Lott was shot and killed August 24, 2014, and broth-





Improvements at Minden Airport are expected to be complete this year,

mayor Tommy Davis said. "The overall project we're doing at the airport comes under the umbrel-

Food pantry fundraiser set for Saturday

A garage sale fundraiser for the Joe LeBlanc Food Pantry is set for Saturday. The goal is to raise about \$2,000 for food to last until October, executive director Jessica Lewis said.

The garage sale will begin at 7 a.m. at the food pantry, located at 408

Broadway in Minden. The sale will be indoors and outdoors.

"We have more clothes than you can imagine," she said. "One whole side of the office will be clothes. We have some really nice clothes, a lot of stuff with tags still on it. The other side will be all kinds of house wares. We have an outrageous amount of sheets, blankets, kitchenware and

baby stuff."

Whatever items are leftover, Lewis says these will more than likely be donated to various charities around Minden.

The food pantry purchases their food at a discounted cost from Food Bank of Northwest Louisiana in Shreveport.

'To put it into perspective, you go to Walmart and buy a box of Cornflakes for \$2 or \$3," she

said. "We can buy 12 boxes for \$1.50. We usually buy canned vegetables, canned fruit; it's usually nonperishables. We haven't had frozen food in forever."

Other nonperishable foods include staple items like flour, sugar and cornmeal. If donations of food are being made, Lewis asks that these staple items be bought in smaller sizes to allow more room

for more variety. JLFP also receives food like rice, dry beans, pasta, pasta sauce, peanut butter and some canned meats through donations.

Donations for the garage sale will be accepted through Friday at 7 p.m. and can include gently used clothing, house wares, kitchen items and small furniture. For more information, contact Lewis at 465-6726.



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AROUND THE STATE **Taxpayers** pay legal costs of pro-Vitter super PAC

BATON ROUGE — Louisiana taxpayers have reimbursed more than \$69,000 in legal fees paid by a super PAC supporting Republican U.S. David Vitter for governor.

The Fund for Louisiana's Future challenged the constitutionality of a Louisiana law limiting contributions in federal court last year and won. The state was required to pay the political action committee's legal expenses.

The Advocate reports payment by Louisiana's self-insurance program showed up on the PAC's campaign finance report.

The Fund for Louisiana's Future objected to a state law capping individual contributions to PACs at \$100,000 for each four-year election cycle, saying that unconstitutionally limited free speech. A federal judge agreed.

The \$69,336 in legal costs paid by the state are less than the nearly \$150,000 the super PAC sought. That figure wasn't approved by the court.

This graduating class

from Minden includes 73 cadets who participated in the BPCC program. 40 students had the potential to earn up to 21 transferrable college credits, and 33 students had the potential to earn up to 15 transferrable college credits before graduating from the five-and-a-half month residential phase. In total, more than 1,137 transferrable college credits were earned. Additionally, in partnership with Associated Building Contractors, 42 cadets completed a 90-hour NCCER course, which allows them to become certified in basic construction technology.

This graduating class includes 10 cadets who were awarded the rank of 5 star, which is the highest rank a cadet can achieve. These cadets have excelled in all aspects of the program and have been selected as leaders among their peers. Five star cadets included: Jhon Bohorquez of Mandeville, Edna Brown of Benton, D'Shawna Burgess of Denham Springs, Carter Burke of Sulpur, Tyler Dufrene of Boutte, Nicholas Gray of Minden, Claude Hayes Jr. of Boyce, Dakota Maffit of Jennings, Taylor Perry of Alexandria, and Palmer Prejean of Lafayette.

Of these top cadets, D'Shawna Burgess of Denham Springs was selected as Cadet of the Cycle, and delivered the commencement speech during the ceremony.


CPT. Jason Montgomery, director of YCP at

The mission of the Louisiana National Guard Youth Challenge Program is to intervene in and reclaim the lives of 16-18 year-old adolescents, producing program graduates with the values, life skills, education, and self-discipline necessary in order to succeed as productive citizens.

The Youth Challenge Program offers young people an opportunity to improve their lives through participation in an innovative, alternative school. The Youth Challenge Program is administered to participants at no cost, and all needs such as meals, bedding, classroom instruction, and uniforms are provided free of charge.

Since 1994, program participants have donated more than 5 million hours of community service, and more than 100,000 cadets have graduated nationwide, with more than 19,600 being from Louisiana. 

5 college institutions removed from negative credit watch

BATON ROUGE — With deep budget cuts dodged by Louisiana's public colleges, national credit rating agency Standard & Poor's has removed five higher education institutions from a negative credit watch.

Gov. Bobby Jindal's administration announced credit the decision Wednesday. The move by S&P indicates the institutions aren't facing the short-term possibility of a rating downgrade.

"Obviously this is good news for us, great news for higher education," said Jindal's commissioner of administration, Kristy Nichols.

S&P's decision affects Nicholls State University, the University of Louisiana at Lafayette, the University of New Orleans Research Foundation, LSU's Bogalusa Community Medical Center Project and the Delgado Community College Foundation.

The credit agency had put the institutions on a negative watch in April, as higher education was threatened with hefty slashing because of state budget problems. But lawmakers scaled back tax breaks and raised taxes to

avoid the cuts, giving colleges a largely standstill budget this year.

The Jindal administration hopes the decision announced for the higher education organizations is the harbinger of good news for the state, which is awaiting word from the national credit rating agencies about its own status.

"This has to be an indi-

cation that we made the right strides," Nichols said.

Rating agencies have raised concerns about the state's long-term finances and patchwork budget maneuvers, which lawmakers reduced in the most recent legislative session.

A decision on whether Louisiana made enough progress to escape a lowering of its credit rating should come within weeks, as the state readies for its next round of borrowing through a bond sale to investors.

Ratings from the credit agencies help determine interest rates. A drop in a state's credit rating raises interest costs, making it more expensive to borrow money.

more than likely receive a \$1 million grant through the Louisiana Department of Transportation to fund the remainder of the project

Along with the construction of the new fuel farm and terminal, the grant will also pay for the removal of the existing buildings.

"We hope, assuming we get the money, we will be able to go out for bids on the terminal, the fuel farm and at the same time, we'll have to extend our water lines out there," Davis said. "We think this will take place in the 2015-16 (fiscal) year in the budget we've been working on.'

The city applied for the grant last fiscal year, and if approved, they will likely receive the money sometime in August or early September, Davis said.

"We'll be able to go out for bids pretty quickly after that," he added.

The total cost of the project, including the construction of the T-hangars, is around \$2 million.

The new terminal will be about 2,500 square feet, roughly double the size of the current one. It will house a conference room, pilots' lounge, control room with computers and phones for flight planning. The Minden airport is classified as general avia-

tion with roughly 200 and 400 planes in and out each month. About 29 planes are currently housed in the two open hangars.

Along with the improvements to the airport, the personnel committee chose a new airport manager Tuesday, who is expected to begin after approval council on August 3.

Steven Burdeaux, originally from Bogalusa, will take the helm and says he's pretty excit-

ed to manage Minden Airport, and that it's a nice facility. " I ' m pretty excit-

from my position at the Gulfport-Biloxi International Airport. There's a lot of stuff that's about to be going on at the Minden airport, and I'm pretty excited to be a part of it."

Currently, Burdeaux is an operations supervisor at the Mississippi airport. He calls the position a "jack of all trades and master of none." He says he is responsible for everything from security badging to

construction, airfield inspections and a variety of things around the terminal.

He is a graduate of Louisiana Tech University, and says he likes the area, calling it "God's country." He's toured Minden Airport and Minden.

"It seems like a pretty nice place, a nice town," he said, "a good place to raise a family.

Burdeaux has been married for nearly eight years and they have a two-yearold son.

He says his interest in aviation comes from growing up around it. His grandfather was always into aviation, owning several planes in Bogalusa, he said.

"I spent a lot of time at the airport in Bogalusa," he said. "My Eagle Scout project actually involved the Bogalusa Airport. I've just always gravitated, really, to anything that had an engine, but aviation is a more lucrative career."

According to his resume', he is a certified employee of the American Association of Airport Executives, Airfield Lighting Maintenance Training and FEMA Emergency Operations Center training.

He has a bachelor's degree in aviation management.

STATE CRIME LSU police arrest employee after audit reveals missing funds

BATON ROUGE — LSU Police arrested an administrative coordinator in the university's Music and Dramatic Arts Building after an internal audit revealed more than \$82,000 was missing from the theater department's checking account.

The audit found 48vear-old David Ν. Rodriguez Jr. was one of four employees in charge of the department's Campus Federal Credit Union account. The Advocate reports the audit said Rodriguez was in charge of taking the collected funds from the previous night's productions and depositing them in the CFCU account.

Sixty student productions took place between June 2010 and March 2015, and while collections equaled over \$187,000, a total of just over \$82,000 remained unaccounted.

Rodriguez was booked Wednesday with theft and remains in jail on a \$5,000 bond.

Online jail records do list an attorney for Rodriguez.

The Advocate on how best to spend BP settlement money

It's hot as can be outside, but it's Christmas in July for elected officials who have BP settlement money to spend.

In Jefferson Parish, it appears part of the money may go to pay raises for parish employees, a nice thing if you are running for office this year.

The Parish Council is falling all over itself to support 5 percent pay raises to almost all Jefferson government employees, although not council members, retroactive to the beginning of this year. One council member, Ben Zahn, suggested the parish could use some of its \$45 million in BP money to fund the pay boosts.

This is an election year, and government employees vote reliably. But parish taxpayers — and there are more of them — are less likely to be impressed, for the raises and the prospect of paying for them with oil spill money are both bad public policy.

To begin with, Jefferson voters are about to elect a new parish president and council. So the raise issue should be theirs to decide next year.

Moreover, a more sensible plan is to tilt the raises toward jobs that are harder to fill rather than spread the money evenly around.

'Proud Partners' corporatize our parks

Our presidents are good at praising America's magnificent national park system, but they're lousy at maintaining it. Bill Clinton-the-candidate, for example, spoke of how lucky he was to have Hot Springs National Park as a childhood playground. Yet Clintonthe-president sat idle as that park's natural wonders and facilities deteriorated — and as the National Park Service's maintenance backlog soared to \$5 billion.

Likewise, in his 2000 campaign, a khaki-clad George W. posed in the majestic Cascade Range. He wailed that parks were "at the breaking point" and vowed to eliminate Clinton's backlog. Instead, he slashed the Park Service budget (including a 40 percent cut in needed repair funds for the Cascade parklands he'd used as a political prop). The maintenance backlog ballooned to nearly \$9 billion under his presidency.

backlog ballooned to nearly \$9 billion under his presidency. Ranger George did make one fix, however — a PR fix. Bush operatives instructed park superintendents to make budget cuts in "areas that won't cause public or political controversy." When discussing park deterioration, they were to avoid the phrase "budget cutbacks" and say instead that parks were undergoing "service level adjustments."

Under Obama, who speaks movingly of a childhood Greyhound bus trip with his family to see some of our parks, another 12 percent has been chopped from the

et — bumping the deferred maintenance bill to a staggering \$11.5 billion! To his credit,

To his credit, Obama has proposed a 2016 "Centennial Budget" for Park Service, mitigating years of destructive underfunding and calling for \$1 billion to address

billion to address the backlog. Good for him. But that still leaves a \$10 billion shortfall, and the sour duo of Sen. Mitch McConnell and Speaker John Boehner will oppose even that increase for the maintenance of these invaluable public assets. Hidebound by their twisted corporate ideology, they dismiss public parks as government intrusion into

Finally, the parish and its leaders need to dream bigger when it comes to spending the BP funds.

The BP settlement includes payments to parish governments and cities, intended as compensation for the costs and economic dislocations caused by the spill. Chip Kline, head of the state's coastal restoration agency, said those particular funds are for local governments to spend. But he also stressed to the Press Club of Baton Rouge that the many projects in the 2012 coastal master plan will need money from all sorts of sources, beyond the sums from the BP settlements.

The purists would doubtless hope that the BP money be spent entirely for coastal restoration and protection. We hope that across the state, including places like Baton Rouge far removed from direct impact of the oil spill, the money is spent for conservation purposes. But that will require pressure from the public, we suspect, to keep officials focused on the one-time nature of this windfall.

In Jefferson in particular, the School Board voted for a onetime bonus for teachers and support workers, using only part of its BP haul. That's not ideal either, but obviously it's a more responsible use of the cash than a permanent raise that would cost money year after year.

But it's still a sign that this cash is going to burn holes in the pockets of elected bodies across Louisiana. When our biology teacher Jeannie Hendrix gathered us together to dissect a frog at Huntington School in Ferriday, La. some 30 years ago it didn't dawn on me that one day we

would read about dissecting aborted babies. Then again, Planned Parenthood wasn't exactly a household

name in

Concordia Parish when I was growing up. And any discussion about abortion was hushhush because, quite frankly, it was a bad thing. Still is.

Planned Parenthood, which bills itself as a "nonprofit organization that provides reproductive health and maternal and child health services," is on the radar these days in light of three recently released videos. The videos captured Planned Parenthood professionals and associates, including medical doctors, discussing extracting body parts from aborted babies to be sold to private companies. Supposedly, the little hearts and lungs and livers and kidneys and whatever else wind up in the hands of so-called researchers.

The word sadistic comes to mind. Murder does, too, but we'll get to that in a moment.

There's a big difference between dissecting a frog and dissecting an unborn baby. One's a frog. One is human. And perhaps the notion of dissecting an unborn baby is intolerable because we readily visualize the birth of a child. If you're a father, you probably recall the emotions you felt the first time you saw a sonogram of one of your unborn children. You'll never forget the birth.

Ī can't imagine what the mother feels. I suspect it's surreal.

And that raises a couple of questions. How on God's green earth could any expectant mother agree to have the life sucked out of her own child? And how could any human being bring himself or herself to the point of performing an abortion in the fist place?

It's murder, plain and simple.

It's beyond any reasonable doubt that Planned Parenthood is in the abortion business. It operates on fees collected for performing abortions, and Planned Parenthood receives about \$500 million annually from the federal government. In other words, U.S. taxpayers are financing abortions from coast to coast.

Over the weekend, the U.S. Senate had an opportunity to attach an amendment to a highway funding bill that could have eventually stopped any government financing for Planned Parenthood. The Majority Leader of the Senate, Sen. Mitch McConnell of Kentucky, a Republican, spiked the measure. McConnell claims he's going to author separate legislation to defund Planned Parenthood.

Let's hope he keeps his word.

Untold millions of unborn babies probably would appreciate it.

the private realms of Disneyland and SeaWorld.

So, while we Americans celebrate the 100th anniversary of our National Park Service, Washington is literally stripping "service" out of the National Park Service.

And, by refusing to fund essential upkeep year after year, America's socalled "leaders" are guaranteeing that this invaluable national asset deemed America's "best idea" by novelist and historian Wallace Stegner will fall into acute disrepair. The only solution, they say, is to commercialize industrialize and privatize our parks, converting these jewels of the common good into just another corporate cash cow.

The corporatization process started with "co-branding" agreements, rationalized by Park Service officials as "aligning the economic and historical legacies" of parks with advertisers. In other words, they're selling the Park Service's proud public brand — as well as its soul.

First in line was Coca-Cola. In 2007, the multibillion-dollar colossus became a "Proud Partner" with Park Service by donating a mere \$2.5 mil-lion (tax-deductible, meaning we taxpayers subsidized the deal) to the Park Service fundraising arm. In return, not only did Coke get exclusive rights to use park logos in its ads, but it was allowed to veto a Park Service plan to ban sales of bottled water in the Grand Canyon park. Disposable plastic bottles are that park's biggest source of trash, but Coke owns Dasani, the top-selling water, so bye-bye, ban. Public outrage forced officials to reverse this crass move, but the Park Service's integrity has yet to recover.

Then this April, Park Service abandoned its longstanding policy of disallowing any links to alcohol or tobacco products when it entered a partnership with Anheuser-Busch after the company donated a \$2.5 million taxdeductible "gift." In turn, its Budweiser brand was given the Statue of Liber ty. Not literally, but symbolically — Bud now has the right to plaster Lady Liberty, the iconic symbol of the USA itself, on its cans. Never mind that Busch is now Bel-

Never mind that Busch is now Belgian-owned; the real hypocrisy is the claim that such co-branding is a philanthropic service to the commons. Creeping commercialization of our public parks no longer creeps: it's running rampant, with brands such as Disney, L.L. Bean and Subaru buying their pieces of Park Service integrity.

And get a whiff of this: Air Wick has also paid to become a Park Service partner, so it's now marketing a new fragrance collection that's advertised as being "uniquely inspired by America's national parks."

Tips for choosing a major

MAJOR LEAGUE BASEBALL Rangers trade for Hamels

PHILADELPHIA (AP) - After years of trade speculation, Cole Hamels' time in Philadelphia is ending.

Two people familiar with the deal say the Phillies have agreed to trade the ace lefthander to the Texas Rangers for a package of prospects.

Both people spoke to The Associated Press late Wednesday night on condition of anonymity because the trade had not been finalized. Hamels has a limited no-trade clause but does not have to approve a deal to the Rangers.

Hamels would become the first pitcher in major league history traded during a season immediately after

throwing a no-hitter – he no-hit the Chicago Cubs on Saturday at Wrigley Field.

"He's definitely a great pitcher," Rangers first baseman Mitch Moreland said after Texas beat the New Yankees 5-2 York "Obviously Wednesday. watched the no-hitter the other day, pretty impressive. He's got a long track record of great success. It will be huge for us."

The 2008 World Series MVP was an integral part of the greatest run in franchise history when the Phillies won five straight NL East titles, two pennants and one World Series from 2007-11.

"He's been here a long

time, but that's baseball, Phillies catcher Carlos Ruiz said following an 8-2 loss at Toronto. "Definitely it's sad when you're around one of your teammates for a long time and then they have to go away."

The rebuilding Phillies, a big league-worst 38-64, traded All-Star closer Jonathan Papelbon to Washington on Tuesday. Both players made it clear they wanted to play for contenders.

Texas is seven games behind AL West-leading Houston and four games behind Minnesota for the second wild-card AL's spot.

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

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

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Sylvester Stallone is parting with memorabilia from the "Rocky" and "Rambo" movies, but he's keeping the two characters alive onscreen.

The 69-year-old entertainer announced Thursday that he'll put hundreds of props and costumes from his 40-year career up for auction in October, with a portion of the proceeds benefiting military charities. Some of the items Stallone has agreed to sell include Rambo's Army jacket and Rocky's gloves, robe and boxing trunks.

Stallone isn't saying goodbye to the characters. Instead, he's set to become Rocky Balboa again onscreen in "Creed" this fall and is working on another "Rambo" installment.

Stallone said today's fascination with cinematic superheroes leaves little room for the "lone wolf" or "man against the odds" characters he likes to play.

"That's kind of why I'm still around, because I embrace that and it's become kind of a rarity and there's not many of us left," he said in a recent interview. "Will that come around again? I don't think so. Not in its purest form... So I embrace it and that's why I want to continue to do it until my body explodes."

First up is "Creed," by writerdirector Ryan Coogler. Stallone is Rocky, but this time he's coach to a young star boxer played by Michael B. Jordan.

"By no means is this a 'Rocky 7,'" Stallone said. "This is a journey for Michael B. Jordan, who is brilliant in the movie, and Ryan Coogler, (for whom) this is a very personal film."

When Coogler first approached Stallone about the film, he declined, saying he felt Rocky had "run his course."

After making "Fruitvale Station," the filmmaker returned to discuss the role again.

"I've never seen someone who was so persistent," Stallone said. He ought to know, after holding out to play the titular character in his breakthrough script, "Rocky," back in 1976. At work now on a screenplay for a new "Rambo" film, Stallone admitted "It really is not fun"

admitted, "It really is not fun." He still thinks the character is compelling — "Where Rocky is the height of optimism, this guy is the height of pessimism," he said — but finds writing more challenging than any other artistic discipline.

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


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
