

# Is money an obstacle in EPA's M6 decision?

Could money be a factor in the delay of the Environmental Protection Agency making a decision on the final contract for the disposal of the millions of pounds of M6 propellant stored at Camp Minden?

In response to Thursday's article on the EPA

update, questions were raised regarding the reason for delay in issuance of the federal agency's decision on the disposal method. Col. Pete Schneider, with the Louisiana Military Department, says it's possible the holdup could be related to money, but he would not say definitively.

"I don't know that, but possible because

they're the bill payer," Schneider said. "I know EPA is really close to sending us something, because we've been talking to them for the last couple of days."

David Gray, director of external affairs at EPA Region 6, confirmed they are wrapping up their review and "finalizing our response to LMD."

"While the (Administra-

tive Order on Consent) only requires us to act if we disapprove, I expect that we will respond to LMD even if our action is to affirm their recommendation," he said.

The AOC still states the method of choice is the open tray burn, which means it would have to be amended - which means signatures would be required by the EPA, LMD, the Louisiana Department of Environmental Quality and the Department of the

"The LMD is ready to sign for an alternate form of disposal," Schneider

Gray was asked about the EPA's statement that

# January burglary leads to arrest

A national database has once again helped law enforcement put a man behind bars.

Tervorious Q. Harris, 23, of the 200 block of Miller Street, was arrested Monday, May 4, on a warrant for

aggravated burglary. Bond was set at \$55,000. Minden Police Chief

Steve Cropper says the national database CODIS, or Combined DNA Index System, helped link Harris to a crime committed

in January. The warrant stemmed from a burglary on Gladney Street. Cropper says the victim and his girlfriend had returned to his residence, and once they got inside, they heard a noise, which spooked the girlfriend, he says. The victim walked around to the back of the

# Byrd: Body camera fundraiser a success

### MPD, WPSO can now outfit entire departments

The Minden Police Department and the Webster Parish Sheriff's Office can now afford to outfit their patrol officers with body cameras thanks to the generosity of the Minden community.

Jack Byrd Jr., president

of MBL Bank, presented Police Chief Steve Cropper and Sheriff Gary Sexton with checks for roughly \$11,000 each Thursday towards the purchase of body cameras.

"This is just another example of the outstanding citizens we have in Minden and Webster Parish," Byrd said, "and because of this, our law

enforcement equipped with this for not only the full understanding of events, but as training tools."

He says 100 percent of the roughly \$22,000 raised

went to both departments. "The sheriff's office and staff are very appreciative for the efforts of Mr. Jack Byrd in his endeavors to

launch a campaign to raise

monies for the purchase of body cameras for our enforcement officers," Sexton said.

"We ordered 27 cameras this morning (Thursday)," Cropper said, "which will supply every shift with cameras. We ordered a camera for the narcotics division and a camera for the investigative division."


He says he ordered one for those two divisions in the event they have to serve a search warrant it

they had the funds in their budgets to purchase these cameras. They both said no. That's when he says he got the idea to begin raising money for them. "I thought it would be a good idea to see what we could do to support our law enforcement," he said. "If you have the video, you could use that video in training classes on what to do and what not to do in situations."

Cropper and Sexton say these cameras are as much

for their officers as they are for the citizens.

Cropper says issues could arise from them if they get knocked off or something happens.

"It's not a cure-all," he said. "We actually purchased a camera to try, so we already have one in use. We had an incident this

weekend where they got a call and when they got there, there was a lot of drug paraphernalia in the residence."

He says officers were going to search the suspect, but he refused to allow officers to see what was in his pocket. When the officer reached for the suspect's pocket, a struggle ensued. During the struggle, the audio kicked off, even though the video was still very clear. He gave this example to show that there could still be some prob-

could still be some problems using the cameras, but it is another tool in law enforcement's arsenal to

house and noticed the door was busted, and when they got back inside, Cropper says multiple guns and two video gaming stations were missing.


"Apparently the suspect cut himself while he was inside the residence," Cropper said. "Officers took samples of that dried blood and turned it over to the crime lab and the crime lab made a match through CODIS."

CODIS is a national database that blends forensic evidence with computer technology. Cropper says when someone is arrested on a felony and taken to Bayou
Dorcheat Correctional
Center, a mouth swab is taken and that DNA is sent to the crime lab, where it is then entered into
CODIS. He also explained the difference between aggravated burglary and simple burglary.

"If you break into my house, and I have a gun there and you pick it up, you've armed yourself," he said. "If you go into my house and steal a TV, then it's a burglary. By stealing a gun, you've armed yourself, and that makes it aggravated burglary."

Harris admitted to the burglary following his arrest, Cropper says.

# Synthetic pot leads to nationwide spike in hospitalizations

HARTFORD, Conn. — A huge nationwide spike in hospitalizations month caused by a class of drugs often called "synthetic marijuana" illustrates the potency and dangers of the chemicals used to make them and the shifty tactics authorities believe manufacturers are using to evade regulation.

Poison control centers nationwide reported 359 cases in January of illnesses from synthetic cannabinoids, which mimic the effects of the main psychoactive ingredient in marijuana but can be far more potent. There were 273 in February and 269 in March. But the number skyrocketed to just over 1,500 in April, according to the American Association of Poison Control Centers.

"This is the worst outbreak of drug abuse that I've lived through," said Dr. Steven Marcus, executive director of the New Jersey

Poison Information and Education System at the New Jersey Medical School at Rutgers University, who has been monitoring the recent spike. "It's almost as if someone had made a witches' brew of these cannabinoids. This is not just powerful marijuana. This is really dangerous stuff that has effects that can be life-threatening."

A potential common link in last month's spike is a compound called MAB-CHMINACA, Marcus told The Associated Press in an interview. The compound was found during tests of synthetic marijuana seized by police in several states where people became ill,

All 50 states have banned cannabinoids by outlawing specific compounds since 2011, and a federal law in 2012 added certain cannabinoids to the U.S. controlled substances list, according to the National Conference of State Legislatures.

MAB-CHMINACA is relatively new and hasn't been banned in many states or by the federal government. A similar compound, AB-CHMINACA, emerged in the illicit drug market last year and was declared an illegal controlled substance in January under a temporary order by the Drug Enforcement Administration.

The DEA says a major problem has been chemical makers, including many in Asia, slightly changing chemical compounds so they're no longer banned controlled substances.

"It's hard to keep up with them," agency spokeswoman Barbara Carreno said. "We're not far behind, but they can tweak a formula faster than we can regulate it."

Synthetic marijuana usually is non-marijuana plant material sprayed with cannabinoids and marketed under brand names like Spice, K2 and Scooby Snax. It emerged in the U.S. around 2008 and became readily available in small retail outlets like convenience stores and head shops, as well as on the Internet, according to the Office of National Drug Control Policy.

It generally costs about \$30 per 3-gram package, similar to marijuana. Many brands list "not for consumption" on the small packages in an apparent attempt to avoid regulation, authorities say.

It became popular because it was easy to buy, people wrongly thought was harmless and its chemicals aren't detected on standard drug tests, the National Institute on Drug Abuse says. But it can be more potent than regular marijuana and can cause vomiting, seizures, hallucinations, elevated blood pressure, loss of consciousness and death, health officials say.

This week in the Willimantic, Connecticut, area, about a dozen people became ill and five were hospitalized after taking K2 believed to be laced with the hallucinogen PCP, police said. The five have been discharged.

Willimantic began receiving calls Monday morning of people psychotic exhibiting behavior after smoking the

"We've seen people running around without shirts, running down main thoroughfares within the city, asking for help," said police Cpl. Stanley Parizo

In New York City, there were more than 120 emergency-room visits linked to synthetic pot during a little more than a week last month, compared with an average of two to three visits a day earlier this year, according to the city Health Department.

Overdoses last month killed two people and sent several others to the hospital in tiny Hancock County, Mississippi; killed one person and sickened two others in Hampton, Virginia; sent nearly 100 people to the hospital in Alabama; and resulted in more than 30 hospitalizations in New Jersey. More than 100 overdose cases have been reported in Lincoln, Nebraska, in the past few weeks, with many users ending up in emergency rooms.

Health officials and police believe "tweaked" formulas may be responsible for the rash of hospital-

Recent testing of synthetic marijuana seized by police in New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Mississippi, Louisiana and other states have turned up a variety of substances, with many samples testing positive for MAB-CHMI-NACA, said Marcus, citing reports by the DEA's National Forensic Laboratory Information System, which collects test results from state and local forensic labs across the country.

Carreno said she could not confirm or deny the results, citing ongoing criminal investigations.

"You are correct that the community was promised that money would be no obstacle when it came to choosing an alternative," Gray said in an email to the Press-Herald. "I don't know the details of the state's technical review process of the vendor application...however, I can say that money has not

been an obstacle in our review of the LMD recommendation to us.

'Through the Dialogue (Committee) - everyone recognized that an alternative might need additional money as well as require a modification to the AOC between EPA, LMD, LDEQ and the Department of the Army," he continued. "As stated earlier letters to the state, EPA remains committed to both removing any barriers to selecting an alternative remedy and if it is determined that a modification to the AOC is necessary to implement an alternative - to support LDEQ and LMD in doing so.'

# The News-Star on education funding

At the risk of sounding like a broken record, the financial danger to our institutions of higher learning remains and has actually intensi-

Standard and Poor's Ratings Services has fired what one state official says is "a pretty serious warning shot" at five Louisiana public colleges and universities, placing their credit ratings on Credit Watch status with a negative outlook and possibly hampering future construction projects on their cam-

Standard and Poor's credit analyst Bianca Gaytan-Burrell of the Dallas office said the affected cam-puses are the University of Louisiana at Lafayette, Nicholls State, University of New Orleans, Delgado Community College and LSU's Bogalusa Community Medical Center Project. "It's not a súrprise. I'm disap-

pointed. It can be fixed," State Treasurer John N. Kennedy said. "It can be fixed if the state policymakers stop waterboarding higher education and start supporting it. "What they are saying is if

Louisiana doesn't get its act together, we're going to downgrade the credit rating of all the schools listed," he said. That costs taxpayers more money because they would have to pay higher interest rates. Gaytan-Burrell said the negative

outlook reflects a 1-in-3 chance that the campuses' credit quality could deteriorate, risking repayment on loans for campus construction proj-

If the Legislature does not resolve the higher education funding shortfalls projected for the 2015-16 budget, that downgrade will

Kennedy said the change to Credit Watch status, revealed in a report issued Monday, comes through no fault of the affected

campuses. The problem lies with the decisions that have been made over the past few years to significantly cut higher education. As Kennedy says, higher education "has been gutted

like a fish.' Standard and Poor's cites Louisiana state funding for higher education in reports issued in earlier, ominous credit ratings reports. In December 2014, it cited a negative outlook due at least in part to "the increased pressure on the university's financial operations due to declines in state support." Gov. Bobby Jindal's projected budget in

February didn't erase the rating agency's concerns.

Similar language emerged on the report released last week, when the ratings service cited the "the potential for negative rating actions due to the proposed reductions for higher education in the fiscal 2016 state budget for Louisiana." A rating action on a proposal is unusual, Standard and Poor said, but because of the state's history in reducing funding "even the best

case scenario could pressure public universities in Louisiana and result in significant related financial

Kennedy said the state's goal

should be no additional cuts. "Enough is enough," he said, adding that in his discussions with professors around the state, he's been told that state universities around the country are making offers to lure faculty members here away, given the dire outlook for

Louisiana colleges and universities. State Commissioner of Higher Education Joe Rallo said he believes lawmakers are aware of the risks to the campuses and that their conversations, at least in private, reflect

that awareness.

We do believe individual legislators, particularly those from northeast Louisiana, do aspire to develop a stable funding source for higher education. But as the debate over tax credits and tax increases goes into high gear, we want to sound like a broken record on the topic of

funding for our universities. Legislators must have courage to do the right thing, and that may mean bucking the administration to

# Hillary's Helpers

Remember those pesky syllogisms from high school? You know - major premise, minor premise, conclusion. For example:

The media generally prefers Democrats to Repub-

-Hillary Clinton is a Democrat

-Therefore, the media will favor Hillary Clinton in the

If anyone disputes either premise or the conclusion, please pass the Kool-Aid. Now, this is not to say that Mrs. Clinton will get a free ride or receive the kind of adoring coverage that was

heaped on Barack Obama eight years ago.

Right now some outlets are obviously peeved at Hillary Clinton's decision to scrupulously avoid

interviews. The New York Times crunched the numbers and wrote this: "Since she declared her candidacy, Hillary Rodham Clinton has answered just seven questions from reporters.'

The Washington Post then got out its trusty calculator and concluded that the Democratic front-runner has answered "roughly threetenths of a question per day." Things are so bad that Confederate General Thomas 'Stonewall" Jackson may have to share his nickname

The media doesn't like to be ignored, and right now many reporters are irked at the Clinton avoidance strategy. In fairness, we should also point out that the New York Times has done some real digging into the Clinton Foundation story. But don't leap to any "ergo" and conclude that major press outfits will subject Hillary Clinton to the kind of scrutiny they traditionally reserve for Repub-

We got a sneak preview of pro-Clinton bias the other day when the New York Times and CBS News polled voters about her various qualities. Despite questions about the Clinton Foundation, despite the destroyed emails, despite all the evasions and word-parsing, the Times reported that Hillary Clinton has "initially weathered" the barrage of bad

The paper's headline was especially interesting: "Hillary Clinton's Appeal Survives Scrutiny, Poll Says." But does that headline itself survive scrutiny? True, the survey found that 81% of Democrats believe Mrs. Clinton to be "honest and trustworthy." But 51% of independents say she is "not honest and trustworthy."

And when Fox News conducted a similar poll, only 33% of independents characterized the former First Lady as honest. Those are abysmal numbers for a woman who desperately needs the support of independent voters, not just hard-core Democrats. Maybe her appeal hasn't "survived scrutiny" after all.

With the campaign season revving up, get used to news coverage that is, shall we say, less than balanced. As Bernie Goldberg said this week, after admitting his embarrassment at making such an obvious point, "the so-called mainstream media tilts left." That is a given, despite

protestations to the contrary by loony left-wing websites. The question is how much that tilting will help Hillary Clinton's candidacy. One mainstreamer, in a moment of candor, once suggested that media bias is worth about 15% to any Democratic presidential candidate. He later revised that downward to 5%, but that is still enough to swing pretty much every national election this side of Reagan-Mondale.

So here's a tip: Read the polls, analyze the news, follow the coverage, and never, ever overlook the fine print. It's often more revealing than the article, and especially the

headline. We The People are facing economic malaise, the threat of terrorism, widespread polarization, crumbling cities, and a debased culture. The next president will have much to do in determining whether the USA can overcome these dire problems. We all need to be high-information voters. Now more than ever.

## **American** Press on government health care being too bureaucratic

The latest example of what a bureaucratic mess federally controlled health care has become is the roadblock being put up to prevent our state from even attempting limited privatization. This is also another example of denial of state and taxpayer rights to local control of programs.

The Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) denied Louisiana's appeal in a letter issued recently, which was released by Jindal administration

The state health agency had asked CMS to reconsider its disallowance of \$189.9 million in federal financial participation for the hospital deals which used the lease payments as the state share. The disallowance covered Jan. 1, 2013 to May 23, 2014.

The disallowance means the state would eventually have to repay the Medicaid expense.

State officials immediately said they would take an appeal to the next level — an administrative hearing — and if unsuccessful they are prepared to fight it out in federal court.

This ridiculous bureaucratic red tape is nothing but obstruction of a state's attempt to make this creaky, old government run system of health care more efficient and workable for the peo

It also adds enormous and needless legal expenses for the taxpayers and adds to the reality of a federal government that has become too big, too expensive and increasingly oppressive.

Another example of this same red tape-bound and obstinate federal health care system is the Veterans Administration's frustrating incompetence or its inability, or deliberate unwillingness, to open a VA clinic in Lake

What is a rightful entitlement for Southwest Louisiana veterans has been fraught with shameful bureaucratic delays, now stretching on for years, if not outright obstruction.

Let's face it, government is incapable of delivering either quality or affordable health care to this state or nation. How much more evidence do we need?

Department of Health and Hospitals Secretary Kathy Kliebert said there is no impact on the budget anytime soon. "It could take years to get through the court system," she said.

Kliebert said the state won't likely get a favorable ruling out of the administrative hearing. "We anticipate when we get to court we will be able to present our case and win it."





# Bill Cosby accuser says she wants her 'good name' restored

Bill Cosby for defamation said she wants her reputation restored after she was branded a liar by his representatives when she came forward with decades-old sexual assault allegations.

Therese Serignese, of Boca Raton, said her case, which had a brief hearing before a federal judge in Worcester on Thursday, is not about financial compensation but about clearing her "good name."

"It hurts to be called the things that I have been called," the 58-year-old nurse said after the hearing, which was the first since the lawsuit was filed in December. "I take pride in my word. I'm an honest person. I came forward with statements of truth. I expect Mr. Cosby to be an honest person as well."

The lawsuit focuses on the defamation allegations and not the assault allega-

Thursday's hearing focused on a request to subpoena records from the lawyers for Andrea Constand, the first woman to file a lawsuit against Cosby for alleged sexual transgressions.

But Cosby's lawyers argued Thursday that the request was improper and unnecessary. A federal judge denied the motion.



The suit also includes two other women as plaintiffs — Tamara Green and Linda Traitz — who say they have been slandered by Cosby's representatives after accusing the "Cosby Show" star of sexual misconduct.

The three women are among dozens who have stepped forward in recent years with assault accusa-

tions against Cosby, who hasn't been charged with

The actor and comedian, who has a home in western Massachusetts, was not present at the hearing Thursday, and his lawyers declined to com-

In court filings, Cosby's lawyers have argued that he was merely acting in self-defense when, through his representatives, he made critical statements about his accusers.

Cosby has denied any sexual misconduct and has said he felt his character was under attack after woman after woman made new allegations.

Serignese says Cosby drugged and raped her in a dressing room after a show in Las Vegas in 1976. She says she was 19 years old at the time. In previous interviews,

Serignese has said she will-

ingly stayed with Cosby in

Las Vegas for some time after the attack and that the two maintained sporadic contact until 1996.

Green, of California, says Cosby drugged and sexually assaulted her in her Los Angeles-area apartment in the early

Traitz, of Florida, alleges Cosby tried to drug her and then groped her on a Southern California beach in about 1970.

The women seek unspecified monetary damages.

The Associated Press generally does not publish the names of people alleging sexual assault, but Serignese, Green and Traitz have publicly discussed the allegations.

Serignese had been among 13 anonymous women prepared to testify if Constand's 2004 case had moved forward.

But Constand, a former University women's basketball official, dropped her suit in 2006 after reaching an undisclosed settlement with Cosby.

Lawyers representing Serignese, Green and Traitz were seeking documents related to their clients that they say are the subject of a confidentiality agreement in Constand's case.

The two sides are next expected in federal court on June 9 for a hearing in Springfield on Cosby's lawyers' motion to dismiss the lawsuit.

## Kimmel won't air new episode opposite Letterman's final show

LOS ANGELES — Jimmy Kimmel is choosing not to air a new episode of his talk show opposite David Letterman's final "Late Show" installment.

Kimmel told the New York Times on Thursday that his May 20 episode will be a repeat out of respect for Letterman. Kimmel's spokeswoman confirmed the report. Other editions of ABC's "Jimmy Kimmel Live" that week wiii be new.

"I have too much respect for Dave to do

anything that would distract viewers from watching his final show," said Kimmel in an email to the Times. "Plus, I'll probably be crying all day, which makes it hard to work.

Jimmy Fallon and Conan O'Brien aren't following suit. NBC's "The Tonight Show" and TBS' "Conan" are planning original installments for May 20, according to show representatives.

Comedy Central's Daily Show with Jon Stewart" and "The Nightly will be in repeats that Letterman has hosted

Show with Larry Wilmore"

"Late Show" for 33 years.

Last year during Jay Leno's final Tonight Show," rivals Letterman, Kimmel and O'Brien each aired new episodes. In their opening monologues that night, Letterman and O'Brien mentioned Leno's last hurrah, while Kimmel tweeted about it.
