## **Fugitive wanted in Waco shooting** arrested at Bossier City casino

### ASSOCIATED PRESS

BOSSIER CITY - Authorities say a man wanted in the deadly shootout involving rival motorcycle gangs earlier this year in Texas has been arrested in Bossier City, Louisiana.

Bossier City police spokesman Mark Natale says local, state and federal agents arrested 38-yearold Phillip Ray White, of Eddy, Texas, Wednesday evening.

Natale says officers were able to locate and identify White at the Diamond Jacks Casino, where he was taken into custody without incident

White was wanted on a warrant charging him with engaging in

organized criminal activity specific to murder.

White, a member of the Cossack Motorcycle Club, was indicted by a grand jury for his role in the May 17 shootout at the Twin Peaks Restaurant in Waco that left nine dead and 20 wounded.

White is awaiting extradition back to Texas.

fearful of that.

"I believe that the real solutions to our problems, the ones that will work and the ones that people will accept and stick with over time, happen to be in the center of the political spectrum," Edwards said. "If you get too far left or too far right, the people are fickle enough that they're going to reject that after some period of time.'

He'll also be working with a majority Republican state House and Senate.

But despite the constraints that could put on Edwards, the governor-elect said he intends to push for the decidedly Democratic causes he championed as a candidate: a minimum wage increase, equal pay for women and expansion of Louisiana's Medicaid program.

"You're not going to see me hanging out on the far left, but we are going to do the things that I said we're going to do," Edwards said.

Edwards reached out to the audience of state officials, lawmakers, lobbyists and business officials, urging collaboration. He said if he proposes something they don't like, they should offer suggestions for a different approach.

"What we can't do is all go to our corner and start lobbing grenades at one another, because then we're going to stay in the same rut that we're in, nothing's going to

get fixed, and the state cannot afford that," he said.

His speech largely recapped plans he outlined during his campaign.

He again said he'll hold a special legislative session in February aimed at raising revenue to help stabilize the state's budget, by making tax changes. He provided no further details on what he'd include.

On Wednesday, Edwards announced a 34-person Fis-cal Matters Committee charged with proposing ways to close the budget gap. Public Service Commissioner Foster Campbell and former state Inspector General Sharon Robinson are cochairing the effort.

Edwards said his aversion

to the continued slashing of state financing for public colleges was the largest reason he decided to run for governor two years ago. budget.

"Our kids are paying more, getting less in return, starting off - if they can go to college at all – with more debt than they should have," he said. "We have to do things differently.'

One target for repeal early in the Edwards administration, the governor-elect said, is a tax credit that lawmakers created on paper to protect term-limited Republican Gov. Bobby Jindal's anti-tax record as he readied a nowended bid for the GOP presidential nomination.

The tax credit – called SAVE – didn't raise new money or cut anyone's taxes, but allowed Jindal to claim an offset against other tax hikes used to balance the

Edwards, a state representative, heavily criticized the tax credit maneuver in the last legislative session as a sham, designed to adhere to a no-tax pledge Jindal signed with an organization led by national anti-tax activist Grover Norquist.

Also Wednesday, Edwards announced he has hired Richard Carbo as communications director for his new administration. Carbo, an Alexandria native, previously worked for former U.S. Sen. Mary Landrieu and former Gov. Kathleen Blanco, both Democrats.

### Credit agency says La. deficit plan was only 'stop-gap' fix

BATON ROUGE – A national credit rating agency says the maneuvers used by Gov. Bobby Jindal and lawmakers to close a \$487 million midyear budget gap were only temporary fixes.

Fitch Ratings released its analysis Thursday of the work recently done to rebalance this year's \$25 billion budget. The assessment was that Louisiana's leaders used "stop-gap measures" that "will not address the state's persistent budget challenges."

## Edwards plans to issue anti-discrimination order as governor

BATON ROUGE -Gov.-elect John Bel Edwards says he'll issue an executive order when he takes office in January that bans discrimination in state government based on sexual orientation.

Edwards, a Democrat, said Wednesday the edict will be similar to anti-discrimination orders enacted by Democratic former Govs. Edwin Edwards and Kathleen Blanco.

Blanco's order prohibit-

"In the pocket of the hoodie, he had cash that he'd removed from the console of

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

## Louisianans slow to enroll under AAC in 2016

BATON ROUGE - More than 43,400 Louisiana residents have signed up for health care coverage next year under the Affordable Care Act, which is nearly a quarter of last year's total so

The enrollment figure in federal Health Insurance Marketplace plans is as of Nov. 28, The Advocate reported. Experts said many people are waiting closer to the date to enroll, confused by changes or shopping around to avoid increased costs.

"They are waiting until

the last minute. They're being worked, it's just not happening (enrollment) as quick as people think it's going to," said B. Ronnell Nolan, president and chief executive officer of Baton Rouge-based Health Agents for America. "Or people just can't afford it."

Open enrollment ends Jan. 31, but consumers have until Dec. 15 to enroll if they want their coverage to begin on Jan. 1, rather than March 1. According to the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, consumers who had a plan in 2015 and

don't pick another by Dec. 15 will be automatically reenrolled.

A year ago, 186,277 Louisiana residents either picked plans or were automatically re-enrolled in health plans under the Affordable Care Act.

Nolan said the low firstmonth enrollment numbers appear to be the result of a combination of factors. The premiums for individual coverage are expected to increase an average of 6.4 percent to 29.5 percent in Louisiana.

Brian Burton, state direc-

tor of Southwest Louisiana Area Health Education Cen-

ter, said it's difficult to compare current enrollment figures to last year's.

In 2014, open enrollment began Nov. 15 and ended Feb. 15, Burton said. The enrollment period also was extended for people who began the enrollment process but didn't complete

Burton expects the 2016 enrollment total will equal the 2015 numbers by Jan. 31.

## The American **Press of Lake Charles on** highway safety

Statistics show that Louisiana highways are becoming safer good news for everybody that travels by car or truck.

The Baton Rouge Advocate reported recently that deaths on Louisiana roads have plunged 20 percent in recent years and fatal accidents are down by 28 percent. According to the Department of Transportation and Development, Louisiana experienced 651 fatal collisions in 2013, reduced from 900 in 2007. Injury vehicle mishaps fell 10 percent during the same time period.

DOTD Secretary Sherri LeBas said road deaths were reduced from 916 in 2008 to 737 last year. More work needs to be done. Crashes in Louisiana are still above the national average, but the downward trend is in line with the national trends. Louisiana State University compiled most of the figures from state vehicle accident reports.

The figures are included in the Louisiana Statewide Transportation Plan, which is a list of desired road and bridge projects the state plans if money for them becomes available.

However, not as promising in the report are the statistics which show less improvement in preventing crashes caused by distracted drivers than drunk or aggressive drivers. Louisiana has already banned the use of cell phones and text messaging by drivers.

Officials at the DOTD noted that the state needs \$178 million to tackle safety issues, including \$127 million around railroad crossings. In at least 27 percent of the fatal accidents, speeding was a factor, according to a July study from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.

Kevin Trull, the deputy director of the Louisiana High Safety Commission, recently said that increased

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

Short of that, how about we just leave things the way they are? Sorry to all you brick layers out there. As an aside, back in 1964 Shirley Ellis had a runaway hit with 'The Name Game.' If you're of a certain age, you can still recite her unique lyrics -Lincoln, Lincoln, bo Bincoln, Bonanana fanna fo Fincoln.' It was a light song infused with fun and joy. But today's Name Game is one of bitterness, usually played by left-wingers who revel in feeling 'oppressed.' And if they really want to start down the slippery slope of erasing past leaders from public streets and buildings, why not go all the way? 
