Arrests made in ATV thefts

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Three men have been arrested in connection with the thefts of several four-wheelers that have gone missing in the south end of the parish.

Leverett Letrell Young, 21, of the 20 block of McArthur in Dixie Inn, was arrested Monday, July 27, and charged with principal to felony theft, three counts

of principal to commit felony theft and four counts of conspiracy to commit felony theft. Bond was set at \$27,500.

Jamal Deunte Bailey, 22, of the 400 block of Marshall Street, was arrested Monday, July 27, and charged with illegal pos-

session of stolen things and conspiracy to possess stolen things. Bond was set at \$12,500.

Kaleeb Lamar Hawkins, 20, of the 2900 block of

Dorcheat Road, was arrested Monday, July 27, and charged with principal to felony theft, principal to commit felony theft and two counts of conspiracy to commit felony theft. Bond was set at \$13,000.

According to reports, the thefts were reported on July 22. Webster Parish Sheriff's detectives interviewed Hawkins, at whose home one of the reported stolen ATVs was found. Further investigation

revealed he knew Young was involved with the four-wheeler thefts in the Dubberly and Heflin areas. He also reportedly told investigators that he and Young had taken photos of one of the four-wheelers stolen later from a residence on Highway 531. This particular four-wheeler was recovered from Bailey's home, investigators say.

During Bailey's inter-

Raymond Warren, 57, entered his plea in front of 26th Judicial District Judge Michael O. Craig, Friday, July 24.

Assistant district attorney Hugo Holland says his charges of 20 counts of identity theft, 38 counts of access device fraud, 38 counts of unlawful possession of fraudulent documents for

Offical: 'brain-eating amoeba' not likely

Minden's water tested monthly

Earlier this week, Ascension and St. Bernard Parish officials said Naegleria fowleria amoeba, commonly known as "brain-eating amoeba," had been found in their water systems.

Officials with the City of Minden say the chances of contamination in the city water is unlikely.

"It's not very likely (contamination) because we keep our chlorine level so high," Rick Broussard, city water and wastewater manager said. "We usually go into the system at the water plant

New laws take effect Saturday

‘Revenge porn’ law makes it illegal to share other’s nude photos

BATON ROUGE— Sending "revenge porn" can land you behind bars, new housing protections are being extended to domestic violence victims and enforcement of sea turtle protection laws is tightening as hundreds of new Louisiana laws take effect Saturday.

The provisions of more than 260 bills passed by state lawmakers earlier this year kick in Aug. 1. Many of the statute changes are modest adjustments to existing laws or govern arcane issues that will draw little public attention. Others are more sweeping in scope.

CRIME AND COURTS

Anyone who shares a nude or partially-nude cellphone picture or video without permission — often an attempt at public shaming called "revenge pornography" — will now

face up to two years in jail and a fine reaching \$10,000.

Laws already on the books made it a crime to send a nude image of someone under the age of 17. The new law criminalizing "nonconsensual disclosure of a private image" is aimed at protecting people who aren't minors. Exceptions are included for police investigations and people who intentionally expose themselves in public.

In addition to creating new crimes, lawmakers also changed the terms used to describe some existing offenses.

Authorities have used "simple rape," "forcible rape" and "aggravated rape" to describe the varying degrees of sexual assault charges. The new terms will be third-degree rape, second-degree rape and first-degree rape, after

complaints that a term like "simple rape" was insulting to victims.

The laws also are changing for victims of domestic violence, to give them more freedom to break a lease to escape an abuser and to let landlords immediately evict those who are deemed abusers by the courts or a state welfare agency. In some narrow situations, landlords will be barred from evicting abuse victims.

SAFE HAVEN LAW

More information will be distributed to the public about Louisiana's safe haven law that allows a parent to relinquish a baby up until they're two months old.

The state social services department has to develop an annual and public information plan to increase awareness about the law. The new law

spells out what the plan should contain and requires annual reporting to lawmakers about the effort.

Under the safe haven law, parents who are unable to care for a newborn can leave the child at any designated facility instead of abandoning the child in an unsafe environment. Louisiana's designated facilities include any licensed hospital, public health unit, emergency medical service provider, medical clinic, fire or police station or pregnancy crisis center.

SHRIMP AND TURTLES

Shrimpers hope to boost their sales now that state wildlife officials will be able to enforce federal requirements for shrimp nets to include escape hatches for sea turtles. A 1987 enforcement ban is officially removed from the books Saturday.

All sea turtles found in U.S. waters are endangered or threatened. In the mid-1980s, when Louisiana's law was passed, the federal rule requiring "turtle excluder devices" in shrimp trawls

was new and contentious.

Supporters of removing the state enforcement ban said some big-box retailers boycotted Louisiana shrimp because they objected to the state restrictions and raised concerns about the state's handling of protections for endangered sea turtles.

BOOSTED LITTER FINES

Littering fines are doubling, in a bid to help shrink Louisiana's retirement debt.

Fines for simple littering will be \$150 for a first offense and \$1,000 for subsequent offenses. Fines for intentional littering will grow to anywhere from \$500 to \$2,500. Fines for improperly disposing of larger litter, like furniture and appliances, could reach up to \$10,000.

The new money is earmarked to pay down the debt of the retirement system of the law enforcement agency that issues the litter citation.

with .9 parts per million and at the end of the system we usually register a .6 or .7 parts per million."

In 2013, the state Health Department issued an emergency rule requiring water systems in Louisiana to maintain a minimum disinfectant level of .5 milligram of disinfectant per liter of water throughout the system.

Broussard says that by

maintaining a good chlorine level through out the system helps fight off any contaminants.

Maintaining the chlorine at the required levels is not the only precaution taken to ensure the city's water is safe. Broussard says the health department tests samples on a monthly basis.

"We have 30 test sites in the system, one month we will send in samples from 15 sites in the system and the next month we send in from the other 15. They are from all parts of the sys-

tem," he said. "They will test to see if we have any coliform in the water and we do a chlorine residual test on a regular basis."

The City of Minden's water is supplied by nine wells in the Sparta Aquifer, Broussard said.

He says the last batch of samples were sent in around the second week of July and no contaminants were found.

The parasite has caused three deaths in Louisiana — in DeSoto and St. Bernard parishes, since 2011.

Police say Warren was ‘floating’ checks between banks

identification purposes, issuing worthless checks, bank fraud, forgery, 17 counts of monetary instrument abuse, three counts of computer fraud, and three counts of online impersonation were rolled into the racketeering charge.

Holland says Warren claims his wife didn't know

about some of the fraudulent schemes and did his best to exonerate his wife, Barbara Warren.

"He exonerated his wife in several of the schemes," Holland said. "I advised, him, his attorney and his wife's attorney that she would still have to answer charges related to a series of hot checks she wrote to Minden Animal Clinic."

"It led me to believe either (1) there was some truth to it, or (2) they had concocted a story to pro-

tect her," he said. "Either way, prosecuting her for the racketeering would prove problematic at this point, so she is being held responsible for the felonies I know I can prove against her, namely the hot checks."

The couple was arrested in April by Minden police when hot checks were reported to them, totaling \$21,000, police chief Steve Cropper said at the time of their arrest.

The National Insurance

Crime Bureau got involved when some reported fraudulent insurance claims were being investigated.

During a search of the couple's Rathbun Street home, documentation was seized in reference to the case, including several boxes of checks, checkbooks, paperwork, some electronics and a truck were confiscated.

Investigators say it all started when they were contacted about two bad

checks written by Barbara Warren to Brookshire's Grocery in Oct. 2014. One of the checks was more than \$500, which is a felony, Cropper said.

In April, a representative at Regions Bank contacted police telling them Raymond Warren had taken Navy Federal Credit Union checks and was writing them on an account for a nonexistent business, investigators said.

Investigators learned of

several more instances where Raymond Warren was allegedly "kiting," or floating, checks from bank to bank.

Barbara Warren was originally charged with three counts of bank fraud, issuing worthless checks and three counts of monetary instrument abuse. Her case has been scheduled for Oct. 12, with trial set for Dec. 7.

A status conference is set for Oct. 12 for Raymond Warren.

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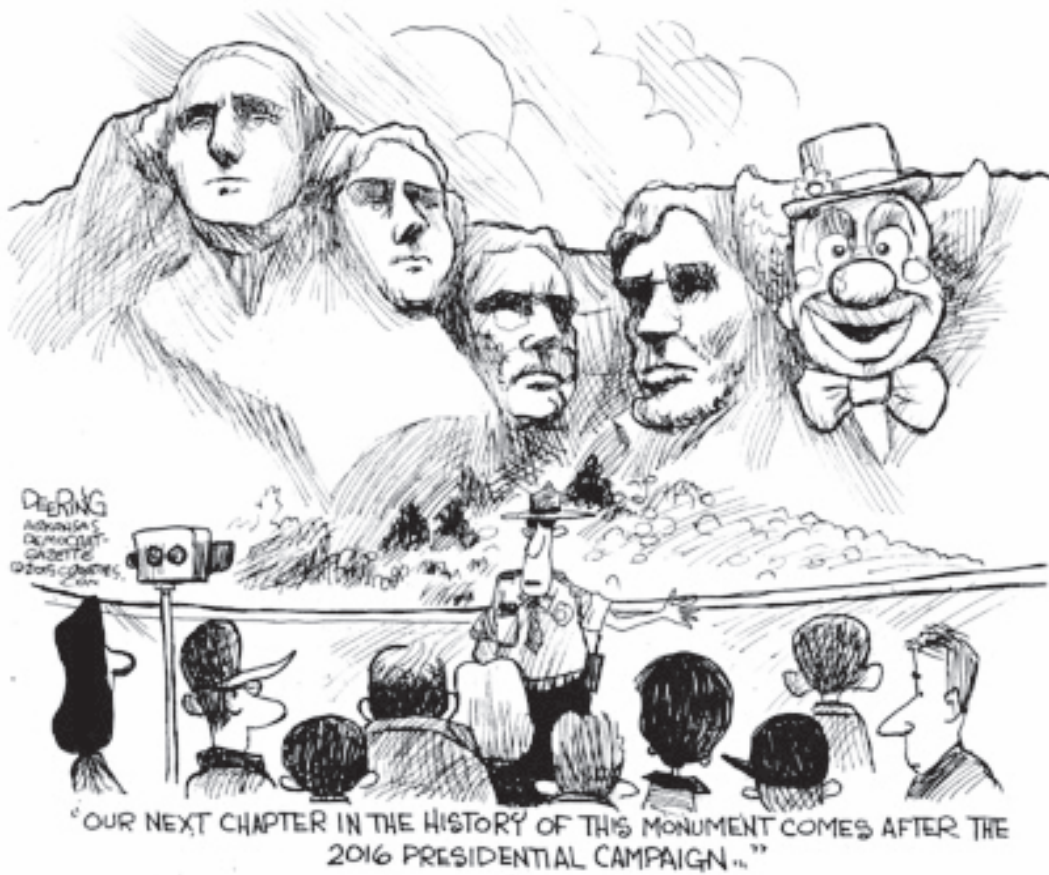

Big things happening in Webster Parish

On June 9th, the Webster Parish Convention and Visitors Commission held their second quarter commission meeting at the newly completed Germantown Colony visitor center. Larry Milford was on hand to give the commissioners a special tour of the exhibits he created for the climate controlled exhibit area of the building housing the original artifacts returned to Germantown from the state archives in Baton Rouge.

The 34th Annual Country Showdown was held in Webster Parish in Minden for the first time. Real Country 104.5 FM KBEF Radio of Minden hosted America's largest country music talent search on Friday, June 26th. The event was held at the Minden Community House with a standing room only attendance for the first year. Plans are already in the works to hold the event again next year at the Minden Civic Center.

Webster Parish was featured again in a full-page write-up highlighting Webster Parish's attractions and events in the June issue of Horizon Travel America, a magazine that caters specifically towards Canadians traveling to the United States. On June 4th, 100,000 copies of the magazine were distributed with the Toronto Star and National Post to affluent readers throughout the coun-

try.

With the assistance of the City of Minden, the first phase of the new signage for the Northwest Louisiana Film Trail has been installed in downtown Minden. Each of the new signs will identify a numbered location of a movie filmed in downtown Minden corresponding to the map in the brochure. Each location sign will give a brief write up about the movie and will have QR code. When scanned with a QR reader application available free online from the App Store, a film clip will be available on your phone or iPad showing the movie trailer and a scene from the movie filmed at the location. This is definitely a first in the state and perhaps the US.

The 64th Springhill Rodeo held on July 30th - August 1st was featured on the cover of July/August issue of Louisiana Road Trips Magazine along with a full page story.

On July 13th - July 17th, I made sales calls with representatives of Shreveport and Natchitoches in Dallas, Texas and Oklahoma City, Oklahoma on tour companies who book groups of 40 -80 people on motor coaches. Our goal was to promote the Louisiana Holiday Trail of Lights and invite their sales people to attend a complimentary tour this December 10th -14th including a visit to all of the five cities while they are all lighted up for the holidays. We were able to book all the available seats. We were also invited to return to Oklahoma City on November 5th to make a presentation to 100-125 group tour sales agents with the goal of booking group tours for the 2016 holi-

day season. We also booked tours for the 2015 holiday season and in the spring of 2016. Be looking for motor coach buses in Webster Parish in November and December. So far we have booked 5 group tours!

The Heart of the Pines Film Festival was held for the first time in Minden on July 25th and 26th bringing quality film screenings and events to the heart of the Ark-La-Tex. The films were selected specifically for the local North Louisiana audience. Attendees got to see great independent films from all over the world, including the critically acclaimed, festival-circuit hit "Wildlike", which will be opening in theaters this September.

Courtney Sandifer, Producer, Director, and organizer decided to hold the first Heart of the Pines Film Festival in her home town. The festival began on Saturday at 10:00 am at the Minden Civic Center with activities throughout the day and evening. Then on Sunday, there was also and interactive Filmmaking Workshop for Children from 2:00pm to 6:00pm followed by an Arts Community Mixer at 7:30 pm in conjunction with the Film Fest at The Farm located at 417 East Union Street in Minden.

The first film festival held in Webster Parish was featured as #2 of " 5 Things to Do this Weekend" in the Shreveport Times, on KSLA Channel 12 News, Fox 33 and 90.7FM The Promise's show "Talk of the Town" with Tom Pace.

The left's deadly wall of silence

Yes, those upstanding representatives are livid because the video was recorded "without the consent of the Planned Parenthood doctor." The House members also complain that the footage was "selectively-edited."

But was there something in the red wine that forced Dr. Deborah Nucatola to talk about she can deftly crush a fetus to ensure that certain prized body parts remain intact? Or was the salad dressing spiked when Dr. Mary Gattner spoke about performing "less crunchy" abortions in order to get "whole specimens?"

She actually seemed to find the whole fee-for-fetus discussion amusing, especially when joking that she wants to make enough money to buy a Lamborghini.

As those Democrats were attacking the messenger, they received support from their ideological allies on the New York Times editorial board. The Times' hacks described the videos as a dishonest attempt to make the sale of body parts look "nefarious and illegal."

Well, it's certainly nefarious, and it's possibly illegal.

Many prominent Democrats are simply making believe the videos don't exist. There has been nary a sound from Hillary Clinton or other presidential candidates, although Bernie Sanders did concede that Planned Parenthood's "tone" was off.

Yes, changing the "tone" should do the trick.

Anyone with a spine might follow the lead of Fox News analyst Kirsten Powers, a lifelong Democrat. "This is stomach-turning stuff," she wrote. "But the problem here is not one of tone. Now we have politicians who depend on the abortion lobby for money and on Hispanics for votes. So when truly vile acts occur, these craven men and women avert their eyes. Or change the subject. Or deflect the blame.

Key Buckeyes suspended for season opener

CHICAGO (AP) — Ohio State has suspended All-America defensive end Joey Bosa, receiver Corey Smith and H-backs Jalin Marshall and Dontre Wilson for its opening game at Virginia Tech.

"Violation of team policies," Buckeyes coach Urban Meyer said Thursday at Big Ten media days. "That's as far as I'll go."

Meyer did say the violations had nothing to do with players breaking any laws.

Meyer said he has known for a while that the suspensions were coming and that he is

"100 percent supportive" of the policies.

The defending national champions open the season Labor Day night in Blacksburg, Virginia, against the only team to beat them last season.

"We're pushing forward," Meyer said. "We're playing an extremely talented team, on the road in a tough environment."

Bosa had 13.5 sacks as a sophomore and enters his junior year as one of the top NFL prospects in college football.

Meyer said the Buckeyes

will look toward sophomore Jalyn Holmes and redshirt freshmen Sam Hubbard and Darius Slade to help pick up the slack for Bosa.

Marshall was second on the team in receptions as a freshman with 38 and was also the team's best punt returner.

Wilson and Smith combined for 41 catches for 555 yards.

The Buckeyes were ranked No. 1 in the preseason coaches' poll released Thursday and are likely to be top-ranked in The Associated Press presea-

son Top 25 when it is released Aug. 23.

Ohio State brings back most of its key players from last year's team, which bounced back from a September loss to the Hokies in Columbus to win the first College Football Playoff. Bosa might be the best of the Buckeyes. He had 21 tackles for loss last season, including a game-ending sack in overtime against Penn State.

Marshall was a versatile playmaker the Buckeyes lined up all over the field, including at quarterback at times. Wilson,

a junior, plays a similar role for Ohio State. A foot injury against Michigan State in November cut his season short and kept him out of spring practice.

Smith, a senior, is in his second season with Ohio State after transferring from junior college.

The Buckeyes will likely have a new addition at H-Back when preseason practice starts in August. Braxton Miller has said he will switch from quarterback to receiver, which could help make up for the losses there.

Contenders make moves

HOUSTON (AP) — With mere hours until the trade deadline, the Houston Astros and Toronto Blue Jays have sent a clear message that they're going for it — making big moves to try and propel their teams into the playoffs for the first time in a long time.

The Astros haven't reached the postseason since being swept by the White Sox in the 2005 World Series. Toronto's playoff drought is the longest in the majors, with its last trip coming in 1993, when Joe Carter's home run won the World Series.

The Blue Jays acquired All-Star left-hander David Price from Detroit on Thursday, a couple days after getting shortstop Troy Tulowitzki from Colorado.

"These types of players, the great superstar players, rarely become available," Toronto general manager Alex Anthopoulos said. "We think we're a good team and adding a guy like Price we think makes us that much stronger and will give us a chance to win. It's as simple as that."

The Astros made their own moves before the deadline for making non-waiver trades at 4 p.m. EDT Friday. They added top left-hand-

ed starter Scott Kazmir from Oakland last week and picked up two-time All-Star outfielder Carlos Gomez and right-hander Mike Fiers from the Brewers on Thursday night.

"This was a move with an eye toward this year, next year and the year after that, more so than five or seven years from now," Houston general manager Jeff Luhnow said.

"That's what our fans want. They want us to win."

In other trades, the Los Angeles Dodgers, which

haven't won it all since 1988, the year of Kirk Gibson's pinch homer off Dennis Eckersley, increased their already hefty payroll to \$297 million with a three-team deal. It brought them starters Mat Latos from the Marlins and Alex Wood from the Braves as well as relievers Jim Johnson and Luis Avilan from Atlanta.

The Blue Jays are six games back in the American League East and two games out of the second Wild Card.

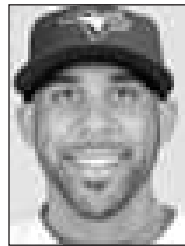
"By adding these two," Toronto manager John Gibbons said, "it gives me a shot in the arm. I know that."

In Price they get a proven veteran and high-level starter to bolster a team with a powerful offense. The first overall pick in 2007 is 9-4 with a 2.53 ERA in 21 starts this season.

"They've got a good thing going on right now in Toronto," Price said. "They've kind of been in this situation before and didn't make these type of moves. It definitely shows you that they want to win right now. You have to respect that. You have to like it and that's what you want to be a part of."

The ahead-of-schedule Astros wrapped up a three-game sweep of the Angels on Thursday night to take a two-game lead in the AL West. The young and energetic team has finally coaxed fans back to the park after several miserable years of losing, including dropping 100-plus games in three straight seasons from 2011-13.

"There is a lot of excitement when you add two players of that caliber for this home stretch," Houston manager A.J. Hinch said. "Moves are exciting this time of year. Everybody loves that."



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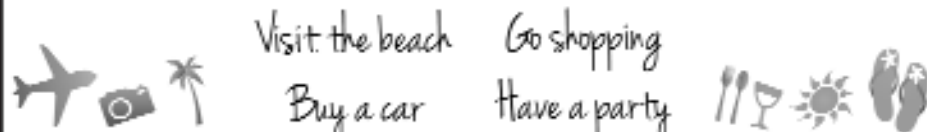

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Stewart: Meeting with Obama wasn't a secret

Jon Stewart says his "secret" White House meetings with President Barack Obama weren't so secret, and not that big a deal. During his penultimate week as "The Daily Show" host, Stewart reacted to a Politico story headlined "Jon Stewart's Secret White House Visits." The article said Stewart had met with the president in 2011 and again last year.

"That sounds so much more awesome than what happened," Stewart said on his show Wednesday night.

After joking about meeting with Obama "and Elvis, who's still alive," Stewart noted that he entered the White House through its public entrance and that both meetings were listed in the White House visitor logs, available for anyone to see.

"Something is not a secret just because you don't know about it," Stewart said, in a segment titled "When Barry Met Silly."

He depicted it as an invitation few Americans would reject.

"By the way, to all future presidents, if you ask me to come to Washington, I will do that," he said. "Because I have no idea how to react to that other than (say) 'what time?'"

He said Obama encouraged him not to make young Americans cynical about their government, and Stewart explained that he was actually skeptically idealistic. Otherwise, he said the conversation was much like it was when Obama appeared on "The Daily Show" earlier this month, only with a very good lunch.

"Was the president of the United States trying to influence, intimidate or flatter me?" Stewart said. "My guess is, 'uh huh.' Did it work? Might have.



Was it sinister? I don't (expletive) know." Stewart said he frequently takes calls from all sorts of important people, with the gen-

eral thrust of the conversation being what a jerk he is, although he used stronger language. Only one person ended their meeting by saying he would

deny ever talking to Stewart if the conversation became public, and the screen identified him: Fox News Channel chief Roger Ailes.

That may have been Ailes' idea of a joke, since he talked about his discussion with Stewart in a 2010 interview.

Further episodes are

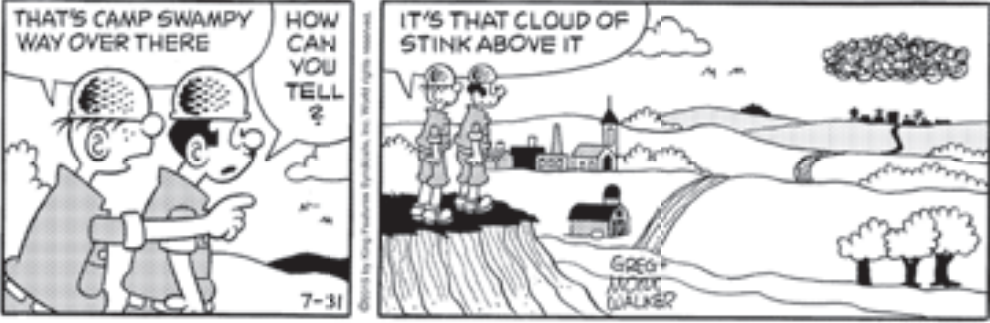

In a statement, Walters said the years-old scandals remain enormously interesting and continue to affect the lives of people who were involved.

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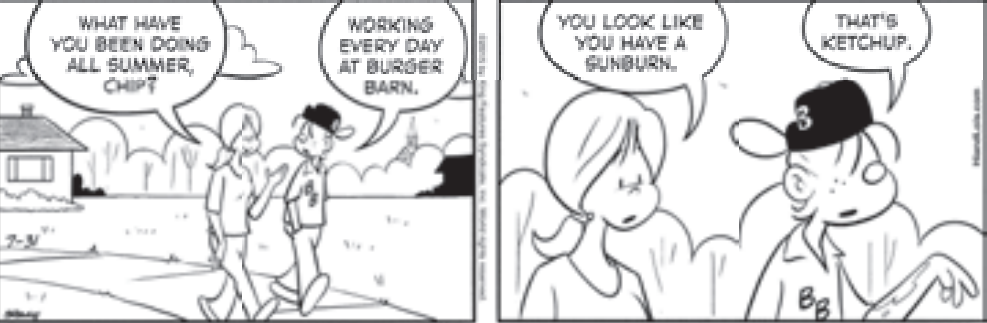
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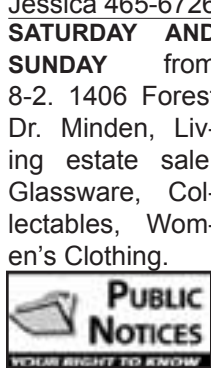
