College Night preps students for future

High school students from Lakeside, Doyline, Glenbrook and Minden were given an opportunity to look at their options after high school.

Minden High School hosted its annual College Night, and principal Robin Tucker says it gives juniors and seniors a chance to meet with recruiters to find out more

about where they might want to go to college.

"We have over 40 post-secondary institutions here for students to visit with and see if they're possibly interested at some point," she said. "It just gives students an opportunity to see what's

available in our area. We always have really good attendance at this event."

The makeup of the institutions included vocational colleges, four-year colleges and branches of the military, she said.

Lakeside junior Janie Watson, 16, says she has a good idea of where she wants to go to school.

"I pretty well know what school I want to go to, but I want to see what all of my

options are," she said. "I'm pretty sure I want to go to Tech, but I want to see if anything closer offers the same thing."

She says she wants to be a high school counselor with a minor in law.

Sgt. Ashley Beverage, a recruiter with the Louisiana Army National Guard, says students can join the guard as early as their junior year and go to an in-state school

methamphetamine. Bond was set at \$200,000.

Agents say Young, aka "Buddy," was seen standing in the ditch on 3rd Street attempting to unlock a gate. Springhill detective Ronald Wedgeworth and Webster Parish Sheriff's narcotics agent Lt. Shawn Baker made contact with Young and placed him under arrest.

"He's a multiple offender, and he's been in trouble with it before," Baker said.

Springhill police chief Will Lynd says Young has a lengthy criminal record, all of them methamphetamine related.

"Buddy works every day, he cuts trees every day and does yard work," he said. "Buddy is a user/small time dealer to support his habit. He gets out and goes back and does it over and over and over. He's a habitual offender. Buddy is well known to be in the methamphetamine trade."

He was transported to the Springhill Police Department and booked. He was then transported to Bayou Dorcheat Correctional Center.

school year, the school received a "C," or 72.5, and in 2014-15, the letter grade is the same, but the score decreased to a 71.1. North Webster High School has raised its score from a "C," or 75.8 in 2013-14 to a "B," or 86.2 in the 2014-15 school year.

Doyline and Lakeside High School's scores have not yet been released.

Superintendent Dr. Dan Rawls says the reason Doyline and Lakeside scores are not in is because they are schools that house more grades than high school; however, he is proud of the scores released so far.

"We're absolutely elated over North Webster High School going from a 'C' to a 'B,'" Rawls said. "We're really, really happy with that. In the seven or eight judgment categories, they went up five of the seven, so they did really well. Minden was a variety; they went up in some (categories) and down in some. Overall, they're about in the same place they were

last year."

Louisiana Department of Education officials say these report cards and letter grades, "indicate that schools made progress in every measure the state uses to assess high school quality: end-of-course tests, ACT, graduation rate and credentialing programs such as advanced placement courses and tests, dual enrollment courses and Jump Start courses and credentials."

LDOE also reports that more schools progressed with low-achieving students due to increased reading and math scores with previously low achieving students and changes in BESE policy.

This year is the first of two years that are considered baseline years.

"It's evident that all the hard work being done in our districts is paying off for our students," state superintendent John White said. "Those efforts are leading to increased opportunities after high school in both college and the workplace for thousands of students."

Rawls says scores for the other schools will be released in December.

tuition-free once they graduate high school.

"Tuition exemption is our best benefit, which means when they go to college in a state public school, a university college, they are exempt from tuition," she said. "If they want to go to school outside of Louisiana, we offer tuition assistance."

Cindy Robertson, a business instructor at Remington College, says Remington, a nonprofit school, is a "fast-track" college where students can get degrees faster. For example, a 24-month program will only take 18, or a 48-month program will only take 36.

"We're kind of in between a community college and a career college because we do have associates degree programs and bachelor degree programs, not just online," she said.

The annual college night is sponsored by Minden High School and the National Honor Society.

how much candy I had, and I had a bunch more after I ran out of candy."

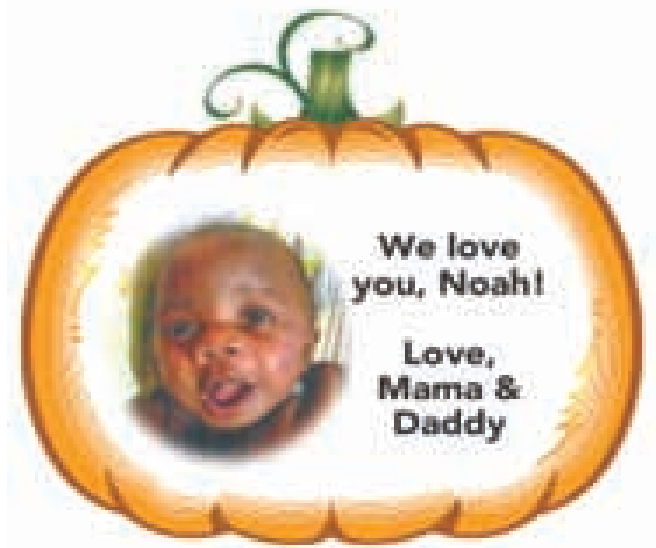
This year, the couple is prepared for more than 500 children.

The Times-Picayune on pay for New Orleans firefighters

The long-running back pay dispute between the city of New Orleans and its firefighters seemed hopelessly deadlocked in early September. Civil District Court Judge Kern Reese found Mayor Mitch Landrieu in contempt of court Sept. 4 and threatened him with house arrest if he didn't come up with an acceptable payment plan.

Not only did the mayor get out of having to spend weekends confined to his house, his administration worked out a settlement with union leaders this month. That is a significant achievement.

The Business Council of New Orleans and the River Region, which paid for much of the mediation and took part in negotiations, deserves a great deal of credit. "I think this is a fair deal for the firefighters. It addresses the long-term health of their pension fund and allows the city to meet its obligations," Business Council chairman Paul Flower said.

This fight had gone on for decades, first over leave pay in the 1980s and then the city's refusal to pay state-mandated 2 percent "longevity" raises to veteran firefighters. Courts ultimately found that the city owed back pay from 1990 to 2006, when the Nagin administration implemented the raises going forward.

Mayor Landrieu inherited the debt when he took office in 2010. Last year the city agreed to pay more than 1,100 firefighters or their heirs \$75 million. Not much of that had been paid when Judge Reese issued his contempt ruling.

Then Oct. 15, the day of the mayor's budget presentation to the City Council, a deal was struck.

Firefighters will now get the \$75 million the administration promised. The city will give them \$15 million from the general fund next year and pay off the rest in \$5 million annual installments. The city also will put money into the firefighters' troubled pension plan to ensure that it doesn't go under.

In return, Mayor Landrieu got some pension reforms that he badly wanted.

Future firefighters will accrue retirement credits at a slower rate, which means they won't be able to retire at full salary until they have put in 40 years. Under current rules, they only need 36 years to reach that level. That will save the city a sizable amount of money over time.

In addition, a new rule will prevent the pension board from approving cost of living increases unless the pension system is essentially fully funded. The previous board gave out those increases even though the system was in poor financial shape.

The pension changes will save taxpayers an estimated \$275 million over the next 30 years, Mayor Landrieu said.

Neither side got exactly what they wanted. The mayor wanted to reduce the pension calculation formula for current firefighters, but that didn't happen. On their side, firefighters didn't want to change the accrual rate at all.

The union had argued that the pension had nothing to do with the back pay issue. That was true, but it was smart of Mayor Landrieu to push for those changes.

The city has been spending more of its general fund to meet firefighter pension obligations every year than it does on Fire Department operations. That couldn't continue.

The Legislature approved reforms in 2013 that should help make the pension system more stable in the future, but those changes didn't go far enough. These additional reforms should strengthen the pension for the long-term, which is important for firefighters and taxpayers.

And, after too many years of waiting, firefighters and their families will finally get the money they are owed.

It's the economy, stupid CNBC

Let's get this straight. On Wednesday morning a new national poll revealed that 54% of Americans rate the economy as 'poor.' That's after nearly seven years of Barack Obama's big government solutions. Republicans, of course, are especially gloomy about the economy.

That was Wednesday morning, teasing things up for CNBC, the self-described 'world leader in business news.' Surely the moderators would flood the zone with substantive questions about the U.S. economy.

Instead, Becky Quick quizzed Marco Rubio about his 'lack of bookkeeping skills,' Carl Quintanilla posed questions about homosexuality and fantasy football, and the astonishingly incompetent John Harwood expressed doubt about Donald Trump's 'moral authority.'

To be fair, CNBC's triumvirate asked many questions about taxes and spending and deficits and Social Security, but way too many of those questions did not elicit solid answers. They seemed crafted to bring attention to the hosts, not the candidates.

So the post-debate analysis focused on the moderators and the undeniably liberal leanings of the mainstream media. Chris Christie, one of the night's stars, summarized the questions as 'snarky, divisive, non-substantive, and biased.' Our own Charles Krauthammer, a star on any night, called it 'the most appalling performance by moderators that I can remember.' Media bias is a very valuable subject, but in this case it overshadowed what was supposed to be the main subject, the dismal American economy.

And that economy is a mess! New data from the Social Security Administration show that 51% of working Americans made less than \$30,000 last year, and 40% made less than \$20,000! The key word is 'working.' Those stats don't even take into account the millions of Americans who are officially unemployed. Or those who have thrown in the towel and dropped out of the economy.

President Obama can boast that the unemployment rate is about 5%, but a stunning 40% of Americans are not in the labor force. That's the lowest participation rate since 1977, when 'Saturday Night Fever' and disco were all the rage.

Median income has gone down under Barack Obama's watch, partly because employers are getting hammered by Washington. Whatever you think about ObamaCare, it has thrown a yoke around the necks of the small and mid-sized companies that do much of the hiring.

Let's put this in stark terms. The median weekly wage when Barack Obama took office was slightly above \$800. It is now slightly below \$800. Going way, way back, household income is pretty much the same as it was in 1995. Two decades of stagnation! Sure, those dastardly one-percenters of Wall Street have done very well, especially in the age of Obama, but workers are taking it on the chin.

The administration always has a ready answer. When the first quarter slumped, the White House and its minions blamed it on the snow and cold weather. Perhaps they should hope that those dire 'climate change' warnings come true. Now we have news that third quarter economic growth was just 1.5%. Maybe it was too warm. Goldilocks come to mind?

No doubt we have a real problem with a moribund economy and it is especially tough on lower income Americans. And CNBC had an ideal opportunity to probe prospective presidents about their solutions. Instead, we got a self-serving panel asking questions designed to go viral.

The next GOP debate is coming up in a couple of weeks, again hosted by business-oriented concerns. This time it's Fox Business Network and the Wall Street Journal, both part of the family that includes Fox News.

You can certainly expect some tough questions from Neil Cavuto, Maria Bartiromo, and Gerard Baker. But their goal will be to elicit real answers about festering economic problems.

Fantasy football will not be part of the debate. Nor will Marco Rubio's student loans, Ben Carson's analysis of nutritional supplements, or whether Donald Trump is packing heat. Actually, if the candidates had been armed Wednesday night, their likely target would have been the CNBC logo draped around the auditorium. And the logo's peacock would probably be riddled with lead.

Any substantive moments in the Boulder debate were lost in the fog of war, a war that broke out between the candidates and the moderators. The Republican presidential hopefuls learned a lot this week. So did the upcoming debate moderators. Future debates will be more about the substance of the candidates, less about the style of the questioners. And that is good news for we the people.

TECH TAKING ON RICE

BULLDOGS FACE OWLS IN RARE FRIDAY NIGHT CONFERENCE GAME



RUSTON – In recent history when Louisiana Tech faces Rice, the home team often comes away with a runaway win. Louisiana Tech will look to buck that trend Friday night when the Bulldogs (5-3, 3-1 Conference USA) play at Rice (4-3, 2-1) in a piv-

otal C-USA West Division game televised nationally on FOX Sports 1 (FS1).

Kickoff is set for 7 p.m. CT at Rice Stadium in Houston, a venue Louisiana Tech has never won at. Greg Wolf (play-by-play) and George Wrighster (analyst) will have the call for FS1.

Over the last five meetings in the series, the home team has won by an average of 35 points. That margin of victory has risen steadily over the last two years; Rice ran over the Bulldogs, 52-14, in the

rain two years ago in Houston while Louisiana Tech clinched C-USA's West Division with a 76-

31 beat down last season at Joe Aillet Stadium in Ruston. "I probably remember [both games] pretty equally," Louisiana Tech offensive lineman Jens Danielsen

said. "They are two completely different stories. Last year was a great feeling and I think that was the most points we ever scored in a game. The year before that was probably one of the worse games I have ever been beaten. It was not enjoyable. It is two completely different stories and we need to learn from both of them and prepare for this week to go on and win the game."

But for the Bulldogs to return to the league championship game, the trend will have to end Friday night. With a 3-1

mark in league play, Louisiana Tech is tied for the division lead with Southern Miss with Rice a half-game back sitting at 2-1.

The loser of Friday's game is likely out of the divisional race while the winner will take one step closer to playing on Dec. 5.

This weekend's match-up also marks the first game between any of the three teams in the hunt for the West Division title. Rice hosts Southern Miss on Nov. 14 while the Bulldogs host the Golden Eagles

on Nov. 28.

But more is at stake for Louisiana Tech than just the race for the divisional title. A win for Louisiana Tech would mark the team's sixth of the season and would also bring bowl eligibility for the Bulldogs.

Only three times in its Division I-A/FBS history has Louisiana Tech become bowl eligible in October. The three times prior – 1997, 1999 and 2012 – LA Tech did not make a postseason appearance; another trend that should end this season.

Risks paying off for resurgent Saints



METAIRIE – In response to New Orleans' 1-4 start, Saints coach Sean Payton took risks that could have exposed his team to even greater calamity and precipitated a full-fledged unraveling of this season.

What resulted instead was a two-game winning streak that has given New Orleans a chance to remain relevant in the NFC playoff picture.

Payton's counterpart this week – New York Giants coach Tom Coughlin – isn't surprised it worked out that way.

"I don't think you dial back anything when things aren't going well. You've got to go for it. You've got to create that lion in your locker room," Coughlin said Wednesday. "You want to surround yourself with a bunch of guys that will put it on the line for you, understanding that there is a risk

involved."

In a victory over Atlanta in Week 6, Payton kept his offense on the field on fourth-and-goal from the 4 in the third quarter. The decision resulted first in an off-side penalty that moved New Orleans to the 2. The Saints then ran a passing play to tight end Ben Watson for a touchdown.

Later that game, on a key third-and-4 in the fourth quarter, quarterback Drew Brees completed a 26-yard pass to the left side of the field to Brandin Cooks. That drive resulted in a touchdown that all but sealed a 31-21 victory.

At Indianapolis last weekend, the Saints converted a pass to Watson on a fake field goal to set up a touchdown. In the fourth

quarter of that game, Brees converted a third-and-8 from the New Orleans 3 by throwing deep down the right sideline to Cooks for a 47-yard gain. Although that drive did not produce points, the completion to Cooks allowed the Saints to use up more time and dramatically change field position, slowing the pace of a Colts comeback bid that ultimately came up six points short.

The Saints finally put the Colts away with a 20-yard completion to Marques Colston on third-and-4 with a little over 2 minutes left; the first down allowed New Orleans to run out the clock.

"Certainly, we are digging here trying to get out of a hole," Payton said this

week, referring to his team's slow start to the season. "You have to be able to take some risk in doing that."

Brees said players love when coaches show confidence in their team by making bold calls, but added that he could also understand why the coach of a struggling team might want to avoid exposure to additional ridicule should a risky move fail.

"It's harder to call those maybe when you're down like that because I think maybe the idea is that, well, 'I don't want to do anything that's going to look stupid or is going to be a costly mistake. Let's play it by the book here,'" Brees explained.

"Certainly, Sean is

aggressive by nature when it comes to that kind of thing. And sometimes you've got to have a little bit of marbles to call that kind of stuff," Brees said. "What allows him to do that is trust – trust in our ability to execute it. And also the message that it sends. It shows that, man, we're willing to pull out all the stops to win a game."

"We're playing to win the game," Brees added with intonation reminiscent of a memorable comment by former NFL coach Herm Edwards. "We're not just going to be passive. ... There are times when you've got to go out and you've got to seize it. And I think that definitely sends a message to our team, on both sides of the football."

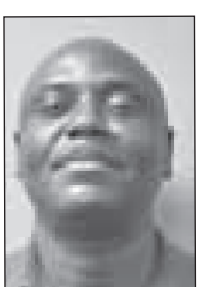

Brady's tosses four touchdowns in route

FOXBOROUGH, Mass. — Tom Brady slammed the ball after taking a sack, got up and threw a touchdown pass on the next play to finish off another stellar performance.

Even when they look sluggish, Brady and the New England Patriots still dominate.

Brady threw for 356 yards and four touchdowns — two to Julian Edelman — and the Patriots beat the Miami Dolphins 36-7 on Thursday night to become the first of the NFL's five unbeaten teams to reach seven wins.

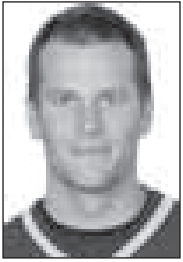
Stephen Gostkowski broke Adam Vinatieri's franchise record for consecutive field goals by connecting from 52 and 36 yards to make it 26 in a row. Rob Gronkowski had 113 yards receiving and a touchdown,

and Dion Lewis had 93 yards receiving and one score.

"I made a bad read and I shouldn't have taken a sack there," Brady said about his angry response to the fourth-quarter sack.

He was smiling afterward while backup Jimmy Garoppolo took the final snaps to seal the lopsided win.

The loss was the first for Miami (3-4) under interim coach Dan Campbell. The Dolphins scored 82 points in wins over the lowly Titans and Texans in Campbell's

first two games after replacing Joe Philbin. But they were completely over-matched against the defending Super Bowl champions.

"You have to play good football in all three phases when you play the New England Patriots. They've always been that way," Campbell said.

It could be an even bigger loss for the Dolphins because four-time Pro Bowl defensive end Cameron Wake was carted off the field with an Achilles tendon injury. Campbell didn't have an update on the extent of the injury.

The Patriots are 7-0 for the second time in franchise history and first time since going 16-0 in 2007. They've scored at least 28 points in every game and 30 or more in six straight.

A week after setting an

NFL record with 25 straight completions, Ryan Tannehill had a rough night against New England. He threw two interceptions and no TDs.

"We just couldn't get going," Tannehill said.

Brady connected with Gronkowski for a 47-yard scoring pass on the opening drive, but the Patriots managed a total of 65 yards on their next five possessions.

"We were doing things we don't typically do," Brady said.

They went up 9-0 on a safety after center Mike Pouncey snapped the ball before Tannehill was ready on a third down from the 9.

Then Brady got going in the 2-minute offense. He completed all four of his passes for 59 yards on a scoring drive that was capped by a 16-yard toss to Lewis for a 19-0 lead.

Tannehill led the Dolphins into the end zone to start the second half with Lamar Miller scoring on a 1-yard run.

But the Patriots took control in the fourth quarter. Brady threw TD passes of 10

and 16 yards to Edelman.

"We dug ourselves in some holes with stupid penalties," Edelman said. "It's one of those things where we were digging ourselves in a hole and our defense was playing well."

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Review: Bullock entertains as a ruthless campaign operative

They say timing is everything — or at least a whole lot. And on several fronts, the George Clooney-produced "Our Brand is Crisis," starring Sandra Bullock as a damaged, ruthless political consultant, has absolutely perfect timing.

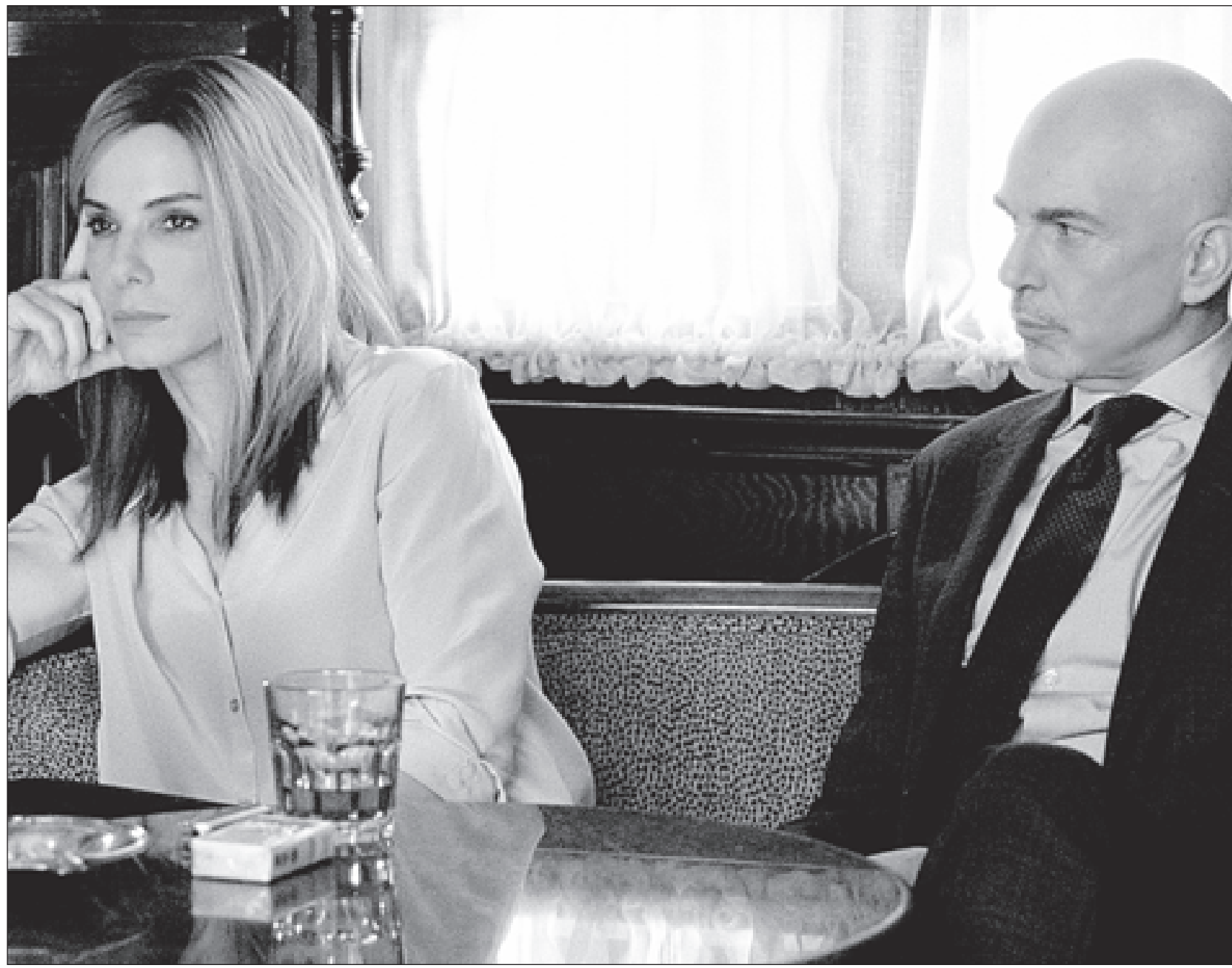
First, it's election season: Enough said! And second, with all the recent discussion about the need for more diverse, open-minded casting, here's a role that was originally written for a man. And happily, in retrospect, the role seems like it SHOULD have been written for a woman — for Bullock, in fact. It's a thornier, meatier role than she's had in a while, one that allows her to use her well-honed comic chops while also digging deeper into a complicated, very flawed character.

As for the film itself, directed by David Gordon Green, it's undeniably entertaining, but a conundrum. At times, it seems like a funny and penetrating political satire along the lines of "Veep" on HBO. (Check out the amusing llama scene. Yes, we said llama.) At others, it's trying to be a much weightier morality tale (It's based on — or rather "suggested by" Rachel Boynton's 2005 documentary of the same name). At moments, these two aims mesh well enough; at others, the zig-zag effect is jarring.

Bullock is Jane Bodine, otherwise known as Calamity Jane, famous for winning elections at any cost. "The truth is what I tell the electorate the truth is," she likes to say.

When we first meet Jane, she's retired from the down-and-dirty world of politics, having been felled by a scandal involving the violation of election laws. She's living in the boondocks somewhere, making pottery. She doesn't drink or smoke anymore, and says she can finally look herself in the eye.

But, like the proverbial



wizened former cop brought in for one last case, Jane is convinced to join the campaign of a failing candidate in Bolivia. It's good money, but the real reason she agrees is that an old nemesis, Pat Candy (Billy Bob Thornton, channeling James Carville — who actually did work on the 2002 Bolivian election) is already down there working for the opposition. These two are warriors to the death.

Arriving in La Paz, Jane confronts a candidate who is

standoffish, elitist, and 28 points behind (Portuguese actor Joaquim de Almeida is perfect for the role, and will be readily recognized by fans of "24"). After some initial sluggishness (and slapsticky altitude sickness) her competitive juices kick in.

Observers of U.S. politics will recognize every lesson learned here; When Pat seeks to exploit Jane's candidate's short temper, resulting in the candidate punching a man, Jane stops her team from

crafting an apology, and frames the punch as a sign of his no-crap approach. It's classic spin. Jane gets her guy to doff his suit jacket and roll up his sleeves. His poll numbers rise. "Our brand," Jane tells the team, "is crisis." Convince voters they're in crisis, and tell them how you're gonna save them.

The backdrop is the contentious relationship between Jane and Pat. While their byplay is entertaining, it's also frustrating. We don't

learn enough about the background; it would help to know more, and sooner.

It all ends with the election, of course, but a subplot involving an idealistic young volunteer (appealing Bolivian actor Reynaldo Pacheco) keeps the film honest, as it were, with an ending aimed at making us wonder what it all was for in the first place.

An excellent supporting cast includes Anthony Mackie and the terrific Ann Dowd as fellow consultants. Yet it

all rests on Bullock. She's fun to watch. Check out her priceless final remark in that llama scene. Her brand is Bullock, and it works pretty well.

"Our Brand Is Crisis," a Warner Bros release, is rated R by the Motion Picture Association of America for "language including some sexual references." Running time: 107 minutes. Two and a half stars out of four.

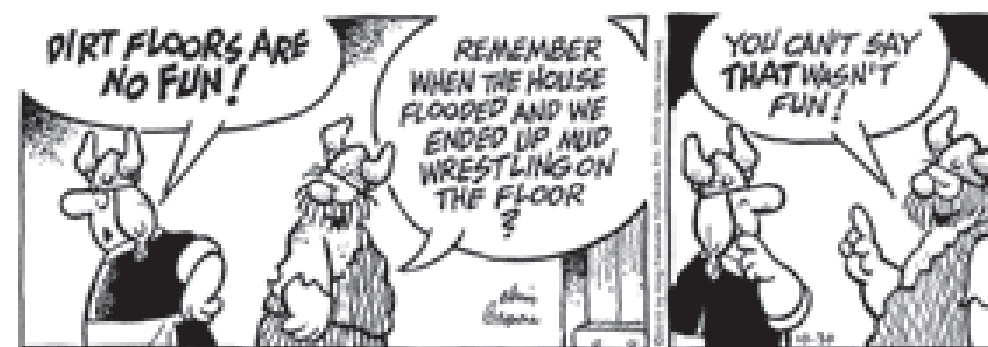
