# Chief: Man flees, pulls gun on officer

# City looks to connect power grid

If the 2015-16 proposed budget for the City of Minden passes as discussed, then the Public Works department may get enough money to begin the completion of the transmission loop.

George Rolfe, public works director, says the city upgraded and updated the city's transmission lines in 2001, but it stops at the German town substation.

"What we want to do is to complete that," he said.

The city's power comes from Entergy's lines, which starts at Gilark, then goes to the steam plant on Horton Street. It leaves the steam plant and then goes out Sibley Road ending at the East Street substation. It then comes back to

Qualifying for the October primary election is a month away, and candidates for various offices have begun to announce their intentions.

The Press-Herald will

publish one campaign announcement per candidate free of charge prior to qualifying. The deadline for submissions is Friday, Sept. 4.

Local offices on the ballot include sheriff, clerk of court, tax assessor, coroner, justice of the peace, and police jurors.

Residents from across the state will vote for Louisiana's next governor, lieutenant governor, secretary of state, attorney general, state treasurer, commissioner of agriculture and forestry, commissioner of insurance and BESE district 4 seat.

charged with felony carnal knowledge of a juvenile. Bond was set at \$200,000.

According to reports, sheriff's detective Sgt. Teresa Rogers received a call from Cotton Valley Police Chief Terry Brown who was questioning Felty when he allegedly admitting to having sex with the 14 year old girl in Sarepta, Cotton Valley and Greenwood.

"I got a phone call from the victim's stepmother saying she suspected something was going on with her stepdaughter," Brown said. "This guy is a relative, and it started in Greenwood. The stepmother saw some things and noticed they were acting strangely, and she saw something on Facebook that didn't add up."

Brown says the girl's stepmother came to the Cotton Valley police station and filed a report.

"The Facebook post wasn't really that bad," he

said. "It wasn't something that you would think would lead up to this, but we called him up here and about 10 minutes later he admitted to having sex with the young lady."

Brown then contacted Rogers about the incident and the victim was transported to the Gingerbread House where she confirmed what Felty told police.

"After he admitted it, he just looked at me and said, 'Whew! I'm glad this is out in the open,'" Brown said.

Sheriff's detectives are

continuing to investigate the case and more charges could be pending, Brown said.

Brown and Cotton Valley Police Officer Jasson Fitzgerald were the initial arresting officers before he was transported to the Criminal Investigation Division.

Brown thanked Rogers for her hard work on the case and says he appreciates her help.

Felty was placed under arrest at CID by Rogers and transported to BDCC.

## Timeline of contained burn unit explained

ESI officials explained the timeline of the contained burn unit, how it will be transported to Camp Minden and how the material will be transported from the bunkers to the destruction site.

Jason Poe, representing Baton Rouge-based Explosive Service International, says once construction of the contained burn unit and its filtration system is complete, it will be barged down to The Port of Shreveport and transferred to the super trailers with multiple axes. It will then be driven on a pre-determined route to Camp Minden to the destruction site where it will be assembled.

According to the time-

line presented, the unit will be delivered mid-December, with the first live fire mid-January.

At an Environmental Protection Agency-sponsored meeting at Camp Minden Thursday, ESI officials and the Louisiana Military Department went over the work plan, the portion of the AOC that specifies all the "what, where, how and when" that will be followed during the destruction of nearly 16 million pounds of M6 artillery propellant left behind at Camp Minden by the now defunct Explo Systems Inc.

Dean Schellhase, with ESI, went over the work plan, telling audience members other plans will be included, such as the

## The Advertiser on state's 'revenge porn' law

Louisiana's newly enacted law that criminalizes "revenge porn" — unauthorized sharing of nude images without permission, usually on the Internet — puts this state in the forward-thinking half of those that have taken steps to halt this cruel practice.

State Rep. Julie Stokes, R-Kenner, passed House Bill 489 in the Legislature and Gov. Bobby Jindal signed it as Act 231, which would penalize offenders with fines of up to \$10,000 and jail time up to two years for intentionally publishing images of people "whose intimate parts are exposed." Those are serious consequences, but not as serious as the damages — mental and emotional — that victims can bear.

For a guilty verdict, the culprit must know the person does not want his or her image distributed and does not consent for the image to be published. For successful prosecution, the accused also must have the intention to harass or cause emotional damage to the person whose image is distributed.

That's a lot to prove, especially in regard to the accused person's intent, but ours is not a subtle age. Accused people have been known to send nude images to the victim's family members. Such intent is hardly masked.

"Revenge porn" laws have developed in at least 20 states in the past few years and usually for the same reason: An ex-boyfriend or ex-spouse takes revenge by posting nude pictures, oftentimes taken on a cellphone, that were shot in more felicitous times.

That's not the sole scenario — folks have been photographed unaware, their images published — and on rare occasion the accused is a woman. Technology and social media have created a strange world.

Yet consequences to victims can be severe. Victims have talked about being terrified to apply for jobs — many companies conduct thorough Internet searches on prospective job candidates — and the results would provide more information to a potential employer than most job hopefuls would be willing to share. Stakes are high.

At least one criminal defense attorney in Louisiana, Craig Mordock, has written that the new state law criminalizes speech that is constitutionally protected. He contends in a blog that "content based restrictions criminalizing speech are presumed invalid," but that accused offenders might have a tough task in defending themselves, especially in state court. One might hope so.

In his blog, Mordock takes exception to Stokes' stated reason for drafting her legislation: "It is not your right to cause someone, sometimes, irreparable emotional harm just because you're mad at them, or want to get back at them, or want to cyber bully them. I just think you have to draw a line somewhere."

That line may cross the First Amendment — it would not be the first — but in a way that most Louisianans can accept — or even demand.

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

## Whither the 'Moderate' Democrats?

This week's focus has understandably been on the crowded Republican field, which is surely about to become less crowded. As the winnowing continues, it is very possible that the party will be represented next year by a moderate like Jeb Bush or John Kasich, or by a doctrinaire conservative such as Ted Cruz.

But there is no such diversity among Democrats, where the candidates range from very far left to even farther left. Moderate Democrats are so rare that they may soon be covered by the Endangered Species Act of 1973.

Coincidentally, 1973 is about when the party veered off into the left lane. That's when the Supreme Court discovered that abortion on demand is a right guaranteed by the Constitution. Some Democrats objected to abortion, but they were slowly culled from leadership positions.

The party's extreme views were apparent again last week when the Senate took up a bill that could have led to the defunding of Planned Parenthood, America's leading abortionist.

This was not about "women's health" or banning abortion, merely a measure that would end the flow of a half-billion dollars to Planned Parenthood every year. Exactly two Democrats voted for the legislation. Two.

Planned Parenthood is an abortion factory and there is no question the group sells the body parts of dead babies or fetuses. A series of videos has

proven that beyond doubt, but the Democratic Party does not care.

Liberals claim to believe in fairness for the underdog and helping the defenseless. But somehow unborn babies, even those who could survive outside the womb, do not count. Social justice, anyone?

On the immigration front, Democrats are also in lockstep on 'sanctuary city' policies that often protect violent felons who are in this country illegally. Despite rapes and killings by men who have been deported numerous times, Democrats defend the policy as justice for the downtrodden. But no one is more downtrodden, at least emotionally, than the family of the late Kate Steinle.

When it comes to economics, many Democrats embrace the Robin Hood philosophy. Except when it comes to their own wealth, of course, which they often shelter in foundations and tax dodges.

The "tax the rich" mantra dominates the party and its leadership. Take Debbie Wasserman Schultz, head of the Democratic National Committee. When pressed by Chris Matthews to delineate the difference between a Democrat and a Socialist, she did a commendable impression of Ralph Kramden being interrogated by Alice. Then, given a mulligan by Chuck Todd a couple of days later, Wasserman Schultz was again totally stymied.

The free market has lifted more people out of poverty than any economic system in the history of the world, but liberal Democrats (are there any other kind?) refuse to acknowledge that fact.

The human toll of liberalism is most evident in our major cities, which are uniformly run by left-wing Democrats. Murder rates are soaring in Milwaukee, Baltimore, Chicago, and other urban centers.

Progressives look away from the black-on-black carnage while chanting "Black Lives Matter" to anyone who will listen. And any Democrat who knows the score had better not utter the words "All Lives Matter." Just ask Martin O'Malley, who got slapped around when he used that seemingly innocuous phrase.

In Bill de Blasio's New York City, some homeless use public fountains as their personal bidets while squeegee guys extort money from fearful drivers. Gotham is once again becoming Hell on the Hudson, thanks to liberalism and its acolytes.

So it's almost irrelevant whether the Democratic nominee is Hillary Clinton, Bernie Sanders, Martin O'Malley, Joe Biden, Elizabeth Warren, or someone else. Don't expect to hear a discouraging word about Planned Parenthood, sanctuary cities, confiscatory taxation, family breakdown, or black crime. Criticism of those problems is simply off limits.

The survivor of the Republican free-for-all, whether moderate or conservative, will surely be a traditional American who deeply loves this country and sings its praises without hesitation or embarrassment. He or she will come up against a woman or man who espouses the liberal philosophy that has wreaked so much havoc.

If the facts matter, the election should not even be close. But facts are often trumped by emotion, even when it comes to electing the most powerful person in the world. Especially when it comes to electing the most powerful person in the world.

## The Advocate on state's managed care plan

It's not clear just how willing candidates for governor are to take on a powerful State Capitol lobbying force, the nursing home industry, which has balked at the managed-care model that Gov. Bobby Jindal has imposed on other providers in the Medicaid program.

Unfortunately, as so often with Jindal's administration, the facts are in dispute about whether managed care has saved the state money and boosted health care outcomes for Medicaid recipients. What is certain is that the providers don't like it.

Gubernatorial candidate Scott Angelle on Thursday backed off the original Jindal plan to extend managed care to nursing homes. "Certainly, it's saving money, but it's not just about money," Angelle said of managed care. While just about everyone can agree with the sentiment, it's not a dreadfully courageous stand.

"I want to see some of the outcomes of the program" before making a commitment to expand it to include long-term care for the elderly and developmentally disabled, Angelle said, deeming this "a vulnerable population." Just about everybody can agree with that, too, but is this a case of tending to the interest of the taxpayer or tending to the interest of provider groups?

Angelle's backing away from a Jindal program — he was a key aide to the sitting governor — came as he and two other candidates participated in a forum on issues facing the elderly. Lt. Gov. Jay Dardenne and state Rep. John Bel Edwards also spoke, but U.S. Sen. David Vitter did not participate, citing a scheduling conflict in Washington. Edwards is a Democrat. The remainder are Republicans.

Jindal already has turned over to private insurance companies management of medical and behavioral health components of the state's \$8 billion-plus Medicaid program. The companies are charged with managing the care of Medicaid recipients.

Many middle-class families don't think of themselves as Medicaid recipients, but their elderly relatives often are. Long-term care for the elderly and developmentally disabled was supposed to be the final part of the Jindal initiative where private companies manage the care of Medicaid recipients. But the administration said Wednesday it will leave the move to the next governor, who takes office in January.

A question about the candidates' positions on the issue was first up at the forum sponsored by AARP Louisiana, the Councils on Aging and the Louisiana Aging Network Association.

"If we have managed care, it needs to be across the continuum of services," Dardenne said. "It's the last of three areas and it needs to be applied to everybody consistently."

That makes sense, and Edwards somewhat more broadly agreed. "We also need to transition to nursing homes when necessary," he said. "It is my goal that we sit at the table and work this out."

We can't help but agree with Angelle as well, though, that this managed care initiative should also stress improved care as well as curbing costs. And one of the problems with Jindal's administration is its yawning credibility gap with legislators and the public. The ultimate fate of managed care for nursing homes and other providers will depend on whether projected cost savings, as well as service improvements, can be trusted in the existing Medicaid contracts.

That may take, after Jindal's phony figures of recent years, a raft of auditors and the blessing of the pope. But even then, the new governor will have to be willing to take on influential State Capitol lobbyists to make things happen.

## Cheddar chicken artichoke melts

The weather is just too hot to spend much time in the kitchen so I eat a lot of sandwiches in the summer. I like to keep a variety of different flavored sliced cheeses in my refrigerator. This K E E P E R recipe was taken from a plastic bag of Sargento Deli Style Sliced Sharp Cheddar Cheese.

My sister-in-law, Ava McWhorter and I both like

recipes that include artichokes hearts. As soon as I read the recipe, I knew she would like it so I invited her to join me for an evening meal. For accompaniment, I served slices of watermelon.

Ava liked the sandwich so well; she urged me to share the recipe in my Minden Herald-Press column.

\*I found the instructions a bit confusing so I have included the way I prepared the sandwiches.

CHEDDAR CHICKEN ARTICHOKE MELTS

2 cups chopped cooked chicken

- 1 (6 oz.) jar marinated artichoke hearts, drained, finely chopped
  - 3 Tbsp. mayonnaise
  - 2 Tbsp. finely chopped red onion
  - 1 Tbsp. Dijon or grainy mustard (I used the Dijon)
  - 8 slices sourdough bread or rye bread (I used rye), lightly toasted
  - 8 slices Sargento Deli Style Sliced Sharp Cheddar cheese, diagonally cut in half
- Combine chicken, artichoke hearts, mayonnaise, onion, and mustard; mix well. Spread mixture evenly over toast; top with cheese. Bake in preheated 375°

oven until hot and cheese is melted, about 6 minutes. Top with remaining toast.

Prep time: 10 minutes. Bake time: 6 minutes Serves: 4

\*Prepare the mixture as directed in original instructions. In my toaster oven, I lightly toasted two slices of the rye bread. I then evenly spread the chicken mixture on those two slices of toasted bread, topped each piece of the toast with a slice of the Cheddar cheese and baked them in the preheated oven for 6 minutes. While these were toasting in the oven, I fully toasted 2 more slices of the rye

# Saints look the same



BALTIMORE (AP) — It was supposed to look different.

New players. New schemes. New attitudes. A better product couldn't be promised, but a different brand of football was. Saints coach Sean Payton spent the offseason saying he didn't want to be "that team." You know, "that team" that suffered defensive breakdowns, made dumb mistakes, and gave up easy yards. "That team" that took the field last season.

On Thursday, during the preseason opener against the Baltimore

Ravens at M&T Bank Stadium, the Saints were, sadly, "that team." In fact, the 30-27 loss might have been the worst possible version of "that team" while the starters were on the field.

"We just have to go back to the drawing board and fix it, make corrections," cornerback Keenan Lewis said. "We'll be all right."

It would take a certain brand of optimism to find things to highlight when the starters for both teams were on the field. Maybe you could hang your hat on fullback Austin Johnson's almost hurdling a guy on the sideline late in the first quarter. On defense, you could point to rookie linebacker Hau'oli Kikaha looking good in run support on one play.

Brandin Cooks' touchdown on a fourth-down screen, which was created by a Terron Armstead block was nice and


showed the receiver maybe developed more ability after the catch, but some style points are lost for it coming against the second-team defense.

That's it. And if you happened to feel good about those moments, injuries to cornerbacks Brandon Browner (carted off with a knee injury after Kikaha collided with his knee) and Delvin Breaux and linebacker Dannell Ellerbe before the end of the first quarter negated the positive vibes.

Disappointment hit as soon as the curtain opened. The first drive was 8:15 of frustration. Baltimore quarterback Joe Flacco and running back Lorenzo Taliaferro dinked and dunked and ran their way to a 7-0 lead on a 16-play, 80-yard march on the game's opening series.

The excruciating part of the drive was New Orleans forced three

third downs and couldn't find an answer. On the first one, Flacco hit Steve Smith over the middle for a first down. On the next try, a third-and-7, Cam Jordan and Kyle Williams created pressure off the left edge, but Flacco slipped out around the right corner and

The first-team offense didn't perform much better against Baltimore's first-team defense. Mark Ingram picked up a pair of yards, Cooks dropped the first pass of the game and Luke McCown wrapped things up with an incompleteness. It was the same thing on the next series, as the offense went three-and-out.

Special teams also got into the act by having a

49-yard kick return by Marcus Murphy negated by a Khiry Robinson hold. The Saints were "that team." The saving grace is that it's the preseason. Perhaps the defense would have been better with Byrd and defensive end Akiem Hicks on the field. The offense unquestionably would have been better with Brees and Spiller.

All isn't lost because the first game of the preseason went the wrong way. It's too soon to panic. But a certain level of concern is acceptable and understandable. Maybe it was even unavoidable. four men, based on the video footage, appear to be black but descriptions of the individuals are vague. In the video, three of the four subjects are wearing something over their faces, one who appears to be wearing a veil of some sort across his mouth.

“Four guys went down to MAR-C Industries and attempted to get into one of their smaller minivans with no luck,” Det. Keith King Jr. said. “They found an econo-van and popped the lock off of it, took off the ignition, cranked it up and went to the Exxon station.”

The perpetrators backed up to the front doors, he says, and two of them got out of the van – one with a crow bar, the other with a dolly.

“They pried the door open, and they went in, wrapped a chain around the center of the ATM machine and the other two held the door,” he said. “The driver took off

and ripped the ATM machine in half, leaving the bottom half. They ripped the top part off. What they don’t know is it’s anchored to the floor, so they didn’t get anything. They wasted their time.”

Once they jerked the chain, it took the door off the storefront and caused quite a bit of damage to the brick, King said.

Three took off on foot, and the driver took off in the van, he said. The van was found still running on Pershing Street, and police collected evidence from the van, including DNA, King said.

“Later this morning, after daylight, the van that was stolen from MAR-C was found on Pershing Street, and some residents on Pershing Street were getting their kids ready for school, and that’s when they noticed the van and that it was still running,” Cropper said. “They had actually run it into the back of another vehicle.”

Charges will include a stolen vehicle, attempted stolen vehicle, burglary of a business and hit and run.

will be out in full force looking for drunk and impaired drivers through Sept. 7.

Minden Police Chief Steve Cropper says grant money from the Louisiana Highway Safety Commission will allow additional officers on patrol.

“We will have additional officers on the streets looking for suspected intoxicated drivers,” Cropper said. “The grant will pay for the overtime of those officers.”

In every state, it’s illegal to drive with a BAC of .08 or higher. The Minden

Police Department wants to remind drivers that driving sober is not a recommendation – it’s the law.

Cropper says the goal of the crackdown is to help save lives.

“We’re not pulling people over to meet a DUI quota,” Cropper said. “We’re cracking down on a reckless crime in order to save lives.”

Cropper says the department received \$10,000 in grant money from the LHSC this year.

## City says completing loop will help eliminate city-wide power outages

Sheppard and Fort Streets. At Sheppard and Fort Street, one line goes to the Sheppard Street substation, the other goes by Brookshire’s, ending at the Germantown substation.

The system was upgrad-

ed from 69 kva, or 1,000 volt amps, to 115 kva transmission, Rolfe said.

“The old system stopped at the steam plant at 69 kva and used to loop the whole town,” he said. “The part between Germantown and High Street, that’s the part that’s missing. Back in 2001, and this started before I came here, they were upgrading from

69,000 volts to 115,000 volts. The reason for that is it’s more efficient.”

In 2001, a new substation at East Street was built, upgraded the substation at Sheppard Street, updated the substation at Germantown, and part of that upgrade was the new galvanized poles, he said.

For example, a number of years ago, as a result of a

guy wire being hit, it shorted out the system, causing the city of Minden to go dark, but crews were able to restore it within two or three hours.

“When that happened, if we had the loop completed, we could have opened up certain switches and closed other switches and we could’ve back fed,” he said. “Right now we can’t

do that. If we have a problem (in between the incomplete portion of the loop), we can’t back feed. That’s what it’s all about.”

During budget workshops over the summer, Rolfe discussed the public works budget with the mayor and council members, saying instead of having \$750,000 dedicated to overlaying roads, that

money would be better spent split it up among this project, tree-trimming, road repair/overlay and water hydrant upgrades and improvements.

If passed, public works would see roughly \$600,000 for all these projects.

Minden police chief Steve Cropper says Sgt. Ryan Barnette responded to a call in the Fort Street area regarding a suspicious person. "Apparently Sgt. Barnette saw him, got out of his vehicle to approach him and the suspect fled on foot," he said. "Officer First Class Chris Hammon-tree arrived to assist, and they were in pursuit of him on foot. As Warren was fleeing from them, he apparently stops at one point and pulls a gun from

his waistband, turns and points it at Sgt. Barnette." At this time, Cropper says Warren reportedly began making comments "for officers to shoot him." "When Warren saw the second officer (Hammon-tree), apparently he turned and began fleeing again on foot," he said. "He ended up running into a person's house, not belonging to him or a relative, just to get away from the officers." Warren ran out of the house, Cropper says, and eventually Barnette and Hammon-tree caught up to him and placed him under arrest. He says Capt. Dan Weaver told him the serial

number on one of the weapons Warren had in his possession had been altered. "At least one of the pistols was stolen from here in Minden," Cropper said. "He will also be charged with illegal possession of stolen things. He had a .380 pistol and a Ruger .45." Cropper says Warren has a lengthy criminal history. operations and maintenance plan, air and water sampling and monitoring and post removal and site control plan. Citizen Advisory Group members asked questions of ESI regarding safety and the integrity of the M6. Brian Salvatore, an LSU

chemistry professor and dialogue committee member, suggested using different odors of chemicals that could possibly distinguish the deterioration of the M6 in the magazines. A sweet smell would indicate the propellant is in better shape than if it has a sour smell. Poe says there's really no way to insure the integrity of the M6, because all the boxes are mixed up. They


will have to judge the integrity of each box when they get ready to physically move it, he said. "We lost a lot of integrity when Explo started mixing all the boxes," he said. "There's really no way to do a stability test of the chemical makeup of the product to know if it will go bad next week. You could literally sample every box and get a result that everything is OK, and get to the next

magazine where in reality that box is bad because I didn't get the grain from the bottom of the box. We've lost our ability to do monitoring of the product when they mixed all the lots, which is a dangerous job for me and my team." He says they can do a physical assessment of the magazine, and that's really it. Poe says he'll take note of chemical odors and they

will look into adding it into their operations and maintenance plan. He says based on the information they received from the TAV site visit report, they plan to destroy roughly 800 pounds of M6 every 20 minutes. The next meeting will be at 6:30 p.m., Thursday, Sept. 17. Adam Adams, EPA on-scene coordinator says the meeting will tentatively be at the Louisiana Depart-






