Stinson takes the seat

Doug Stinson wins race for 26th Judicial District Court judge

Saturday March 26 was Election Day across Bossier and Webster Parishes. At stake was an open seat on the 26th Judicial District court bench (which serves Bossier and Webster Parishes), one property tax millage renewal proposition in Bossier Parish and two property tax millage renewal propositions in Webster Parish.

The race for 26 Judicial District Court judgeship was won by Doug Stinson with 63 percent (6,317 votes) in Bossier Parish and 57 percent (2,081 votes) in Webster Parish. His opponent, Allie Aiello Stahl, had 37 percent (3,708 votes) in Boss-

ier Parish and 43 percent (1,570 votes) in Webster Parish. Voter turnout for this race was 13.4 percent in Bossier Parish and 15.3 percent in Webster Parish. Early voting for this race took place March 12 through March 19.

The vacancy on the 26th Judicial District Court bench for which today's election was held was created when Judge Charles Jacobs resigned last July in order to become the new city attorney for the City of Bossier City serving under the administration of newly elected Mayor Tommy Chandler who took office on July 1, 2021.

Born August 24, 1927, in Choudrant, Louisiana to Leon and Jessie Ford, Mack had 5 other siblings whom he outlived. He graduated from Choudrant High School and soon thereafter joined the United States Navy. After his Navy hitch was done, he joined the United States Air Force, proudly serving his country for the second time. Mack met his wife to be after this and they married in 1947 during a "blizzard" in North Louisiana. They were the first to buy land on Drew Lane when there was yet no street there, for they wanted Minden to be their home.

Through the years Mack served his church as a deacon and Youth Group leader. He loved to meet new people and talk to people. His love for Jesus always carried through his conversations he had with them. As a witness he started making "Jesus Plaques" out of wood to give away. The little plaques are in most states and in many places around the world now. The "Good News" section of the newspaper would carry his articles he wrote each week.

Mack was famous for his grilled chicken. He had a secret basting sauce. Also known for his golfing as well, he would say, smiling, "The younger guys fight over me to be their partner." He loved golf and made 2 hole-in-ones before he quit because of back trouble.

Preceding Mack in death was his beautiful wife, Dorothy Ann Ford, his parents, 3 sisters, and 2 brothers.

He is survived by his daughter, Paula Morgan Ford and grandson Tim E. Morgan both of Minden and numerous nieces and nephews, all of whom he loved in a special way.

The funeral service is Wednesday, March 30, 2022, at 1:00 p.m. at Rose-Neath Funeral Home Chapel in Minden, Louisiana with Pastor Keith Mariott of the Minden Presbyterian Church officiating. Hydrate and Heal celebrates Grand Opening

Hydrate and Heal, one of the latest businesses to open in Minden, had their grand opening this past Saturday. Owned by Haley Swilley, Hydrate and Heal is an IV vitamin infusion and injection lounge which means they offer a selection of vitamin/mineral "cocktails" delivered through an intravenous injection.

"Everything we have is strictly vitamins," Haley said. "A multivitamin has all this, but a pill has to go [through your digestive system], and you only absorb maybe 30% of it, but if you put it straight into the bloodstream, you absorb 90-95% of it. So it's better for you, it kicks in faster, plus you're getting the hydration because you're getting fluids with it."

The infusion lounge engages a medical doctor as its medical director. Clients fill out a history and physical questionnaire, and then Haley, who is a registered nurse, completes an assessment. If there are no medical issues, the client can choose which infusion they want. Otherwise, the doctor may make recommendations.

People enjoy this service for many reasons. Some just want an increase in energy, some are trying to speed their recovery from illness, some use it as part of a weight management plan, and some people just need it to help them get over a hangover quickly.

"I've been researching this for years—probably

five or six years—wanting to do it, but it's always in bigger cities," Haley said. She's spoken to many people who love receiving this type of service. "They told me how much they loved it, but hated the drive. So I thought, let's do it here in Minden and save people that trip."

Not only has she made the trip shorter, she's willing to cut it out entirely by adding a mobile service. Haley will come to your work or home to administer an IV or B12 injection, so you don't have to take time out of your own day to do it. She also keeps regular business hours.

both candidates stated their reasons for seeking the open seat on the 26th Judicial District Court bench. Doug Stinson stated his desire to continue to serve the public in a different capacity as judge and how he wants to make a positive difference for our community as a judge as being his reasons for becoming a candidate in this race. Stinson is an attorney from Benton. He has a private legal practice, he currently serves as the attorney for the Town of Benton and he has served as an Assistant District Attorney for Bossier and Webster Parishes since 2012. He comes from a long line of public servants and his father, Ford Stinson, Jr., also served as a 26th Judicial District Court judge from 1996-2014.

Allie Aiello Stahl mentioned her 10 years of service to the citizens of Bossier and Webster Parishes as a prosecutor and her passion for always wanting to help innocent victims of crime, particularly families and young children as being her reasons for entering the race for the 26th Judicial District Court open seat. Stahl is an attorney from Bossier City. She has a private legal practice and she has served as an Assistant District Attorney for Bossier and Webster Parishes for the last 10 years. Her husband, Christopher, is also an at-

torney in Bossier City.

Bossier Press-Tribune Managing Editor, Stacey Tinsley, caught up with both candidates at their individual campaign watch events on Saturday night in Bossier City. Stahl held her campaign watch event at BeauxJax in Bossier City's EastBank District. In conceding the race, she said, "Thank you all for being here tonight, I really appreciate your support. As for the results, they are not what we had hoped for. But, I'm still so thankful for everybody that is here tonight. I'm so proud of the campaign that we have run. I'm very thankful for everybody that has supported me. I have a fabulous team and I am proud of the message that we put out there."

Stinson held his campaign watch event at DavTac Guns and Ammo on Swan Lake Road in Bossier City. He said, "Thank you for all of the support that I had, especially law enforcement. The fact that law enforcement was willing to get behind me, meant a lot to me. My family and friends have been incredible. It has been pretty amazing seeing everybody rally around me."

In his March 9, 2022 Bossier Press-Tribune candidate profile, Stinson stated his priorities (if elected) will be to continue what he has done for his entire career - work hard, be prepared for court every day, always be fair, be tough on crime,

protect victims' rights, try to be as efficient as possible, and maintain the integrity of our judicial system. He also said that fairness and equal justice under the law are the most important aspects of our judicial system, which he intends to uphold. And, he stated that he intends to continue to support law enforcement and how fortunate we are to have such great law enforcement in our district.

The Minden Press-Herald will follow-up in the days ahead with additional reports as Stinson prepares to be sworn in as judge.

Also on Saturday's ballot were Fire Protection District property tax renewal propositions for Bossier and Webster Parishes. In Bossier Parish, there was a 10 year 24.85 Mills property tax renewal for Northeast Bossier Parish Fire Protection District No. 5. This property tax renewal passed by a margin of 72 percent (133 votes) to 28 percent (53 votes) with an unofficial voter turnout of 18.2 percent.

In Webster Parish, a 10 year 10 Mills property tax renewal proposition for the Evergreen Fire Protection District passed by a margin of 94 percent (15 votes) to 6 percent (1 vote). A 10 year 10 Mills In Lieu property tax proposition for Springhill Fire Protection District No. 11 passed by a margin of 62 percent (144 votes) to 38 percent (90 votes).

Distracted driving bill resurfaces in Louisiana House

(The Center Square) – Members of the Louisiana House Transportation, Highways and Public Works Committee have approved a bill to outlaw hand-held cell phones while driving, a measure experts said has reduced distracted driving in neighboring states.

The committee voted unanimously Tuesday to approve House Bill 376, sponsored by Rep. Mike Huval, R-Breaux Bridge, to prohibit the use of cell phones while driving, with certain exceptions.

The same bill was approved by the House but fell short in the Senate during the last legislative session.

“This bill is not to keep people from using a phone when driving a vehicle. The last thing I want is to keep a young child from not being able to use a phone to call their mom or dad ... or a mother who needs to call for an emergency,” Huval said.

“This is not what this bill is about. It’s trying to promote safe driving, this is all this is for.”

Provisions in the bill allow for community ser-

vice, rather than a fine, for violations, and exceptions for police, firefighters and EMS workers. There’s also exceptions for reporting emergencies and crimes, life-and-death situations, and communications devices such as CB radios that are attached to a vehicle.

“We’re not doing this to give tickets. We’re not doing this to raise money,” Huval said. “If you happen to want to pay for it instead of your community service, of course, you can pay for it.”

Fines included in HB 376 range from \$50 for a first offense up to \$300 for a third offense.

“If the operator of a motor vehicle is involved in a crash at the time of the violation, the fine shall be equal to double the amount of the standard fine imposed,” according to the bill. “The law enforcement officer investigating the crash shall indicate on the written accident report that the operator of the motor vehicle was using a wireless telecommunications device at the time of the crash.”

The bill also includes provisions requiring police who issue tickets to record the race and ethnicity of the violator, to ensure the law doesn’t result in racial profiling. That information is forwarded to the federal government for analysis, Huval told the committee.

Jennifer Smith, CEO of stopdistractions.org, an advocacy group promoting the legislation in Louisiana and other states, explained the data collection component and other aspects in the House Transportation Committee on Tuesday.

“There’s a provision in there that has data collection on police stops, so they collect the data to track the ethnicity of the driver, racial profiling data,” Smith said. “There’s also additional search protection, so police cannot search the vehicle, the drivers, any of its passengers or the phone.”

“There’s a federal grant, called the 1906 grant, that the government is really trying to promote, that they even just beefed up in the recent transportation bill,” she said. “These

grants will pay for the collection and analysis of that data, but will also now pay for public education, outreach and training, so it’s a really great addition that could really help.”

Twenty-four states and the District of Columbia have similar laws, and data from other states shows they are effective, Smith said.

“Georgia’s hands free law for distracted driving crashes the first year they had the law in effect in 2019, which was half the year, there was a 48% drop in distracted driving crashes,” she said. “And they saw about a seven to 12 percent drop since in all fatalities.”

Huval told the committee the bill calls for officers to issue warnings through the end of the year, to give residents time to acclimate to the change.

HB 376 is now on the House floor, where lawmakers voted 77-20 to approve a similar Huval-sponsored bill last session.

Durham indictments: Trump really was spied on

In the midst of the Russian invasion of Ukraine, historic inflation, record high gas prices and the inexplicable confusion some people have regarding whether men should be allowed to compete against girls in sports, it would be easy to have overlooked the report a few weeks ago of special prosecutor, John Durham. It also doesn't help that the national so-called media, once again, was slow to cover the story and did so only cursorily when it did.

What did we learn from the first installation of these startling court filings?

The crux of the filing is that an internet services company and its owner, Rodney Joffe, “exploited his access to non-public and/or proprietary Internet data” including “Internet traffic pertaining to the Executive Office of the President of the United States.” Joffe was not only monitoring internet traffic to the White House during the Trump presidency but also internet traffic to Trump Tower and President Trump's apartment on Central Park West.

I note that every time a government website is accessed the individual accessing it has to acknowledge they have the right to do so, or they will be subject to prosecution, so hacking the White House servers is certainly an indictable offense. However, what happened here is a classic insider attack because a system can never be secure from people who are authorized to access it and who are unethical or crooked. Joffe's company had the technical authorization, if not the legal authority, to access the server under the contract but

of course only for the legitimate purpose of the contract. (Joffe's scheme was to monitor Trump's servers using access to internet traffic granted to him and his company under a DOD cybersecurity contract).

In perhaps the understatement of the year, the Wall Street Journal noted that “White House communications are supposed to be secure, and the notion that any contractor—much less one with ties to a presidential campaign—could access them is alarming enough. The implication that the data was exploited for a political purpose is a scandal that requires investigation under oath.” (WSJ, 2-15-22). Will that ever happen at a time when the Deep State in D.C. holds so much power? Probably not.

Jason Chaffetz, explains the bombshell revelations contained in the Durham filings “could have profound implications on Americans' ability to trust our institutions.” The Durham filings confirm what so many Americans already suspected—that President Donald Trump was right about his opponents infiltrating his private information—including during the time he was president and in the White House—and that Hillary Clinton's campaign consistently lied to the American people about it.

We should enumerate the several astounding conclusions that can be drawn from the filings:

One, our federal government can't be trusted to protect our data. Secondly, our White House communications are not secure. (How is this even possible?). Thirdly, U.S. Intelligence Agencies like the FBI can be and have been weaponized for partisan politics. We can no longer trust our law enforcement agencies or federal courts to investigate, prosecute and try people on a non-partisan basis. The existence of a federal investigation may or may not be rooted in real evidence of criminal actions, depending on whom their subject is. Fourth, if there was any remaining doubt there is no longer that we cannot trust mainstream news outlets who buried this story. (See also the 2020 Hunter Biden laptop story which the often-dishonest media only now, in March 2022, acknowledged was a major story, one damaging to the Biden presidential campaign). Fifth, there is simply no justice—if no equal protection of the laws—if Hill-

ary Clinton and those around her are not held accountable. (Jason Chaffetz, 2-16-22, FOX).

The point here is that some very bad actors involved in the Hillary for America campaign worked together to manufacture false information to make it look like Trump was conspiring with Russia. They delivered the false information to the FBI and CIA in order to prompt an investigation which they could then have the media report on, making it look like the Trump-Russia collusion allegations had substance behind them when they clearly did not.

The conclusion is that Trump was spied on by the FBI later (through illegally obtained FISA warrants) but by Hillary's campaign initially and the entirety of the Trump-Russia allegations were made up out of whole cloth by the Hillary for America campaign, which paid handsomely for them.

These filings make painfully clear that we are at a point in American history that a presumption of falsity and untrustworthiness must be made whenever our national media or government institutions make a “statement” regarding the “news.” There is simply no reason to believe them at face value, and every reason not to.

Mark Cuban shows how the free market helps patients

Billionaire investor Mark Cuban is known for his razzle-dazzle. Not only has he backed a long string of tech, media, and cryptocurrency companies, he also owns the Dallas Mavericks basketball team and is a TV star on “Shark Tank.”

Getting into discount drugs might not have seemed like an obvious next move for Mr. Cuban. But that's exactly what he did last month, when he launched Mark Cuban Cost Plus Drugs.

The company's goal is to offer safe and affordable medicines at transparent prices. It's a noble cause, given that one in four Americans has

trouble affording their prescriptions.

Cuban has clearly observed that the inflated prices consumers pay for generic medicines are ripe for disruption. Congress should take note of his strategy.

Cost Plus offers more than 100 generic prescription medicines, many at eye-popping discounts.

Take fluoxetine, the generic equivalent of Prozac, a treatment for depression. A 30-day supply of the generic normally retails for \$21.92. You can get the same thing from Cost Plus for \$3.90.

A 30-count supply of the cancer drug imatinib sells for \$17.10, compared to a whopping \$2,502.50 at other drug stores.

The list goes on. Cost Plus requires consumers to pay for medications out of pocket and doesn't process insurance claims. But its drugs cost less than most patients would pay elsewhere even with insurance.

How are these discounts possible? Cuban isn't selling products at a loss. His company is just bypassing drug-industry middlemen and their exorbitant markups.

A new study by the Berkeley Research Group shows how steep those markups are. More than half of gross drug expenditures – the total spent on prescription medicine at the consumer end, either by patients or their health plans – goes to middlemen.

Those middlemen include insurers, hospitals, pharmacies, the government, and pharmacy benefit managers – murky go-betweens who use their buying power to extract discounts from drug makers while seldom passing the savings to consumers.

The study found that the share of drug spending going to middlemen is rising. From 2013 to 2020, their portion of the intake from drug spending rose from 37% to 51%.

In other words, middlemen have been taking in more and more – with zero benefit to consumers.

Cuban deserves credit for creating a business model that not only saves consumers money on their medi-

cine but shows the extent to which middlemen have been ripping off patients.

For years now, Congress has debated how to rein in the predatory practices of pharmacy benefit managers, with proposed bills that would require greater transparency. But the private sector is now leading the way. Cuban's company could serve as a model and first step for fixing the price-inflated status quo.

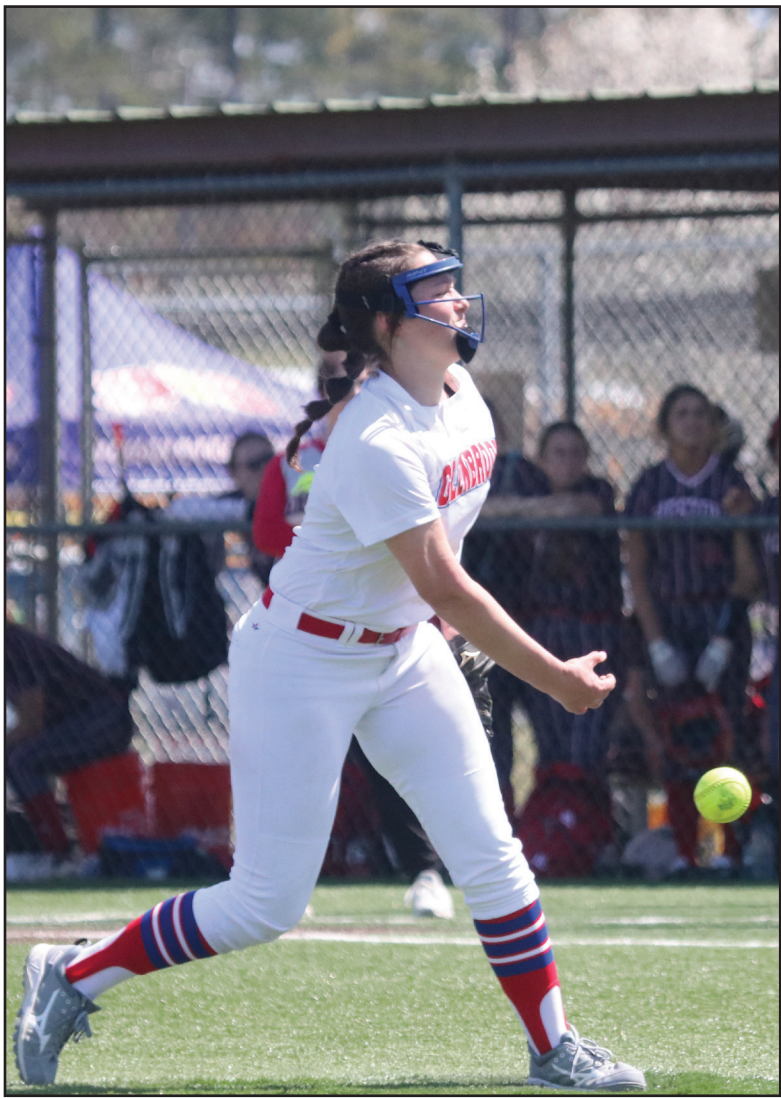

Kylie Ryan took the loss for Minden against Sterlington despite giving up only one earned run on five hits while striking out five Lady Panthers.

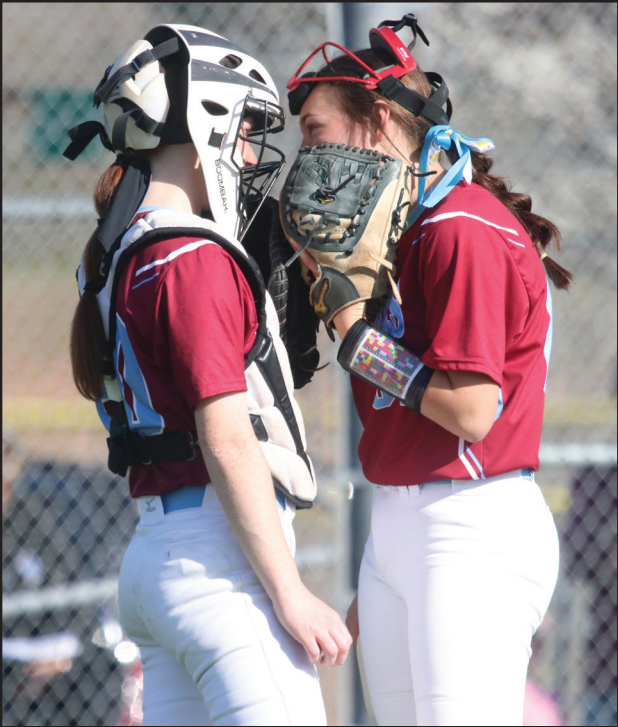

the bottom of the third.

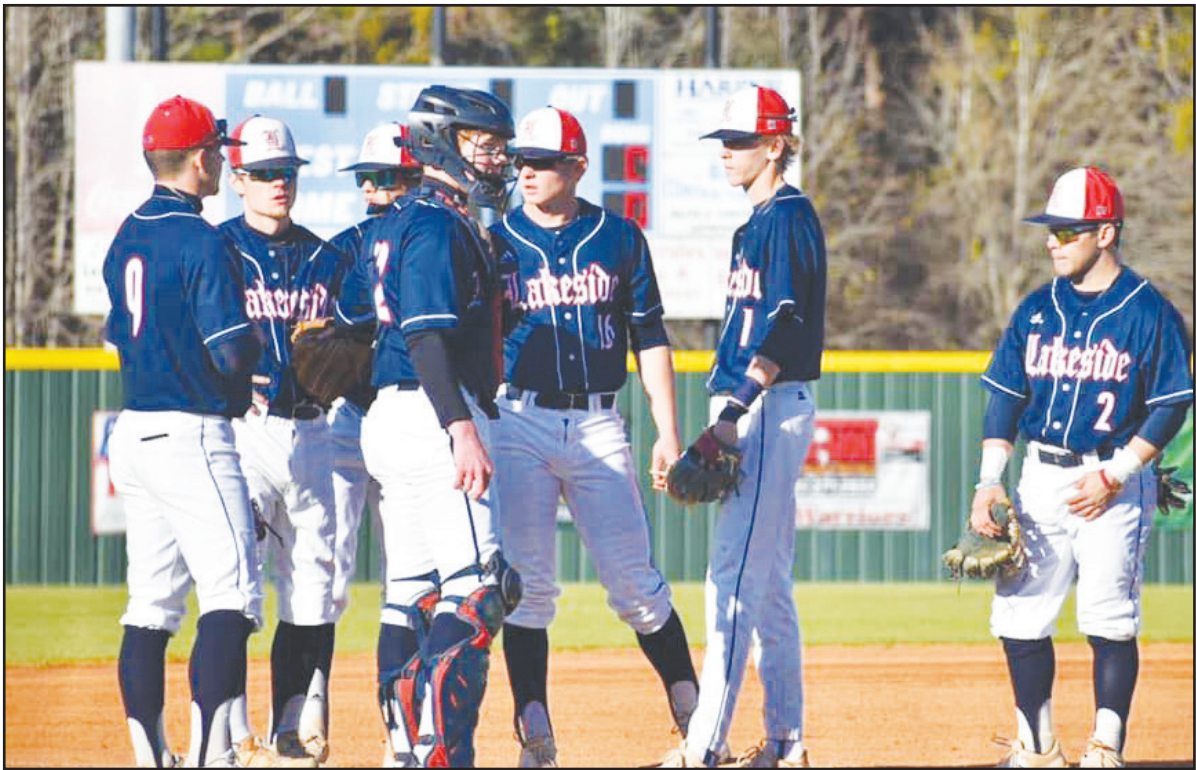

Ides of March bring turkey scouting

It's late March, the jonquils are blooming and I saw dogwoods beginning to timidly show the blossoms that will soon decorate the woods with a snowy white.

Our calendars just reminded us of the arrival of spring this past Sunday. Although my azaleas took a bit of a hit with the early March surprise snow event accompanied by temperatures in the 20s, other flowering plants, such as forsythia, flowering quince and Lady Banks roses are already making a flowery showing around the area.

As I sit this morning at my computer, something else is going on that provides affirmation of the change in the seasons. I'm hoping a lightning bolt doesn't zap our power and what I am writing so if you're able to read this, you'll know we made it through a powerful late March storm. Thunder, lightning and heavy downpours seem to be the ticket this morning letting me know that, yes, spring is here and with it comes spring storms.

I was reminded of two serious weather events that have taken place over the past few decades, spring floods that had an effect, if not directly on me, but did on family members.

In 1991, all we could do was stand by and watch as Lake D'Arbonne gobbled up scores of lakeside homes, including that of my in-laws. After the rain stopped, I was able to take my boat and paddle up to their house, look through the window at furniture floating in the five feet of water that swallowed their home. Thankfully, the in-laws had evacuated but

their house was beyond repair and had to be rebuilt.

Then in 2016, another family member took a hit when flood waters caused Black/Clear Lake to rage wildly. My sister and her family live on a hill next to the lake and saw flood waters slowly creep up the hill, stopping within inches of entering their home.

I remember talking to someone knowledgeable about the effect the 2016 flood would have on our freshwater fishery.

I visited with Mike Wood, retired head of freshwater fisheries for the Louisiana

Department of Wildlife and Fisheries, and asked him if he thought the high water levels would kill that year's spawn.

"The main effect of all this extra water will likely be a positive one," Wood said. "Fish are used to water; that's where they live. The high water is not nearly as big a problem for fish as it is for fishermen.

"It's tragic that so many people have had their homes and camps inundated by flood waters but a springtime flood can be a bonanza to the fishery," he added.

"Nobody wants fish to be swimming around on their flooded patio but where there is gravel and hard ground and the water stays up for a week or so, we could conceivably have what we call a 'super spawn.' If so, you'll see the positive effects a couple of years down the road."

Wood said that not only does high water sometimes trigger an impressive spawn, water that is covering new ground flushes out insects — bugs, worms, spiders et al — that are inaccessible to fish under normal circumstances.

"The fish take advantage of this new food source and can really fatten up during times of high water," Wood said.

Since a number of area lakes were affected by the floods, we wondered of Wood if he had a favorite lake to fish during times like we're experiencing.

"Lake D'Arbonne, hands down," he said. "There are thousands of big old slab crappie just ready to move shallow to spawn. Another lake that is a good one is Poverty Point; this lake has been producing lots of three pound fish, but it's a little crowded because the best fishing areas are fairly small."

Hopefully, the thunder I'm listening to and the pounding rain outside my window won't create another 1991 or 2016 event and if it does, worrying about our fishery won't top the list of concerns. In the back of our minds, however, is the assurance that the bass, crappie and bream will be just fine.
