West Nile virus cases in state hovers at 20

BATON ROUGE — Twenty people in Louisiana have been diagnosed with West Nile virus so far this summer, and half of them had the most dangerous form, an infection of the brain or nervous system, The state Department of Health and Hospitals said Thursday.

Two others had flu-like West Nile fever, and eight did not have any symp-

toms and were diagnosed through blood tests, according to a news release Thursday.

Nobody has died, department John Ford said.

The department's weekly surveillance report shows that four of the dangerous neuroinvasive cases were in Rapides Parish, two were in

Hurricane Danny strengthens in the **Atlantic Ocean**

MIAMI — Hurricane Danny has gained a little strength as it moves across the Atlantic.

The hurricane's maximum sustained winds early Friday had increased to near 85 mph (140 kph). The U.S. National Hurricane Center says some additional strengthening is possible but Danny should start weakening on Saturday.

The hurricane is centered about 985 miles (1,590 kilometers) eastsoutheast of the Leeward Islands and is moving west-northwest near 10 mph (17 kph).

Danny is tiny hurricane with hurricane force winds only extending outward up to 10 miles (20 kilometers) from its center.

Hurricane Danny doesn't currently pose a threat to land but the Hurricane Center says those in the Leeward Islands should monitor its progress.

Cheating site logged federal subscribers with sensitive jobs

WASHINGTON - U.S. government employees with sensitive jobs in national security or law enforcement were among hundreds of federal workers found to be using government networks to access and pay membership fees to the cheating website Ashley Madison, The Associated Press has learned.

The list includes at least two assistant U.S. attorneys, an information technology administrator in the White House's support staff, a Justice Department investigator, a division chief, and a government hacker and counterterrorism employee at the Homeland Security Department. Others visited from networks operated by the Pentagon.

Federal policies vary by agency as to whether employees could visit websites during work hours like Ashlev Madison, which could be considered akin to a dating website. But such use raises questions about what personal business is acceptable — and what websites are OK to visit - for U.S. workers on taxpayer time, especially those with sensitive jobs who could face blackmail.

Hackers this week released detailed records on millions of people registered with the website one month after the break-in at Ashley Madison's parent company, Toronto-based Avid Life Media Inc. The website — whose slogan is, "Life is short. Have an affair" - is marketed to facilitate extramarital affairs.

Few connecting from federal networks had listed government email accounts when subscribing. But the AP was able to trace their government Internet connections, logged by the website over five years and as recently as June. They encompass more than two dozen agencies, such as the departments of State, Justice, Energy, Treasury and Transportation. Others came from House or Senate computer networks.

Records also reveal subscribers signed up using state and municipal government networks nation-

wide, including those run by the New York Police Department, the nation's largest. "If anything comes to our attention indicating improper use of an NYPD computer, we will look into it and take appropriate action," said the NYPD's top spokesman, Stephen Davis.

The AP is not naming government subthe scribers it found because they are not elected officials or accused of a crime.

Many federal customers appeared to use nongovernment email addresses with handles such as "sexlessmarriage," 'soontobesingle" or "latinlovers." Some Justice employees Department also appeared to use prepaid credit cards to help preserve their anonymity but nonetheless connected to the service from their office computers.

"I was doing some things I shouldn't have been doing," a Justice Department investigator told the AP. Asked about the threat of blackmail, the investigator said if prompted he would reveal his actions to his family and employer to prevent it.

"I've worked too hard all my life to be a victim of blackmail. That wouldn't happen," he said. He spoke on condition of anonymity because he was DEFENSE SECRE-

deeply embarrassed and not authorized by the government to speak to reporters using his name.

Defense Secretary Ash Carter confirmed Thursday the Pentagon was looking into the list of people who used militarv email addresses. Adultery can be a criminal offense under the Uniform Code of Military Justice.

"I'm aware it," Carter said. "Of course it's an issue because conduct is very important. And we expect good conduct on the part of our people. ... The services are looking into it and as well they should be. Absolutely."

The AP's review was the first to reveal that federal workers used their office systems to access the site, based on their Internet Protocol addresses associated with credit card trans-

agency, Homeland Security rules, for instance, say devices should be used for only for official purposes. It also prescribes "limited personal use is authorized as long as this use does not interfere with official duties or cause degradation of network services.' Employees are barred from using government computers to access "inappropriate sites" including those that are "obscene, hateful, harmful, malicious, hostile, threatening, abusive, vulgar, defamatory, profane, or racially, sexually, or ethnically objectionable."

The hackers who took credit for the break-in had accused the website's owners of deceit and incompetence, and said the company refused to bow to their demands to close the site. Avid Life released a statement calling the hackers criminals. It added that law enforcement in both the U.S. and Canada is investigating and declined comment beyond its statement Tuesday that it was investigating the hackers' claims.

The Advocate on debate about public statues and monuments

Public statues and monuments, by their nature, are meant to be permanent parts of a civic land-scape. That doesn't mean such memorials should never be removed. But when we do consider taking them down, we should do so thoughtfully.

By that standard, the process to determine the fate of several Confederate monuments in New Orleans doesn't seem destined to inspire much public confidence in the result. That's a shame, given the dimensions of a controversy that's captured attention beyond New Orleans, bringing state officials with their own political agendas into the fray.

This summer, New Orleans Mayor Mitch Landrieu called for replacing the monuments with less controversial ones. The iconic images in question include the statue of Confederate Gen. Robert E. Lee atop a huge column at a St. Charles Avenue traffic circle, a statue of Confederate President Jefferson Davis on the street that bears his name, and the statue of Confederate Gen. P.G.T. Beauregard at City Park's entrance. Another monument commemorating an 1874 white rebellion against the city's biracial Reconstruction-era government also is part of the controversy.

The Confederacy advanced white supremacy and slavery, twin evils of American history. No reasonable person can favor celebrating those ideas. But even some people who despise the Confederacy's values have argued for keeping the monuments in place as a cautionary message to today's citizens — and those to come after us. This dispute also invites reflection on what moral vardstick we should use to mark he past in public memory. Should the statue of Andrew Jackson, slave owner and persecutor of Native Americans, be removed from Jackson Square, too? What about memorials to slave owners George Washington and Thomas Jefferson, whose faces adorn our national currency? Given the difficulty of such questions, we shouldn't demonize our differences regarding the proper role of public monuments. That's why the polarizing quality of this summer's debate has been so regrettable. Landrieu called for the monuments' removal before getting widespread public input, creating the perception that decisions about the status of the monuments had already been made. Two city panels have recommended removal of the monuments, and the issue now heads to the New Orleans City Council, which almost surely will follow the recommendations. Cynics might be forgiven for assuming that allowing public comments before the committee votes was really just for show. This process has seemed more driven by theater than policy, creating a natural climate for political posturing by many other players. Gov. Bobby Jindal, as well as U.S. Sen. David Vitter, Lt. Gov. Jay Dardenne and Public Service Commissioner Scott Angelle, who are GOP contenders to replace Jindal, have come out against removing the statues. State Sen. John Bel Edwards, the lone Democrat in the governor's race, said the issue should be left to New Orleans residents. Although state officials might shape this debate at the margins, the future of the monuments will, we suspect, ultimately be determined by the people of New Orleans, and that's as it should be. New Orleans needs a united citizenry to confront its broader challenges, such as crime and public education. But this summer's discussion of the Crescent City's Confederate statues, ostensibly aimed at civic unity, is sparking division instead. Sadly, a debate about public monuments has become a monument to political folly.

NATIONAL FOOTBALL LEAGUE NFL head coaches fed up with practice fights

SPARTANBURG, S.C. Carolina Panthers coach Ron Rivera offered this edict to his players before the start of this week's joint practices with the Miami Dolphins: You fight, you're out.

"We told our guys if you get thrown off the field, I'm going to treat you like you got thrown out of a game," Rivera said Thursday.

So players wouldn't return to practice.

Dolphins coach Joe Philbin agreed with the approach, and it has

worked.

Skirmishes at camps are not new, and to some extent even condoned. But Rivera and Philbin are among a group of coaches around the league who have spoken out to curb the fighting that has garnered training camps headlines in an effort to set the tone for workouts.

And when coaches speak out, their voices are being heard.

Arizona Cardinals coach Bruce Arians said he has no patience for fighting in training camp, issuing a

zero tolerance policy. If players fight, they run.

"It's not tolerated here," Arians said. "Coaches that believe in it, they need to get new jobs."

The Dolphins and Panthers completed two days of fight-free work on Thursday, aside from one very minor scuffle between Panthers offensive lineman Michael Oher and Dolphins defensive end Olivier Vernon on Wednesday.

"We talked to our players about making sure we took advantage of the opportunity," Rivera said. "We didn't come here to be disruptive and fight, we came here to get better as a football team.'

Philbin said he and Rivera took measures before practices to make sure players were getting the message, calling them together in a group near midfield. And once practice started, the Rivera and Philbin split up and went to different fields, each with authority to discipline the opposing team's players.

"I told our team we're not

coming here to have a bar room brawl – and If we want to do that, we can stay down in Florida," Philbin said. "We came down here to compete and to get tougher and to get a little more physical against a really good football team."

Indianapolis Colts coach Chuck Pagano issued a similar statement to his team before scrimmages with the Chicago Bears.

Pagano didn't want a repeat of the sideline-clearing brawl that happened earlier this summer

between the Washington Redskins and Houston Texans, or even the fights that marred a joint practice between the Dallas Cowboys and St. Louis Rams earlier this week.

"If guys fight, if you do it in the game, they're going to throw you out and you're hurting the team. So you can't do it," Pagano said. "... Treat them like we treat ourselves. It's not about the chirping and the jaw jacking and taking cheap shots. It's about getting better."

LOS ANGELES -Sheriff's investigators plan to recommend that prosecutors file a vehicular manslaughter charge against Caitlyn Jenner for her role in a fatal car crash last February, officials said Thursday.

Investigators found that Jenner was driving "unsafe for the prevailing road conditions" when her SUV rear-ended a Lexus, Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department spokeswoman Nicole Nishida said.

Jenner was hauling an off-road vehicle on a trailer behind her Cadillac Escalade on Feb. 7 when she steered to avoid cars slowing for a traffic light in front of her on the Pacific Coast Highway in Malibu.

Jenner's SUV rearended two cars, pushing the Lexus into oncoming traffic and also hitting a Prius. The Lexus driver, 69year-old Kim Howe, was killed when her car was struck head-on by a Hummer.

The case will be presented to prosecutors for final review next week, Nishida said. The district attorney's office will determine what charges Jenner ultimately faces.

If convicted of such a charge, Jenner could face up to one year in county jail.

Jenner's attorney Blair Berk declined comment. The fatal crash

occurred months before Caitlyn Jenner's transition. She was formerly known as Bruce Jenner, the 1976 Olympic decathlon champion and Kim

Kardashian's stepfather. Howe's stepchildren have filed suit against Jenner claiming they've suffered enormous damages.

The lawsuit by Dana Redmond and William Howe does not specify how much they are seeking. They claim Jenner was negligent when she collided with their stepmother's car, causing them and other relatives "great loss-

Attorneys for Howe's step-children, Dana Redmond and William Howe, did not immediately return email messages seeking comment.

Another woman, Jessica Steindorff, who was driving the Prius, also filed suit seeking unspecified damages. A phone message for Steindorff's attorney, Brad Simon, was not immediately returned on Thursday.

Jenner's transition has played out in public over the past several months and included a high-profile interview with ABC's Diane Sawyer last April, in which Jenner, appearing nervous at first, declared, Yes, for all intents and purposes, I am a woman."

She appeared on the July cover of Vanity Fair -with a photo of a longhaired Jenner in a strapless corset, legs crossed, sitting on a stool. The image was shot by famed celeb photographer Annie



Leibovitz. Inside, more images depict Jenner in gold lame, a black bustier and a cleavage-baring, offthe-shoulder gown.

Jenner also debuted a

new Twitter account with: "I'm so happy after such a long struggle to be living my true self. Welcome to the world Caitlyn. Can't wait for you to get to know her/me." In about three hours, the account had more than 860,000 followers.

Flamboyant Trump evolved into cautious businessman

NEW YORK — Donald Trump sells himself as a bold empire-builder, the kind of businessman who could force through big changes in Washington as president.

Yet for all his bravado - "I've done an amazing job," the Republican White House hopeful boasted during his announcement speech — a review of the billionaire's financial filings and recent deals suggests he's no swashbuckler.

Trump is reluctant to take on debt after it nearly ruined him in the 1990s. He holds few stocks for someone of his wealth and has grown increasingly dependent on making money by lending out his name to others rather than developing real estate himself.

But that's not his money," says Don Peebles, a real estate developer who oversees a \$5 billion real estate portfolio. "He's not taking big risks.'

That's not a knock. Peebles calls Trump a "pioneer," praising his move into a nearly riskfree business. In an industry prone to booms and bust, say branding experts and rival developers, it's a shrewd shift that only someone with Trump's name recognition could pull off. In essence, Trump gets a stream of fees without risking any of his own money.

But it's not the image that Trump is projecting as a candidate for president, given that his White House campaign is built around his prowess in the boardroom. The candidate's

'We have been major buyers of properties," said the candidate's son, Eric Trump, who oversees real estate development and acquisitions at the Trump Organization. "We believe in owning dirt."

A few hoteliers had created buzz by putting their names on buildings think Conrad Hilton of Hilton Hotels — when Donald Trump was getting his start in the 1970s, but the idea hadn't really caught on in luxury residential real estate. Trump made it work, thanks to unabashed love of glitz and glamour - and some good timing.

He broke ground on New York's Trump Tower in 1980, just before New York City's resurgence from near bankruptcy and the start of the longest bull stock market in history. He bought and built more

and diversified into airlines and casinos — all with his name leading the way.

Then boom turned bust in the late 80s, and Trump lost nearly everything. Unable to pay back billions of dollars of debt, he threatened to tie up lenders in court, threw two of his casinos into bankruptcy, cut a series of deals that erased most of his personal liability, then began buying and building once again.

In 2001, he completed the 90-story Trump World Tower, a residential building across from the United Nations in New York. Three years later, he launched his runaway TV hit "The Apprentice" and his brand began to take off as a business in and of itself. Today you can buy a myriad of Trump-Tabeled products, including cologne and cufflinks,

men's suits and furniture and fragrances.

Not all the branding deals have gone smoothly. Condo buyers in failed Trump-named properties in Fort Lauderdale, Florida, and Baja, Mexico, have claimed in lawsuits that the billionaire misled them into believing he was more involved in the projects than just lending his name. Trump won the Fort Lauderdale case and settled the one in Baja.

It's difficult to know how much risk Trump is taking with his money today, because it's not clear how much he's got.

In a recently released list of assets, he estimated his worth at \$8.7 billion more than double the figure calculated by Forbes magazine, which has been tracking his wealth for

ing deals, brand and branded developments" worth \$3.3 billion — or nearly 40 percent of his net worth.

One area where Trump is digging into his own pocket is golf resorts. Last year, he bought Ireland's Doonbeg club on the Atlantic coast and Scotland's Turnberry Resort, the site of several British Opens and the 17th course in his collection.

Eric Trump says the golf ventures are doing "fantastically" well. Others aren't so sure, noting that club membership and play in general have dropped since the financial crisis.

"It's is not a booming business and yet he wants us to believe that his is," says Ron Whitten, a senior editor at Golf Digest. If Trump is making money on his golf clubs, whitten says, "he is the only one doing that."

LOS ANGELES -Sheriff's investigators plan to recommend that prosecutors file a vehicular manslaughter charge against Caitlyn Jenner for her role in a fatal car crash last February, officials said Thursday.

Investigators found that Jenner was driving "unsafe for the prevailing road conditions" when her SUV rear-ended a Lexus, Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department spokeswoman Nicole Nishida said.

Jenner was hauling an off-road vehicle on a trailer behind her Cadillac Escalade on Feb. 7 when she steered to avoid cars slowing for a traffic light in front of her on the Pacific Coast Highway in Malibu.

Jenner's SUV rearended two cars, pushing the Lexus into oncoming traffic and also hitting a Prius. The Lexus driver, 69year-old Kim Howe, was killed when her car was struck head-on by a Hummer.

The case will be presented to prosecutors for final review next week, Nishida said. The district attorney's office will determine what charges Jenner ultimately faces.

If convicted of such a charge, Jenner could face up to one year in county jail.

Jenner's attorney Blair Berk declined comment. The fatal crash

occurred months before Caitlyn Jenner's transition. She was formerly known as Bruce Jenner, the 1976 Olympic decathlon champion and Kim

Kardashian's stepfather. Howe's stepchildren have filed suit against Jenner claiming they've suffered enormous damages.

The lawsuit by Dana Redmond and William Howe does not specify how much they are seeking. They claim Jenner was negligent when she collided with their stepmother's car, causing them and other relatives "great loss-

Attorneys for Howe's step-children, Dana Redmond and William Howe, did not immediately return email messages seeking comment.

Another woman, Jessica Steindorff, who was driving the Prius, also filed suit seeking unspecified damages. A phone message for Steindorff's attorney, Brad Simon, was not immediately returned on Thursday.

Jenner's transition has played out in public over the past several months and included a high-profile interview with ABC's Diane Sawyer last April, in which Jenner, appearing nervous at first, declared, Yes, for all intents and purposes, I am a woman."

She appeared on the July cover of Vanity Fair -with a photo of a longhaired Jenner in a strapless corset, legs crossed, sitting on a stool. The image was shot by famed celeb photographer Annie



Leibovitz. Inside, more images depict Jenner in gold lame, a black bustier and a cleavage-baring, offthe-shoulder gown.

Jenner also debuted a

new Twitter account with: "I'm so happy after such a long struggle to be living my true self. Welcome to the world Caitlyn. Can't wait for you to get to know her/me." In about three hours, the account had more than 860,000 followers.

Flamboyant Trump evolved into cautious businessman

NEW YORK — Donald Trump sells himself as a bold empire-builder, the kind of businessman who could force through big changes in Washington as president.

Yet for all his bravado - "I've done an amazing job," the Republican White House hopeful boasted during his announcement speech — a review of the billionaire's financial filings and recent deals suggests he's no swashbuckler.

Trump is reluctant to take on debt after it nearly ruined him in the 1990s. He holds few stocks for someone of his wealth and has grown increasingly dependent on making money by lending out his name to others rather than developing real estate himself.

But that's not his money," says Don Peebles, a real estate developer who oversees a \$5 billion real estate portfolio. "He's not taking big risks.'

That's not a knock. Peebles calls Trump a "pioneer," praising his move into a nearly riskfree business. In an industry prone to booms and bust, say branding experts and rival developers, it's a shrewd shift that only someone with Trump's name recognition could pull off. In essence, Trump gets a stream of fees without risking any of his own money.

But it's not the image that Trump is projecting as a candidate for president, given that his White House campaign is built around his prowess in the boardroom. The candidate's

'We have been major buyers of properties," said the candidate's son, Eric Trump, who oversees real estate development and acquisitions at the Trump Organization. "We believe in owning dirt."

A few hoteliers had created buzz by putting their names on buildings think Conrad Hilton of Hilton Hotels — when Donald Trump was getting his start in the 1970s, but the idea hadn't really caught on in luxury residential real estate. Trump made it work, thanks to unabashed love of glitz and glamour - and some good timing.

He broke ground on New York's Trump Tower in 1980, just before New York City's resurgence from near bankruptcy and the start of the longest bull stock market in history. He bought and built more

and diversified into airlines and casinos — all with his name leading the way.

Then boom turned bust in the late 80s, and Trump lost nearly everything. Unable to pay back billions of dollars of debt, he threatened to tie up lenders in court, threw two of his casinos into bankruptcy, cut a series of deals that erased most of his personal liability, then began buying and building once again.

In 2001, he completed the 90-story Trump World Tower, a residential building across from the United Nations in New York. Three years later, he launched his runaway TV hit "The Apprentice" and his brand began to take off as a business in and of itself. Today you can buy a myriad of Trump-Tabeled products, including cologne and cufflinks,

men's suits and furniture and fragrances.

Not all the branding deals have gone smoothly. Condo buyers in failed Trump-named properties in Fort Lauderdale, Florida, and Baja, Mexico, have claimed in lawsuits that the billionaire misled them into believing he was more involved in the projects than just lending his name. Trump won the Fort Lauderdale case and settled the one in Baja.

It's difficult to know how much risk Trump is taking with his money today, because it's not clear how much he's got.

In a recently released list of assets, he estimated his worth at \$8.7 billion more than double the figure calculated by Forbes magazine, which has been tracking his wealth for

ing deals, brand and branded developments" worth \$3.3 billion — or nearly 40 percent of his net worth.

One area where Trump is digging into his own pocket is golf resorts. Last year, he bought Ireland's Doonbeg club on the Atlantic coast and Scotland's Turnberry Resort, the site of several British Opens and the 17th course in his collection.

Eric Trump says the golf ventures are doing "fantastically" well. Others aren't so sure, noting that club membership and play in general have dropped since the financial crisis.

"It's is not a booming business and yet he wants us to believe that his is," says Ron Whitten, a senior editor at Golf Digest. If Trump is making money on his golf clubs, whitten says, "he is the only one doing that."
