Minden's 37th Annual MLK Jr. Day Celebration

The afternoon of January 14, a commemorative service was held at Mt. Zion CME Church in honor of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. as part of the 37th Annual MLK Jr. Day Celebration in Minden. This event provided an opportunity for the community to reflect on the work of Dr. King and all he did to further his dream of a truly united America. This event also recognized the work being done here in Minden, including the winners of youth contests for essay writing and poster design following this year's celebration theme, as well as leadership award winners.

Soon after the service began, Minden Mayor Nick Cox was present and read aloud a proclamation designating January 15 as MLK Jr. Day in Minden.

"Whereas Dr. Martin Luther King recognized the great injustice of segregation and discrimination and made it his life's purpose to right those wrongs in favor of justice, freedom, quality, fairness, and reconciliation, and whereas his message of non-violence, optimism, and service continues to resonate today as we strive to reflect our highest ideals in fairness, equality, and opportunity, and whereas the vision of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. was one of peace, opportunity, and harmony, and whereas the 2024 MLK Jr. Celebration marks the 37th annual celebration for the City of Minden, and this year's

To be considered, students must plan to enroll full-time in an accredited college or university during the fall of 2024, with a minimum ACT composite score of 20 and a minimum GPA of 3.0 (on a 4.0 scale). Immediate family members of Meriwether Wealth & Planning employees are ineligible to apply.

Interested applicants must complete and sign the scholarship application, along with submitting required documentation, including an official high school transcript, ACT/SAT transcript, teacher's letter of reference, civic or business leader professional letter of reference, acceptance letter from an accredited college, and a brief essay

January 9, 2024 started like any normal day for 39-week-pregnant Gillian Jacob and their three boys, Shepherd, Asher and Levi. The family were busy getting ready for work and school. The boys got on their bus at 6:40am

but instead of going to work, Jacob and Gillian decided to head to Minden to the hospital, an hour drive from their house. She thought she was having a few contractions and the night before the baby was less active, which was odd Gillian said because he had been the most active of all four boys in

the womb.

During the hour journey she began making all the necessary phone calls; one to her cousin, Amanda Johnson, an RN at Minden Medical Center on the Perinatal Unit, the baby's nurse, then to the birth photographer, Sarah, to

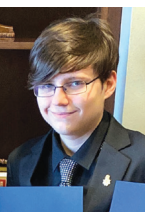

theme is Be the Dream, spread hope, courage, and unity, now therefore I, Nicholas A. Cox, mayor of the City of Minden, do hereby proclaim Monday, January 15th, 2024 as Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Day in the City of Minden. The citizens of Minden take this opportunity to reflect on Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.'s message on the principles of justice and equality for all people pursuing the idea of the spirit of one America," said Cox.

Shortly after, the mayor also took the time to present the event's keynote speaker, Dr. Breleisha Gilbert, associate professor at Grambling State University, with a key to the city in recognition of her accomplishments.

Next the service was dedicated acknowledging the accomplishments of the youths who participated in the celebration's essay and poster contests. The submissions were judged on originality as well as the development of the theme, Be the Dream, spread hope, courage, and unity.

For the poster contest winners the elementary category was won by An-sleigh Walker, the middle school category was won by Railynn Crow, and the high school category was won by Charlene Randall.

In the 4th through 5th grade category, third place was Camila Sosa, second place was Brielle Qualls-Davis, and first place was Lala Huddleston, all from E.S. Richardson Elementary School.

In the 6th through 7th grade category, third place went to Addison Bennett from Doyline High School, second place went to Courtnei Hampton from Webster Jr. High, and first place went to Kaylee Johnson from Doyline High School.

For the 9th through 12th grade category, third place went to Chelsei Hampton from Minden High School, second place went to Peyton Handy from Doyline High School, and first



place went to Leigha Ken-non-Gilbert from Minden High School.

Gilbert ended up reading her essay aloud to the audience at the service, and excerpt from it reading, "Courage is standing up for what you believe in. When you know you will probably be judged by others or even when no one agrees with you. When leading the protests and giving speeches, Dr. King had to be courageous because he knew that there were many people who did not agree with him or like him. He also knew that there were some people who even wanted to hurt him, ultimately taking his life.

"This did not phase him though. He continued to fight for what he believed in courageously. At various times and experiences, I have stood courageous in uncomfortable situations. It is not a good feeling to experience, but when you know what you are doing is right, you find the courage to stand, even if you have to stand alone. Dr. King often said, 'the time is always right to do what's right,'" said Gilbert.

As a part of each annual MLK Celebration, the committee recognizes and honors outstanding students for their dedication to social action, positive change, and building bridges along races, cultures, and communities, and who so aptly demonstrates the important aspect of service with the 2024 MLK Leadership Award. The recipients for this year's award included both Gabrielle K. Cooper and Kaileah Calloway.

Near the end of the service the Keynote Speaker for the event, Dr. Breleisha Gilbert, associate professor at Grambling State University, took the opportunity to share some encouraging words with the audience about chasing their dreams and never giving up, using her own life experiences as examples.

"What is hope? Hope is an expectation of trust and desire for a certain thing, that happened or that you want to happen. With my testimonies the goal is to spread hope that you can do anything that you can set your mind to, and I want you to cast that fire throughout this process or whatever you have to do that nothing is impossible. I want you to trust yourselves throughout the process, and continually reminding yourselves that you can be the dream, and that you can make that dream into reality," said Dr. Gilbert

"My purpose is to serve through my teaching, mentoring, sharing, and through my giving to my community, at the school, and personally. So I charge all of you with this. Let what has been said today motivate you and spark a fire that has not been. You have the ability to leave a mark with whatever purpose, and just do that, be that dream. "Appreciate the process, you might not understand it while you are going through it, but just stay grounded and understand that it is God's process, and he will always be there to encourage you."

James 'Jimmy' Byron Williams

James 'Jimmy' Byron Williams, a beloved father, grandfather, community leader, Mayor of Sibley, businessman and friend, passed away on Saturday, January 20, 2024, at the age of 68.

Services will be held at the First Baptist Church in Minden at 1 p.m., Thursday, January 25, 2024. Pastor Keith Mariott will perform the service, with burial following at Lane Memorial Cemetery in Sibley. Visitation will be held Wednesday, January 24 starting at 5 p.m. at Rose Neath Funeral Home in Minden.

Jimmy was born on June 6, 1955, in Minden to Wayne Wynn Williams, Sr. and Irene Botkins Williams. After successfully battling Multiple Myeloma for the past 5 years, no one expected that it would be Jimmy's loving and generous heart that would take him from us while sitting at home watching an NFL football game.

Jimmy loved his community and had dedicated the last 20 years to the Town of Sibley. He was serving as the mayor of Sibley, a position he had held since 2009 after serving on the Sibley Board of Alderman for four years. The continuing impact of his

service to Sibley will continue to be felt for decades by its residents. Some of his many achievements include improving the Sibley water system, bringing new business and opportunities to the town and the creation of a new subdivision at the north entrance of the town.

In 2019, he was elected as President of the Louisiana Municipal Association (LMA), serving as the state's leading advocate for villages, towns and cities. As a result of the COVID pandemic, he served in the role an extra year and received the LMA's President's Award in 2022, the highest award given by the organization, for his efforts. Jimmy was a member of the LMA Executive Committee and had previously served as LMA's First Vice-President, Second Vice-President and District A Vice-President.

His work as mayor and with the LMA allowed him to travel and see the country while representing Louisiana and Sibley. One of his proudest moments as LMA President was the honor of laying the wreath on the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier at Arlington Cemetery. Jimmy never met a stranger, always had a great story to tell and counted the many mayors, elected officials and municipal employees that he met over the years as friends.

When his brother Butch opened Minden Athletic in 1973, Jimmy became one of its original employees and would continue to be a vital part of the business by helping manage the store for the following 50 years. In 1976, Jimmy helped the business to temporarily expand, helping

open and serve as manager of Springhill Athletic. Over the past 50 years, Jimmy served as a manager, headed up team sales, constructed trophies, helped bring the first computers to the store and completed many construction projects. He would start his own business, Williams Silkscreen, printing a countless number of athletic team uniforms, t-shirts and P.E. Uniforms over the years.

Jimmy was a proud member of the 1972 Minden High School State Championship Baseball Team, having recently helped organize a 50th reunion for the team. His love of baseball continued, playing for the Minden Redbirds and coaching the Wiley Pevy Post 74 American Legion team, where he challenged umpires for 30 years.

He loved the Lord and often would quote and share scripture with others. He was an active member of the Minden Presbyterian Church, where he served as an elder and was always willing to use his handyman skills to help improve the facilities.

His greatest achievement and joy in life was his family and serving as "Poppie" to his grandchildren, whom he loved to give a ride around the neighborhood and on the farm in his golf cart. He would use any excuse to spend time with his children and grandchildren, often suggesting getting together for a good meal. His house was always open as a gathering place, especially during the holidays. Hearing the unique nicknames he gave his grandchildren, nephews and nieces will be missed, as well as his love for twirling their hair.

He was preceded in death by his parents, as well as his brother Wayne "Butch" Wynn Williams, Jr. and his in-laws Sid and Marilyn Kilgore of Homer.

After talking to Dr. McKenzie, Gillian told Dr. McKenzie she had not timed anything but she would start logging what she felt were very mild contractions. During the hour drive she logged 20 consistent contractions, that were getting a little stronger, but still not very painful she reports.

“The contractions weren’t unbearable, I could still talk through them” so when driving up Jacob pulled into the circle drive at the front of the hospital, dropped her off and went to park the van. Gillian walked through the front doors and was welcomed by a friendly voice at the front desk. She told the receptionist, “I’m in labor and need to go to the 4th floor. Dr. McKenzie is following me, and she knows I’m coming. She is supposed to meet me upstairs.”

The kind lady, who Gillian now knows is named Karey, showed her the direction to the elevator and said as soon as she turned to make her way there, she knew the baby was coming. She told Karey, she was feeling lots of pressure. Karey then asked if she needed some help getting to the elevator. At the high court

Supreme Court considers two cases critical to the return of
‘government by the consent of the governed’

Our federal government has been out of control for decades. Agencies like the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and a number of others have not been simply implementing the legislation and policy the U.S. Congress and president have agreed to and enacted into law. Rather, these massive, unaccountable agencies have been making law themselves. That is an unquestionable violation of our principle of representative government and our Separation of Powers doctrine.

How have we gotten to this unconstitutional impasse?

I think the major reason is the 1984 U.S. Supreme Court case of Chevron v. NRDC. In that case, as noted by the Wall Street Journal “the Justices ruled that courts should defer to administrative agencies’ interpretation of laws when the statutory text is silent or ambiguous. In practice this has become a license for Congress to write vague laws that delegate legislative power to administrative agencies.” (WSJ, 1-16-24).

So, by deferring to the federal agencies in this way, the Supreme Court made a huge concession—and mistake—and essentially allowed each federal agency to become a sovereign unto itself and to interpret statutes, enact federal regulations and decide

disputes in any manner it chose, and with virtually no oversight from the judiciary or the legislative branches of government.

Let me offer an example: if the highly partisan Environmental Protection Agency challenges coal miners in West Virginia because the EPA believes coal production and consumption supposedly contribute to “global warming,” the Supreme Court could conclude that the statute addressing the acceptable amount of coal

production is not clear. In that case, the U.S. Supreme Court could “punt” by saying “it’s not clear to us what Congress intended so we’ll defer to the EPA’s decision to limit coal production at a certain number of tons a year.” This is how a Democrat Congress writes legislation with intentionally vague language, knowing that clear, specific language could not pass through the House or the Senate, but that vague language would be interpreted by the federal agency in the manner liberal Democrats in the Congress intended. This legisla-

tive deception is toxic to our ‘government by consent of the governed.’

A decision of such magnitude as how much coal production should be allowed in West Virginia, or the U.S., is a monumental policy question that must be decided by the Congress itself. No one elected the Secretary of the EPA. No one voted for the thousands of career bureaucrats who work in that agency. The EPA may well possess substantive, technical expertise regarding environmental issues, but these individuals must not be allowed to be the nameless, faceless, decision-makers who are apparently determined to put the coal miners in WV and across the country out of work because the EPA believes that “coal is bad.”

To underscore this point, I share an anecdote. I worked in the U.S. House of Representatives for almost eight years for two Members of Congress from Louisiana. During those years, I met a number of career employees in the agencies. I recall a conversation with one individual who worked for nearly 40 years for an agency in DC. He told me once, in a rather matter of fact way, that “look, man, the president will be gone in 4 or 8 years; congressmen and senators may be here for a decade or two,

but we career employees are here for much longer, so we make the policy.” I remember being taken aback by his answer but realized he was correct. Well, this status quo is completely and sadly unconstitutional.

The cases the Supreme Court heard this past week pose a different issue than the West VA coal miners—but present the very same constitutional principle: can an agency—this time it’s the National Marine Fisheries Services (NMFS)—force a small family-owned herring boat operator to pay for the cost of a federally-mandated monitor on his boat to be sure he’s not catching more fish than allowed. Congress didn’t fund the cost of the monitors and the statute’s not clear, so who pays?

Hopefully, with these cases, the Supreme Court will stop deferring to federal agencies and force the Congress to do the hard work of writing and debating legislation with clear language and intent, sending the bills through the regular committee process to the House and Senate floors to be voted up or down and either signed or vetoed by the president.

Perot finds remains of mystery buck

Ruston's Jeff Perot was deer hunting in Richland Parish on December 28. What caliber was he toting? He wasn't carrying a rifle; he was armed with his camera as he has contracted with a landowner to spend time on his land and photograph as many deer as he can to give the owner an idea of just what he has on his 7200 acres. Perot is an architect by profession but he is also one of this area's most notable wildlife and nature photographers. He sums up what he does..."I DRAW pictures as an architect and TAKE pictures as a photographer," he quipped. Perot has shared some of his outstanding photos on Facebook and especially some of the deer he's photographed on his Richland Parish project. Perot's ability to take a photo that just grabs you when you see it confirms his expertise at the craft. He shares photos of not only deer doing what deer do in the wild but also of turkeys, ducks and herons and egrets and a variety of other creatures. He shared with me one of the most unusual finds he has ever had on his outdoor photographic jaunts. "I have walked over just about every acre of this plot in Richland Parish but on the morning of December 28, I found something that made me stop and first

thank the Lord for giving me the opportunity to find what I found," Perot began. "While walking through some tall grass in the woods on the property, I saw something that caused me to pause. There were bones of a deer, laid out in a manner like the animal had just laid down and died. There was no evidence that a coyote had killed it or rodents had gnawed it because everything was laid out in order," he said. He saw what he thought were bones from the deer's rib cage sticking up out of the grass. Walking closer, Perot was looking at some-

thing that he at first couldn't believe. "Upon closer examination, what I was looking at sticking up out of the grass were antlers the likes I had never seen. Realizing what I was looking at, I didn't pick it up immediately before thanking God for giving me the opportunity to stumble upon something like that," he said. When he reached to pick up the antlers attached to the top half of a skull, Perot was in total shock. He held in his hand the rack of a buck that almost defied description. "I got to counting points

and ended up with 25 on a non-typical rack. The antlers were in good shape, not starting to deteriorate but faded somewhat and having lost most of their natural color after it is believed the deer had died two years ago," he continued. Perot took the rack to Cecil Reddick, a Buckmaster official scorer living in the area who put the tape on the rack and came up with 244 5/8 inches of mass and the jawbone revealed the buck was only 4 1/2 years old. In sharing his find with the property owner, Perot learned that this was a mystery buck; nobody had ever reported seeing it nor had photos of the deer. It's a mystery that will likely go unsolved because there was nothing left of the carcass to indicate why it died. What are Perot's plans for his unusual find? "I'm going to see if the rack can be preserved and maybe made into a mount to have it look like it did before it died. Right now, all I have is the top half of the skull to which the antlers are attached. I'm in no hurry and want to explore all possibilities as to how to preserve it," he said. Perot is back at work in his office drawing pictures as an architect. However, he'll probably never forget the photograph in his excitement he forgot to take when he found the remains of a mystery buck lying in grass in Richland Parish.

JACKSONVILLE, Ala. -- Isaiah Crawford cored a career-high 30 points as the CUSA Preseason Player of the Year led Louisiana Tech to a resounding 74-57 victory over Jacksonville State last Saturday afternoon inside Pete Mathews Coliseum. Crawford was simply unstoppable, especially in the second half when he put LA Tech (13-6, 3-1 CUSA) on his shoulders. After scoring a mild nine points in the first stanza, he exploded for 21 in the second, making eight of his nine field goal attempts. He was a force on the defensive end as well, notching a season-high five steals. His supporting cast was solid on that end of the floor too as the 'Dogs length bothered Jax State (10-9, 2-2 CUSA) all day. Collectively, they held the CUSA leading scorer KyKy Tandy to 14 points, making his last field goal to tie the game up at 41-41 with 13:20 remaining. From that point on, it was all Bulldogs. They proceeded to make nine straight field goals and closed the game out making 12 of their last 14, go-

ing from a tie game to a 17-point road victory. Crawford made 17 of his 30 points in that 13-minute stretch. First it was a steal and fastbreak layup to cap a 9-0 run to make it 52-43. With the Gamecocks hovering around at a 7-point deficit with 6:36 to play, Crawford reeled off five straight points, including a bucket-plus-the-foul to push the lead out to 64-52, their largest of the lead up to that point. "That is what we need him to do," Tech Head Coach Talvin Hester said. "When you think of a pre-season player of the year, that is the kind of performance you want to see. He was great defensively too. He had five steals. He had a really key block down the stretch. He was the Isaiah Crawford that we know he can be." Jax State was only able to manage five points in the final minutes (just one made field goal). After early turnovers put LA Tech in a 6-0 hold, the Bulldogs later went on a 16-2 run to take an 11-point lead. The visiting team took a 30-25 lead into the locker room, a lead that evaporated quickly in the second half when the Gamecocks started the stanza on an 8-0 run.

This program is not responsible for utilities being shut off between the time an application is made and payment is received by the utility company. Benefit may take 30-90 days to credit to individual's utility account.

CRISIS ASSISTANCE:

The LIHEAP program also provides energy crisis intervention to eligible households. The program provides for an energy payment up to a **maximum benefit** amount of **\$1000.00**. To be eligible for LIHEAP Crisis Assistance, the applicant's household must meet the following requirements:

- Income eligibility.
- Disconnection Notice(threatened or actual interruption of service which may cause a lack of cooling/heating source.)
- Vulnerability (mail that has been received within the last 30 days which has the same address as the utility bills.)
- Faced with health risk and/or safety hazard.

A household can receive only one (1) crisis assistance benefit during a 12-month period. Services are available to all persons on a non-discriminatory basis without regard to race, color, sex, national origin, religion, age or disability. 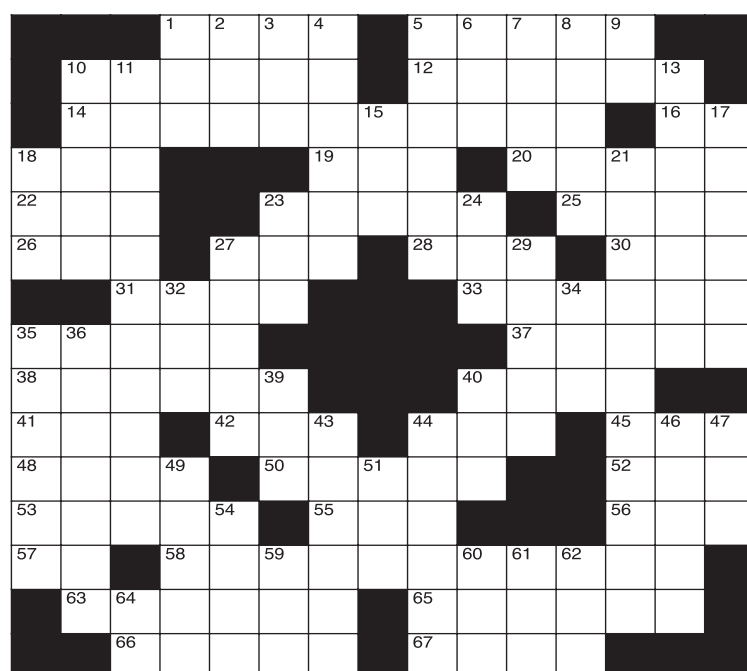
