Walmart replaces Christmas trees

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Christmas trees have been put back up at each entrance of the Minden Walmart after being taken down over the weekend.

The two large Christmas trees that were at both entrances of the retailer were replaced with smaller trees to make space for customers, according to a spokesperson.

A Facebook post was shared more than 1,000 times Sunday claiming all Christmas décor in the local discount store was being removed after a customer complaint; however, a Walmart spokesperson says that's not true.

Authorities: Lindsay Lohan's stepmother removed from plane

NEW ORLEANS — A coast-to-coast flight was diverted to New Orleans to remove actress Lindsay Lohan's stepmother, authorities said Saturday.

Kate Major-Lohan,

Kate Major-Lohan, who is married to Lindsay Lohan's father, was removed from a JetBlue plane on Wednesday, Col. John Fortunato, spokesman for the Jefferson Parish Sheriff's Office, confirmed in an email.

FBI spokesman Craig Betzebe said she was arrested on a charge of interfering with flight crew members and attendants.

JetBlue Airways Corp.

spokeswoman Sharon Jones said in an email that Wednesday's Flight 101 from Fort Lauderdale, Florida, to Los Angeles was diverted to New Orleans to remove an "unruly customer" whom she did not identify. She referred further questions to law enforcement.

Major-Lohan's phone number was not immediately available. It was not clear whether she had an attorney who could comment.

Lindsay Lohan's spokeswoman, Kate Driver, said in an email, "We don't comment on clients' personal lives."

\$1.7M bond set for man in gunfight that wounded 17

NEW ORLEANS — Bond has been set at \$1.7 million for a man police accuse of participating in a gunfight that wounded 17 people at a New Orleans playground after a neighborhood parade.

Online records show 32-year-old Joseph "Moe" Allen's bond was set Sunday in New Orleans Magistrate Court. He's also being held without bond on an otherwise unspecified out-of-state warrant.

Defense attorney Kevin Boshea didn't immediately respond to an email seeking comment. Records show Allen was booked with 17 counts of attempted murder in the Nov. 22 shooting at Bunny Friend Playground. A preliminary hearing is scheduled Dec. 8.

Police spokesman Tyler Gamble says Allen turned himself in Saturday, a day after being identified as a suspect.

Police say they believe several others were involved in the shooting and are seeking any information people might have.

The largest prize won in Louisiana for Saturday's drawings was


\$2,219. The lottery corporation says 10 Lotto tickets won that amount for matching five of six numbers.

Suspect in Colorado clinic shooting to appear in court

Colo. — The man accused of opening fire at a Planned Parenthood clinic in Colorado Springs lived a troubled, isolated life in the mountains of South Carolina and Colorado, but acquaintances said he never hinted that he would target the organization. Robert Lewis Dear, 57,

will make his first appearance in court Monday. He is accused of killing a police officer and two civilians — an Iraq war veteran and a mother of two — who were accompanying separate friends to the clinic. The rampage touched off an hourslong standoff and shootout Friday that also left nine other people in the hospital. Dear's court appearance will be done by video Monday afternoon in Colorado Springs.

Colorado Springs police on Sunday said they would not disclose any information on the motive for the attack.

Dear has been described by acquaintances as a reclusive loner who didn't seem to have strong political or social

Neighbors who live near Dear's former South Carolina home say he hid food in the woods and lived off selling prints of his uncle's paintings of Southern plantations and the Masters golf tournament. After he moved to Colorado, he once gave a neighbor pamphlets opposing President Barack Obama.

"He didn't talk about them or anything. He just said, 'Look them over when you get a chance,'" Zigmond Post said. A law enforcement official

said Dear told authorities "no more baby parts" after being arrested, part of a rambling statement that investigators are parsing to understand the reasoning.

The law enforcement official who recounted Dear's statement spoke on condition of anonymity because the official was not allowed to publicly discuss the ongoing investigation. The official said the "no more baby parts' comment was among a number of statements he made to authorities after his arrest, making it difficult to know his specific motivation.

Still, U.S. Attorney John Walsh said investigators have been in touch with lawyers from the Justice Department's Civil Rights and National Security divisions, suggesting officials could pursue federal charges in addition to state homicide ones. One possible avenue is the 1994 Freedom of Access to Clinic Entrances Act, which makes it a crime to injure or intimidate clinic patients and employees.

"The case may fit the criteria for a federal domestic terrorism case, but based on my experience, I would be very surprised if this is not simply a local prosecution," said Colorado Springs Mayor John Suthers, a former U.S. attorney and state attorney general. "Murder charges will be more than adequate on the local level.'

Planned Parenthood said witnesses believe the gunman was motivated by his opposition to abortion. Suthers said it's unclear whether the shooting was

intended to send an ideological message.

That may or may not be the case here. We just have to see how things unravel," Suthers said.

Whatever authorities decide is sure to be controversial, given the political murkiness of Dear's statements and the debate over Planned Parenthood, which was reignited in July when anti-abortion activists released undercover video they said showed the group's personnel negotiating the sale of fetal organs. The organization has denied seeking any payments beyond legally permitted reimbursement of the costs for donating the organs to

Planned Parenthood has said that Colorado's 19 other clinics would be open for business Monday. The Colorado Springs clinic, though, has been heavily damaged and will be closed for an uncertain amount of time, said Vicki Cowart, the regional head of Planned Parenthood.

Trump says black pastors likely pressured not to endorse him

NEW YORK — Donald Trump says he thinks a group of black pastors meeting with him Monday had planned to endorse him for president but were pressured out of it because he "believes all lives matter."

"Probably some of the Black Lives Matter folks called them up and said, 'Oh, you shouldn't be meeting with Trump because he believes all lives matter," Trump said Monday on MSNBC's "Morning Joe," referring to the movement protesting against police brutality and the killing of unarmed African-Ameri-

Trump predicted some of the 100 black evangelical leaders would endorse him after the meeting, nonethe-

Many of the religious leaders invited to the meetand-greet with Trump were surprised that the gathering was being advertised by his Republican presidential campaign as an endorsement. After they objected, the Trump campaign decided to keep the meeting private and quietly canceled a press conference afterward meant to announce their support.

"It's a miscommunication," said Darrell Scott, the senior pastor of New Spirit Revival Center in Cleveland Heights, Ohio, who helped to organize the meeting scheduled for Monday afternoon in New York - one of several Trump has convened in recent months with black religious leaders.

Trump's campaign had issued a press release last week that read: "Mr. Trump will be joined by a coalition of 100 African-American evangelical pastors and religious leaders who will endorse the GOP front-runner after a private meeting at Trump Tower.'

The campaign later rebranded the event as "a private, informational meetand-greet with many members of the Coalition of African American Ministers." A campaign press release said that a number of attendees were still expected to endorse Trump

after their meeting, but that the event would be closed to the press.

On Monday, Trump said,

"I have no idea what the

meeting is really. ... We'll

see what happens. I don't know it it's an endorsement, I don't know if it's an endorsement by some." "I do think pressure was put on them by people who may disagree with certain

things," added Trump, who

said he has "a great relation-

ship with the black pastors." Trump has been courting the support of evangelical black clergy members as he works to broaden his appeal in a crowded Republican

field. Scott estimated that more than 100 preachers from across the country would be attending the meeting, despite criticism in an open letter in Ebony magazine from more than 100 black religious leaders.

In the letter, the group wrote that "Trump's racially inaccurate, insensitive and incendiary rhetoric should give those charged with the care of the spirits and souls of black people great pause." They also expressed concern that the meeting on Monday would "give Trump the appearance of legitimacy among those who follow your leadership and respect your position as clergy."

Earlier this month, a black protester was roughed up by Trump supporters at a rally in Birmingham, Alabama. Trump said after the incident, "Maybe he should have been roughed up because it was absolutely disgusting what he was doing."

Trump also drew criticism recently for retweeting an image of inaccurate statistics that vastly over-represented the number of whites killed by blacks, among other errors.



Recognizing the greatness of American generosity

In 1620, a small band of pilgrims came to this continent, refugees who had fled persecution and violence in their native land. Nearly 400 years later, we remember their part in the American story -- and we honor the men and women who helped them in their time of need.

Thanksgiving is a day for food and football, and for hoping the turkey didn't turn out too dry. But it's also a day to count our blessings and give back to others -- a reminder that no matter our circumstances, all of us have something to be grateful for. Maybe it's good health, a new addition to the family, or a child taking a next step toward college or a career. Maybe it's a new job, or long overdue raise. Maybe it's something as simple, and as important, as the chance to spend time with the people who matter most.

Of course, every American can be thankful for the chance to live in a country founded on the belief that all of us are created equal. And as President, I'm thankful that I get to see the best of America every day -- the courage of our troops

and veterans, the resilience of our families, and the basic goodness of the ordinary people who call this country.

On this uniquely American holiday, we also remember that so much of our greatness comes from our

There's the generosity of Americans who volunteer at food banks and shelters, making sure that no one goes nungry on a day wnen so many plates are full. There's the generosity of Americans who take part not just in Black Friday and Cyber Monday, but Giving Tuesday -- recognizing that in the holiday season, what you give is as impor-

tant as what you get. And I've been touched by the generosity of the Americans who've written me letters and emails in recent weeks, offering to open their homes to refugees fleeing the brutality of ISIL.

Now, people should remember that no refugee can enter our borders until they undergo the highest security checks of anyone traveling to the United States. That was the case before Paris, and it's the case now. And what happened in Paris hasn't stopped Americans from opening their arms anyway.

One woman from Pennsylvania wrote me to say, "Money is tight for us in my household ... But i have a guest room. I have a pantry full of food. We can do this. Another woman from Florida told me her family's history dates back to the Mayflower -- and she said that welcoming others is part of "what it means to be an Ameri-

Nearly four centuries after the Mayflower set sail, the world is still full of pilgrims -- men and women who want nothing more than the chance for a safer, better future for themselves and their families. What makes America America is that we offer that chance. We turn Lady Liberty's light to the world, and widen our circle of concern to say that all God's children are worthy of our compassion and care. That's part of what makes this the

greatest country on Earth. I hope that you and your family have wonderful Thanksgiving, surrounded by loved ones, and full of joy and gratitude. And together, may we all play our own small part in the American story, and write a next chapter that future genera-

Edwards' victory has ripple effect across politics

While analysts were still sifting through the results of the Louisiana governor's race, politicians already were moving beyond how it happened that a

for re-election to a third term next year, creating a rare open Senate seat. Several politicians had been eyeing the seat for months though initially it was because conventional wisdom once had Vitter likely coasting to an easy win for governor. Republicans have been readying campaign

plans for quite a while. First up, U.S. Rep. Charles Boustany, a Republican from Lafayette, let fewer than two days lapse after Vitter's re-election decision before releasing a pre-announcement of his own Senate race plans. In the statement, Boustany made it clear he intends to run for Vitter's seat, saying an official Senate candidacy declaration would

"I look forward to outlining my vision for Louisiana and how I intend to help lead our state to the bright future I know lies before us," Boustany said.

Within hours of Boustany's statement, Republican U.S. Rep. John Fleming of Minden followed up with one of his own, saying he, too, will make his Senate race announcement "in the near future.

'At that time I will share my goals for Louisiana and our nation, and why I believe the voters are eager to see real, conservative solutions in our

nation's capital," Fleming said. Other Republicans considering the Senate race include Treasurer John Kennedy; Public Service Commissioner Scott Angelle, the third-place finisher in the governor's race; and Rob Maness, who ran unsuccessfully for Senate last year. New Orleans Mayor Mitch Landrieu, a Democrat, also hasn't closed the door on a run for the posi-

If Boustany and Fleming both stick it out in the Senate race, that would create openings for their congressional district seats, and already possible contenders are starting to discuss their campaign options.

Angelle has been mentioned as a strong potential candidate for the 3rd Congressional District job held by Boustany, if he decides he'd prefer an easier competition than the Senate race is shaping up to be.

With this year's elections barely done, the 2016 races are getting under way. Meanwhile, in Baton Rouge, maneuvering for state legislative leadership jobs has been going on behind the scenes for months.

Now that Louisiana's next governor has been chosen, lawmakers are trying to leverage

the outcome to their advantage.

Some legislators are hoping their alliance with Edwards can help them gain support from their colleagues. Others are seeking to use the party split — Edwards is a Democrat, while Republicans hold majorities in both the state House and Senate — to drive more legislative independence in leadership selections.

Governors traditionally have held significant sway over who becomes Senate president and House speaker, with many governors going so far as to meddle in the selection of legislative committee chairmen and vice chairmen as well.

Edwards campaigned as a moderate with a bipartisan approach to governing. As a state lawmaker, he's also talked of the need for more legislative independence. Lawmakers are waiting for more signals on just how much he tries to interfere in their affairs as governor, and Edwards hedged a bit when questioned on the subject.

"I don't intend to tell the Legislature exactly who they need to put in what positions," Edwards said the day after his election win.

"But there will be communications because we have an agenda," he said. "I was elected with 56 percent of the vote saying I was going to do certain things, and I'm going to work to make sure that we get those initiatives through the Legisla-

Let pharmacies prescribe birth control

Oregon introduced a bill in Congress to let doctors discuss birth control with their patients. The need for such a bill showed how controversial the subject was. But this was the heart of the Great Depression, when impoverished Amer icans could barely feed the children Oregon, along with California, is again ahead of the curve in promoting women's access to contraceptives.

Back in 1933, Rep. Walter Pierce of

Both states will soon let pharmacists dispense the pill, patches and other hormonal contraceptives without a doctor's prescription. This is a major advance for the following reasons:

—Logistics. Needing a prescription from a physician requires having a physician. Many women don't, and those who do must often wait for appointments. Or they may have had a recent checkup and want birth control without going through the other unpleasant procedures in a gynecologist's office.

—Cost. It's a cheaper way to obtain birth control.

-Convenience. The United States has a very high percentage of unintended pregnancies. Many are the result of women being unwilling to jump through the hoops to secure birth control before having sex. The hurdles of convenience, cost and logistics are higher for poor women.

Please spare us the lectures on personal responsibility. The objective here is to prevent

unwanted pregnancies. Some argue

that these state laws don't go far enough in "freeing" the pill. They want it sold over the counter just like aspirin and toothpaste.

Hormonal contraceptives are already sold over the counter in

much of the world - in nearly all of Asia and Latin America and in most of Africa. A prescription is still required in Canada and in western Europe, with the interesting exception of Portugal.

One can argue for requiring some sort of prescription, at least for the time being. Health insurance generally doesn't cover over-the-counter medications but will pay for prescribed contraceptives.

The federal Food and Drug Administration, meanwhile, takes forever to approve over-the-counter medications (another problem that needs fixing).

Although these contraceptives are generally very safe, they can cause complications for a few women. Both Oregon and California will ask pharmacists to have women fill out short questionnaires to help determine whether hormonal birth control poses

any risks to the patient. Arizona, Idaĥo and New Mexico have shown an interest in following the Oregon and California example. Washington state already lets pharmacists prescribe contraceptives, but only under special agreements with physicians; they can get complicated.

As we look forward to more easily obtainable birth control, we can also observe the past at work in a case now winding through the U.S. Supreme Court. It is the umpteenth challenge to the Affordable Care Act requirement that employers provide coverage for birth control. (Houses of worship are already exempt.)

The plaintiffs this time are the Little Sisters of the Poor in Baltimore. They argue that the Obama administration's accommodation for religious nonprofits opposed to contraception, such as theirs, is too burdensome.

In truth, all they have to do is fill out a short form saying that birth control violates their religious beliefs and they won't have to pay for it. The group says doing even that makes them "complicit" in the alleged immorality tied to

Americans have to agree on certain principles, and access to birth control is widely accepted, including among Catholics. In this world of increasing religious diversity, many principles will conflict with theological teachings. In short, Obama has stretched religious accommodation far enough.

Back to the future, thank the American West for leading the way toward curbing unwanted pregnancies — the results of which no one of faith or otherwise wants. Letting pharmacies prescribe contraceptives should become



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

first comeback win in only his second NFL start. Starting for Peyton Manning, Osweiler drove

the Broncos 83 yards to give the Broncos a brief lead in the fourth quarter, then called the perfect play in overtime to set up the win. Osweiler and the Broncos overcame a 14point, fourth-quarter deficit for a 30-24 victory over none other than Tom Brady and the previously undefeated New England

Kobe retiring after 20th season

LOS ANGELES After 20 years in a Lakers uniform and a lifetime in basketball, Kobe Bryant determined that his aching body and his passion for the game had both grown weaker than his excitement about the future.

That's when Kobe decided he could only wait a few more months to begin his life after the Lakers.

Bryant announced Sunday that he will retire after this season, ending a landmark 20-year NBA career spent entirely with Los Angeles. He was serenaded with cheers throughout the struggling Lakers' 107-103 loss to Indiana, beginning his farewell tour through the league with a clear mind and a burgeoning curiosity about his next chapter.

"I had to just accept the fact that I don't want to do this anymore, and I'm OK with that," the dry-eyed, smiling Bryant said after the game.

The 37-year-old Bryant made the longanticipated declaration in

a post on The Players' Tribune on Sunday, writ-ing a poem titled "Dear Basketball. "My heart can take the pounding. My mind can

handle the grind. But my body knows it's time to say goodbye," wrote Bryant, the third-leading scorer in NBA history. "And that's OK. I'm ready to let you go. I want you to know now. So we both can savor every moment we have left together. The good and the bad. We have given each other all that we have."

Minutes after LSU closed the regular season with a 19-7 victory over Texas A&M, athletic director Joe Alleva said Miles will remain the coach. The announcement capped more than a week of speculation

that Miles was the verge of losing his job after his first threegame losing streak in his 11 years at ĽSU.



looking forward to working with Coach Miles as he leads this team to a bowl leads this team to a bowl game and another great recruiting class," Alleva said as Miles' wife, Kathy, and their four children looked on. "Les and I have talked. We have talked about this program and we are committed together to working to win and comworking to win and compete at the highest level."

LSU's administration had allowed speculation about Miles' status to fester by refusing to comment on the matter last week, but Alleva stressed that he was only following his policy of waiting until after the season to comment on a coach's future.

Indeed, Miles said he did not know for sure whether he'd just coached his last game on the home sideline of Death Valley until after the game. He said LSU President F. King Alexander

informed him first, followed by Alleva.

"We're a talented foot-ball team. We seemed to undershoot our mark this year," Miles said. "I agree with Joe. Winning championships is something Joe wants to work toward fully and I'm right with him. It's not enough to win occasionally. You have to win all the time. I get that."

LSU players didn't find out until word began circu-Alleva's lating about announcement. Tigers senior right tackle Vadal Alexander said he found out when he got a text from his parents and just smiled.

Victory over Texas A&M (8-4, 4-4) did not come easily for the Tigers (8-3, 5-3), who trailed until Derrius Guice's 50-yard scoring run in the third

Leonard Fournette ran for 159 yards and a touchdown. He finished the game owning LSU's single-season rushing record at 1,741 yards, surpassing the mark of 1,686 yards set by Charles Alexander in 1977.

"It has been hard, not just with (speculation about) coach Miles, but with us having lost the last three games," Fournette said. "These last three weeks will help this team grow and help us grow in life. I can say this has been one of the longest three weeks in my life. It was

hard for everybody." Kyle Allen passed for

161 yards and one touchdown for the Aggies, but had a pass intercepted by Donte Jackson inside the final 2 minutes, all but sealing LSU's victory.

Aggies coach Kevin Sumlin said his team's

turnovers and problems protecting Allen tipped the game in LSU's favor.

"It is kind of hard when

the quarterback can't set his feet and move the ball down field," Sumlin said.

During the "Tiger Walk," from the team busses to the stadium, Miles was greeted like a hero as he waved to the crowd, at times pausing and turning around as if to soak it all in. Many fans held up signs expressing support for the embattled coach, some urging LSU to give him at least one more Inside Death Valley

before kickoff, the crowd roared when Miles was introduce during Senior Day ceremonies. The coach tipped his trademark baseball cap to acknowledge the crowd, raising the volume a little more.

Miles overall record improved to 111-32. LSU

could have had a nine-win regular season if not for lightning canceling the season opener against heavy underdog McNeese State. Yet, some of the very

aspects of LSU's game that have bothered Miles' critics showed up again.

There were a handful of pre-snap penalties and the passing game was largely ineffective. Brandon Harris was 7 of 21 for 83 yards, no touchdowns and an interception. A number of his passes sailed over intended receivers or skipped off the grass short of their mark. Most of his receptions came on check downs to running backs, including a critical third-down swing pass to Fournette for a 17yard gain that sustained the Tigers' final scoring drive.

It didn't help that kicker Trent Domingue, who'd missed only one field goal all season coming in, missed three against the

Aggies.
When the Tigers finally produced a big play to take a 13-7 lead, it came on Guice's long run.

The Aggies, who led 7-6 at halftime, scored their lone TD on Allen's 8-yard, third-down pass over the middle to Ricky Seals-

The Aggies squandered a chance to widen their lead when Allen was sacked and stripped by Kendell Beckwith on the LSU 13, with the Tigers' Devon Godchaux recovering.

Bulldogs fall to Golden Eagles, 58-24



RUSTON - Louisiana Tech running back Kenneth Dixon tied an NCAA record but the fanfare was overshadowed by a season-high seven turnovers in the Bulldogs' 58-24 loss to Southern Miss Saturday afternoon at Joe Aillet

Stadium in Ruston. Dixon scored twice as he Montee tied Ball (Wisconsin, 2009-12) and Keenan Reynolds (Navy, 2012-Present) with an NCAA record 83 career overall touchdowns.

However both scores came off receptions as Louisiana Tech (8-4, 6-2) struggled to establish a running game, rushing for negative yardage in a game for

the first time since 1999. Southern Miss (9-3, 7-1) took advantage of LA Tech's season-high seven turnovers as the Golden Eagles scored 30 points off turnovers including 20 points off three Tech turnovers in a 45-second


The loss, which came on the 80th anniversary of the first meeting between the snapped teams, Louisiana Tech's nine-game home winning streak.

Jeff Driskel was 27-for-44 for 355 yards and three touchdowns but was also intercepted three times. Trent Taylor notched 11 catches for 102 yards and one touchdown while Paul Turner registered six catches for 112 yards in the game. Dixon was the team's thirdbest receiver with five catches for 81 yards but finished with negative-four yards rushing.

Beau Fitte led the Louisiana Tech defense as he tallied a career-high 15 total tackles including one for a loss of three yards and an interception.

That would be Southern Miss quarterback Nick Mullens only interception as the USM signal caller threw for 386 yards and three touchdowns in a 24-for-37 performance while Ito Smith ran for three scores of his own on 169 yards rushing. Michael Thomas caught seven passes for 162 yards for Southern Miss including one touchdown.

Louisiana Tech now awaits an announcement of which bowl game the Bulldogs will be invited to with that decision to be made by Dec. 6. Conference USA has seven guaranteed bowl commitments this season including the NOVA Home Loans Arizona,



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
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
