Grabbing Gridiron Glory



The Glenbrook Apaches stormed into their first academic year as a full-fledged member of the Louisiana High School Athletic Association and marched through to a 10-0 regular-season record, earning a first-round playoff bye before defeating Catholic-Point Coupee in the second round and then being edged 28-27 by OCS in the quarterfinals.

Glenbrook goes 11-1 in first full LHSAA football campaign

Not many, if anyone, saw it coming — not this fast or this strong.

As a probationary, first-year member of the Louisiana High School Athletic Association during the 2021 football season, the Apaches showed that while they were newcomers, these underdogs were more than ready to play competitive football, even it was at times against some of the better football powerhouses the LHSAA has to offer.

The Apaches went 8-2 in 2021, falling only to perennial powers Calvary Baptist and Homer, which would go on to take a state championship.

While that earned Glenbrook some attention, not many expected the Apaches to go undefeated in 2022 regular-season play, defeating Haynesville 56-17 and Homer 18-14 along the way.

That earned the Apaches what was the state's longest win streak at 18 consecutive games before being edged 28-27 by eventual Division IV Select School State Champion Ouachita Christian after Glenbrook went for a late two-point conversion and the win before being stopped by the Eagles.

The doesn't take away from a remarkable and incredibly exciting season for the Apaches, who only appear to have bigger and brighter things in their future.

But they came oh so close to playing David to Ouachita Christian's Go-



liath this season.

In fact, it was a pair of red-zone turnovers that proved to be most costly for the Apaches.

Take away those turnovers, and the game's stats were basically even. The Eagles did not convert a third-down attempt, but OCS had 11 first downs compared to Glenbrook's nine. Only 42 yards separated the two teams in total yardage.

Even the penalties were fairly even, but three takeaways by the Eagle defense — two in the red zone — ended up being the primary true determining factor.

It's been an incredible turnaround for longtime Apaches players who saw Head Coach David Feaster's Glenbrook team go 1-7 five years ago when he first took over the team.

But Feaster, who previously coached at Parkway, Minden and Leesville, continued working the magic that had made him a success with those other programs and slowly and surely guided his Apaches into become a powerhouse program that looks poised to compete for district and even state championships for years to come.

Taking the 2022 2-1A championship in a district that competes the likes of perennial powerhouses Homer and Haynesville, shows what kind of bright future can be in store for the Apaches if they just stay the course and continue fighting forward.

Glenbrook has shown it can be a Louisiana small school powerhouse, too.

But the Apaches won't be surprising anyone next season. Opponents know what Glenbrook is capable of.

But that won't stop the Apaches from returning to the field to fight for their true goal — a state championship.

2022 GLENBROOK APACHES FOOTBALL GAME-BY-GAME REVIEW

Game 1 - Glenbrook 12, Cedar Creek 6

It wasn't three yards and a cloud of dust but more like three yards and a spray of mud.

In a defensive slugfest played at boggy Apaches Stadium, turnovers played much of the difference as Glenbrook held on for a win over the Cougars on Sept. 2.

The tempo was determined early as Cedar Creek took the opening kickoff and marched down to the Glenbrook 1-yard line before turning the ball over on downs.

Then Cedar Creek stopped the Apaches, and thanks to a shanked punt, took over on the Glenbrook side of the field and drove all the way down to the Apaches' 14 before coming up two inches short on a fourth-and-one situation.

Five plays later the Cougars' Ladd Thompson intercepted a Glenbrook pass to set Cedar Creek up with first down at the Apaches' 10-yard line with 25 seconds left in the opening stanza.

The Cougars got down to the Glenbrook 1 before a double penalty — holding followed by a personal foul — backed them up the Apaches' 30. Two plays later Cedar Creek turned the ball over on downs.

And that's the way the game that looked like a heavyweight slugfest fought on a Slip-and-Slide instead of a boxing ring mat would go — as in "go the distance."

But in the end, the decision would go to Glenbrook.

Glenbrook took over at its own 31 after that Cedar Creek turnover

on downs and marched 69 yards on eight plays, with quarterback Ty Feaster taking it in on a 1-yard quarterback sneak for the score.

Cedar Creek blocked the extra point kick attempt, leaving the Apaches up 6-0 with 6:50 remaining in the first half.

The Cougars drove as far as the Glenbrook 36-yard line with a little under two minutes left in the opening half before again turning the ball over on downs as the Apaches went into the locker room leading 6-0 at the half.

Cedar Creek did make one throw that counted as quarterback Caden Middleton threw a 51-yard scoring strike to Jed Stephens with 9:47 remaining that left the game tied at 6-6 after the point after touchdown kick attempt drifted wide right.

A good kick return set Glenbrook up in solid field position, and the Apaches drove all the way to the Cedar Creek 11 before Thompson hauled in his second interception of the game to keep the Cougars alive.

Glenbrook's Maddox Mandino put the Apaches back on top on a two-yard touchdown run up the middle that gave the home team a 12-6 lead after the PAT pass attempt fell incomplete.

But on the next play from scrimmage following Glenbrook's kickoff, Mandino sealed the deal for the Apaches with an interception with 5:43 remaining.

Glenbrook then made four straight first downs before going into the victory formation in the final 1:20 to escape with the season-opening win.

Game 2 - Glenbrook 42, Bossier 14

The Apaches went into attack-mode from the start, recovering an onside kick to open the game before Ty Feaster hit Landy Powell on a scoring strike to put Glenbrook on top 7-0 on 23 seconds into the contest.

DJ Carter's touchdown run pushed

the Glenbrook lead to 14-0 at the 5:31 mark of the opening stanza and the rout was one.

Ty Feaster finished with three TD passes for the Apaches with Cason Clemmons hauling in two of those scoring strikes.

Maddox Mandino added a touchdown run for Glenbrook, which climbed to 2-0 on the season.

Game 3 - Glenbrook 56, Delta Charter 8

Glenbrook's early-season surge continued Friday night as the Apaches rolled over Delta Charter.

The Storm went for the onside kick to open the game and recovered the football, going up on top 8-0 only 1:14 into the contest.

That would be the last score for the storm on the night.

And it didn't Glenbrook long to

move on top for good as Apaches quarterback Ty Feaster hit running back DJ Carter out of the backfield on a scoring strike that put them on 8-0 midway through the first quarter.

By halftime, Glenbrook led 43-8 thanks in part to scoring scampers by Carter, Feaster and Maddox Mandino.

The Apaches went to their bench in the second half, with both Landry Powell and Ryan Reagan both spending time at quarterback.

Game 4 - Glenbrook 56, Haynesville 17

The Glenbrook Apaches football team made themselves known with a 4-0 start, and the Louisiana Sports Writers Association took notice.

Glenbrook arned its first-ever ranking in a LSWA football poll, standing in ninth place in the Class 1A ranking after earning one of the top wins in program history by blasting the Haynesville Golden Tornado 56-17 Sept. 24 at Apaches Stadium.

Defense has played a crucial role for Glenbrook early on as the Apaches have outscored opponents 166-45 for

an average win of 41.5 - 11.25.

Even better, Glenbrook's starting defense is giving up an average of only 7.0 points per game while forcing 3.25 turnovers per contest.

As has been the norm for the Apaches this season, Glenbrook jumped out to a 28-7 advantage by the end of the first quarter and led 35-7 at intermission.

Chase Sentell opened and closed the Apaches' scoring parade with their first and last touchdowns on the night.

Glenbrook will look to remain undefeated starting at 7 p.m. Friday as they play host to unbeaten Arcadia during the Apaches' Homecoming festivities.

Game 5 - Glenbrook 53, Arcadia 20

Glenbrook celebrated Homecoming 2022 in winning fashion on Sept. 30 as the Apaches defeated Arcadia 53-20 at Apaches Stadium

The Apaches struck first after a tentative start that saw both teams turn the ball over with Landry Powell putting Glenbrook on top late in the first quarter.

DJ Carter's scoring scamper with a little less than five minutes remaining in the second quarter extended the Apaches' lead to 14-0, which the Hornets cut to 14-6 at intermission with a late second-quarter score.

Touchdowns from quarterback Ty Feaster and Chase Sentell pushed the Glenbrook lead to 28-6 before a Fester field goal pushed the advantage to 31-6 early in the final stanza.

Turner McClelland and Tre Kent each added late touchdowns for the Apaches, who have now outscored opponents 219-65 on the season.

Glenbrook (5-0) is now ranked No. 9 in GeauxPrep.com's Class 1A power ratings and No. 2 behind only St. Martin Episcopal in GeauxPrep.com's Division IV select school power rankings using the format that will be used to determine the 2022 Louisiana High School Athletics Association playoff brackets.

Game 6 - Glenbrook 51, Magnolia SOE 6

It was another strong start and early finish for Glenbrook's starters as they raced past the Magnolia School of Excellence on Oct. 7.

Glenbrook picked up its first touchdown and two-point conversion only 1:40 in the contest.

The Apaches led 48-12 at the end of the first quarter and 55-20 at halftime.

Glenbrook went to its bench early, which played a big part in the reason the Mariners reached paydirt so often despite being dominated on the field.

The Apaches opened scoring on a pass from Ty Feaster to Chase Sentell followed by Jackson Waller's two-point conversion run for an early 8-0 advantage.

A Dayton Sims interception set up a Feaster to Turner McClelland scoring strike that pushed Glenbrook's lead to 15-0.

Touchdown runs by Rhett Johnson and DJ Carter pushed the Glenbrook lead to 28-6 at the 7:25 mark of the second quarter.

Before halftime McClelland and Cason Clemson had both taken snaps under center for the Apaches as head coach

David Feaster and his staff started riding the Apache go-round, shuffling players in and out so that everyone could receive solid playing time.

"A school football team with the kinds of poopulation numbers we have is always looking for more guys to play, so when we see the young guys making a offensive play, or even just on a tackle, we see that as a great thing," said Coach Feaster.

"Those kinds of reps can really us out later in the season, so it's important to get those in now. It's also important just to keep that kind of momentum building for later this season and on into the future."

Connor Williams and Toby Haulmark were two young Apaches who received carries against the Mariners — totes that could bode well for both of their Glenbrook football futures.

"I can see him being one of our mainstay running backs in the future, so him getting those kinds of carries today is important for him and for this team in the future," said Coach Feaster.

The Mariners' final touchdown and two-point conversion came with under 30 seconds against against Glenbrook third and fourth-stringers.

Game 7 - Glenbrook 48, Ringgold 8

The state’s longest win streak was pushed to 13 straight as the Apaches stormed out to a 27-0 first quarter lead en route to an Oc4. 14 win at Ringgold. By halftime Glenbrook was already playing the majority of its roster while building a 41-0 advantage at intermission.

Quarterback David Feaster connected on touchdown passes for DJ Carter,

Seth Mangrum, Toby Haulmark and Cason Clemson early on.

The player movement allowed by the big lead allowed Glenbrook to give slot back/defensive back Maddox Mandino some time under center and the senior responded by throwing a touchdown pass to Connor Williams.

Ringgold scored a pair of late touchdowns against what amounted to the Apaches’ JV team, but it was far too little, too late as Glenbrook climbed to 7-0 overall and 4-0 in District 1-1A.

Game 8 - Glenbrook 48, Plain Dealing 16

Glenbrook scored on the opening play and ever looked back as the Apaches remained undefeated Friday with a 48-16 win at Plain Dealing.

Tre Kent raced the opening kickoff back for a score that put Glenbrook up 7-0 only second into the game.

The Apaches’ scoring parade didn’t slow as Turner McClelland added a pair of touchodwns followed by a Ca-

son Clemmons scoring scamper to build a 28-0 Glenbrook advantage by the end of the opening stanza.

It was 35-0 at intermission before Glenbrook quarterback Ty Feaster’s touchdown toss to Chase Sentell pushed the Apaches lead to 42-0 mid-way through the third quarter.

Plain Dealing’s scores came near the end of the third quarter and in the fourth quarter after the Apaches had gone deep to their bench on both side of the ball.

Game 9 - Glenbrook 21, Homer 14



Glenbrook’s defense came up big in a 21-14 win over Homer that clinched the District 1-1A regular-season championship for the Apaches.

It was arguably the biggest football game in Glenbrook history, one with the District 1-1A championship at stake.

And in a hardfought showdown between state powerhouses, Glenbrook kept the state’s longest win streak alive as they held on to earn a win over on Oct. 27 at Apaches Stadium.

Glenbrook won the opening coin toss and elected to receive before Homer went for the onside kick and recovered it to try and earn opening possession for both halves.

But a solid defensive effort by the Apaches stopped the Pelicans on fourth down to take the ball back.

A long run and added penalty yardage against the Pelicans pushed Glenbrook’s drive to the Homer 30-yard line, but the Apaches could only manage to push as deep as the 17-yard line to turn the ball back over to the Pels on downs.

Homer was driving toward the Glenbrook red-zone when the Apaches’ Tre Kent picked off a pass and made a long return to regain possession for GHS at the Homer 17.

Glenbrook quarterback Ty Feaster’s touchdown run with 4:01 remaining in the first half put the Apaches on the scoreboard first with a 7-0.

But Homer quickly countered with a touchdown drive of its own, tying the game at 7-7 with 2:06 left in the first half.

Both teams were stopped on the ensuing two possessions and the score remained knotted up at 7-7 heading at intermission.

The second half ended like the first, with Glenbrook forcing a Homer punt.

Feaster then looked to his aerial

attack, directing a scoring drive with passes to DJ Carter, Turner McClelland, and Chase Sentell before Maddox Mandino’s scoring scamper pushed the Glenbrook lead to 14-7 at the 8:00 mark of the third quarter.

After forcing Homer to punt again, Glenbrook failed to connect on an attempted field goal.

The Pelicans used a long pass to set up the tying score as they knotted things up at 14-14 with 45 seconds remaining in the third stanza.

After Homer forced the Apaches to punt on the next possession, Homer took over at its own 34-yard line.

This time it was Cason Clemmons turn to play hero for the Apaches as his interception of a Homer pass returned the ball to Glenbrook, with Feaster finding Mandino on a long pass to move into the Pelicans’ red zone.

It looked Homer would get the ball back when Feaster fumbled fighting for extra yardage, but McClelland pounced on it to retain possession for Glenbrook at the HHS 15-yard line.

Feaster then fired a 15-yard scoring strike to Mandino to put the Apaches on top 21-14 with 8:24 remaining.

Glenbrook then went for a kill shot with an onside kick attempt, but the Pelicans recovered the ball at their own 42.

The Apaches held strong, forcing a Homer punt and taking back over on their own 41-yard line.

Multiple punts later Homer was forced to make a late punt, giving the Apaches possession at midfield with 1:56 remaining.

But Homer got one last chance after recovering a fumble at their own 48.

Just as they’d done all season, Glenbrook’s defense rose to the occasion, recording a sack on the game’s final play to seal the win for the Apaches.

Game 10 - Glenbrook 46, River Oaks 14

Glenbrook completed its 2022 regular season unbeaten as the Apaches took over early to defeat River Oaks 46-14 at Apaaches Stadium.

The Apaches (10-0) became one of only five unbeaten teams in Louisiana heading into the playoffs with unblemished records, joining Destrehan (10-0), De La Salle (9-0), Many (9-0) and Vermilion Catholic (10-0).

Only Destrehan and Many would go on to go undefeated on the season to earn state titles.

A long scoring scamper by DJ Carter put Glenbrook on top early while Turner McClelland and Rhett Johnson both hauled in scoring passes from Ty Feaster to help push the Apaches to their 16th straight win dating back to last season.

That first Glenbrook touchdown came at the 8:21 mark of the opening stanza with McClelland’s scoring reception coming with 1:25 left in the first quarter.

Feaster’s second scoring strikes to both Johnson and McClelland pushed the Apaches’ advantage to 34-0 at halftime.

Chase Sentell opened the second half by returning the River Oaks kickoff for a score to push Glenbrook’s lead to 40-0 only 20 seconds into third quarter.

Glenbrook head coach David Feaster then emptied his benches, with eighth-grade quarterback Ryan Regan throwing a touchdown pass to Connor Williams to push the Apaches advantage to 46-0.

After that score Glenbrook’s 11 seniors took the field at the same time before leaving together for the rest of the game as River Oaks’ final score came against Apaches’ reserves.

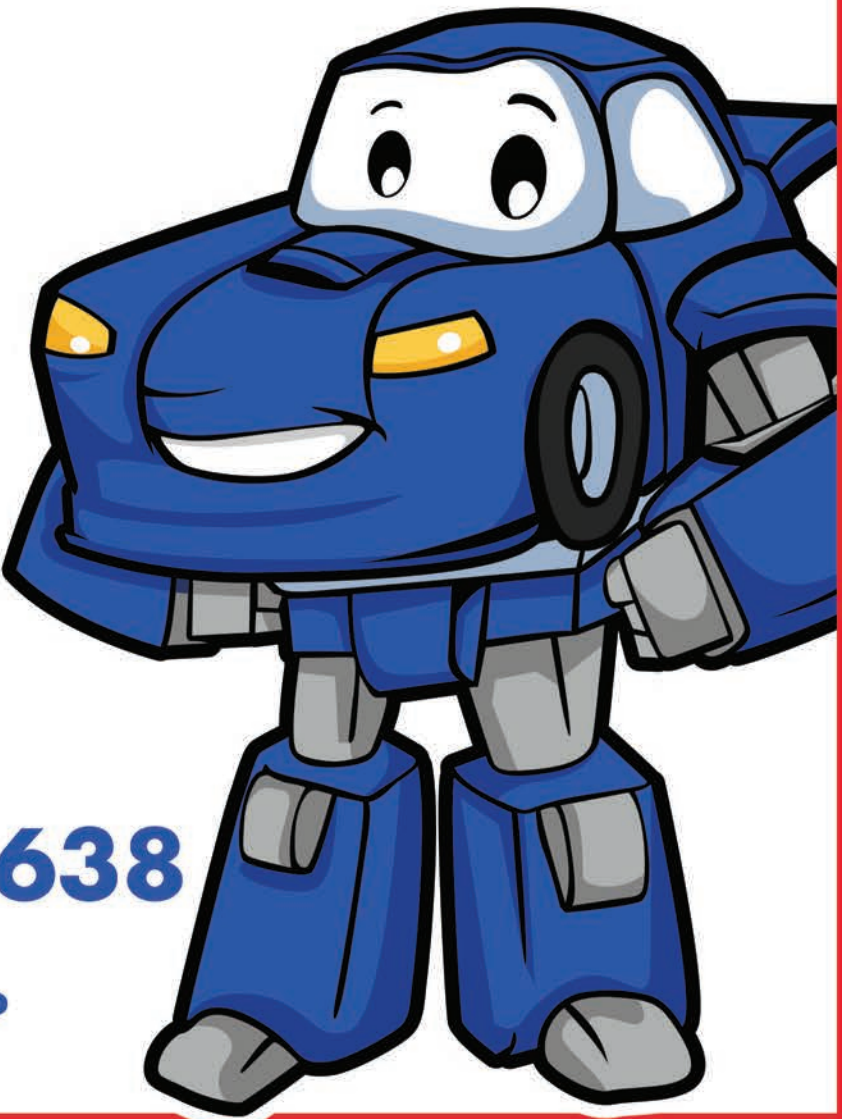

Rhett Johnson earns first-team All-State accolades

Ty Feaster, Maddox Mandino earn honorable mention among La. Class 1A players

Glenbrook senior linebacker Rhett Johnson has been named to the Louisiana Sports Writers Association's Class 1A All-State first team.

The 5-foot-9, 180-pound Johnson had 75 total tackles and 36 assists, 11 tackles for loss, one sack, two interceptions and three fumble recoveries.

He helped the Apaches go 10-0 in the regular season.

Glenbrook finished 11-1 after falling to eventual select Division IV state champion Ouachita Christian 28-27 in the quarterfinals.

Glenbrook junior quarterback Ty Feaster and senior defensive back Maddox Mandino were named Class 1A honorable mention.

Feaster rushed for 109 yards and five touchdowns while connecting on 157-of-231 passes for 2,436 yards with 37 touchdowns and only four interceptions.

Mandino, a senior, excelled both at rushing and receiving on offense and well as playing defensively from his free safety position.

He rushed for seven touchdowns on only 24 carries for 176 yards and added 11 receptions for 232 yards while totaling 54 tackles (37 solo) along with five interceptions and three pass break-ups defensively.

Feaster and Mandino teamed to make a late difference in one of the Apaches' biggest wins of the season — a 21-14 decision over Homer.

Glenbrook moved back out in front with 8:24 remaining as Feaster fired a 15-yard touchdown strike to Mandino for the game's final score to secure what was at least at that point the Apaches' biggest win of the season.

Head coach David Feaster talks about what his 12th-graders meant this past season

Glenbrook had 11 seniors who all played crucial roles in the Apaches' history-making season in 2020.

The *Minden Press-Herald* asked Apaches head coach David Feaster to talk a little about his seniors and what they mean to his football team this past season.

"He played for us as an eighth-grader," Feaster said. "He had the courage to go on the field and play, which was tough back then. We saw him grow both physically and mentally.

"When I think about DJ, I'll always remember playing Haynesville in 2021 and going for two and the win. He didn't have much blocking, but he bounced outside, ran over a guy, cut back inside and got the ball across the line to beat Haynesville 42-41.

"That was our first monumental game in the LHSAA that made everybody look at that map to try and find out where Glenbrook was."

Cason Clemons
WR/DB

"Clemons was a guy who I honestly felt was our best cornerback," Feaster said. "But we had to have him on offense, so we didn't play him that much on defense until the end.

"He was a guy we

knew we could throw it to all the time — he was a speed guy who could get open and catch the ball. He didn't mind getting hit going over the middle and overcame a very tough injury.

"But he came back his junior and senior seasons better than ever."

Hayden Harmon
FB/LB

"Harmon was another guy who was in the game as an eighth-grader," Feaster said. "He was in the game as a ninth-grader. He started every game at middle linebacker and as a 10th-grader was our leading tackler.

So he was a guy who really solidified our inside run defense, and that's a big, big part of a ballgame in Class 1A. So having him there in the interior, knowing he was going to be there making tackles, was huge for us for five years."

Toby Haulmark
TE/LB

"The first thing that comes to mind about Toby is that because he had been out of district, he had to sit out his whole junior year," Feaster said. "But he came to practice every day.

"He was there for our scout team offense and defense every day. He wasn't playing much football before he came to Glenbrook. He was a baseball player.

"But he turned himself into a really good football player and

made some big plays for us when he did get eligible his senior year."

Rhett Johnson
RB/LB

"Rhett was a guy that as soon as he came to us we knew he had the right attitude for football," Feaster said. "He loved it. He loved contact. He was injured a lot and played with injuries all the time — very tough.

"The fact he fought through all that and turned out to be the MVP for the district and an All-State linebacker is just amazing. It was a great accomplishment. He's such a smart guy, but extremely tough as well."

Tre Kent **RB/DB**

"We knew immediately Tre was going to be very athletic," Feaster said. "But he turned out to be a great cover guy, and if he wasn't so good at that he would have played a lot, lot more at running back.

"But because we had DJ Carter and Maddox Mandino running the ball and Turner McClelland and Clemons running the ball, there weren't that many balls to go around on offense.

"He could have had a lot more offensive production, too, but he was so valuable to us on defense."

Maddox Mandino
WR/RB, DB and return specialist

"Maddox was our all-around guy for four or five years," Feaster

said. "He started as an eighth-grader and had a really, really tough injury both his eighth- and his 10th-grade year that put him out for the season. But he kept coming back. He broke a leg where his foot was turned the wrong way his sophomore year but by baseball later that spring he was faster than he's ever been. It's amazing he was able to come back both times and still be as fast and as athletic and valuable to our team as he was."

Turner McClelland
WR/DB

"When Turner came to camp the first thing we noticed was that he was everybody's favorite guy," Feaster said. "We're a K-12 school and everybody has always loved having him around and he turned out to be such a great leader because everybody liked him so much and he always did what we asked him to do.

"Again, he was mainly a baseball player at his previous school but when he came to us as a sophomore we asked him if he wanted to play football and he said, 'Yeah, I guess so.' And we immediately recognized that he was going to be really good. He had great football speed and great courage. He was one of several guys we had who we called true warriors — one of those guys who always played hard and well against

really good competition, even when we weren't very good.

"He was a great receiver and made a lot of plays, including that touchdown that put us within a point of Ouachita Christian in that quarterfinals game."

Dayton Simms
WR/DB

"Dom was a guy — we called him Dom because he got his 'Dominator' nickname from the video game — who had tremendous speed," Feaster said. "He worked really hard, but ran track too and was really fast because of that.

"He was a guy that we could put in the (defensive) secondary and he could run with anybody out there, especially in Class A. He knocked down a lot of passes this year and made a couple of interceptions and made tackles.

"And Dom had a great personality that showed on the field and on the sideline. He was a great team guy."

Trey Yetman **DE**

"Trey endured a lot because he just wasn't a natural athlete — a natural football player," Feaster said. "And he didn't play any other sports. But because he showed up every day, worked hard and did what he was told, he ended up being a very valuable asset for us and started on defense most of the season.

"And even when he

wasn't playing he was a great team guy. He's never had a negative thought in his mind and was always pulling for the rest of the guys. He was a guy we knew we could count on when we needed him, so it was great to have him in the program.

"He didn't start until his senior year, so we were really pleased that he stuck things out all those years and ended up being a contributor in our biggest season."

Luke Vining
OL/DL

"Luke was with us in the seventh grade, and the eighth grade, and by ninth grade was playing a lot," Feaster said. "He was starting on the offensive line as a 10-grader and by his senior year we actually had to use him on defense, too, because he became that valuable — he just made plays.

"We knew when he took over at left tackle that spot was locked down and that he was always going to know exactly who to block and what his assignment was. And he had the physical ability to get it done, too, even though he played against some really good people sometimes.

"He was dependable — you always knew you could count on Luke and the fact we played him on both sides of the ball meant he was in shape and had the courage to play all night long no matter who he was playing against."

Apaches go down fighting for win

Glenbrook falls 28-27 in OCS in quarterfinals after failed 2-point try

MONROE — The state’s longest win streak versus a team undefeated at home after naming the field in honor of its current head coach.

Something had to give.

And in a hard-fought game of give and take between undefeated Glenbrook against top-seeded Ouachita Christian at the Eagle’s Nest, OCS escaped with a 28-27 win Friday night to move on to the Division IV Select School Semifinals.

Escaped as in “dodging and taking down a bullet” fired by the Apaches, who went for the two-point conversion and the probable win as opposed to playing for overtime after scoring the game’s final touchdown with 1:07 remaining.

And as the smoke cleared in this north Louisiana shootout, the Apaches’ win streak had been stopped at 17 while OCS remained undefeated on Steven Fitzhugh Field after playing 29 games there.

OCS led 14-0 at half-time. But the score could have easily been tied.

The Eagles led 7-0 at the end of the first quarter and stretched that advantage to 14-0 when Zach White burst through the Glenbrook defense on an eight-yard scoring scamper with 8:31 remaining in the first half.

But the Apaches had two drives that could have led to potential second quarter scores — before a pair of fumbles turned the ball back over to the Eagles at the OCS 12-yard line (at the 7:07 mark of the second quarter) after getting down

to the OCS 5) and the Ouachita Christian 3-yard line with seconds in the first half.

Glenbrook’s offense rolled again in the third quarter, but this time without turning the ball over.

Turner McClelland hauled in a six-yard touchdown pass from Ty Feaster to cut the OCS advantage to seven points with 6:54 left in the third quarter before the Apaches went for and recovered an on-sides kick to take right back over at the OCS 47.

That led to a 44-reception by McClelland helping to set up a two-yard plunge to paydirt by Maddox Mandino late in the third quarter to cut the OCS to 21-14.

Then lightning struck for the Eagles in the form of quarterback Landon Graves’ legs.

Following a third red-zone fumble — this one at the Eagles’ six-yard line, OCS quarterback Landon Graves exploded on a quarterback draw on the following play

for a 94-yard scoring scamper to extend Glenbrook’s deficit to 14 points with 7:00 remaining.

The Apaches quickly countered, with Feaster hitting Chase Sentell for a 58-yard touchdown pass with 5:50 remaining to cut the Eagles’ lead to 28-21.

After stopping an OCS drive, Glenbrook got another shot on offense as the Apaches took over on their own 36 with 2:46 remaining.

A 33-yard pass to Sentell, a five-yarder

to Rhett Johnson and a 10-yarder to Mandino set up the Apaches’ touchdown with 1:07 remaining as Feaster fired a 14-yard scoring strike on a slant to McClelland, who had to fight his way through attempted tacklers to get into the end zone.

That’s when Glenbrook tried the two-point conversion run for the hopeful win, only to see it fall inches short.

The Apaches finished with 408 yards of offense while holding OCS to 276.

Feaster, a senior, led that offense with a 27-of-43 passing performance for 381 yards with three touchdowns and one interception.

McClelland hauled in a team-high eight receptions for 101 yards for Glenbrook while Sentell added six catches for a team-best 117 yards and his score.

Glenbrook ended its historic first season as a fully-recognized member of the Louisiana High School Athletic Association with a record of 12-1.

Greatness continues for Glenbrook

Apaches take down Catholic-Pointe Coupee, 42-21

The undefeated Glenbrook Apaches had become accustomed to building early big leads and cruising to wins during the regular season.

That didn’t happen Friday night for the sixth-seeded Apaches, who played host to Catholic-Pointe Coupee in second-round action of the Louisiana High School Athletic Association Division IV Select School playoffs.

This time the Apaches (11-0) had to play the role of a heavyweight boxer, slowly chopping at Catholic-PC with body shots and sharp jabs to wear down the Hornets en route to a 42-21 over the Hornets.

In fact, the Hornets scored first with a six-yard touchdown run at the 1:52 mark of the opening stanza and sent the game into halftime tied at 14-14 after Hayden Elliot hit paydirt for a second time on a four-yard run with 1:08 remaining before intermission.

But Glenbrook moved on top 21-14 only 1:19 into the second half on a 32-yard scoring strike from Ty Feaster to Turner McClelland, and the Apaches outscored the Hornets 21-7 in the final stanza to secure the win.

Glenbrook head coach David Feaster said he couldn’t have imagined it working out much better.

“Second round of the playoffs against a 10-1 team ... we knew it would be tough,” Feaster said. “We’re just happy that by the time we got to the fourth quarter, it wasn’t that tough.”

Glenbrook built large early leads in multiple games this season, allowing them to empty their benches in the second halves of their games and give younger, inexperienced Apaches much-needed, and Feaster said

that paid off against Catholic-PC.

“For a school with only 60 boys it’s been amazing how we’ve been able to play more boys than some of these programs with kids that have been playing a long time,” Feaster said. “But (Catholic-PC) did play a lot of players who went both ways and I think they did eventually start wearing down.

“But then I think we made some adjustments on both offense and defense that we had some success with and helped us move out ahead. And once that happened — their style is not to come from behind. Their style is to pound the ball in there and chew up the clock, and that didn’t work well for them after we got up by 14, so that’s how we got away from them in the second half.”

Senior tailback DJ Carter had a big night for the Apaches, averaging 15.5 runs per carry, including a 12-yard scoring scamper.

Carter finished with 186 yards on only 12 carries, which was just the kind of numbers Feaster wanted to see.

“He played a lot of tailback for us as an eighth-grader and has started from the ninth grade on up,” Feaster said about Carter. “I was looking at our season stats during the week, and it kind of went the way I wanted. DJ only had about 400 yards rushing heading into this game and the rest of our running backs less than that.”

“So we spread the ball around. The idea is, we wanted DJ and the rest of the guys to be really fresh by the time we got to this point of the season. Even though he could have run the ball a whole lot more during the year and have gained a whole lot more yards, he might have had ankle sprains or thigh bruises — the kinds of nagging injuries he’s

sometimes had to battle in past seasons. Not to mention just tired legs. So the fact we were able to spread the ball the season and still end up where we were was a great thing because tonight we needed him to go and he did.”

In fact, Feaster was prepared to use Carter more but was pleased he didn’t have to with Ouachita Christian looming next week in the third round of the playoffs..

“The way things went tonight still kept everybody fresh,” Feaster said. “Turner McClelland had

a couple of great catches. Cason Clemons had some nice catches, too. We were able to throw some deep stuff and some shorter stuff and had success with both.

“So it’s a great thing when we can spread it around to a lot of different guys and we don’t have to wear down our main ball-carrier and only give him 12 carries and still win like we did. That’s where we want to be.”

Chase Sentell added 32 yards on three carries for the Apaches, who also got a 23-yard run from Otis

Kent along with a five-yarder from McClelland, who finished with a team-best six catches for 97 yards, including a 28-yard touchdown reception that put his team on top 14-7 early in the second quarter along with that first score of the second half.



Cason Clemons added three receptions for 83 yards, including a 55-yard scoring strike from Ty Feaster to tie the game at 7-7 with 1:11 remaining in the first quarter.

Landry Powell and Rhett Johnson had two catches each for the

Apaches, with Powell chalking up 16 yards and Johnson totaling 13 yards, with 12 of those coming on a 12-yard touchdown reception to put Glenbrook on top 28-14 with 10:38 remaining.

“I’m proud of the way we played and I think it puts us in good position heading into next week,” Feaster said. “It won’t get any easier against a team like OCS, but we’re playing good football and we’ll be ready to give them a fight. We still have a lot left we want to accomplish.”
