

Crimson Tide falls in season opener

Minden High School was at high tide for the start and finish of Friday night's football season opener at W.W. Williams Field.

Unfortunately, the Crimson Tide ran low in between, with "the little things" turning costly as Parkway took a 45-14 win over Minden.

Minden lit up the scoreboard first as Daylen Robinson's six yard scoring scamper at the 6:20 mark of the opening stanza and a 6-0 lead after the extra point attempt was blocked.

But it only took the Panthers 14 seconds to answer as Parkway quarterback Cannon Link hit Ed Moses in stride for a 72-yard scoring strike that put PHS on top 8-6 following a twopoint conversion run by CJ Dudley.

Parkway was unsuccessful on an onsides kick try immediately after, setting Minden up with solid field position at its own 48-yard line.

penalties But two bogged down the Tide as they were flagged for 15 yards and forced to punt after four plays.

And again Parkway struck quickly, driving 61 yards on five plays with Rontavious Richmond juking and dancing his way to paydirt on a seven-yard touchdown that pushed the Panthers' advantage to 14-6 after the PAT failed.

Minden drove inside the Parkway 30 early in the second quarter, but again a pair of penalties bogged down the Tide and forced a punt from their own 45yard line.

This time it took the Panthers three plays to score as Jaylen White ran

right and raced 65 yards untouched for a score that put Parkway on top 21-6 with 6:52 remaining in the first half.

Minden had another scoring opportunity late in the opening half as the Tide drove down to the Panthers' 15-yard line before a Major Cooper pass was picked off at the 6-yard line to give the ball back to PHS with 1:02.

That was more than enough time for Parkway as White slashed right and outraced everyone down the right sideline on a 82-yard scoring run with seven seconds left on the clock to put the Panthers up 28-6 at halftime.

After the game Minden head coach Spencer Heard admitted that five turnovers and eight penalties for 81 yards were too much to overcome.

"Some of the penalties occurred in bad situations," Heard said. "We had the ball in the first half where we were close to or in the red zone and penalties backed us up out of there and took some of those opportunities away. I think that was a big part of it.

"We've got to tackle better, squeeze better on the defensive line — there's a lot of things we have to do better. We just have to get ready to come to work yards. Monday, move on and get better on to the next game."

A 6:16 drive by Parkway to open the second half sealed Minden's fate as a 24-yard field goal put the Panthers up 31-6.

The Crimson Tide drove to the Parkway 30 early in the fourth quarter before a pass bounced off a receivers' hands into the hands 10:25 remaining.

Minden finally scored again with 2:15 remaining as Robinson scampered to paydirt on a two-yard run and followed with the two-point conversion run to account for all 14 of the Crimson Tide's points on the night.

Robinson finished the night with 99 rushing

Glenbrook begins LHSAA play with big win

Glenbrook lit up the scoreboard for 45 firsthalf points Friday night as the Apaches opened the season with a 59-28 home win over River Oaks to record their first official Louisiana High School Athletics Association victory.

The Apaches jumped out early, with DJ Carter scoring on an eight-yard touchdown run before recovering an onsides kick. Quarterback Ty Feaster then fired a 44-yard scoring strike to Cason Clemons to put the Apaches up 14-0.

A 42-yard punt return by Madox Mandino accounted for Glenbrook's third score before Feaster hit Turner McClelland on a 50-yard scoring strike.

Madino later scored again on a 44-yard screen pass from Landry Powell. Not to be outdone, Glenbrook's defense got in on the scoring action late in the first half as Garret Brown turned in a pick six as he intercepted a River Oaks pass and raced it back 63 yards to paydirt.

"It was nice to start that fast," said Apaches head coach David Feaster. "River Oaks is down a little bit. They're numbers are down. They don't have the speed they're used to having. For years Glenbrook has been playing against those guys. They have a great football program. They've won some championships state over there in the MAIS. The fact we were able to get up on them early and easily beat them was really nice."

Ty Feaster threw for 179 yards and three touchdowns on 9-of-12 passing while adding two carries for 22 yards.

Rhett Johnson led the Apaches with 39 rushing yards on four carries while Carter added 24 yards on four rushes.

Powell added another 20 yards on the ground on two carries with one rushing touchdown.

SIBLEY — The Warriors' engine was clicking on all cylinders Friday night as Lakeside opened the 2021 prep football season with a dominating 39-0 home win over Magnolia School of Excellence.

Lakeside's scoring came on five touchdowns and a safety.

"Magnolia has some talent but had some injuries out there and had a rough night," said Warriors coach Mike Santelices. "I've been on that side of an outcome. I've been there before where you suffer injuries and it's a tough ordeal. I really kind of hated to see it."

Senior running back Ashton Stewart played a big role for Lakeside, powering his way for three touchdowns on 88 yards rushing.

He provided the Warriors' first score on a oneyard dive at the 9:29 mark of the opening stanza.

"Ashton's a thumper but has some speed, too," Santelices said. "He's a solid receiver also. He's a good little running back and definitely deceptive in the open field. I wish he was a freshman."

Lakeside pushed the lead to 13-0 at the 2:31 of the first quarter as quarterback Jacob Whitehead threw a screen pass to Cade Boley, who did the rest for a 19-yard scoring strike.

The Warriors pushed their advantage to 19-0 with 11:39 remaining in the first half as Stewart bulled his way to paydirt again, this time from six yards out.

Lakeside's defense provided a quick turnaround score as defensive lineman tipped a pass into the air and picked it off. Two plays later Whitehead tossed a screen pass to receiver Tarrio Grigsby, who was coming out of the backfield, for a four-yard scoring strike at the 9:39 mark of the second quarter.

SPRINGHILL — North Webster scored on its first possession and never looked back Friday night as the Knights rolled past Haynesville by a score of 34-7. JaMarcus Stephens, who finished with three touchdowns and a pair of two-point conversions, scored two plays into the Knights' first possession on a one-yard plunge. He also played a big role from his linebacking position on a defense that didn't allow Haynesville to score until there were under four minutes remaining in the contest.

North Webster quarterback Colin McKenzie added a one-yard scoring scamper while also tossing a touchdown pass to Seth Dehart for the Knights' final score on the night.

"Our kids executed what we had planned," said North Webster coach John Ware. "They executed and really played hard. We really dominated up front on both sides of the ball and that was the key to the game to be honest.
