Minden Fire Chief Kip Mourad offered some fireworks safety tips for this Fourth of July, saying it's always best to use common sense.

FIREWORKS SAFETY TIPS

The U.S. Consumer Product Safety **Commission offers the following tips** for using fireworks safely:

»Never allow young children to play with or ignite fireworks.

»Avoid buying fireworks that are packaged in brown paper because this is often a sign that the fireworks were made for professional displays and that they could pose a danger to consumers.

»Always have an adult supervise fireworks activities.

»Parents don't realize that young children suffer injuries from sparklers. Sparklers burn at temperatures of about 2,000 degrees - hot enough to melt some metals.

»Never place any part of your body directly over a fireworks device when lighting the fuse. Back up to a safe distance immediately after lighting fireworks.

MINDEN CRIME Fight lands man in jail

A Shreveport man was arrested following a fight that led to a man going to the hospital.

Cedrick Jones, 45, of the 5000 block of Kennedy

Street in Shreveport, was arrested Saturday, June 27, and charged with aggra-vated criminal damage to property



and aggra-

vated assault. Bond was set at \$35,000.

According to reports, Jones was the apparent aggressor in the fight between him and the boyfriend of his ex-girlfriend.

Officer Mitch Hackett and Sgt. Ryan Barnette responded to the call at the 500 block of Myers Street in reference to a disturbance. Upon arrival, the victim explained Jones and his brother were there and the victim was trying to deescalate the situation but Jones attempted to hit him. The argument escalated and the victim tried to get into his vehicle and drive away. Reports indicate Jones grabbed a tire tool and smashed the driver's side window while the victim was inside, causing injury to his arms and eyes. He was transported to Minden Medical Center for treatment of the injuries. Photographs of the vehicle and the victim were taken and submitted into evidence. Jones was transported to Bayou Dorcheat Correctional Center.

"Don't let kids play with fireworks without an adult present," he said. "Don't light any in your hand or throw them.'

He says when shooting fireworks, it is best not to shoot them towards people, especially bottle rockets, because they can backfire causing, in some cases, severe injury.

"(Use) basic common sense in operating them," he said. "Don't light them or throw them around any structures; have them out in an open area."

He also suggests having a water source nearby if it hasn't rained all week, even with the amount of rain the area has received over the last several months.

Chief of Police Steve Cropper says a good rule of thumb to remember about fireworks is that as long as fireworks companies are selling, it's OK to shoot

»Never try to re-light or pick up fireworks that have not ignited fully.

»Never point or throw fireworks at another person.

»Keep a bucket of water or a garden hose handy in case of fire or other mishap.

»Light fireworks one at a time, then move back quickly.

»Never carry fireworks in a pocket or shoot them off in metal or glass containers.

»After fireworks complete their burning, douse the spent device with plenty of water from a bucket or hose before discarding it to prevent a trash fire.

SAFETY **Cropper: Be safe this Fourth of July**

Law enforcement officials are urging motorists to be safe this Fourth of July as many families will be on the road to visit friends and loved ones. Minden Police Chief Steve Cropper says the most important thing a driver can do is wear their seatbelt and make sure

every passenger in the vehicle is belted in as well.

With families traveling out of town, I want to you stress need to wear your seatbelt," he said. "Be CROPPER

smart and have a good time." He addressed drinking and driving as well.

"With it being a holiday weekend, everybody likes to get together and celebrate, and you need to stay away from drinking and driving," he said. "That's a big issue."

Louisiana State Trooper Matt Harris, public information officer, says wearing seat belts and driving sober are of utmost importance when inside a vehicle.

"In 2014, 47 percent of the fatal crashes investigated by Troop G involved impaired drivers and 60 percent involved unrestrained motorists," he said, "so make the right choice this Independence Day. Drive sober and buckle up."

Cropper says handguns being fired on the Fourth of July has always been a big issue. He warns gun owners that it is illegal to

fire a weapon within the city limits of Minden.

"A lot of people think it's OK to fire a gun up in the air on the Fourth of July," Cropper said. "They don't stop to realize that even though that bullet goes up, it's got to come down somewhere. It is against the law to discharge a firearm inside the city limits, whether it's the Fourth

Study: Webster Parish has lowest tax burden

A recent study shows Webster Parish as having the lowest tax burden on its taxpayers in terms of income tax, sales tax, fuel and property taxes. Steve Sabato, with

SmartAsset, says the study shows Webster Parish ranking second only behind Avoyelles Parish.

"The tax season came and went, and left some of us asking ourselves, 'How did I pay so much?" Sabato said. "Everyone feels a tax burden of some kind, but its weight can vary

across different states and counties or parishes. Curious to see how Webster Parish's tax burden stacks up against others in Louisiana? A recent study by SmartAsset calculated the amount of money a specific person would pay in income, sales, property and fuel taxes in each

parish in Louisiana, and ranked them lowest to highest in terms of tax burden."

According to the study (taxes paid by the average person), citizens of Webster Parish pay roughly \$8,800 in income tax, \$1,100 in sales tax, \$631 in property taxes and \$190 in fuel taxes.

The top 10 parishes listed with the lowest tax burden include (1) Avoyelles Parish, (2) Webster Parish, (3) Claiborne Parish, (4) East Feliciana Parish, (5) Evangeline Parish, (6) Winn Parish, (7) Assumption Parish, (8) Richland Parish, (9) Franklin Parish

and (10) Pointe Coupee Parish.

EDUCATION **DEQ** issues citation to Webster Parish **School Board**

At the request of the Webster Parish School Board, their attorney is sending a letter to the architecture company they feel is responsible for them receiving a citation from the Department of Environmental Quality.

School board president Charles Strong says their attorney is sending a letter to

the company regarding information they have not received since 2014

STRONG about Minden High and Webster Junior Highschools not having asbestos in the buildings.

Buster Flowers, maintenance and school security supervisor, says when the two schools were built, Sutton, Mitchell, Beebee and Babin Architects LLC of Shreveport (formerly Morgan, Hill, Sutton and Mitchell) was supposed to compose a letter reporting no asbestos in the schools. The board still has not received that letter and the person in charge of the letter composition is no longer employed with the company. After speaking with company representatives, he says they will not provide a letter, leaving Webster Parish Schools under a citation from the DEQ – and will remain so until that let-

ter can be provided. "There's no asbestos, but they will not write a letter," Flowers said in Monday's school board meeting. "We have an asbestos company trying to contact them and they can't get anything from them.

Strong says he hopes the company will come through with a letter, as they should.

"I would think it ought to be incumbent upon the contractor or architect to provide that information," he said.

The board's attorney will be requesting the asbestos information regarding the schools to lift the citation by the DEQ, he said.

The discussion came up following the board's lengthy discussion in Monday's meeting about the addition of wings to J.A. Phillips Middle School and Webster Junior High School. The board was discussing how to go about choosing an architect or whether they should choose the one that provided a quote for construction.

of July or not." The National Highway Transportation Safety Administration offers some tips for drivers for the holiday weekend: ■ Regular maintenance – Tune-ups, oil changes, battery checks and tire rotations go a long way toward preventing breakdowns before they happen. Protect child passengers – Research on the effectiveness of child safety seats has found them to reduce fatal injury by 71 percent for infants (younger than 1 year old) and 54 percent for toddlers (up to 4 years old) in passenger cars. If you're traveling with children, remember the best way to protect them in a car is to put them

in the correct child safety seat for their size and age. All children 13 and under should ride in the back seat.

Distraction accounts for approximately 10 percent of fatal crashes and 18 percent of injuries - all preventable. Distracted driving can be anything that pulls your attention away from driving, including cell phone use, texting while

driving, eating, drinking and using in-vehicle technologies and portable electronic devices.

N Observe the "Move ■ Avoid distraction – Over" law – Move over and change lanes to give sate clearance to law enforcement officers assisting motorists on the side of the road. It's the law in all 50 states. For more information on drivers safety, go to the NHTSA website.

"They can shoot fireworks during the same period they can sell fireworks," he said. "When they start selling them, you can shoot them. When they stop selling them, you have to quit shooting them."

Cropper says it's important to have respect for your neighbors when shooting fireworks.

"If you have a neighbor living right next door and it's late, you need to stop and think about them trying to rest," he said. "Just have respect for your neighbors and other people.'

Birthdays are special, and some are more special than others. Since I observed a special birthday — my 80th — last Saturday I know that I feel "special" since there were stacks of birthday cards from all over the Unit-

ed States, and even from Hawaii, and there were gifts of fruit, fresh vegetables, jelly, jam, preserves, pickles, candy, flowers from the florist, two birth-

daughter baked, balloons, books, dish towels, pot holders, money and so many sweet letters, visits and phone calls. Just a simple you" "thank seems inadequate, but it comes from my heart.

A Country's Birth

This Friday is another special birthday. It is the 227th anniversary of our independence from England, so it really is the birthday of our country.

Thomas Jefferson was the main author of the Declaration of Independence. He was proud of that fact and that was one of the things he specified to be listed on his tombstone.

In 1781, our forefathers drew up the Articles of Confederation, and in 1787 they drew up the Constitution. It was ratified by nine states of the 13. We had a new name — The United States of America.

I asked my son which of our founding fathers was responsible for designing our form of government. He felt that Madison and Hamilton had the most influence on drawing up the Constitution. I know that there are things that may need changing in our form of government, things that may need improving, but in spite of these things our form of government is the best on earth. Don't you agree?

A Feeling of Freedom

Perhaps we do not always like those in places of leadership. Nothing is always perfect. Jesus selected 12 to be in his inner circle, to help him carry out His earthly ministry, and one of them was Judas Iscariot.

But we have the privilege of voting for whomever we want to, and the ballot box is just another of the freedoms that we enjoy.

When I see the flag pass by, or when I pass the flag in downtown Minden, I feel a sense of pride and patriotism.

"One nation, under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all" may be just a line from the pledge to the flag, but it is what the flag represents.

You cannot separate the flag from all those in our country's past who helped our nation be the world leader that it is today.

Those Who Served

So many of our friends, relatives and even those that we do not know have served under that flag in many branches of service in so many wars.

Minden has had its share of heroes, men who have earned the Silver Star, the Bronze Star, the Medal of Honor, and then there are the hundreds of others who never received an individual honor but served with honor and valor in many battles across the world.

In my circle of acquaintances I remember those who "flew the Hump in the Himalayas," one who served with Merrill's Maurauders and returned as one of 12 who lived with that group, this man was a classmate of mine, Ray Maddry.

I remember those who served at the Battle of the Bulge, and one who served above and beyond the call of duty and received the Bronze Star for his bravery — George Turner.

Others who received the Bronze Star would be George's brother, Killen Turner, as well as Richard Garrison, Bill Ichter and many others.

And there have been several Silver Star winners — George Calvit for his outstanding bravery even though he was severely wounded in the battle for Iwo Jima.

My husband received no indi-

vidual honors but his unit was awarded several honors because of some of the battles across North Africa, Sicily and Italy. He served four years and four months, receiving his discharge on July 4, 1945.

It is so touching to see the flags on the graves that are placed there on a couple of occasions each year. We do not realize how much we owe to so many until we notice just how many flags mark the graves of men who fought in all the wars for us.

Buried Heroes

There is a section in the old Minden cemetery that is the area where Confederate soldiers are buried. There are no individual markers, but there is an obelisk that tells that this is the area of Confederate soldiers.

I have stood in many national cemeteries across the United States. When I visited the battlefield at Chalmette where the victims of the Battle of New Orleans are buried. I think "what a waste of men and boys."

The battle was fought after the war was over, but lack of communication did not inform either side of that fact.

The Cemetery at Arlington, Virginia is awe inspiring. It was such a somber time as I stood at the Tomb of the Unknown soldier and watched the changing of the guard. I always think that each of the men who died was somebody's son, somebody's husband or brother, or even some child's

father.

Remember the Price

This July 4 we honor our nation's birthday, but this nation has been bought with a price and we must never forget those who paid that price.

In my bedroom closet, high on a shelf is a triangular folded flag. It was presented to me on the occasion of my husband's funeral. He served under that flag; he revered what it stood for and so do I.

When I remember how long our form of government has stood, I thank God for the men who had the vision and the ability to design an almost perfect form of government.

To me that flag represents America — the men who helped plan our future, and our democratic form of government, the men who have fought and some have given their lives for what we believe.

If you have a loved one or a friend that received an indivisual honor or medal during any war, I would like for you to tell me the name and I will add it to my own memories. Just call me and in the future I will remember those who have meant so much to our freedom

EDITORIAL ROUND UP Times-Picayune on same-sex ruling being correct

At five minutes after 10 Monday (June 29) morning, Jefferson Parish Clerk of Court Jon Gegenheimer began issuing marriage licenses to same-sex couples. A few hours later, Earl Benjamin and Michael Robinson took the license they got from his office and were married in New Orleans by Judge Paula Brown. "You are the best thing that ever

happened to me," Mr. Benjamin told Mr. Robinson, as staff members of the gay rights' group Forum for Equality watched them take their vows.

Good for Mr. Gegenheimer. Thanks to him, Louisiana is no longer ignoring the U.S. Supreme Court ruling Friday that legalized same-sex marriage in all 50 states. The East Baton Rouge clerk began issuing licenses Monday afternoon and others say they are going to start as well. New Orleans depends on the state health department to issue licenses, so for now couples have to get that document in another parish.

Louisiana was the last state to issue marriage licenses to same-sex couples following the Supreme Court ruling because Gov. Bobby Jindal and Attorney General Buddy Caldwell resisted abiding by the court's ruling

Gov. Jindal claimed the state needed to wait for the 5th U.S. Circuit of Appeals to rule in a separate gay marriage case before imple-menting the high court ruling. Mr. Caldwell and the Louisiana Clerks of Court Association advised clerks Friday to wait for 25 days, which is the deadline for appeals to the Supreme Court ruling.

But those are false impediments, and Mr. Gegenheimer and other clerks are right to go ahead. The attorney for the Jefferson Park clerk's office reviewed the

PERSPECTIVE What moved marriage equality from taboo to justice?

From 1956 until 2010, CBS television's daytime lineup included America's longest-running soap opera: "As the World Turns." But times change, and now a real-life human drama of profound importance has debuted in America: "As the Generations Turn."

It's the inspiring story of our society's continuing struggle to evolve toward dignity and mutual respect ... as well as love. The moment came on June 26, 2015, when Justice Anthony Kennedy proclaimed from the ornate chamber of the Supreme Court: "The right to marry is a fundamental right inherent in the liberty of the person, and under the Due Process and Equal Protection Clauses of the 14th Amendment couples of the same sex may not be deprived of that right and that liberty.

Kennedy and Justices Breyer, Ginsburg, Kagan and Sotomayor voted to make this higher level of inclusiveness the law of the land, but they are not the producers of it. Indeed, while the court's ruling debuts a new day, it is the culmina-tion of generations of painful struggle by brave gay and lesbian activists and advocates. And it is particularly the product of a defiant and determined LGBTQ movement for equality that arose from the brutal police riot at the Stonewall Inn in New York on June 28, 1969.

This democratic evolution from rank inequality literally came out of America's closet,

America's closet, rising through only a few neigh-borhoods at first, but then entering the consciousness of today's youth. Rejecting the shibboleths, igno-rance, fears and rance, fears and bigotry that previ ously permitted such intolerable discrimination, young people

Supreme Court ruling over the weekend and found no reason to wait.

But Gov. Jindal wanted to able to grandstand for a few days before admitting on "Meet the Press" Sunday that Louisiana couldn't ignore the ruling. "We don't have a choice but to comply, even though I think this decision was the wrong one," he said.

It's unclear what motivated Mr. Caldwell, but he should have known that the appeal period didn't affect the force of the ruling. He is the state's top lawyer, after all, and should understand how the Supreme Court works.

Gov. Jindal emphasized that clerks and state employees who don't want to issue marriage licenses to same-sex couples because of their faith won't have to do so. Freedom of religion is a cherished right, and the Supreme Court specifically said that its ruling was not meant to abridge anyone's beliefs.

But if there are clerks or other public officials who express religious objections, the state should ensure that couples seeking a license have another option in that office or nearby. The government should not continue to be complicit in making it difficult for people to get the license they are legally owed.

Gay couples who wanted to marry in Louisiana or wanted their marriages from other states to be recognized here have been waiting – and waiting. Then when the Supreme Court made same-sex marriage legal across the nation Friday, they had to wait again because of political meddling.

That isn't right.

Getting married isn't only an expression of devotion to each other. There are tax, Social Security and other legal benefits — everything from inheritance rights to hospital visitation privileges — that flow from marriage.

Same-sex couples in Louisiana also had not been allowed to adopt a child together. And it has been difficult for same-sex couples from other states who adopted children born in Louisiana to get a birth certificate listing them as parents.

All of that was patently unfair. The Supreme Court now has given couples here all of those rights. And Bobby Jindal and the state of Louisiana should stop standing in their way.

and family. In forming a marital union, two people become something greater than once they were. As some of the petitioners in these cases demonstrate, marriage embodies a love that may endure even past death. It would misunderstand these men and women to say they disrespect the idea of marriage. Their plea is that they do respect it, respect it so deeply that they seek to find its fulfillment for themselves. Their hope is not to be condemned to live in loneliness, excluded from one of civilization's oldest institutions. They ask for equal dignity in the eyes of the law. The Constitution grants them that right."

Let me be clear. I couldn't care less whether a man or woman is gay or whether a same-sex couple gets married. How they live their lives as well as what they do in the privacy of their own homes is none of my business, just as my relationship with my wife and my relationship with Jesus Christ is none of their business. Still, the Scriptures are very clear, ladies and gentlemen.

At least they are in the book of Genesis. In Chapter 2, Verse 24, God instituted marriage between a man and a woman. He said, "Therefore a man leaves his father and his mother and cleaves to his wife, and they become one flesh.

Or perhaps we should look to Matthew 19:4-5. "He (Jesus) said, 'Have you not read that he who made them from the beginning made them male and female,' and said, 'For this reason a man shall leave his father and mother and be joined to his wife, and the two shall become one'?"

Anyone who has remotely paid attention over the past couple of decades to how society's attitude toward homosexuality, open marriages, children born out of wedlock and what passes for acceptable entertainment on television and in music should have expected the Supreme Court to legalize marriage among same-sex couples. Litigation is a certainty, and eventually the Supreme Court will be back in the mix. This time, justices will decide whether religious freedom is protected under the First Amendment when the "constitutional right" of a samesex couple supposedly has been infringed.

You can rest assured, too, that the militants in the homosexual movement would like nothing more than to challenge religious institutions. And they're going to do it.

BATON ROUGE (AP) – Three LSU players were named Tuesday to the 2015 Perfect Game All-America teams. Freshman right-handed pitcher Alex Lange was named to the first team, junior shortstop Alex Bregman was named to the second team, and senior catcher Kade Scivicque was voted to the third team.

Perfect Game was the final outlet to announce its 2015 All-America teams over the past five weeks. Six dif-ferent LSU players earned some type of All-America recognition, and Lange, Bregman and Scivicque each earned first-team All-America accolades, marking the second time in three years the Tigers have featured a school-record three first-team All-Americans. LSU also had three first-team All-Americans in 2013.

Lange posted a 12-0 record with a 1.97 ERA in 114 innings for the Tigers this season. In 17 starts, the righthander struck out 131 and limited opponents to a .212 cumulative batting average.

The Lee's Summit, Mo., native was voted National Freshman Pitcher of the Year and SEC Freshman of the Year, and he received first team all-SEC recognition.

Bregman, a 2015 Golden Spikes Award finalist and a two-time first-team all-American, enjoyed a brilliant three-year career at LSU, bat-ting .337 (265-for-786) with 56 doubles, 10 triples, 21 homers, 148 RBI, 153 runs and 66 atelap hasas and 66 stolen bases.

Bregman, the 2013 Brooks Wallace Award winner as the nation's best shortstop, batted .323 in 2015 with 22 doubles, three triples, nine homers, 49 RBI, 59 runs and 38 stolen bases, the secondhighest single-season steals total in LSU history.

Scivicque, a native of Maurepas, La., was one of three finalists for the Johnny Bench Award, given to the nation's most outstanding catcher. A first-team All-SEC selection, he hit a team-high .355 this season with 21 doubles, six homers, and 48 RBI, and he threw out 21 runners attempting to steal.

Scivicque, who was voted to the 2015 College World Series All-Tournament Team, was selected in the fourth round of the MLB Draft by the Detroit Tigers.

COLLEGE BASEBALL Former Tiger, Dean named UNO head coach

If you were to ask Blake Dean where he was headed in the next five years after his playing days at LSU ended in 2010, he would have said he'd be well on his way to a career in Major League Baseball.

It didn't quite work out that way.

Instead, the 27-year-old was standing at a news conference Tuesday, where he was as the next head baseball coach at UNO, the youngest in the history of the program.

"It's such an honor for me to take this job," Dean said. "I'm truly humbled and excited for this opportunity. ... Many of my former coaches have told me that people will try to knock me for my age, but I plan to use it to my advantage.

"I believe I can bring an energy to the program that will get people excited again."

Dean, who served as an assistant coach for the Privateers the past two seasons, takes over the UNO program as one of the youngest head coaches in the NCAA.

While it will be a challenge to lead a team at such a young age, UNO Athletic Director Derek Morel said Dean has many of the qualities that will immediately allow him to galvanize players.

"He has such a maturity about him for a guy his age,' Morel said of Dean. "His experience as a player, his ability to relate to people and his excitement about the program were all qualities we thought made him a great choice for the job. I think him already having that experience with the guys on the team over the past two years will allow him to immediately come in and lay down some of his principles without having that period where he has to get to know the players."

Dean was named interim coach in May following the retirement of former head coach Ron Maestri, who concluded his second stint as the Privateers' coach.

Maestri helped raise the profile of the program during his time as coach from 1972-85, and once the program fell on hard times, Maestri decided to take on the job once again in 2013. Ålthough Maestri's

record over the past two seasons was 25-78, Dean said Maestri helped rebuild the UNO program - and he hopes to pick up where Maestri left off.

"Coach Maestri believed in me. He gave me an oppor-tunity to succeed," Dean said. "I hope he knows that I'll continue to push this thing forward, and I will do everything that I can to make sure everyone remembers his legacy, and we can build it back to what it was.'

Dean added that one of the keys to ensure the growth of UNO's baseball team is to continue making local recruits view the school as a desired destination.

Dean played four seasons at LSU from 2007-10, winning a College World Series championship in 2009. He was MVP of the 2008 SEC baseball tournament and an All-American following the 2008 and 2010 seasons.

Dean was drafted in the eighth round of the 2010 MLB draft by the Los Angeles Dodgers and retired as a player following two years in the minor league system.

Asif Kapadia's Amy uncluttered approach that Winehouse documentary "Amy" is a slow, tragic zoom out. It begins with the intimacy of home movies and ends in faraway paparazzi footage. Our VIP access has been revoked.

First seen as a brighteyed 14-year-old girl singing a knockout "Happy Birthday," Winehouse gradually recedes from our view as her renown grows, obscured by a blizzard of flashes and a deadening haze of celebrity. Fame arrives like fate: a destiny foreshadowed by Winehouse's self-evident talent and her own ominous misgivings. "I would go mad," she says of fame before its tidal-wave arrival.

"Amy" is an exceptional, emotional portrait of a pop star who perished too young. But it is, more broadly, a clinical case study of celebrity's crushing onslaught and an indictment of its tabloid apparatus. It's a horror movie.

The ingredients of Winehouse's swift demise (she drank herself to death at age 27 in 2011), as seen in the film, are many: a broken family, her own self-destructiveness, a lack of timely intervention. But most haunting is the film's close-up of a toxic celebrity culture where out-ofcontrol addicts are merely punchlines for late-night hosts.

Kapadia, a British filmmaker who started in fiction film, eschews talking heads. His tremendous "Senna." documentary about the Formula One racer Ayrton Senna, who died at 34, relied entirely

maintains closeness with the subject and gives "Amy" an unbroken drama.

Both films replace hagiography with evidence (archival video, audio testimony, even old voicemails), but the purity of Kapadia's aesthetics shouldn't be mistaken for perfect objectivity. He and editor Chris King have pointedly, expertly assembled snapshots of Winehouse's life to lend a particular view of it.

Winehouse's family especially her father, Mitch have publicly denounced "Amy" as "mis-leading." That, though, should be taken as a good sign of Kapadia's independence in making 'Amy."

The film is disarmingly intimate. There is Winehouse, an aspiring singer, playful and flirty in the backseat of a car, goofing around with friends and a video camera.

The rise of this insanely charismatic Jewish retrosoul singer from North London seems a certainly to all who encounter her. The voice, smoky and soulful, is unmissable. "A charmer," describes Yasiin Bey (Mos Def), immediately infatuated by "a sweetheart" who could drink anyone under the table and roll a smoke.

Her upbringing casts a pall. The divorce of her parents when she was nine (also the age when Kurt Cobain's parents split, as noted in the recent documentary "Kurt Cobain: Montage of Heck") after an admitted seven-year affair by her cab driver father, is cited as a turning point for ographical hit "Rehab": "I drugs. In a mocking video Fiedler-Civil shoots while both are in rehab together, she's less inclined to make a joke out of it: "I don't really mind it here," she says.

Kapadia has gotten everyone close to Winehouse to speak, and the interviews are more personal having been on archival footage, and the worse.
