City Council moves to annex La. 531 property

May's Minden City Council Meeting was a brief affair, seeing as the agenda only hosted a total of 6 items on the agenda. Of these items, the ones of note include the annexation of the property belonging to Quickdraw Travel & Casino into the city limits, as well as the adoption of an ordinance officially implementing the STEP program for the City of Minden.

The annexation of the Quickdraw Travel and Casino's property went through fairly easily. Councilman Michael Roy of Dist. D did have a question pertaining to a hole on the property, and whether the city would have an obligation to fill it if they annexed it in.

"If I remember correctly, there's a big hole out there, around one of the drainage areas."

"That's an oxidation pump for their sewer," said Gardner.

"Would that be put on us to fix?" asked Roy. "That'll be their responsibility," confirmed the Mayor.

After the brief discussion, the motion passed unanimously.

Next, Ordinance 1116 was motioned in by Councilman Roy with a second coming from Councilman Wayne Edwards of Dist. D.

A few weeks back the Council had a workshop to discuss the specifics of the Safety Traffic Enforcement Program (STEP) program, though still a few questions lingered before the council adopted the program.

Councilman Roy asked why the limit for who officers would pull over was set at 12 miles an hour. Mayor Gardner explained that it was a matter of keeping a higher percentage of the fine going to the city, as opposed to splitting it with

Concealed carry bill advances

The Louisiana House approved a bill Wednesday that calls for letting adults age 21 and older to legally carry a concealed firearm without a permit.

Gov. John Bel Edwards, a Democrat who generally supports gun rights, opposes the change, arguing that requiring permits and training strikes the right balance between personal rights and public safety. House Bill 596 by Rep. Bryan Fontenot, R-Thibodaux, was sent to the Senate with a 72-28 vote.

The Senate already has approved Senate Bill 118, which has the same goal, with a 27-11 vote.

Fontenot said Louisiana adults already have the right to carry a firearm openly without a permit. He noted that many other states have enacted similar provisions and rejected the argument that his proposal could put law enforcement officers in danger.

Fontenot also said the cost of the training required to get a permit exceeds State Police's expenses to deliver the training. The change would apply only to people not otherwise banned from carrying a gun.

"We're not trying to create a new wheel," Fontenot said. "Criminals will do what criminals will do."

Rep. Mandie Landry, D-New Orleans, suggested the bill violates the Second Amendment principle that arms should be "well regulated." Rep. Aimee Freeman, also a New Orleans Democrat, relayed law enforcement concerns that untrained people who can hide the fact that they are armed would increase risks to officers and the public, especially if alcohol is involved.

The House also unanimously approved House Bill 129 by Rep. Tony Bacala, R-Prairieville. It

Transgender sports ban bill wins Senate backing

The Senate voted 29-6 for the bill from Sen. Beth Mizell, the Senate's second-ranking Republican.

Four Democrats — Sens. Regina Barrow of Baton Rouge, Katrina Jackson of Monroe, Gary Smith of Norco and Greg Tarver of Shreveport — joined Republicans in supporting the legislation.

But the measure likely is headed to the same House Education Committee that rejected a similar proposal a day earlier.

Supporters of the proposals said they are trying to protect female athletes from unfair competition. Opponents call the measures discriminatory.

Gov. John Bel Edwards, a Democrat, opposes the bill and is expected to veto it if the proposal reaches his desk.

The Louisiana High School Athletic Association already has taken a position that student athletes "shall compete in the gender of their birth certificate unless they have undergone sex reassignment."

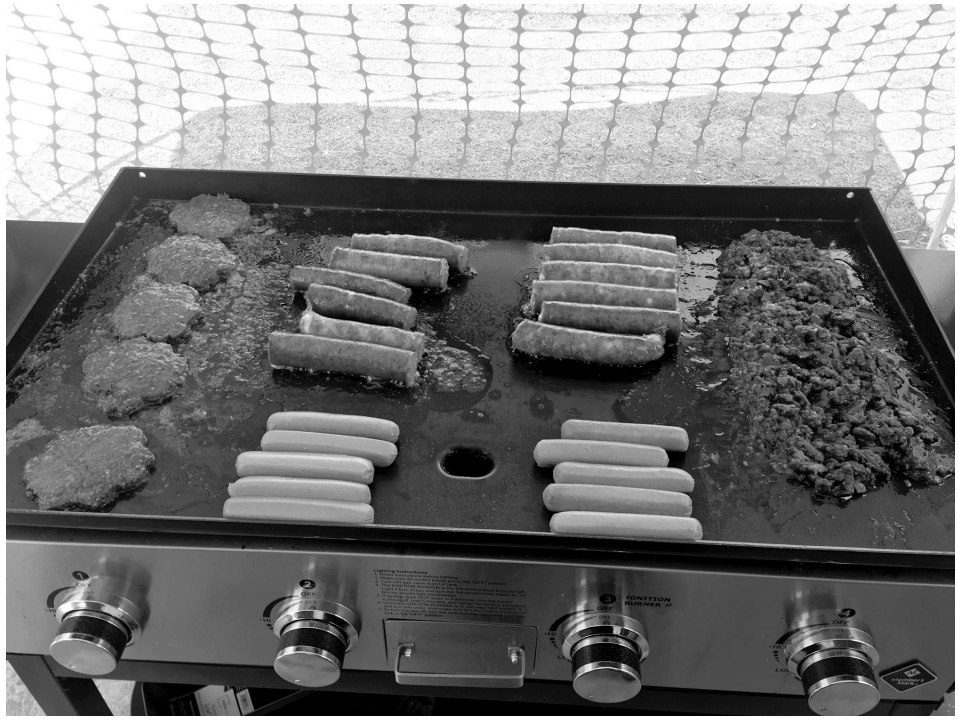

the state.

"If it's 10, you would have to share that fine with the state, if it's twelve, the city's allowed to keep the entire amount," said Gardner.

"So we will not stop them unless they are doing 12 miles over the posted speed limit of 70."

Councilman Terika Williams-Walker of Dist. asked whether the fine would increase based on how much individuals were speeding. The Mayor clarified that it would be the same price, regardless of how fast and individual

is going.

"Regardless of whether it's 12 mile over or 22 miles over, it's still 250 dollars?" asked Councilman Walker.

"Yes ma'am, And it will not go on your driving record if you pay it properly."

Cropper noted that the Minden Police Department would have to wait until the middle of May to start enforcing the program, as some of the equipment needed for the vehicles used for the program had yet to come in.

"We're looking at the middle of May. The old up is with getting all of the

proper equipment for the vehicles," said Cropper.

It was revealed by Michael Fluhr, Acting City Clerk, during his financial report that the city saw quite a significant increase in their sales tax collections for the month of April, \$709,000 compared to last year's collection for the same time period \$526,000. "An increase of 183,000 dollars," said Fluhr.

Reading a report from the sales tax commission, Fluhr explained that the possible reason behind the increase was the stimulus checks provided in the month of March.

"I believe the overall increase was due to retail shopping, eating out, car purchases, construction, and of course alcohol sales."

He also added that a potential cause of the increase was due to the stimulus checks provided by the federal government a few weeks back. "It's the stimulus money that went into the economy," said Fluhr.

The Minden City Council Meeting takes place on the first Monday of every month starting at 5:30 p.m at Minden City Hall. Meetings are open to the public to attend.

Guns: House approves minority law enforcement recruiting

calls for the Council on Peace Officer Standings and Training and other government entities to develop plans to recruit more minorities for law enforcement positions.

Entities would have to ensure their officers receive anti-bias training or risk losing state law enforcement grants.

The POST council also would have to certify law

enforcement agencies in order to investigate "officer-involved shootings" that result in death or serious bodily harm. Officers who engage in misconduct could have their

POST certifications suspended or revoked, which Bacala said would prevent those officers from finding jobs at other departments when they're fired for misconduct.

Lawmakers in House, Senate go in opposite directions on auto insurance bills

Committees on opposite sides of the Louisiana state Capitol went in different directions Wednesday on bills meant to prevent auto insurance companies from setting rates based on factors other than the customer's driving record.

The Senate Insurance Committee declined to advance Senate Bill 55 by Alexandria Democrat Jay Luneau with a 4-4 vote. The bill would have banned automobile insurers from using three factors when setting rates: the insured person's status as a widow or widower, their credit score and their gender if over age 25.

Luneau described all three factors as unfair discrimination, arguing that driving habits should be used to set rates. He cited research by The Zebra, which calls itself "the nation's leading insurance comparison site," that indicates women in Louisiana pay more for car insurance even though women, on average, are safer drivers, according to some measures. Several states already ban using gender when setting rates, according to The Zebra and Wednesday's testimony.

Luneau also argued using credit scores penalizes poor people who might be good drivers, potentially causing them to drive without insurance, which is bad for them, other drivers and the state as a whole.

Auto insurance rates in Louisiana are among

the highest in the country.

"This will not lower the [average] rates in Louisiana one penny," Commissioner of Insurance Jim Donelon said of Luneau's bill.

Instead, it would lower rates for some drivers and raise rates for others, Donelon said.

Several Republican lawmakers said Wednesday they didn't want to restrict competition by putting government mandates on private companies, reasoning that consumers always can choose another carrier. Supporters, who are more likely to be Democrats, pointed out that government forces drivers to buy car insurance, so it's hardly a "free" market, so government has a responsibility to protect consumers.

House Bill 467 by Rep. Edmond Jordan, D-Baton Rouge, does not touch on gender or marital status. Jordan wants to ban credit information, education level, employment and occupation as factors in setting auto insurance prices.

"Credit is a strong predictor of risk," for auto insurers, Rich Piazza, the state insurance department's chief actuary, said during the House Insurance Committee hearing on HB 467.

Rep. Sherman Mack, R-Albany, however, seemed incredulous that someone's credit score could influence their auto insurance rates, even if they've never had an accident. Mack backed Jordan's bill, helping it to advance on a 7-6 vote.

Southeast cleaning up debris of rain, twisters

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (AP) — A deluge that dumped more than 7 inches of rain in a few hours and spawned at least three tornadoes eased Wednesday but left homeowners and workers to clean up a wide area across the Southeast.

With heavy rains still falling in the Florida Panhandle, crews inland used shovels and heavy machines to remove downed trees, limbs and other debris that covered roads and bridges once floodwaters receded in metro Birmingham.

My father was a soldier. Vietnam. He never talked about it much; most soldiers don't, I've learned. Especially those who saw the worst of humanity and/or those who may have had to bloody their hands in the barbarity of that warfare.

He was a good man. But a troubled one. I loved him and lost him. About 15 years ago. He died under, I'll just call it unusual circumstances. I don't want to say anymore than that and the only reason I even mention it at all is because I want to let you know that, I think, war ... well, war ... I just can't comprehend much of war because I've never experienced it. Never been in that world. Never willingly (or unwillingly for that matter) said I'll take on this fight. Never said I'll enter that world and face whatever the Devil can throw at me.

My pop, some call their father dad or daddy, I called mine pop, wouldn't watch war movies. I tried to get him to watch Saving Private Ryan once. Told him it was a good film. "No such thing as a good war movie, bub," he replied.

And that, as they say, was that.

On occasion he would imbibe (Bit of self-medication I believe) and sometimes he would talk. These weren't the conversations of normality we would have about sports and such. These were on God and

His favorite Fallen Angel, good and evil, society and sacrifice. And sometimes about men killing other men for no purpose other than their politicians told them to do so.

One of his favorite movies, and now one of mine as well, was Legends of the Fall. Three brothers go to war. Only two return. The relationship between the remaining sons and their father becomes complicated as they all lived through years in harsh Montana winters.

One of the survivors went on to become a politician, and his daddy (a former soldier who saw what the government did to the Native Americans) told him this about a political career path and the life of the slain brother Samuel:

"Samuel chose to be a soldier and soldiers die!" he says. "Sent to their slaughter by men in governments! Parasites like you!"

Parasites. Politicians. Soldiers. Sacrifice. Comfortable chairs and lobbyists. Frozen fields and flaming deserts.

It's 2021. I hear the news and

read the Internet. We trade in one set of wars for maybe others. We seem to be heading into more and more heated conflicts. Middle East, China, even here at home. You know one of the differences between our two political parties? Republicans want a huge military but don't want to send it anywhere. Democrats want a small military but want to send it everywhere.

Doesn't matter who is in power. Soldiers die. That remains.

My dad died on a hot July night. He died alone. He never met his second granddaughter and the last words I said to him weren't that kind. If I could have one more thing to tell him, it wouldn't be I love you. It would be that I understand as much as possible what may be in your head. And I'd share with him a poem I've discovered since his death.

Alfred Owen's "Dulce et Decorum Est" tells the story of a WWI soldier witnessing the deaths of his fellow soldiers and questioning what he calls "the old lie" - Dulce et decorum est Pro patria mori, a latin phrase from the Roman poet Horace meaning "It is sweet and fitting to die for one's country."

The final stanza:

If in some smothering dreams, you too could pace

Behind the wagon that we flung him in,

And watch the white eyes writhing in his face,

His hanging face, like a devil's sick of sin;

If you could hear, at every jolt, the blood

Come gargling from the froth-corrupted lungs,

Obscene as cancer, bitter as the cud

Of vile, incurable sores on innocent tongues, —

My friend, you would not tell with such high zest

To children ardent for some desperate glory,

The old Lie: Dulce et decorum est

Pro patria mori.

War is necessary sometimes. But how many millions and millions of young men have died because of greed and the egos of lesser men - the parasites, the politicians? How many lives ruined in the intervening years? How many manipulated into fighting wars that only serve to make rich men richer?

Serving your country is noble. Dying for a greater cause is as well. I just don't think anybody knows what the greater causes are anymore.

Biden vs. Biden on 'Is America a racist country?'

"Hear me clearly: America is not a racist country."

So declared Sen. Tim Scott, a Black Republican, in his televised rebuttal to Joe Biden's address to Congress.

Asked the next day what he thought of Scott's statement, Biden said he agrees. "No, I don't think the American people are racist."

Vice President Kamala Harris also agreed with Scott, "No, I don't think America is a racist country."

What makes these rejections of the charge of racism against America significant is that Biden and Harris both seemed to say the opposite after Derek Chauvin was convicted.

Biden had called George Floyd's death "a murder (that) ripped the blinders off for the whole world to see the systemic racism... that is a stain on our nation's soul."

Harris had said much the same: "America has a long history of systemic racism. Black Americans — and Black men, in particular — have been treated throughout the course of our history as less than human."

But which is the predominant view of Biden and Harris about the moral character of the country they were elected to lead?

Is it a vicious slander, as Scott implied, to call America a "racist country"? Or is America's soul, as Biden and Harris said, so stained by "systemic racism" that this country has treated Black Americans "as less than human" for the 400 years of her existence.

Has America been a curse

for the 40 million Black people whose numbers have multiplied 10-fold since the abolition of slavery in 1865, and whose freedoms and material prosperity have grown accordingly?

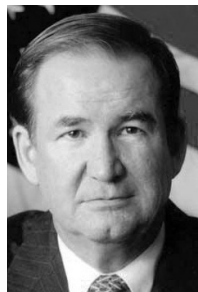
Or has America been a blessing to Black people?

This is not just a gotcha question.

For the clashing commentaries of Biden and Harris reflect an ideological divide within their own coalition over a most basic issue: Is America a good country?

We have been on this terrain before.

Between LBJ's landslide in 1964 and the breaking of his presidency in 1968, the Democratic Party had split into three factions, all at war with one another.

There was the Robert Kennedy-Gene McCarthy-George McGovern anti-establishment and anti-war left.

And there was the populist-right George Wallace bloc, containing millions of flag-waving blue-collar Democrats in northern industrial states and Southern Dixiecrats who detested the leftist radi-

cals on cultural and patriotic grounds.

That Democratic Party disintegrated in the convention hall and the streets of Chicago in August of 1968, opening the door to the GOP era of Richard Nixon and Ronald Reagan.

Today's Democratic Party encompasses three similar blocs.

There is the Biden liberal establishment that controls the media, the academy, the Congress, the administration. There is the Bernie Sanders-Elizabeth Warren-AOC progressive-socialist wing. And there is, today, a new militant and radical third force.

Included in its ranks are Black Lives Matter, antifa and protesters who burn Old Glory, tear down statues, monuments and memorials, assault cops, smash and loot stores and riot at will.

This is the "Abolish Ice!" and "Defund the Police!" faction of the party that detests the old America and favors open borders to alter it forever. This anarchic element is rendered moral sanction by journalists and politicians who share its malignant view of American history.

The Biden-Harris statements on the conviction of Chauvin were tailored to pander to this crowd.

Yet, in his address to Congress, Biden also made a statement that sounded like a Biden plagiarism of Trumpian nationalism:

"All the investments in the American Jobs Plan will be guided by one principle: 'Buy American.' American tax dollars are going to be used to buy

American products made in America that create American jobs."

Biden is scrambling to keep one foot in every camp in his coalition by appearing to agree, at times, with them all.

The problem: While one part of his party believes America is a good and great country deserving of loyalty and love, another believes America is racist in its soul — a land whose character is defined, as it has ever been, by white supremacy, white privilege and white rule of people of color.

How many were the victims of rogue cops or Proud Boys?

Can you lead a country about whose history you profess shame?

And how long will Americans follow leaders who appear to agree with those who hate what America was and, yes, what America is?

In 2020, Trump united the Democrats. But with Trump gone, Biden must do the uniting of his disparate party himself.

And his need to behave, at times, like a believer in the racial indictment of the America he grew up in is probably not something Joe Biden can credibly and indefinitely pull off.

60 years since 1st American in space: Tourists lining up

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — Sixty years after Alan Shepard became the first American in space, everyday people are on the verge of following in his cosmic footsteps.

Jeff Bezos' Blue Origin used Wednesday's anniversary to kick off an auction for a seat on the company's first crew spaceflight — a short Shepard-like hop launched by a rocket named New Shepard. The Texas liftoff is targeted for July 20, the date of the Apollo 11 moon landing.

Richard Branson's Virgin Galactic aims to kick off tourist flights next year, just as soon as he straps into his space-skimming, plane-launched rocketship for a test run from the New Mexico base.

And Elon Musk's SpaceX will launch a billionaire and his sweepstakes winners in September. That will be followed by a flight by three

businessmen to the International Space Station in January.

"We've always enjoyed this incredible thing called space, but we always want more people to be able to experience it as well," NASA astronaut Shane Kimbrough said from the space station Wednesday. "So I think this is a great step in the right direction."

It's all rooted in Shepard's 15-minute flight on May 5, 1961.

Shepard was actually the second person in space — the Soviet Union launched cosmonaut Yuri Gagarin three weeks earlier, to Shepard's everlasting dismay.

The 37-year-old Mercury astronaut and Navy test pilot cut a slick sci-fi figure in his silver spacesuit as he stood in the predawn darkness at Cape Canaveral, looking up at his Redstone rocket. Impatient with all the delays, including another hold in

the countdown just minutes before launch, he famously growled into his mic: "Why don't you fix your little problem and light this candle?"

His capsule, Freedom 7, soared to an altitude of 116 miles (186 kilometers) before parachuting into the Atlantic.

Twenty days later, President John F. Kennedy committed to landing a man on the moon and returning him safely by decade's end, a promise made good in July 1969 by Apollo 11's Neil Armstrong and Buzz Aldrin.

Shepard, who died in 1998, went on to command Apollo 14 in 1971, becoming the fifth moonwalker — and lone lunar golfer.

Since Gagarin and Shepard's pioneering flights, 579 people have rocketed into space or reached its fringes, according to NASA. Nearly two-thirds are American and just over 20% Soviet or Russian. About 90% are

male and most are white, although NASA's crews have been more diverse in recent decades.

A Black community college educator from Tempe, Arizona, sees her spot on SpaceX's upcoming private flight as a symbol. Sian Proctor uses the acronym J.E.D.I. for "a just, equitable, diverse and inclusive space."

NASA wasn't always on board with space tourism, but is today.

"Our goal is one day that everyone's a space person," NASA's human spaceflight chief, Kathy Lueders said following Sunday's splashdown of a SpaceX capsule with four astronauts. "We're very excited to see it starting to take off."

Twenty years ago, NASA clashed with Russian space officials over the flight of the world's first space tourist.

The accident made a permanent impression in my memory because I just happened to be watching Good Morning America when the accident occurred! As a 1966 graduate of McLain High in Tulsa, Oklahoma, and one who lived in an orphanage, I'm here to tell you that teachers do touch the future!

I wish to share what I've discovered to be one of the key missing elements of most high schools across the nation.

As a student at McLain, which boasted a student body in excess of 1,400, I enjoyed our weekly, all school assembly that was packed with motivation.

On a Red Letter Day in my life, the crossroads in my adolescence, a senior read aloud her first place Freedom Foundation essay contest piece.

At fifteen, I was awakened inside. I knew, I promised myself, I pledged, that the next year I would win a prize on my own essay.

Teachers touch the future

Though I practiced not all year, the dream, the promise grew in my heart, ready to burst forth and bloom. Several weeks before the deadline, I awakened with a start in the middle of the night, jumped out of bed full of inspiration and insight. I wrote as fast as my fingers would fly and I composed a piece that placed third in that contest!

Self-esteem began to grow, to mount up within my heart, to show on my face, even though I lived in an abusive orphanage. After being privileged to read my piece, I began to perform in plays upon the stage. I spoke in assemblies before the student body and found the thrill, the exhilaration of doing what I feared most, of

standing before a crowd!

I was compelled to follow the dream that was planted by inspiration and by a teacher who was wise enough to encourage us whenever and however he could, to use our talents, as speech students to participate in those weekly assemblies.

I was blessed with a teacher, Shirl White, who was not only a speech teacher, but play director as well. I was taken in a group, from state to state, to participate in forensic contests, because he counted not the cost, nor the hours consumed after school.

I was privileged to have a teacher who was in my corner, who pushed me out while I dug in my heels, to

overcome my painful childhood.

In fact I elected to take speech three years in a row simply because I sensed that speech class was the only subject on our curriculum that I would help me overcome my painful shyness.

I will always believe that God placed Shirl White in my path to lead me to a new day!

I'm thankful to have grown up in an era when all school weekly assemblies weren't a chore. I wonder if I would have ever gotten the idea to write had it not been for the inspiration I received just hearing the Freedom Foundation Essay winner read her piece aloud!

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STRANGER FROM A STRANGE LAND

I got a new phone and a new phone number to go along with it. We're here to stay after a half decade plus and it's time we made the move from the 816 (the Kansas City area code) to the 318.

In 1844, painter turned inventor Samuel Morse first words upon trying out his new and improved telegraph quoted the biblical book of Numbers. He tapped out, "What hath God wrought?" The message traveled from Washington, D.C. to Baltimore.

In 1876, Alexander Graham Bell test drove his telephone and uttered to his assistant the less lofty, "Mr. Watson. Come here. I want to see you." This between separate rooms in Boston.

My first words on the new phone were my standard phone greeting, "Dirk here." I pay homage to William Shatner every time I flip open my communicator. My stepdaughter Lindsay called me and made a crude reference to the virginity of my new accessory.

Like many new toys, the technology is more difficult to manipulate. Texting and accessing the calendar are more laden with steps and effort. But the sound quality is vastly improved. I could not only hear Lindsay clearly but also her husband Morgan talking in the background. Aural quality should be the benchmark of any telephone. Yet these days they're used more for texting, social media, and watching videos. This is not what Alexander Graham Bell intended. It wasn't a university degree in communications but rather the advent of social media that helped me finally

understand communication theorist Marshall McLuhan's famous statement, "The medium is the message."

The old flip phone would have hit ten years this summer, a Methuselah milestone for modern technology. I carried it in my left pocket, the side struck during my August motorcycle mishap. The truck clipped me hard enough to break my lower left leg and ten ribs yet my thigh and femur were spared. I hoped the flip phone too. Sadly, I noticed in recent months it just wasn't holding a charge as long as it once could. It often didn't last a day. I wasn't surfing the web and draining the battery. It had no internet powers. I want to be accessible. I need a phone willing to work a full day.

I figured I would have to acquiesce to Apple dominance and invest in an iPhone. The things seem too large to reside comfortably in a pocket. I understand they have payments like a house or a car. When I was a kid, my parents never had to replace our telephone. The same rotary dial black workhorse stayed mounted on the kitchen wall for decades. It worked flawlessly although in the early years we had a party line with the Duttons down the street and overhead their conversations. That mighty old phone never discriminated against my Fred Flintstone fat fingers as an iPhone does.

My new flip phone model is slightly larger than its predecessor. No where near the size of an iPhone however. If a circle instead of a rectangle,

the iPhone's the size of a coffee saucer. A purse would accommodate it but I don't own a purse. I dropped my new flip phone twice within a week. The hinge straps on the old cellphone rubber cover split apart long ago. Time for a new cover to protect the new phone.

I visited the Homer Road AT&T store waving my cane and flip phone and immediately set off their curmudgeon alarm. They wouldn't help and referred me to Amazon to order olden supplies. I kind of understood their lack of interest in a guy lacking hip accessories, but my wife actually has a new modern iPhone she couldn't sync up with her van. The AT&T clerks proved no more help to her than me and returned to pecking away on their phones. Lisa went across the street to the Brown car dealership. They restored her car calling capabilities in minutes.

She ordered me a phone cover on her phone. Flip phones lack advantages of commerce offered by the iPhone. The thing arrived within a week plus an extra plug-in charger. I'm back in business.

When I graduated college in 1984 and was out on my own, I saw no reason to rush into buying a telephone. It struck me as a hasty purchase. I went a year without one and felt no sense of deprivation. Soon cordless phones were all the rage. They sat charging in their plastic cradle. You could pick them up and walk around the house in conversation. No cords to tangle as we currently

employ in the pharmacy.

My first cellphone had that snake game on it. I then went a few years without a cellphone which shocked people as much as my year with no telephone at all. The oft quoted funny rebuttal to those concerned about my phoneless state quipped by stepdaughter Amanda was "Well who'd call him?" It's funnier when you read it in her accent at her decibels.

Perhaps the saddest innovation of phone technology is being e-mailed an AT&T video explaining my bill. That's not enticing viewing. During my days in corporate video production, we were expected to extol the benefits of video over print presentations. A paper invoice is more succinct than a ridiculous video. I've worked on plenty of bad videos but couldn't recall any less compelling than this.

I'm not nostalgic for the days when video production tools were in the hands of an elite few. It's better everyone can edit shows and make elaborate graphics from the palm of their hand. But the flood of artistic expression means consumption in the extreme. It's simpler to watch a show than read a book, even if production values are shabby. It reminds me of the onset of computer graphics that made everyone a layout design artist.

The old flip phone sleeps on a closet shelf. The decade archive of photos is trapped in its circuitry. As long as the charger works, I can still view their tiny poor resolution and revisit my last five years in Missouri and first five in Louisiana. Funny baby videos of

the grandkids. The Louisiana triplets eating in their three seated table. Harleigh tormenting her brother Mason by removing his pacifier. Inconsolable Kansas City infant Finn screaming like a wounded animal. We now share a laugh about his baby temper. Today he's a super smart six-year-old with ways of articulation and eloquence amazing and surprising.

The triplets lost a great-grandparent in recent weeks. When one told me, it was news to another over-hearing. I asked how one knew and one did not. Turns out one checked social media that morning. Something about the conversation saddened me.

Phones are a necessary aggravation. Portability is a great tool in the field when you've an emergency. But overall, I'd say the days of old are preferable when a phone, like a toaster or a rake, was there when needed but not obsessed over constantly. Kids are fascinated by others phones. Adults inquire which upgrade you currently wield. I can stop mid-sentence conversing with someone enthralled during scrolling and rarely do they look up. When sitting in a room full of people playing with phones and no one looking at each other, I might unholster my flip phone to see what all the fuss is about. I imagine it shrugs back at me.

Hall of Fame creating behavioral health program for players

The Pro Football Hall of Fame is forming a behavioral health program seeking solutions to mental and behavioral issues for current and former athletes and their families.

The program, announced Thursday in Canton, Ohio, is supported by such hall members as Ronnie Lott, Brian Dawkins, Steve Atwater, Andre Reed and Tim Brown; current players Adrian Peterson and Calais Campbell; and David Baker, president of the Hall of Fame.

“We have to end the stigma surrounding mental health, and that includes athletes,” Dawkins said. “It’s OK to ask for help and to reach out if you are hav-

ing issues. It’s OK not to be OK. But it’s not OK to stay that way — because our silence is killing us and damaging our families.”

Hall of Fame Behavioral Health will offer a concierge call center and crisis line to match treatment and counseling services with an accredited network of providers nationwide. Providers are trained to handle issues such as post-career transition, identity, addiction, performance anxiety, mindfulness, and the culture of sports. Such services will complement existing programs and assistance available to players through the NFL and NFLPA.

“The Pro Football Hall of Fame has always been about protecting the most important part of the game of football: the players,” Baker said.

Pelicans rule out Ingram vs. 76ers with sprained left ankle

game.

New Orleans plays its next five games on the road before finishing the season at home against the defending champion Los Angeles Lakers.

Collen takes over for Mulkey at Baylor

Nicki Collen knows she has taken a different and more meandering path than a lot of coaches. The latest step to becoming coach of three-time national champion Baylor happened in a hurry.

“It hasn’t been an even staircase to the top,” Collen said Wednesday. “But I have a lot of experience, I have a lot of life experience, and so I bring a different things to the table. I’m a mom, I’m a wife, I’m all those things all of the time. And I’m also at a point in my life where I’m comfortable with who I am.”

Collen was preparing for her fourth season as head coach of the WNBA’s Atlanta Dream, even leading them through practice Monday before being

named that night as the new coach for the Baylor program that Kim Mulkey built into a national power the past 21 years until returning to her home state as LSU’s coach. The Lady Bears were national champs in 2005, 2012 and 2019, and won the Big 12 regular-season title each of the past 11 seasons.

“I’m not trying to be somebody I’m not, and I’m not going to try to be Kim Mulkey,” Collen said before her formal introduction on the campus in Waco, Texas. “I’m just going to be me. And I’m not saying that makes it easy. I’m not saying that’s necessarily the right formula, but it’s my right formula.”

She told the crowd at the Ferrell Center she was going to be “authentically

me,” and understood why a few days earlier they didn’t even know her name while Mulkey’s name is still synonymous with Lady Bears basketball.

“The expectations haven’t changed,” Collen said. “Maybe how we do it has changed, but the expectations haven’t changed.”

Collen got emotional explaining how she signed her Baylor contract on Monday, the birthday of her late sister who passed away seven years ago after a short bout with cancer. She also told of speaking by phone Sunday night with coach Scott Drew, whose team last month won Baylor’s first men’s basketball national championship, and who ended their conversation with a prayer.

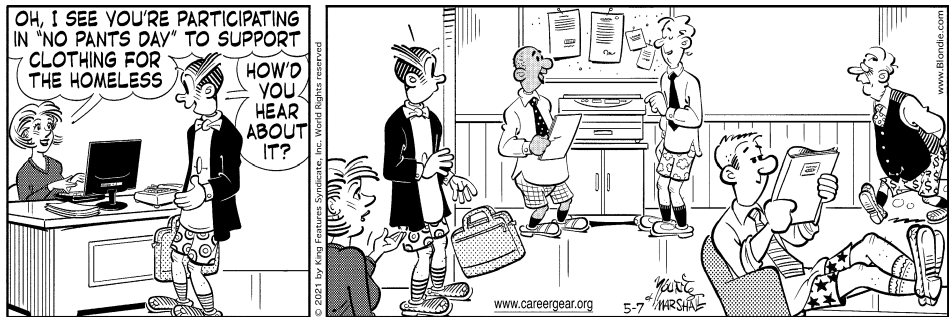

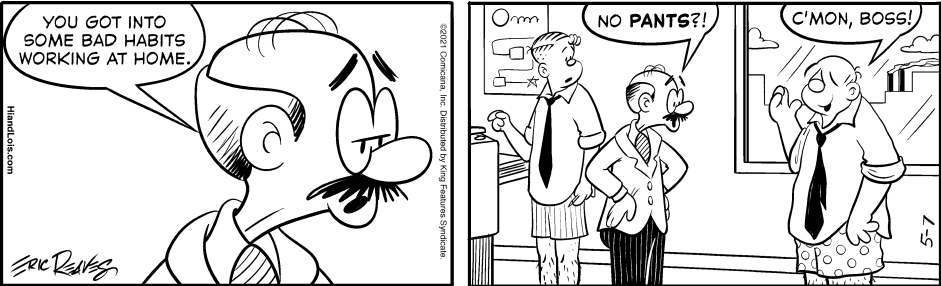

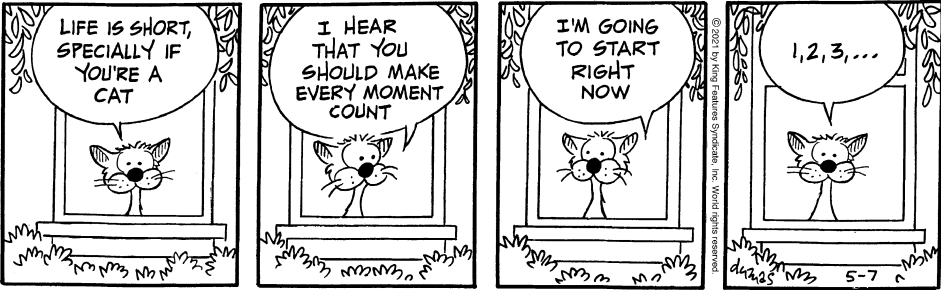
