## Firm withdraws Dorcheat water permit application

An application for the scenic rivers permit needed to begin a study on drawing water from Bayou Dorcheat lies dormant with the Louisiana Department of

Wildlife and Fisheries, officials say.

Matt Weigel, with the LDWF scenic rivers program, says they received the application but KSA Alliance, the firm that submitted the application, withdrew it – sort of.

“They have submitted an

application; however, we did not process it,” he said, “and before we could process it, they called us to withdraw it. It’s not technically withdrawn, but we’re treating it as if we haven’t received the application, because they sent us a package in the mail. They called

us before we received the package.”

He went on to say that it’s technically not withdrawn because it has not been processed, adding that it takes a while to process those applications.

## Cocaine, meth dealer's court date moved

The court date for a man convicted and sentenced to 35 years in prison on drug charges has been moved again.

Voltaire Sullivan, convicted in June of three counts of distribution of Schedule II CDS (crack cocaine) and one count of distribution of methamphetamine, will go before 26th Judicial District Judge

Mike Nerren for status conference on additional charges of possession with the intent to distribute Schedule I CDS and introducing contraband into or upon the grounds of any state correctional institution. Other charges include possession with intent to distribute Schedule II CDS,

possession with intent to distribute Schedule I CDS, convicted felon in possession of a firearm or carrying a concealed weapon, illegal possession of stolen firearms, possession of a firearm while in possession of a controlled dangerous substance and attempted simple escape.

Sullivan was originally arrested August 1, 2013 on three counts of distribution of crack cocaine, distribution of ecstasy, possession of Schedule II CDS crack

cocaine, possession of marijuana with intent to distribute, possession of a firearm by a convicted felon, possession of a stolen firearm, illegal possession of a firearm while committing a drug felony and attempted escape.

He was tried on the three counts of distribution of Schedule II CDS crack cocaine and one count of distribution of ecstasy, officials say.

And as they say, the rest is history. Mourad says they discussed charging a fee at the gate and donating it to St. Jude, as Minden is one of the biggest donors to the children's research hospital.

"Last year, it got bigger, and this year, we had the game planned, and somebody offered to donate something for a raffle prize," he said.

It grew from there. This year, raffle items include a 50-quart Yeti ice chest, a handgun, a two-man ladder stand, deer camera, five-gallon deer feeder, a 32-inch Vizio television set and a his or her watch. Also donated is an LSU fire pit, half-carat diamond earrings and a one-ton deer corn.

Raffle tickets are \$10 per chance and will be sold during the game as well as before.

"We still have some questions ourselves about whether the application is going to happen," Weigel said, "but I have no insight as to their reasons (for withdrawal). Officially, there is no application for that water withdrawal. It's still in the study phase."

He says they have received "a good bit" of public comment thus far, even though there is no official public comment period open.

"(It's) mostly all against," he said, "and we've also

received some resolutions from the affected towns. We're holding all the public comment we receive for when the application does come through."

KSA Alliance is the engineering firm conducting a study as to the feasibility of opening a long dormant surface water treatment plant located on the grounds of Camp Minden. The Webster Parish Police Jury, in May, agreed to the study, with Bossier Parish footing the bill. In the process of that study, engineers during the May police jury meeting, said they would have to get a permit to draw water from Bayou Dorcheat.

That is where the contention hits. The City of Minden and the Town of Sibley passed resolutions opposing the idea of Bossier Parish seeking a Scenic Rivers permit to draw surface water off Dorcheat.

Previous studies have shown the permit was denied, such as the one in the 1980s, and most recently in 2010. The 2010 study was conducted by Shaw Environmental and Infrastructure, which evaluated the economic benefits to residents and businesses in Haughton, east Highway 80 and the Sligo

Road areas, as well as the areas in Webster Parish around Camp Minden.

"We'll look at the plant essentially to see if water is available and if we can get it permitted," Lanny Buck with KSA said in May. "We will see what it will cost to get back on line, and we will develop who needs the water. We'll see about the quantity of water, the quality and what the well situation is."

Phone calls to KSA senior project manager John French for comment on the status of the application were unreturned as of press time.

## 2 dead, 1 injured in wrong-way crash on Interstate 20

MONROE — Louisiana State Police say two people died and one was seriously injured when a pickup traveling the wrong way on Interstate 20 hit a car head-on.

The accident happened late Saturday night just east of Monroe.

Troopers said in a news release that a pickup, driven by 41-year-old Jorge Benavides of Oxford, Mississippi, was traveling west in the eastbound lanes when he struck an eastbound car driven by

20-year-old Thomas Williams, of Delhi.

Troopers say Williams, as well as a passenger, 19-year-old Jamerro May, of Monroe, were pronounced dead at the scene. Another passenger in the car was taken to a Monroe hospital with serious injuries.

Benavides was booked Sunday with two counts of vehicular homicide and other charges.

Online jail records do not list an attorney for Benavides

a minor. Bond was set at \$2,500.

Webster Parish Sheriff's deputies observed the two in the parking lot of Southern Inn Motel in Minden with a child inside the vehicle, according to reports. A large amount of smoke was observed coming from inside the vehicle, and the driver, identified as Savage, was seen holding a cigarette-type object.

Deputies approached the vehicle and made contact with Savage and his passenger, identified as Doyle. During a search of

the vehicle, in plain view, suspected synthetic marijuana was seen inside.

Upon questioning, deputies say Doyle told them the mother of the child was inside the motel room. The child's mother was allowed to come get the two-year-old, and Doyle and Savage were placed under arrest.

Arresting officers were sheriff's narcotics agents Bobby Igo III and Joel Thomas as well as Maj. Dustin Reynolds, Lt. Scott Tucker and Louisiana Wildlife and Fisheries agent Wesley Duck.

Savage and Doyle were transported to Bayou Dorcheat Correctional Center for booking.

# Boehner slams some GOP hard liners as ‘false prophets’

WASHINGTON — Speaker John Boehner is embarking on his final month in Congress by moving to complete unfinished business and vowing not to leave his successor with a politically gridlocked House.

The Ohio Republican says a spending bill to keep the government running will pass and there will be no shutdown when money runs out at midnight Wednesday. Beyond that, he said on CBS's "Face the Nation" Sunday he expects "I might have a little more cooperation from some around town to try to get as much finished as possible."

"I don't want to leave my successor a dirty barn," he said. Among issues still to be settled: a transportation bill, tax breaks and whether to raise the government's debt limit.

The interview was Boehner's first after announcing Friday that he would resign from Congress at the end of October. The timing, he said, was clarified after spending the day with Pope Francis and designed to help avert a government shutdown. But even as he looked forward,

Boehner harked back to the faction of his party that he ultimately could not control.

Boehner unloaded against conservatives long outraged that even with control of both houses of Congress, Republicans have not succeeded on key agenda items, such as repealing President Barack Obama's health care law and striking taxpayer funding from Planned Parenthood. He refused to back down from calling one of the tea party-styled leaders, presidential candidate and Sen. Ted Cruz, a "jackass."

"Absolutely they're unrealistic," Boehner said. "The Bible says, 'Beware of false prophets.' And there are people out there spreading noise about how much can get done."

Boehner's resignation announcement Friday stunned Washington but was long in the making after years of turmoil with the same House conservatives who propelled the GOP into the House majority on a tea party-style, cut-it-or-shut it platform. Without Boehner, the job of leading divided congressional Republicans falls more heavily on Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell — who declared nearly a year ago that the GOP's prospects of reclaim-

ing the White House depends substantially on showing the party can govern.

The announcement of Boehner's resignation rippled through the slate of 2016 presidential candidates competing for support among the GOP's core Republicans. As Boehner let out the word to House Republicans Friday morning, GOP presidential hopeful Sen. Marco Rubio relayed the news to a conference of conservatives — who erupted in triumphant hoots. Rubio, retired neurosurgeon Ben Carson and former Hewlett Packard CEO Carly Fiorina were among the GOP candidates who said Boehner's departure showed it was time for the party to move on.

Fiorina suggested that McConnell's leadership, too, has been unsatisfactory.

"I hope now that we will move on and have leadership in both the House and the Senate that will produce results," Fiorina said on NBC's "Meet the Press."

But former Florida Gov. Jeb Bush called Boehner, "a great public servant."

"I think people are going to miss him in the long run, because he's a person that is focused on solving problems," Bush said on "Fox News Sunday."

Boehner's resignation announcement came as congressional Republicans faced a familiar standoff in their own ranks over whether to insist on their demands in exchange for passage of a federal budget — the same dynamic that led to the partial government shutdown of 2013. For nearly a year, McConnell, now the Senate's

Republican majority leader, has insisted there would be no repeat, even as conservatives dug in.

"We told people to give us the Senate and things would be different. We told them back in 2010, give us the House and things will be different," said Rep. Mick Mulvaney, R-N.C., on "Fox News Sunday." "Things are not

that different."

Retorted Boehner on CBS:

"We have got groups here in town, members of the House and Senate here in town, who whip people into a frenzy believing they can accomplish things that they know — they know — are never going to happen."

# LSU sues operator of Shreveport, Monroe hospitals

BATON ROUGE — Louisiana State University on Friday sued the private manager of its Shreveport and Monroe hospitals, alleging that the operator breached its contract and failed to live up to promises to keep the hospitals as academic centers.

LSU filed the lawsuit against the Biomedical Research Foundation of Northwest Louisiana, or BRF. LSU is seeking to oust the operator with the suit.

The suit comes only two years after hospital operations were turned over to the

research foundation as part of Gov. Bobby Jindal's effort to privatize the state's charity hospital system.

In the suit, the university alleges that BRF's actions have been "antagonistic" to LSU and the state while also undermining the reputations of the hospitals.

The university had notified BRF on Thursday that it considered the hospital manager in breach of contract and demanded it withdraw as hospital operator. In response, BRF leaders vowed to sue.

The suit was filed in state

district court in Baton Rouge.

BRF officials could not be reached immediately for comment.

LSU charged that BRF has "never given anything but lip-service to the education and training components" at the hospitals.

The suit also charged that BRF has focused its efforts on turning the hospitals into private facilities, which LSU says was never the intent of the contract they signed.

LSU System President F. King Alexander in a July letter outlined 11 pages of com-

plaints about hospital management. He said BRF had not established a sustainable financial model for the hospitals, had damaged the LSU Shreveport medical school's reputation and threatened the stability of both the medical school and the hospitals.

Negotiations to resolve the complaints didn't end the dispute.

Foundation leaders, who run the hospitals as University Health, have denied any mismanagement and say they have followed the contract's terms. They've said

LSU has thwarted efforts to ease the transition and remedy concerns.

BRF took control of the two north Louisiana hospitals in October 2013 through a no-bid contract, part of Jindal's push to privatize most of the university-run public hospital system that cares for the uninsured and provides much of the state's medical student training.

Privatization of the hospitals in Shreveport and Monroe was in contrast to the approach the Jindal administration took in south Louisiana, where LSU's

facilities are being overseen by companies that run other private hospitals in the area.

Created in 1986 to boost regional economic development, BRF had more limited resources and no background in hospital management. It had never previously run a patient care facility. The research foundation's president and CEO was a Jindal campaign donor and, at the time the deal was struck, one of Jindal's appointees to the LSU Board of Supervisors.

Walt worked as an independent landman many years for many companies and ended his career as district landman for McRae-Petrofunds in Shreveport. After his retirement, Walt took great joy in managing the family farm and overseeing the herd and hay fields.

He was a member of the Heflin United Methodist Church for 53 years, where he was

## Dispose of your expired and unwanted prescription drugs

Published on Saturday Sept. 26

Today, September 26th, is “National Prescription Drug Take-Back Day.” It’s a day where you can safely, conveniently, and responsibly dispose of expired and unwanted prescription drugs at collection sites in your community.

Here’s why this matters. More Americans now die every year from drug overdoses than they do in car crashes. And most of those deaths aren’t due to drugs like cocaine or heroin – but rather prescription drugs. In 2013 alone, overdoses from prescription pain medications killed more than 16,000 Americans. And most young people who begin misusing prescription drugs don’t buy them in some dark alley – they get them from the medicine cabinet.

If that’s not a good enough reason to participate in “National Prescription Drug Take-Back Day,” here’s another. Many prescription pain medications belong to the same class of drugs as heroin. In fact, four in five heroin users started out by misusing prescription drugs. And over the course of just one year, between 2013 and 2014, we saw a 33% increase in the number of heroin users.

All of this takes a terrible toll on too many families, in too many communities, all across the country – big and small, urban and rural. It strains law enforcement and treatment programs. It costs all of us – in so many different ways.

That’s why, four years ago, my Administration unveiled a Prescription Drug Abuse Prevention Plan. We’ve been partnering with communities to combat overdoses, and we’re seeing some promising results. That’s why the budget I put forward this year would build on those efforts. It would make critical investments in things like drug monitoring programs, equipping more first responders to save more lives, and expanding medication-assisted treatment programs – including in our prisons.

In fact, getting smarter about how we address substance use disorders is a vital part of reforming our criminal justice system. Rather than keep spending billions of taxpayer dollars on needlessly long prison sentences for nonviolent drug offenders, we could save money and get better outcomes by getting treatment to those who need it. And we could use some of the savings to make sure the brave men and women of law enforcement have the resources they need to go after drug kingpins and violent gangs, disrupt the flow of drugs into our country, and address the real threats to our communities.

With no other disease do we expect people to wait until they’re a danger to themselves or others to self-diagnose and seek treatment. So we should approach abuse as an opportunity to intervene, not incarcerate. And we all have a role to play here. Parents, we have to understand how important it is to talk to our kids, and to safely store medications in the house. The medical community has to be engaged, too – because better prescribing practices will make a difference.

And as a country, we have to keep working to reduce drug use through evidence-based treatment, prevention, and recovery. Because research shows it works. Courageous Americans show it works, every day. That’s why the man I named to head the office of National Drug Control Policy – Michael Botticelli – is a man in long-term recovery himself. He talks about it openly and honestly, precisely to strike down the shame and stigma that too often keep people from seeking care before it’s too late.

This is something I’ll be talking about more in the weeks to come, in communities across the country. Because it’s a challenge we can solve if we work together.

## David Vitter runs partisan campaign in governor’s race

Now that he’s running for governor after years in Washington, Republican U.S. Sen. David Vitter is trying to suggest he’s not a partisan politician. His own campaign tactics in the governor’s race undercut that narrative.

He’s launched a series of partisan-style attack ads against his GOP rivals, and he’s repeatedly turned to partisan talking points for Republicans as he seeks to hang onto his front-runner status in the competitive race leading up to the Oct. 24 election.

Vitter’s one of four major candidates in the governor’s race, which also includes Republican Public Service Commissioner Scott Angelle, Republican Lt. Gov. Jay Dardenne and Democratic state Rep. John Bel Edwards.

In the last few weeks, attention on the governor’s race has heightened — and Vitter’s 2007 prostitution scandal has surfaced again as a campaign issue. Vitter’s partisan advertising response appears to be an attempt to switch topics and stem any damage from the revisiting of his admission of a “serious sin” after phone records linked him to Washington’s “D.C. Madam.”

Vitter’s mastered the use of divisive campaign tactics over the years. This time, the approach could get Vitter elected governor in the conservative red state, but it could damage the relationships he needs to tackle Louisiana’s budget train wreck.

Budget and tax bills can hit tricky terrain, and some can be blocked entirely, if they can’t get a two-thirds vote — and those super-majority votes require support from at least some Democrats.

By alienating Democrats or irritating Republican supporters of other candidates with Washington-style partisanship, Vitter can threaten his ability to make the sort of sweeping budget and tax changes needed to dig Louisiana out of its financial mess.

Vitter’s repeatedly inserted himself into New Orleans’ local debate over whether to remove several Confederate statues in the city. He’s sent letters to Democratic Mayor Mitch Landrieu, who supports taking down the statues, referencing the city’s crime and telling him to “focus on murders, not monuments.” He’s also launched a radio ad attacking Landrieu on the topic.

The state has no control over the city’s monuments, but the issue gives Vitter the ability to take a swipe at a well-known Democrat.

In another ad, Vitter hits a frequent GOP talking point, alleging widespread abuse in welfare and food stamp programs. He talks of enacting new work requirements before people can get benefits and banning people convicted of violent crimes from being eligible for the aid.

States have only modest leeway to place limits on the federally funded programs. And enacting such restrictions won’t do anything to save Louisiana money since the benefits are paid solely with federal financing. None of the state’s deep budget difficulties would be solved with the ideas.

But the talking points register as popular among con-

servative Republican voters.

Vitter’s also recently unveiled TV attack ads aimed at undercutting the candidacies of his two GOP competitors.

One spot describes Dardenne as a liberal, and the other ties Angelle to President Barack Obama, reminding viewers that Angelle was a Democrat for 31 years before switching to the GOP.

Dardenne said Vitter was using false attacks designed to mislead the public and reviving the same accusations his opponents have used repeatedly over the years to no avail. Angelle said Vitter’s attacking because he’s struggling to hold on to his front-runner status and wants to change the conversation.

The senator’s campaign says Vitter is attacking his Republican rivals because he’s been hit with criticism from the other candidates and outside PACs.

“We aren’t going to let the story be one-sided, which is why we want to make sure voters know about Scott Angelle’s and Jay Dardenne’s liberal records,” campaign spokesman Luke Bolar said in a statement.

The partisan bomb-throwing tactic shifts focus away from the state’s larger problems and the difficult decisions that any governor will have to make to rebalance Louisiana’s budget and keep the shortfalls from continuing to appear year after year. None of the major candidates for governor, including Vitter, have offered detailed plans to address those troubles.

## Students are the real victims of censorship

The 2015-16 academic year has opened with a predictable collection of demands for banning certain views, often involving sexual or racial matters. Many are couched in convoluted claims that disagreeable speech is making students feel “unsafe.”

Much of the squelching aims to fend off challenges to some of the more ludicrous theories of victimization. Well-constructed thoughts on social injustice can be defended in debates.

But the concern here goes beyond the issue of free speech. What do these bizarre definitions of sexual or racial harassment do to the students’ heads? They, too, are free speech, but when they are shielded from counterarguments, they take on the air of “facts.” The students leave school with “givens” that are not givens 5 feet outside the campus gates.

Case in point is the story of Ellen Pao. A hotshot Harvard-educated lawyer, Pao sued her Silicon Valley venture capital employer for gender discrimination. As evidence, she cited a partner’s referring to a porn star on a private jet.

Where would an otherwise worldly woman come to see a mere mention of porn-watching as evidence of sexual bias? No need to answer.

Brown University just issued another survey “finding” that about 1 in 4 of its undergraduate women have suffered “nonconsensual sexual contact.” It’s hard to know what the heck that means, but you wonder how the throngs of unescorted high-school girls roaming nearby Thayer Street manage to survive the evening.

Brown offers an exhaustive list of advice for men wanting to counter sexual violence. Item No. 9: “Refuse to purchase any magazine, rent any video, subscribe to any web site, or buy any music that portrays girls or women in a sexually degrading or abusive manner.”

Firstly, most pornography is legal, and school administrators have no business telling their scholars what is permissible reading.

Secondly, do the students have any time left to read Shakespeare? Come to think of it, they’d better not. (“Frailty, thy name is woman!”)

Over at Wesleyan University, “advocates” are trying to close the student newspaper for publishing an opinion piece critical of the Black Lives Matter movement. Author Bryan Scastavage wrote:

“If vilification and denigration of the police force continues to be a significant portion of Black Lives Matter’s message, then I will not support the movement. ... I should repeat, I do support many of the efforts by the more moderate activists.”

Clearly not a scorched-earth portrayal, but it elicited demands for abject apology, diversity training for the newspaper staff, setting aside part of the front page for “marginalized groups/voices” and so on.

By the way, Wesleyan’s president and many of its students offered full-throated defenses of Scastavage’s right to speak his mind.

I actually feel sorrier for the students goaded into making tyrannical demands than I do the author of the piece. That’s because, to quote Shakespeare again, “the evil that men do lives after them” — especially in the Internet age.

College kids have forever made angry, unwise remarks. In olden days, that speech would end up forgotten, buried in a landfill on the yellowing pages of the student rag. Now the public cries are forever archived in the great cloud and easily retrieved by prospective employers and mothers-in-law.

And when a law firm, for example, Googles the name of the graduate who said an article mildly critical of her advocacy group made her feel “unsafe,” it might very well regard her as a risk not worth taking.

College administrators could spare themselves later heartache if they made clear from day one that no one has the right not to be offended. They might start with the professors.

### NANCY’S KITCHEN

## Three-Cheese Chicken Bake

This excellent KEEPER recipe was taken from a long kept August, 1999 “Taste of Home” recipe booklet purchased at a grocery store checkout counter. This little book contains multiple outstanding recipes. The booklet title is “Taste of Home Family Favorites.” I have many “Taste of Home” recipe books, and saved booklets and magazines kept over time.

All “The Taste of Home” series are a source of great recipes using inexpensive everyday ingredients readily available at local grocery stores. All the recipes are shared by nationwide caring cooks.

Making this casserole was time consuming requiring several steps and several dishes and pots & pans to \*clean up. The final outcome was well worth the time and effort. It would be

ideal to prepare for company or for a potluck dinner by making ahead and have ready to pop in the oven.

All the listed ingredients (except for the ricotta cheese) are staples in my kitchen. I had no ricotta cheese so I substituted an unknown amount of sour cream in its place.

I recently prepared this for my sister-in-law, Ava McWhorter and my dinner. There was so much leftover, I sent a great part of it home with Ava to share with her secretary, Jane Rogers, for their lunch the next day. They both gave it a BIG thumbs up.

#### THREE-CHEESE CHICKEN BAKE

- ½ cup chopped onion
- ½ cup chopped green pepper
- 3 Tbsp. butter
- 1 (10 ¾ oz.) condensed cream of chicken soup, undiluted
- 1 (8 oz.) can sliced mushrooms, drained (I used the 4 oz. size)
- 1 (2 oz.) jar diced pimentos, drained
- ½ tsp. dried basil
- 1 (8 oz.) pkg. noodles, cooked &

- drained
- 3 cups diced cooked chicken (I used chicken breasts)
- 2 cups ricotta cheese (I substituted sour cream)
- 2 (8 oz.) cups shredded cheddar cheese
- ½ cup grated Parmesan cheese
- ¼ cup buttered bread crumbs

In a skillet, sauté onion and green pepper in butter until tender. Remove from the heat. Stir the soup, mushrooms, pimento, and basil; set aside.

In a large bowl, combine the noodles, chicken and cheeses; add mushroom sauce and mix well. Transfer to a greased 13 X 9 inch baking dish. Bake uncovered, at 350° for 40 to 45 minutes or until bubbly. Sprinkle with crumbs. Bake 15 minutes longer. YIELDS: 12-15 servings

\*TIP: When using a pot to boil such ingredients as chicken or spaghetti for example, I spray the inside of the pot with cooking spray first. Then when it is cleanup time, it is easier to clean out the residue left in the used pots.

#### Newton spoils McCown's moment

Luke McCown, starting in place of the injured Drew Brees, completed 31 of 38 passes for 310 yards, but it wasn't enough to save the Saints (0-3) from falling three games behind the division leading Panthers and Atlanta Falcons in the NFC South.

It was the first game Brees has missed because of injury since joining the Saints in 2006.

The previous time McCown started was Sept. 18, 2011, a game in which he threw four interceptions in a 32-3 loss while playing for the Jacksonville Jaguars.

"I thought he showed a lot of poise and I was really proud of the way he played," Saints coach Sean Payton said of McCown, who fell to 2-8 as an NFL starter.

#### Manning tosses two TD's in Broncos win

DETROIT — Peyton Manning was cool and confident, lofting passes to teammates as if they were buddies in his backyard.

Whether it was third or fourth down, in the second or fourth quarter, the 39-year-old Manning showed he still has it.

Manning converted a fourth down with a 45-yard touchdown pass to Demaryius Thomas with 5 seconds left in the first half. Then he threw an 11-yard scoring pass to Owen Daniels on a third down with 2:28 remaining, lifting the Denver Broncos to a 24-12 victory over the Detroit Lions on Sunday night.

"I imagine it will be part of the arsenal throughout the season," Manning said. "It gave us some help in protection."

Manning was sacked only once after he was sacked seven times in the first two games.

ST. LOUIS — Big Ben was the only postgame topic that really mattered to the Pittsburgh Steelers. Michael Vick's reaction when Ben Roethlisberger went down in the third quarter, and he had to grab his helmet and go, said it all.

"I was kind of stunned," the Steelers backup quarterback said after finishing a 12-6 victory over the St. Louis Rams on Sunday. "You never want to see a guy like Ben go down."

The Steelers scheduled an MRI on Monday and Roethlisberger's left knee injury will be re-evaluated after that but coach Mike Tomlin had no other updates beyond saying, "Ben's got a knee."

Le'Veon Bell scored from a yard out in the first half in his first game back after a suspension.

Harris, already with a fumble recovery to his name, dropped into coverage and made an acrobatic interception. He immediately set his sights on the home sideline where he picked up a huge block

from Zi'Kerrion Baker that sent the Minden crowd into a roar and Harris into the end zone.

"I read pass and dropped into my zone," Harris said. "I caught it and was able to take it all the way. I had my eyes on the end zone."

That made the score 35-8, where it would stay.

"I told our guys to dig their heels in tonight on defense," Heard said. "I feel like they really stepped up to the challenge. Our whole team did, and I feel like we're better right now than we've been at any point since I've been here."

The Crimson Tide sit right outside the top 10 of the Louisiana Sports Writers Association's Class 4A rankings, and if they keep playing like this it will be hard to keep them out.

"I haven't seen everyone else play," Heard said. "But I'd have to imagine we're one of the top 10 teams. I believe in our team and if you want to be the best you have to believe, so yes I think we are."

Rivette finished with 137 yards passing and one touchdown, while Sneed led the team in rushing with 94 yards and a pair of scores on just four carries. Tavarius Edwards caught six passes for 70 yards and a score, while Sneed added four catches for 60 yards. Rivette added 51 yards rushing, Rogers added 54 and Kolby Jackson contributed 10 yards.

Ethan Culp and Baker each had a sack, while Williams had an interception. Harris was the defensive star of the game with a fumble recovery and a pick six.

# Cowboys come up short in shootout

ARLINGTON, Texas — Julio Jones glided over the goal line on a diving touchdown. That quieted a Dallas crowd riled up by early hopes that the Cowboys might find a way to survive without Tony Romo and Dez Bryant.

Fill-in Atlanta running back Devonta Freeman did most of the rest of the silencing.

Matt Ryan connected with Jones for two touchdowns, Freeman ran for 141 yards and three scores starting for injured rookie Tevin Coleman, and the Falcons beat the

Cowboys 39-28 on Sunday.

"We just want to move the ball — I don't care how we do it," said Freeman, who also had 52 yards receiving. "Run, pass, if we get three points on a field goal, as long as we move the ball and get points."

Freeman's third score early in the fourth quarter capped a rally from a trio of 14-point deficits for the Falcons (3-0), who didn't win their third game until Week 10 last year, and Week 13 in 2013.

Jones had his third

straight 100-yard game to start the season, finishing with 164 and a clinching 2-yard score late in the fourth. According to the NFL, Atlanta is the first team to start 3-0 after trailing in the fourth quarter of each game.

"We clearly got punched in the mouth and we were looking to respond," said Dan Quinn, who joined Jim Mora (2004) as the only Atlanta coaches to start their careers with three straight wins. "Dallas certainly had us reeling all the way through and we had to battle like

crazy to get back in it."

The Cowboys (2-1) had a six-game winning streak in the regular season snapped in backup quarterback Brandon Weeden's ninth straight loss as a starter going back to his two-year stint in Cleveland.

With Romo watching with a sling supporting his broken left collarbone, and Bryant also in street clothes because of a broken right foot, Weeden started 9 of 9 to push his streak of completions to 16 to start the season.

But the run ended with

a second-quarter interception that turned the game in the Falcons' favor.

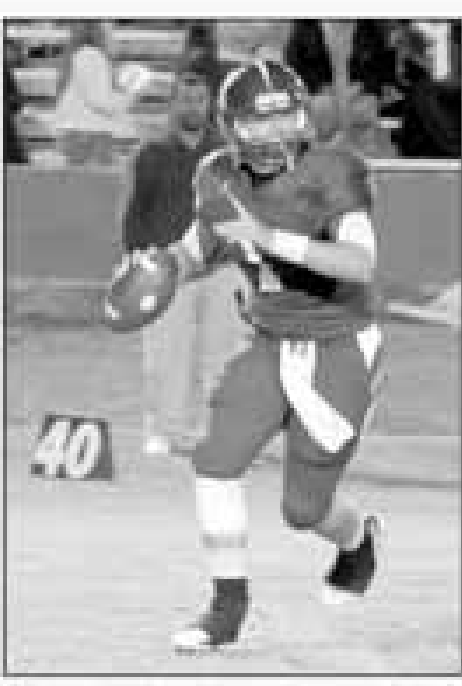
"We did a lot of really good things," Weeden said. "Maybe not so much in the second half."

Dallas running back Joseph Randle had 85 yards on his first three carries, including a 37-yard touchdown that helped the Cowboys to a 14-0 lead. He had just 2 yards on his final 11 runs, and the Cowboys had just three first downs in the second half after getting 20 before halftime.

Jones had 137 of his

yards in the second half, including a 45-yard catch-and-run touchdown that ended with a dive as he turned upside down and held the ball over the goal line in his outstretched arm. A 2-point conversion pulled Atlanta within 28-25.

Weeden was 22 of 26 for 232 yards, but Cole Beasley was the only receiver to catch a pass. Randle finished with 87 yards rushing and three touchdowns, matching his total from last season when he was NFL rushing champion DeMarco Murray's backup.

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## ‘Hotel Transylvania 2’ bites off September record

LOS ANGELES — September has a new box office star in "Hotel Transylvania 2." The PG-rated animated pic earned a robust \$47.5 million in its debut weekend, making it the top September opener of all time, according to Rentrak estimates Sunday.

The previous record holder was "Hotel Transylvania" which opened to \$42.5 million in 2012.

"It really is something the whole family can agree to see. There are laughs for adults, kids, and teenagers as well," said Rory Bruer, president of worldwide distribution for Sony.

According to the studio, an estimated 59 percent of audiences were female and 60 percent were under the age of 25.

Paul Dergarabedian, a Senior Media Analyst for box office tracker Rentrak, noted that the film capitalized on early excitement for Halloween. It's also serving an audience eager for more family friendly animated content.

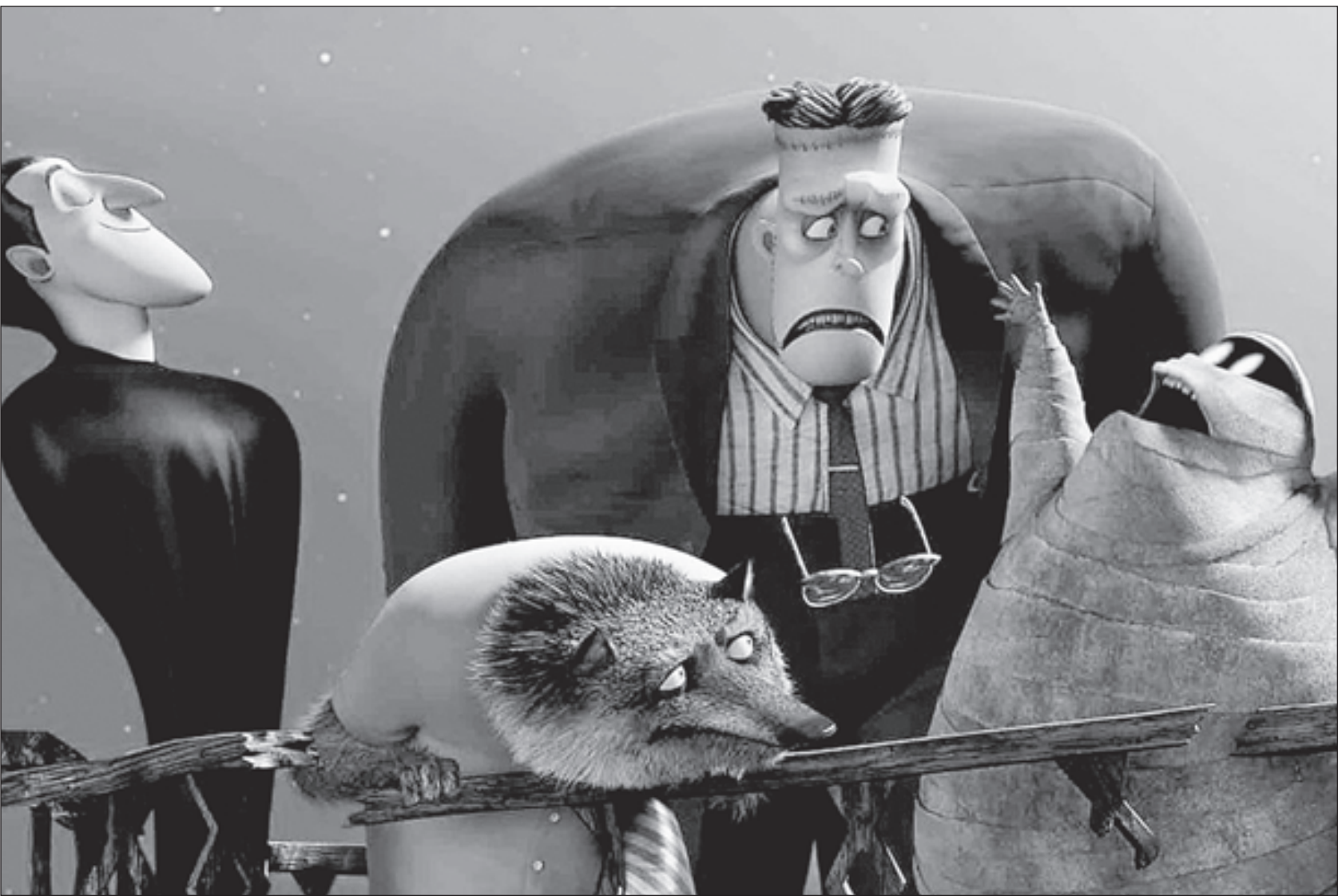
"This year hasn't been oversaturated with family animated films, it seems like virtually all have done well," he said.

The film, which cost around \$80 million to make, features the voices of Adam Sandler, Mel Brooks, Selena Gomez and Kevin James and is the only animated feature on the market until "Peanuts" opens in November.

"The Intern," a PG-13 rated workplace comedy starring Anne Hathaway and Robert De Niro, took second with a solid \$18.2 million.

Audiences for the Nancy Meyers written and directed film were 62 percent women and 88 percent over the age of 25. Significantly, 55 percent were over 50-years-old — an audience that doesn't typically rush out to see films on opening weekend.

"Nancy Meyers is her own brand and I think that auto-



matically accesses an audience who looks at it and thinks 'this is a movie I want to see,'" said Jeff Goldstein, an executive vice president at Warner Bros., of the veteran filmmaker known for films like "It's Complicated."

"Here we have a real hit," he said.

"Maze Runner: The Scorch Trials" took third place in its second weekend in theaters with \$14 million — a 54 percent drop from its opening. The film has brought in \$51.7 million to date.

"Everest," meanwhile, landed in fourth place with only \$13.1 million after expanding nationwide. The

fact-based adventure film opened only on IMAX and premium large format 3D screens last weekend.

"It's very difficult to know where a film is going to land when there's no good comp for it. Based on the releasing pattern we had for the movie, we're kind of blazing a new trail. You can call it an experiment if you will," said Nick Carpou, who heads Universal's domestic distribution. "When you add the two weekends together and the mid-weeks in between, sitting here at \$23 million feels really good."

Dergarabedian said that perhaps the competition over the same audience is the rea-

son for "Everest's" soft weekend.

"It's really crowded out there," Dergarabedian said. Both "Black Mass," in fifth place with \$11.5 million, and "Everest" have been pulling in predominantly male audiences.

The well-reviewed border drama "Sicario" is also dividing audience attentions. It cracked the top 10 with \$1.8 million from only 59 theaters.

Hope isn't lost for "Everest," though. Internationally, it has earned \$73.7 million to date. Also, with a solid A CinemaScore, word of mouth should be strong in the coming weeks, despite the direct

competition of next week's "The Walk," another vertiginous, event film that will take over IMAX screens.

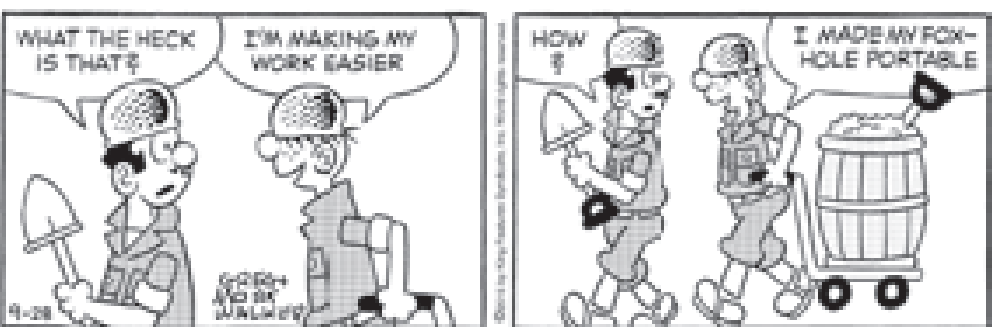

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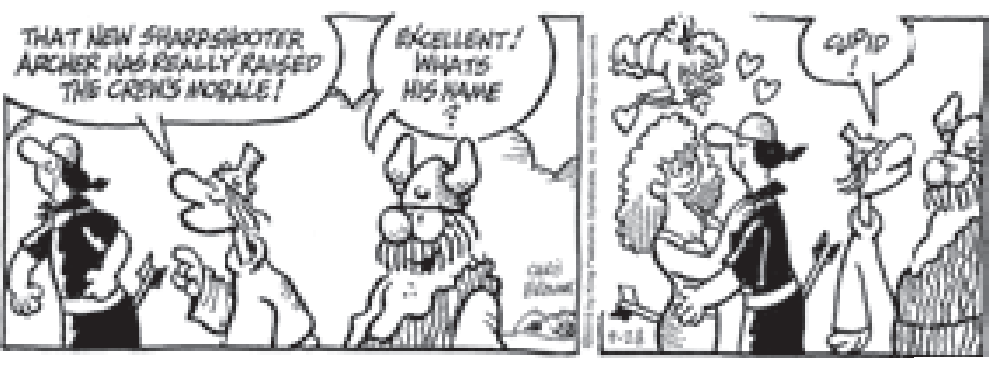

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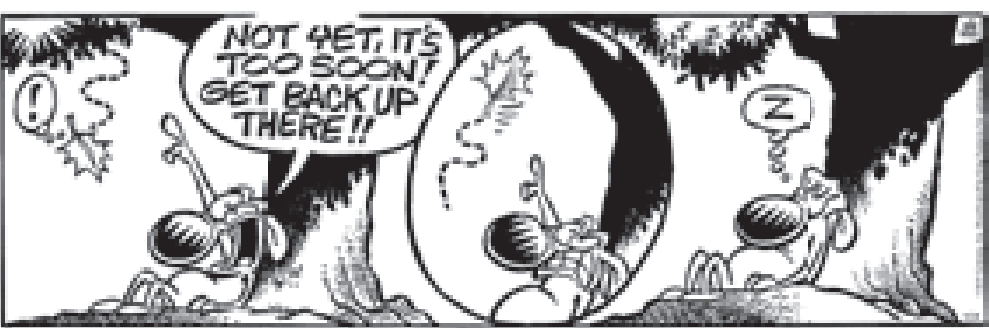
