our many accomplishments, fought through adversity, and tried to give our fans the full commitment to

excellence they deserve," Thibodeau said in a statement. "I love this game and am excited about what's ahead for me with USA Basketball and the next coaching opportunity in the NBA."

Chicago advanced to the Eastern Conference finals that season, but it's the only time the Bulls made it past the second round under Thibodeau, who had two years left on his contract. Íowa State coach Fred Hoiberg, who has not returned to work full-time following open heart surgery in April, is widely viewed as a top candidate to replace him.

The move comes two weeks after the Bulls were eliminated by Cleveland with a listless effort in Game 6 of the East semifinals that came on the heels of an injury-filled 50-win season.

There are three documents that will guide the process of the destruction of the M6 from beginning to end – the action memo, the AOC and the work plan.

Dolores Blalock, also a dialogue committee member, questioned the legality of the standards because it isn't in the AOC.

"What I'm understanding is it's got to be in the AOC," she said of the newer standards. "If it's not in the AOC, it's not right. Right now, with the way things stand, it's the 1980 standards in the AOC. Can the AOC be amended to include those (newer standards)? Can legal and enforceable levels of hazardous pollutants be written into the document that controls the incinerator emission? Will these standards be written out in detail in the main document, accepted as law and enforceable? Why do we have to leave those 1980 standards?"

EPA attorney George Malone expounded on that, saying that all three documents work together, which makes the standards enforceable.

"This particular AOC is not writing any particular standard," he said. "That's just not the kind of information that is included in an AOC. In its appendices, there is a 'statement of work' section which generally describes the work that will be performed, but it does not include specific air standards. The work plan is the document required by the AOC to include the details that will be accomplished, including the standards.'

EPA regional administrator Ron Curry says none of this was done lightly and believes the documents are solid.

"I think the legal advice that you heard from George is extremely correct," he said. "I know that the AOC is enforceable in its current state. We believe in this document, otherwise we would not have spent the last several months in moving forward in the direction we have been moving to try to make this a working document. We had opportunities to have it not be a working

document, but because of the legalities that were discussed here tonight, it is a working document, and it will cause the destruction of the M6. These discussions have not been 'back of the envelope' discussions. They've been very detailed discussions among the various parties. I will tell you that I firmly believe if for any reason if we went back and attempted to reopen this AOC, we would be taking at least a six month step backwards. With that being said, I still believe this document is solid and am willing to bank my reputation on it and the reputation of this agency on it."

Army Col. Sam Mims (Ret.) cautioned them about changing the AOC so close to moving forward with the destruction of the M6. Although he couldn't talk about the details, he says he'd seen the paperwork and changing it now would be a huge setback.

"I was in the Army for 30 years, and if you really want to delay this process, demand that the AOC be renegotiated," he said, "and you will see bureaucracy at its finest. The four members of that AOC will

LOS ANGELES — For the first time in nearly eight years, Lindsay Lohan is not on probation.

Los Angeles Superior Court Judge Mark Young on Thursday ended Lohan's probation in a reckless driving case, closing the last of a series of LA criminal cases that have dogged the actress for years.

Young said he reviewed community service logs and determined Lohan, 28, completed her sentence. He praised Lohan's attorney, Shawn Holley, telling her she did an excellent job getting the actress to complete the hours in recent weeks.

Unlike many previous proceedings in her criminal cases, Lohan was not present for the hearing. In a statement posted on Twitter, Lohan thanked Holley and the two New York groups where she did her recent flurry of service hours.

"Clean slate," Lohan wrote. "Fresh start."

Resolving the reckless driving case was not without its hiccups — Lohan missed a deadline last year to complete her community service, and a prosecutor criticized her efforts, noting she was given credit for meeting fans of a London stage play and other questionable activities. A judge earlier this year ordered Lohan to redo 125 hours of service

Over the years, the actress was briefly jailed five times and sentenced to rehab for a variety of violations ranging from failing to perform her community service to skipping counseling sessions.

Since 2007, Lohan was convicted in three cases — a drunken driving and drug case, a theft case filed over a stolen necklace, and a reckless driving case filed after the actress crashed her Porsche into a dump truck on Pacific Coast Highway while on her way to a movie shoot.

The drug and DUI case were resolved in 2012, 4 1/2 years after she was arrested twice in quick succession. Despite taking a plea

deal that allowed her to avoid jail time, Lohan struggled to comply with the terms of her sentence and was ordered jailed after she missed a court appearance.

It took more than 50 court hearings to resolve the trio of cases, with the actress being forced to appear 20 times in person.

Lohan's court appearances had a tendency to become major spectacles, with deputies creating a red carpet-worthy line so photographers could document the starlet's entrances and exits to court. Commentators often critiqued Lohan's fashion and choice of hair color, and someone even showered the actress in confetti as she walked into the Beverly Hills courthouse for one hearing.

Drama seemed to follow her into the courthouse. Her feuding parents were sometimes in attendance, and Lohan famously showed up to one hearing with an expletive painted on her fingernails. One of her attorneys told a judge the actress was "ensconced in the bosom" of a rehab facility when in reality Lohan only briefly checked in and was photographed shopping at an electronics store around the time of the hearing. During her first stay at the

Betty Ford Center, Lohan got into a fight with a rehab worker. No charges were filed.

In another instance, a judge summoned Lohan to court to explain that just because she was serving house arrest, house parties were not allowed.

The incidents did little to appease critics, who thought Lohan should be harshly punished for her inability to stay out of trouble. In reality, Los Angeles' overcrowded jail system ensured that Lohan's stints behind bars were brief.
