City budget topic of workshop

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The Minden City Council and city department heads continued to hash out the numbers in the second of two budget workshops Thursday.

Mayor Tommy Davis says they are projecting roughly \$30 million in revenue with a 1.3 percent

increase.

"And to balance it we're going to need about \$750,000 in reserves," he said.

In the workshop, discussion centered on proposed cuts in every department, where they looked at possibly shaving some things from departments.

"When we meet next time, the council is going

to come back with some recommendations," he said.

They are still looking into offsetting the increase in costs such as retirement and health benefits. Also, departments are asking for

raises for the employees. A two percent, across the board, raise was discussed; however, no final decision on raises will be made until the council passes their budget in September.

Minden Police Chief Steve Cropper asked for a raise for his officers as well as new cars for his department. One will have to be replaced following the car

crash that left one patrol unit totaled.

Cropper says all departments with the city are important, but he's also facing officers that may be willing to walk out the door if they don't get a raise.

"I've got five or six good officers that are just waiting to see what the city is

City continues to seek downtown director

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The City of Minden is accepting applications for the newly separated job of downtown development director.

Mayor Tommy Davis says they've already begun advertising for the job, but didn't give a timeline as to when interviews for the position will begin.

"We're advertising for that position right now," he said, adding the number of applications received so far is unknown.

The downtown development director works strictly with the Minden Main Street program. As for seating a board, those positions will be filled by appointment, Davis says, and they have some names of some people they are looking into.

"We're compiling a list of people that we think would be interested and good on that, but we have not started contacting anybody yet," he said.

The downtown development director salary will begin around \$28,500.

A bill just passed this year's legislature that separated the job of the downtown development director and the economic director and cleaned up some language regarding the board to make it all legal. He says the problem was no one on the commission met the requirements, which made the commission unconstitutional.

According to the new bill, for potential members

Man flees police, crashes stolen car

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A Minden man who fled police didn't get very far, but he racked up a string of charges in his wake.

Shawn David Rambin, 37, of the 1100 block of Pine Street, was arrested Monday, July 13, and charged with two counts of theft of a motor vehicle, theft over \$1,500, illegal possession of stolen things, possession of Schedule IV CDS (clonazepam), possession of a firearm by a convicted felon, possession of a firearm in the presence of a CDS, two counts of hit and run, open container, stop sign, two counts of no driver's license, four counts of simple burglary, simple theft, two counts of possession of a legend drug and unauthorized entry. A hold was also placed on him by probation and parole. Bond was set at \$217,250.

Minden Police Chief Steve Cropper says they'd gotten a call in reference to a hit and run where a vehicle struck a parked vehicle in the parking lot at Wal-Mart and left the scene.

"Officers located the vehicle that was involved with the hit and run," he said. "At that point in time, the suspect, Mr. Rambin, ran a stop sign at Pine and Marshall Streets, where he wrecked the vehicle, which turned out to be stolen."

Rambin fled the scene on foot and ran inside a residence on Marshall Street where he did not have permission, trying to hide from police.

LSU hospital manager slaps competitor with lawsuit

BATON ROUGE — The operator of LSU's Shreveport hospital sued its regional competitor Thursday, accusing it of violating federal antitrust laws and trying to take away university-affiliated doctors and paying patients.

The lawsuit, filed in Shreveport by the Biomedical Research Foundation of Northwest Louisiana, or BRF, is an outgrowth of continuing tensions with LSU since the foundation took control of the university's Shreveport and Monroe hospitals in October 2013.

BRF accuses Willis-Knighton Health System of trying to undermine the entire LSU hospital privatization deal.

The research foundation, which runs the two state-owned hospitals as University Health, said plans to have LSU doctors working at Willis-Knighton clinics to provide specialty care will give Willis-Knighton a monopoly in the market, largely eliminating competition and driving up health care costs in the region.

Steve Skrivanos, chairman of the BRF board, said Willis-Knighton was "trying to destroy University Health as a competitor." The lawsuit seeks to nullify the clinic plans.

Monroe-based insurer

ance company Vantage Health Plan also joined the lawsuit, claiming Willis-Knighton has refused to offer the insurer reasonable contract terms to provide coverage in the Shreveport area.

Vantage CEO Gary Jones said Willis-Knighton is able to charge as much as two or three times what health providers charge in other regions because the health system controls so much of the market.

"That increases costs for everybody," Jones said.

Willis-Knighton wouldn't comment Thursday on the lawsuit, saying in a statement that it has "a long-standing policy of not speaking or responding publicly on the business decisions or actions of other health care providers."

University officials and BRF have repeatedly clashed since Gov. Bobby Jindal privatized the north Louisiana hospitals nearly two years ago. The foundation had never run a patient care facility when it got the no-bid contract, and several state officials are pushing for LSU to find a new operator of the two hospitals — and to consider Willis-Knighton.

LSU System President F. King Alexander notified the research foundation last week that it has failed

to meet its contractual obligations and is considered in breach of contract. Willis-Knighton reached out to Jindal and others about possibly assuming management of LSU's Shreveport hospital earlier this year.

The lawsuit claims Willis-Knighton is seeking to pressure LSU to oust the research foundation as hospital manager, "so that Willis-Knighton can take it over." The privatization

deal for the LSU hospitals has worked so well that Willis-Knighton is threatened by the improved competition, the lawsuit says.

But David Ettinger, an antitrust lawyer hired by BRF, said the antitrust lawsuit wasn't "a matter of retaliation" against Willis-Knighton.

He said to give Willis-Knighton "an even greater mass of providers violates the law and we think is

harmful to the community." He estimated the health system has 75 percent of the commercially insured business in the region today and said that would grow to 86 percent if the LSU clinic deal was allowed to take place.

Willis-Knighton described its support for the LSU medical school and its doctors, saying physicians from the university have worked with Willis-Knighton for

decades.

"It has been and continues to be a healthy, positive relationship for patients and families throughout our area," the statement said.

Willis-Knighton previously raised antitrust concerns itself two years ago, when it decided against entering a privatization deal with the Jindal administration to take over the LSU Shreveport hospital.

going to do," he said.

Many of them could go anywhere and work, he says, but they love Webster Parish.

"It's just gotten to the point where they just can't survive," Cropper said. "Minden has one of the lowest crime rates in this state. I have officers that are proactive; they look for drugs on the streets, they

look for people breaking into vehicles, they look for people breaking into houses."

He fears if they can't give these officers raises, then they will end up with officers no other department wants.

"I'm not saying these other departments aren't important, but if you want good public safety, you're going to have to pay for good public safety," he said.

Fire Chief Kip Mourad also talked about his

department, saying those under 20 years of service receive a two percent longevity raise, and that's all some have to hold on to. The fire department, set by the civil service board, gets a mandatory two percent longevity raise whether the city decides to give raises or not.

For instance, if the city decided to give an across the board raise, the fire department would receive their raise plus two percent.

"We stay here because

we like Minden," he said. "I chose to be here, but if you cut the two percent, that's all some of these employees are holding on to — the only benefit. My retirement is met, some of the others are met. Some of the guys are holding on to it because they don't want to go anywhere. I'll fight for that two percent until my last breath."

Councilman Bennie Gray says if there is any way possible, he'd like to see a two percent raise across the board. Council-

man Mike Toland says he feels they should be able to come up with the two percent, adding he wants to study the options given to them.

Davis says there are some fee increases added into the coming year's proposed budget as well. They are looking at raising rates on sewer and sanitation fees.

"That's not been done yet, but it's what we're looking at," he said.

Recreation fees may be going up as well. A long

discussion centered on what the recreation center pays for, like upkeep of all the city's parks and the center, and what the fees cover.

Rec Center director Winky Newer says the fees parents pay for their children to play sports don't cover all it takes to provide sports activities. He says a fee increase would help.

The next regular council meeting will be Monday, August 3.

"He left that residence, stole a second vehicle taken from Marshall Street, and was eventually stopped by officers," Cropper says. "In a search of Rambin, he had a loaded

Higher numbers of La. students reach college-ready ACT score

BATON ROUGE — The number of public high school seniors who scored well enough on the ACT standardized test to enter college without remedial work continues to grow, Louisiana's education department said Thursday.

Of the latest group of graduating seniors, 24,619 students earned an ACT score of 18 or higher. That's a boost of 959 students from 2014 and of 6,312 students from 2012, according to data released by the department.

The number of students who scored well enough to

earn scholarships through the state's TOPS free college tuition program also increased. Nearly 1,000 more students reached a score to be eligible for TOPS than in the previous year, according to the education department.

State Superintendent John White credited rising standards and accountability changes for the improvements.

"Raising expectations for all students is not easy, but our students are showing they are as smart and capable as any in America," White said in a state-

ment. "By providing access to more rigorous courses and tests for all students, we are seeing achievement increase across the board."

Louisiana's average ACT composite score is 19.4 on a 36-point scale, the department said.

National ACT results won't be released until next month, but Louisiana has consistently fallen below the national average of states and is expected to do so again. The national average ACT composite score last year was 21.

For the TOPS program, 27,838 students earned the

minimum 17 ACT score needed for a TOPS Tech award for community or technical college tuition, while 18,039 received the 20 Act score needed for a TOPS award to a regional university.

Louisiana began requiring all students to take the ACT in 2013, regardless of whether they planned to enter college. State officials said the ACT provides students with an opportunity to measure educational progress, while helping the state measure schools' effectiveness.

DHH: Parents ensure vaccinations are current

BATON ROUGE — With the beginning of a new school year quickly approaching, state health regulators are urging parents to make sure their children have received all required vaccinations.

State officials say Louisiana law requires children, ages 4 or older and entering kindergarten, pre-kindergarten or Head Start programs, to have proof of receiving the following vaccinations:

— booster dose of poliovirus vaccine
— two doses of measles, mumps and

rubella vaccine
— three doses of hepatitis vaccine
— two doses of varicella (chicken pox) vaccine
— booster dose of diphtheria-tetanus-acellular pertussis (Tdap) vaccine.

Children in daycare also need to be up-to-date with their age-appropriate immunizations. Children 11 or older and entering the sixth grade must have proof they received all the age-appropriate immunizations listed above, as well as vaccinations for meningitis and Tdap.

Diabetes is a dirty word but according to a study released by the Center of Disease Control, in January 2011, it was stated that if our present trend continues, 1 in 3 Americans could be diabetic by 2050.

She said “you need to schedule an appointment with our office so that we can teach you how to give yourself insulin shots!”

That was one call I did not take. I let it go to voice mail because I was busy eating and sharing a Blonde brownie with friends at a local restaurant.

I've not had one bite of dessert or bread since that call came!

Mustering up courage, I paid a visit to Dr. Carter Boyd right before Christmas. I told him “I am going to do this my way! I will give up bread, desserts, all fried foods and white products. I will lose twenty five pounds. I will take up walking again and continue drinking lots of water. I know I can do this without insulin to which he replied “If you do what you say you will do, I know you can!”

That shock brought change to my life! My children had been after me for years to get serious about my blood sugar.

Sometimes we just don't listen.

Then on June 22 it was Ebony on the line again, telling me my blood sugar is much better! It is now at 5.6 which is right under normal.

This doesn't make me a welcome camper, at regular senior citizen luncheons, where a number of the others are shooting insulin after rounds of desert.

It takes courage to not give into peer pressure.

Sugar is addictive. I am like an alcoholic. I may not ever be out of the woods but medical research says that diabetes is reversible. I do not want to be one who sits in my recliner while I drink sugared drinks, eat ice cream and lose my feet.

Having grown up in an orphanage, I suffer from post-traumatic stress disorder, but I know sugar isn't the answer. Life is simply too beautiful to give up!

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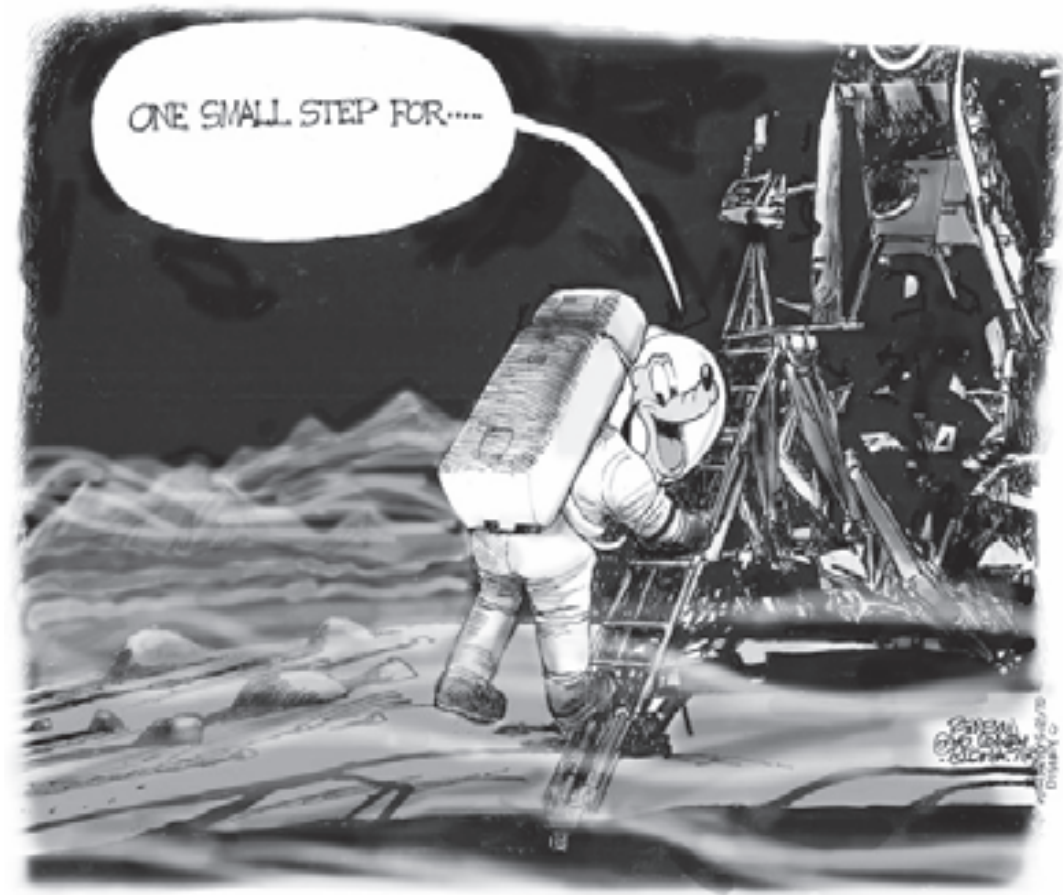

Planned parenthood, cut the cord

You have probably seen the newly-released undercover video involving Planned Parenthood. Any humane citizen, anti-abortion or not, has to be sickened by the conversation.

The video shows Dr. Deborah Nucatola, Planned Parenthood's senior director of medical research, discussing the sale of fetal body parts. Between sips of red wine, she breezily talks about crushing an unborn baby so as to keep certain organs intact.

The not-so-good doctor thought her dining partners were representatives of a biotech firm; in fact, they were actors hired by an anti-abortion group.

That organization, the Center for Medical Progress, is now public enemy number one to the hateful left-wing media. CMP is being accused of perpetrating a "hoax" and a "flimflam" by releasing excerpts from the conversation. Planned Parenthood itself denounces it as a "heavily edited video."

Of course the video was edited. But even her most ardent defenders are not denying what Deborah Nucatola said. Or how she said it. "We've been very good at getting heart, lung, liver," she casually boasted. "I'm gonna basically crush below, I'm gonna crush above, and I'm gonna see if I can get it all intact." Nucatola charmingly added, "A lot of people want liver." She was not referring to that day's lunch menu.

Nucatola also spoke candidly about the fees for providing body parts to medical researchers, which she esti-

mated at \$30 to \$100 per organ. It is not clear whether that is against the law - selling body parts for profit is illegal, but Planned Parenthood claims it is merely reimbursed for its costs. There may not be a smoking gun, but there is certainly a bloody forceps.

The man behind the video, anti-abortion activist David Daleiden, leveled some very serious charges Wednesday night on The Factor. He flat-out accused Planned Parenthood in Los Angeles of criminal behavior, saying the organization "has been involved in selling the body parts of the babies that they abort for decades ... they sell the body parts and they make money off of doing so."

Of course, this is far from the first outrage involving Planned Parenthood. The virulently pro-abortion group has come under fire for telling minors how to avoid reporting statutory rape charges against their much-older boyfriends, and for promoting questionable abortions. And now there is this nauseating video.

Planned Parenthood's defenders in the left-wing media have already rushed to their battle stations, unloading both barrels on the Center for Medical Progress. But, again, Dr. Nucatola is very clear on the video, laying out just how the abortionist can protect certain organs while killing the fetus. It all brings new meaning to that old adage: "The operation was a success, but the patient died."

This week a woman named Abby Johnson watched the video and then wrote an open letter to Dr. Nucatola. Johnson has some special insight, having run a Planned Parenthood clinic. "I used to be just like you," she wrote. "My former clinic used to harvest fetal body parts ... all of the blood, body parts, and extra tissue would be collected into a glass jar." Johnson added this: "After

a grueling abortion day, we would all go out for margaritas and talk about harvesting fetal parts as if we were talking about harvesting a field of corn." This brings to mind what Hannah Arendt famously referred to as "the banality of evil."

We don't know if Planned Parenthood has broken the law in this case; the cops and the courts can sort that out. But we certainly know that taxpayers should not be contributing to the carnage wreaked by these abortionists.

We the people fork over more than \$500-million to Planned Parenthood each year. A half a billion dollars! The group and its acolytes claim the money is used to promote "women's health" and "prenatal services." Is anyone fooled by that? That federal largesse helps support the country's largest abortion mill, plain and simple. A group that aborts about 1,000 fetuses every single day.

Whatever you think of abortion, can't we all agree that the time has come to end this outrageous subsidy that enables an ugly and dishonest group to continue its vile behavior?

Some members of Congress are now vowing to investigate and hold hearings. Let the tribunals begin, and let Dr. Deborah Nucatola step forward as a witness. We should warn her, though, that the hearings won't be providing any nice Chianti. On Capitol Hill, it's strictly BYOB.

One final word. Planned Parenthood accuses the Center for Medical Progress of "unethical video editing." Imagine being lectured about ethics by Planned Parenthood! Irony just doesn't get any richer. Planned Parenthood, though, gets richer all the time, thanks to you and me. It has to stop, it is long past time to cut the cord.

Times-Picayune on justice moving slowly

Every part of the criminal justice system must work efficiently for justice to be served and New Orleans to be safer. That hasn't always been the case at Criminal District Court. But the court overall improved significantly in 2014 in moving cases through the docket.

The average time it took for a case to be wrapped up in 2011 — from arraignment to conviction, guilty plea or dismissal — was 157 days. In 2014, that improved to 117 days, according to the Metropolitan Crime Commission annual report on the 12 CDC judges' efficiency. If the bottom three judges are excluded, that number falls to 100 days — which is quicker than the national average of 111 days.

"That is an impressive accomplishment for the court as a whole," commission president Rafael Goyeneche said. "You have judges that are working hard and are working smart, as a whole."

The quicker pace at the court is a positive development. Speed is not the only measure of a well run and fair judicial system, but letting cases languish for months on end doesn't serve the accused, the victim or the public.

"When I ran several years ago, I ran on a pledge that I would work hard and take the bench early because my theory has always been justice delayed is justice denied," Judge Franz Zibilich said.

The court's improvements in case management are particularly noteworthy because violent crime and the use of weapons are significantly higher in New Orleans than in other cities. The national average is 29 percent, but 45 percent of felony cases here involve violence and weapons, Mr. Goyeneche said. Those cases are more complex and can take more court time.

Also, District Attorney Leon Cannizzaro's office accepted more cases for prosecution in 2014 than the year before. That increased the average number of pending cases from 2,573 in 2013 to 2,692 in 2014, according to the crime commission report.

It is significant that judges are moving cases promptly despite those challenges. The statistics suggest judges are telling people to be in court on time "and doing their part to ensure justice is timely administered in their section of court," Mr. Goyeneche said.

Judge Zibilich moved into the top spot, as the most efficient jurist for 2014. Judge Karen Herman, who had been No. 1 for five years, came in second in a tie with Judge Keva Landrum-Johnson.

Some judges are lagging badly, though. The least efficient in the crime commission report were Darryl Derbigny and Julian Parker, who tied for 10th place, and Tracey Flemings-Davillier, who was last. All three were ranked near the bottom in 2013, as well. Judge Parker retired at the end of 2014, but the other two need to get a handle on their caseload.

Judge Flemings-Davillier inherited a massive docket when she took the bench in 2012. She points out that she has worked hard and moved almost all of those cases as well as the cases allotted to her in 2013.

Still, she had an average of 422 cases open each quarter in 2014, according to the crime commission. Mr. Goyeneche has said that the judges with the largest backlogs may need the help of an ad hoc judge appointed by the Supreme Court. That would be a sensible approach.

The court as a whole could be more efficient with an electronic docket system, he said.

Some judges are critical of the crime commission report and question its need and fairness. But looking at how individual judges are performing, and which ones are behind, is worthwhile.

The public elects these judges and depends on them to run criminal courts effectively. It is important to know who is and isn't doing that.

New year, same battle



HOOVER, Ala. — Brandon Harris has been taking advantage of his competitor's time away from LSU's starting quarterback battle, but Anthony Jennings may be back soon enough.

LSU coach Les Miles said he is "optimistic" that the team's four suspended players will return, and that includes his incumbent starter, Jennings, at the team's most important position. The Tigers' much-publicized quarterback battle isn't far from restarting.

"Eventually, both guys will be on the team," Miles said Thursday during LSU's time at Southeastern Conference Media Days. "Confident in both guys. I think there are some advantages Brandon has had. Have to see how that works out. Competition will decide who starts."

Jennings has been suspended since his arrest June 18 for unauthorized entry

into a dwelling. Jennings, defensive back Dwayne Thomas and defensive lineman Maquedius Bain allegedly walked into a fellow student's apartment to retrieve items they claim were stolen from Jennings the week before. Jennings filed a police report for the stolen items a few days before the incident.

Thomas also was booked on a simple burglary charge. Offensive lineman Jevonte Domond, a reserve junior-college transfer, was arrested in May for felony domestic abuse battery.

Miles suggested Wednesday that all four will return to the team. East Baton Rouge District Attorney Hillar Moore has not formally charged any of the suspended players.

"I don't want to come in front of the legal process here. From what I know, it appears to be something that has resolution," Miles said. "Legal process is not done yet."

In the meantime, Harris has the team to himself. For nearly a month, he has operated as the Tigers' starting quarterback while Jennings is on suspension. Miles said Jennings has not participated in any summer

workouts.

"The extra throws that Brandon has gotten has helped him, 7-on-7s and all of the things he's done that summer," Miles said. "Players say that (Harris) played well. I'm not saying they're making a decision, but it is certainly a positive piece."

Coaches are not allowed to instruct voluntary summer workouts. Strength and conditioning staff members oversee summer drills.

Players have taken notice of Harris.

"Brandon has been doing a great job, man," linebacker Kendall Beckwith said. "Being a great leader. Really get those guys going. He gets on them. It was kind of surprising. I didn't expect Brandon to get on somebody the way he does. He's really been working hard, making crisp passes. He's been making some great passes, been putting some balls in some windows like I haven't seen."

"Even before things happened with Anthony, he was doing the same thing," said senior Vadal Alexander, who has settled in as LSU's right tackle. "I see a big difference in their maturity, growth and their development."

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'Game of Thrones' earns a leading 24 Emmy Award nominations

WEST HOLLYWOOD, Calif. — The Emmys, television's highest-profile awards, could have seized the moment with Thursday's nominations to fully acknowledge the wealth of diverse talent adding to the medium's vibrancy and relevance.

There was recognition of stellar actresses Taraji P. Henson and Viola Davis. Henson, who plays the sexy, formidable matriarch on hip-hop drama "Empire" and Davis, a brilliantly cutthroat attorney on "How to Get Away with Murder," are competing for drama series actress honors.

The nominations set up the possibility of a history-making outcome: It's one of the few top acting categories that has only been awarded to white actresses.

"I gotta win! I gotta win for history!" an exuberant Henson said when asked about the prospect during an "Empire" panel in May.

But there were glaring omissions as well — including a shut-out in major awards for "Empire," a breakout hit that makes a black family the rare focus of a TV drama, other than Henson's bid.

Academy voters also snubbed Latina actresses Gina Rodriguez, a Golden Globe winner for "Jane the Virgin," and Sofia Vergara, a four-time nominee for "Modern Family."

Queen Latifah is in the running for her compelling portrayal of blues singer Bessie Smith in the film "Bessie." Its 12 nominations included best TV movie and acting nods for Mo'Nique and Michael Kenneth Williams.

"This is what it's supposed to be like. You should recognize actors and creative people in this industry from every level of all colors who do great work," Latifah said.

The realm of gender identity also received some attention, with "Transparent" and star Jeffrey Tambor's transsexual portrayal earning best comedy series and acting bids.

"Any light of recognition and acceptance by the academy and the community is so important



for our show because we are still the little engine that could," Tambor said. "And the subject matter is so important. So this is really, really a bright, bright day."

It's understandable that worthy shows and performers will be overlooked, given the crush of small-screen programming on broadcast, cable, satellite and online. But some omissions stand out as a sign the TV industry has yet to encompass the diversity of the country it seeks to entertain.

While academy voters found room for Henson and Davis, two-time nominee Kerry Washington of "Scandal" was

squeezed out.

Family comedy "black-ish" earned an acting bid for star Anthony Anderson, but failed to gain a best series nomination.

For the overall top nominee, the nominations were a rerun of last year. "Game of Thrones" repeated as the top nominee, with 24 bids. That's five more than last year, despite the fantasy saga taking hits for depicting a female character's wedding-night rape by her brutish husband.

The series is a contender again for top drama honors, an award that has eluded it since it debuted in 2011. TV academy

voters rarely give shows in the sci-fi or other genres the ultimate accolade, with "Lost" among the rare exceptions.

Other top awards are "American Horror Story: Freak Show," with 19 nominations; TV movie "Olive Kitteridge" with 13 nominations; and "House of Cards," "Mad Men" and "Transparent" with 11 nominations.

The nominations reflect the steadily rising tide of cord-cutting networks. No commercial broadcast network drama made the cut for best series, with cable, streaming service Netflix and non-commercial PBS divid-

ing up the spoils instead.

"The Good Wife" was the last broadcast nominee in the category, in 2011.

Programs getting a last chance for Emmy glory include best drama series nominee "Mad Men," a four-time winner in the category that would be the most-honored drama ever with a fifth trophy. For star Jon Hamm's portrayal of Don Draper, it's a final shot after seven previous nominations.

David Letterman, who retired from "Late Show," and Stephen Colbert, who left "The Colbert Report" to succeed Letterman this fall, both received variety talk show nominations for their former shows.

"Late Show" was last nominated in 2009 as best variety, music or comedy series and last won in 2002. Colbert's show won in 2014.

They're both getting a break: the TV academy split the variety series category into two, one for variety talk shows and one for variety or sketch series like "Saturday Night Live," making space for more contenders in each.

Joining "Game of Thrones," "Mad Men" and "Better Call Saul" in the best drama category are "Downton Abbey," "Homeland," "House of Cards" and "Orange Is the New Black," which switched over from comedy series contention because of an Emmy rules change.

On the comedy series side, perennial TV academy favorite "Modern Family" is nominated again, along with "Louie," "Silicon Valley," "Transparent," "Unbreakable Kimmy Schmidt" and "Veep."

"Modern Family" has won in the category a record-tying (with "Frasier") five times.

The Emmy Awards will air Sept. 20 on Fox, with Andy Samberg as host.

HBO received a leading 126 nominations, followed by ABC with 42, CBS and NBC with 41, FX Network with 38, Fox with 35, Netflix with 34, Comedy Central with 25 and Showtime with 18.

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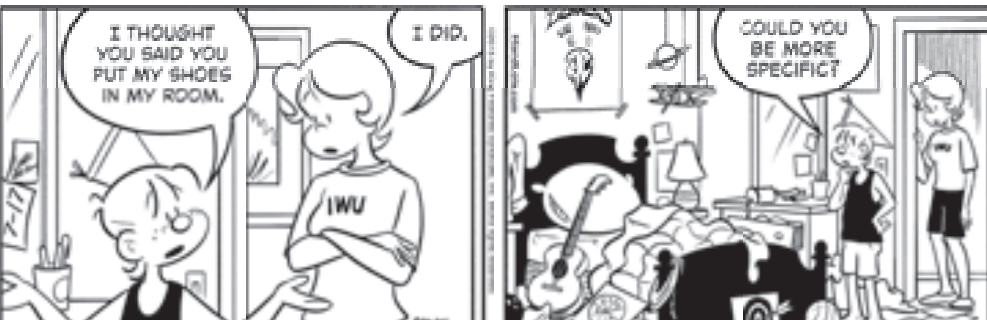
