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
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


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NLTCC's Powerline Worker Program shapes heroes in Northwest Louisiana

Since the inception of the Powerline Worker Program in the fall of 2023, Northwest Louisiana Technical Community College (NLTCC) and American Electric Power - Southwestern Electric Power Company (AEP-SWEP-CO) have been at the forefront of shaping the future of line workers in the region. The partnership has not only equipped students with valuable training, but has also highlighted the vital role of line workers in our local community.

Led by James Barlow, an instructor and AEP-SWEPCO alumni, the Powerline Worker Program at NLTCC equips students with technical skills while fostering a strong sense of responsibility and community service. Through hands-on training and immersive learning experiences, students develop the confidence and competence required to excel in the demanding profession of linework.

As time has progressed into the spring semester, the inaugural class has made significant strides in their journey. Ac-

tively participating in the establishment of the pole yard on NLTCC's Shreveport campus alongside AEP-SWEPCO, they are benefiting from a tailored training program that addresses the evolving needs of the industry. This hands-on program provides students with opportunities to operate bucket and line trucks, set and pull poles, wire transformer banks, climb electrical poles in various weather conditions, utilize AEP-SWEPCO's indoor training facility, and much more. Students also receive their CDL license.

Line workers play a vital role in maintaining a reliable power supply for homes and businesses, contributing significantly to the well-being of their communities. Their hands-on work not only offers job security but also brings a sense of fulfillment as they actively contribute to keeping the community powered. With a growing demand for line workers in the state, there are ample job opportunities for those entering the field.

"Our program is all about putting the


skills and the certifications within reach of Ark-La-Tex students to enhance their overall employability and ensure they are job ready," said Dr. Jayda Spillers, NLTCC Chancellor. "We believe we have the opportunity to deliver a program that meets the needs of our local residents and employers like AEP-SWEPCO."

For those interested in joining the program, the next class begins on March 18th, 2024. Entrance requirements include an age requirement of 18 years old, a current driver's license, a satisfactory DOT physical, a high school diploma or equivalent, and no fear of working at high elevations. Additionally, applicants must pass a DOT drug screen immediately before beginning the course.

As the only source of powerline worker training in Northwest Louisiana, NLTCC encourages interested applicants to visit nltcc.edu for more information. The program promises to address the region's workforce needs and offers an exciting opportunity for individuals seeking a rewarding career in this essential field.

Beloved mayor and community leader, JIMMY WILLIAMS, remembered for dedication and service

Timmy Williams, a cherished figure in Webster Parish, renowned for his multifaceted roles as a father, grandfather, mayor of Sibley, businessman, and friend, passed away on Saturday, January 20, 2024, at the age of 68.

Williams, born in Minden in 1955, dedicated the last two decades of his life to the Town of Sibley, where he served as mayor since 2009. His profound impact on the community manifested through numerous achievements, including enhancements to the Sibley water system, facilitation of economic growth, and the establishment of a new subdivision at the town's north entrance.

Notably, in 2019, Williams was elected as President of the Louisiana Municipal Association (LMA), assuming a pivotal role as an advocate for villages, towns, and cities statewide. His exceptional leadership during the challenges posed by the COVID-19 pandemic earned him the LMA's prestigious President's Award in 2022. Williams's commitment to service extended beyond municipal boundaries, as evidenced by his active involvement with the LMA Executive Committee and his representation of Louisiana and Sibley on a national scale.

A cornerstone of the Minden business community, Williams played a pivotal role in the success of Minden Athletic, contributing five decades of service to the establishment. His entrepreneurial spirit also led to the founding of Williams Silkscreen, a venture that left an indelible mark on the local athletic apparel industry.

As a proud member of the 1972 Minden High School State Championship Baseball Team, Williams's passion for baseball endured throughout his life, as he continued to engage with the sport both as a player and a coach.



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Tourism thrives in Webster Parish, boosting local economy

Tourism in Webster Parish has experienced a significant upswing since the easing of COVID restrictions, according to the annual report released by Webster Parish Tourism for the year 2022. Visitor spending witnessed a notable increase, with expenditures soaring by 11%. This surge translated into a 10% rise in state tax revenues and a 13% uptick in local tax revenues, directly impacting residents by trimming individual tax payments by \$207.

In 2022, visitor spending in Webster Parish approached nearly \$30 million, generating \$1.15 million in local taxes. While comprehensive data for 2023 is pending, initial indicators suggest a continuation of the upward trend.

Apart from the traditional annual festivals in Minden, the growth is attributed to various factors, including the exposure garnered through HGTV's Hometown Kickstart and Camp Minden securing a 10-year contract to host the Archery Shooter Association Pro/AM tournaments.

The surge in short-term rentals, such as bed and breakfasts, has been particularly noticeable. Sara McDaniel, owner of Simply Southern Cottage, has witnessed a surge in bookings across her properties, drawing guests from across the United States and internationally. McDaniel's properties not only contribute to local accommodations but also drive spending in restau-

rants, souvenir shops, and local stores. "They're eating at our restaurants, they're shopping downtown, and I fully expect to see that continue to grow."

"2023 has been a good year for short-term rentals in Minden," McDaniel stated. "My bookings have steadily increased month over month at all my properties." With her company projected to contribute approximately \$30,000 in state and local taxes, McDaniel anticipates further growth in 2024.

Similarly, Jim and Kim Huffman of Huffman Management reported growth in 2023, with an average daily rate surge of 18% and a 6% increase in occupancy. The international reach of Huffman Management's website underscores the global interest in Minden as a travel destination. Buoyed by their success, the Huffmans are expanding their portfolio with two additional houses earmarked for renovation as short-term rentals.

Serena Gray, executive director of Webster Parish Tourism, expressed optimism about the future, emphasizing collaborative efforts to attract more visitors to the area and foster economic growth across the community. "We are filled with anticipation for where we are headed and believe that, as we continue to work together, we will attract more visitors to our area resulting in economic growth for our entire community."

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LA Tech student saves lives in campus attack

In a harrowing incident at Louisiana Tech University's Lambright Sports and Wellness Center on Monday, local resident and LA Tech student Colin Campbell demonstrated quick thinking and courage by swiftly transporting two injured women to the hospital.

His father, Tracy Campbell of Minden, reported getting a message from Colin saying, "Dad, there's been an attack on campus. I'm at the hospital, and I need y'all to come quick."

The event unfolded shortly after 9 AM when reports of a stabbing incident surfaced at the campus facility. Colin, en route to his dorm, witnessed people fleeing the Lambright Center in distress. Sensing the urgency, he halted his vehicle and discovered two women with stab wounds, one in the throat. Without hesitation, Colin assisted them into his vehicle and drove them to the hospital, maintaining communication with emergency services throughout the transit.

Colin's rapid response drew praise from Emergency Medical Technicians (EMT), who noted that he surpassed the speed of


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an ambulance. Another student transported a third victim, contributing to the swift medical attention required.

Tech police swiftly intervened, receiving a call at approximately 9:08 AM and apprehending the suspect, identified as Louisiana Tech student Jacoby Johnson, by 9:12 AM. The attack occurred outside the Lambright Center as victims were exiting. Johnson fled toward the main campus but was apprehended without incident by campus police.

The motive behind the attack appears to be random, as authorities investigate the incident. Johnson, currently receiving treatment at Northern Louisiana Medical Center for injuries sustained during the initial altercation, faces legal repercussions. Ruston Police Department and the Lincoln Parish Sheriff's Office collaborated on scene control and evidence collection.

Four victims were identified, two of which were transported to a local hospital, one was airlifted to Shreveport, and another declined treatment. Unfortunately, Annie Richardson, the graduate student who was airlifted, died as a result of her wounds. The other three victims were not students.

Fuelled by her own transformative experience, Wilbanks is passionate about sharing the benefits of journaling with others, particularly in a time when mental health struggles are pervasive. "Since it helped me so much, I really want to share that with other people, because mental health is a huge problem in modern times, and after COVID it's just gotten worse," she emphasizes.

With a vision to reach beyond the scope of Minden, Wilbanks is expanding her efforts by offering journaling workshops throughout the state, including Natchitoches, where she is attending school, and her hometown in DeRidder.

"Bringing it to life has been so much fun," Wilbanks expresses with enthusiasm. "It's something that I want to share with other people, so they can learn how to properly combat the battles they are going through mentally, so they don't have to feel like they have to be isolated, feel like they're unheard, feel like they're unimportant."

Through her dedication to community service and her unwavering commitment to uplifting others, Miss Minden Maison Wilbanks is not only leaving a lasting impact on those she encounters but is also fostering a culture of self-care and resilience that extends far beyond the confines of her title. 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



Riding on this year's success, plans for next year have already begun. The 2024 Witches Ride is scheduled to take place on October 24.



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
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MINDEN ST. JUDE AUCTION SETS ANOTHER RECORD-BREAKING YEAR



Northwest Louisiana Technical Community College (NLTCC) looks back on a successful year led by Dr. Jayda Spillers, who celebrated her first anniversary as chancellor at the start of the year. Throughout 2023, NLTCC has experienced significant growth and success.

One standout achievement this year was the successful launch of the New Lineman Certification Program in collaboration with AEP SWEPCO. This program has gained significant traction, offering students valuable skills and career opportunities. To support eligible students participating in the program, the Gulf Research Program has awarded NLTCC the Workforce Development for the Energy Transition grant.

In November of 2023, NLTCC also received a grant from the Lumina Foundation's "Tell Your Story" project, which will be used for the design and creation of a school mascot and rural campus signage, which will foster a stronger sense of community and identity.

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NLTCC's commitment to community partner-ships under Dr. Spillers' leadership is evident in new collaborations between the Automotive Technology program and the Shreveport Fire and Police departments. The partnership aims to increase the pool of qualified automotive technicians within the city departments. Students in the last six months of their training will have the opportunity to work in these city automotive shops that serve the Fire and Police

Departments. In addition to these ac-

complishments, NLTCC underwent various physical transformations in 2023, with renovations still ongoing at the Shreveport campus. The LPN program has expanded to now include an Asso-

ciate Degree in Practical Nursing, and the Mansfield campus is one step closer to expanding its nursing wing.

closer to expanding its nursing wing. In Fall 2023, NLTCC introduced the Industrial Maintenance Technology Program at both the Mansfield and Shreveport Campuses. This addition of new programs aligns with the college's commitment to providing diverse educational opportunities that meet industry needs.


Another significant milestone for NLTCC was the successful visit from the Council on

Occupational Education (COE), paving the way for reaccreditation. NLTCC also achieved reaccreditation with ATMAE for the Industrial Instrumentation & Electrical Technology programs. ATMAE accreditation plays an important role in ensuring the high quality and industry relevance of NLTCC's programs, which provide the college with recognized credentials that enhance students' career prospects.

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

MAYOR NICK COX TALKS ABOUT PLANS **FOR MINDEN MOVING INTO 2024**

The coming of a new year offers a time to reflect on the year to come and what one wants to see happen during that time. Mayor Nick Cox has been in office for a year now, and given his position has a vision and plan for how he would like to see Minden move forward. He took some time to share his thoughts on projects that he and the city as a whole can look forward to as we get further along in 2024.

One of his main focuses has been that of the consolidation of departments throughout the city into a new public works building.

"Something I'm looking forward to is building the public works building. I'm a builder at heart anyways, and I also apply that love of building to building a community. Building up people, build-ing up teams, and building up structures," said Mayor Cox.

I'm excited because with that building

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will be the consolidation of employees. Right now we have the departments spread throughout the city, and this will help us move toward bringing everybody together. It'll also help us by getting our employees out of older buildings that are energy inefficient."

The council voted on this last year, and the city will officially have the project out for bid in a few weeks. He stated that an architect has already designed the facility so, once the council approves a bid, it'll be good to go for construction.

Another project that started last year and is carrying over to this year is that of improving Minden's local animal shelter. The city has attained some funds in order to help with improvements, but are working to create more ways to raise even more money to see the project fully realized. A fundraiser is in the works for later this spring where people can donate to the cause while also taking part

in a fun activity, a Minden pet election.

"What we've got in mind is a pet election. If you love your little doggie, and you want them to be mayor, you can pay a sum of money to get them up on the ballot, with the proceeds going toward the animal shelter," said Mayor Cox.

Essentially, along with a donation, citizens will be able to put their furry friends up for election for various seats in Minden's government such as mayor, chief of police, city council, etc. Others can donate and vote on their favorite

pets to win these seats. As the mayor of Minden, Cox has to be forward thinking when it comes to Minden's opportunities to grow and bring in new people. While it may be something many take for granted, clean running water is a necessary part of being able to build new places for more people to live.

"We've got money in capital outlay from the state to build a water tank and

expand our water capacity by two million gallons," said Mayor Cox. "We've been applying to the state for years, and we just got it passed to a higher priority."

Essentially, the part of Minden that has seen the most growth in recent years is furthest from the area that pumps the highest quality water. This project will allow the city to take one of its best resources and increase how far out it can travel.

These are just a handful of the projects that the city has planned for the upcoming year that have enough groundwork already completed to report on them. There are other projects in the works that will take some more time to develop before they can be officially announced to the public. SRT, similar to SWAT, handles all the high-risk warrants and major crimes in the city. Lt. Cheatham, commander of the SRT, already has a list of equipment

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ready to order.

"The first thing we're doing, between the gun raffle and what Keith and JD have done, is getting ballistics protection for the SRT team," said Lt. Cheatham. "Ballistic carriers, plates, helmets. After that we'll start looking at firearms that are specialized for the team along with training ammo and things of that nature. We're also in the process of possibly buying a drone that will be utilized for the police department."

"Anytime we've had a major incident here in the city, we've had to call outside the parish to get somebody from either Bossier or DeSoto to come all the way over here," said Chief McIver. "Our guys will now, due to all the funding and the help, get all the training and equipment they need to handle those situations ourselves. I'm very excited about that."

Any funds not used by SRT will go toward patrol officers' needs.

"I'm proud of this; I'm proud of the support," said event organizer Keith Jellum. "People do want to help. The community involvement shows that they trust the police officers. And the officers see they can trust that the community wants to see them do well. The better y'all do, the better we do as a community."

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Minden High School welcomes dedicated school resource officers Ensuring safety and trust in education

Minden High School is now benefiting from the presence of two seasoned School Resource Officers (SROs): Officers LaDarrius Joseph and Jemela Freeman. Both officers bring years of law enforcement experience to their roles, fostering a secure and supportive environment for the students.

Officer Joseph's journey began with the Webster Parish Sheriff's Office, followed by his transition to the Minden Police Department. Now in his fourth year as an SRO, Joseph's commitment to safeguarding the school community remains unwavering. Officer Freeman, with prior law enforcement experience in Shreveport and as a former SRO at ALC, brings a wealth of insight to her position.

"I love doing this. I didn't anticipate doing this but, now that I'm in it, I wouldn't do anything else," shared Officer Joseph. "This is where I'm supposed to be; this is where I belong."

Officer Freeman echoes the sentiment: "I feel like the kids can talk to us about anything. We gain their trust, and they can look at us without being like, 'oh, there's the po-po.' Some people have bad judgment about law enforcement and just see us as bad, but being here with us every day lets them learn more about us and we learn about them. They learn to trust us; we build trust."

The officers' day begins with the closure of a section of College Street, redirecting traffic to accommodate the school buses. A brief meeting facilitates situational awareness, paving the way for their patrols. Notably, Minden High School boasts a sprawling campus, necessitating vigilant monitoring.

"We try not to walk together. Now that there's two of us it's better because, God forbid, if anything happens, at least some type of law enforcement presence is closer," emphasized Joseph. "At a certain point, we'll run into each other, and we'll talk for a little bit before continuing walking around the school."

Through both lunch shifts, the officers oversee students in the cafeteria and commons areas. Between shifts, they seize the opportunity to complete daily reports—a vital task that informs the school board monthly.

As the day winds down, the officers deploy a road block on College Street once again to facilitate orderly bus pickups. The year's commencement has been auspicious, with students exhibiting commendable behavior. Officer Joseph remains optimistic about the future, expressing, "I don't believe that any of these kids are bad. They just need something to do. They need something to occupy their time. If they had that, they'd have less time to do things they shouldn't be doing."

Working in tandem, Officer Joseph and Officer Freeman exemplify a harmonious partnership. "Working with Officer Freeman has been amazing," praised Joseph. "I couldn't ask for a better partner." The sentiment is reciprocated by Freeman: "He's great. Having a great partner makes the job easier. Having him there is great support to lean on; you become a family. And I've learned a lot from him. He's a wise guy."

The officers share an unwavering commitment to the students, striving to provide protection and guidance. "We love the kids. We love them like they're our own, so we're going to do the best we can to protect them and guide them," affirmed Freeman.

A s 2024 commences, Minden Police Chief Jared McIver takes stock of the substantial changes and enhancements implemented within the Minden Police Department during his tenure. After assuming office in early 2023, Chief McIver prioritized a multifaceted approach to elevate the department's professionalism and efficiency.

Among the noteworthy initiatives was the establishment of the deputy chief position to ensure continuous command-level decision-making. Currently, the department boasts two deputy chiefs, Tokia Harrison and Chris Cheatham. Training emerged as a focal point throughout the year, with officers attending diverse sessions, including the use of less-lethal force. Furthermore, officers transitioned into instructional roles, facilitating knowledge dissemination within the department. A dedicated training room was also added to support officers in staying abreast of evolving practices.

Achieving full staffing levels marked a significant milestone for the department, resulting in the formation of specialized teams to address specific issues. Notable additions include a Special Response Team, Drug Apprehension Response Team,

two full-time narcotics officers, three detectives (including a juvenile detective), and two School Resource Officers. This expansion led to a restructuring of ranks.

In terms of equipment, substantial upgrades were made, encompassing a new computer system, two drones, updated uniforms and badges, body cameras, firearms, laptop computers for each officer, and additional patrol vehicles.

A standout accomplishment for the year was the successful removal of the TTS and CHS gangs from Minden, significantly enhancing the safety of residents.

Reflecting on the transfor-

mative year, Chief McIver attributed the success to divine guidance and a dedicated team sharing common ambitions. Chief McIver stated, "In 12 months time, the Minden Police Department has advanced beyond my expectations. All credit goes to God. Second, we have a great team that shares the same ambitions and goals and wants to see our department continuously grow. We strive to create a positive work environment that promotes men and women enjoying their job."

With optimism, the Minden Police Department looks forward to sustaining this growth in the upcoming year.

NEW DEPUTY CHIEF LOOKS BACK ON PAST AS SHE PREPARES FOR THE FUTURE

fter over 13 years of working as the school resource officer (SRO) at Minden High School, Tokia Harrison was recently appointed the position of deputy chief for the Minden Police Department. This is the first time that the Minden Police Department has had a deputy chief, but it was a position that Chief Jared McIver wanted Harrison to fill as soon as he was elected. "She's going to be my right arm," said Chief McIver as soon as the election results were in last November. The position is interim until she passes her final test, but Harrison feels confident that she is prepared to do so.

Working with high school students for so many years has definitely prepared Deputy Chief Harrison for whatever surprises and changes may come.

"I loved going to work every day, even when bad things were going on," said Deputy Chief Harrison. "That's how I know it was my purpose, because I enjoyed it. I built a lot of relationships. It was bittersweet leaving.

"But it definitely prepares you. You learn all the different personalities and different types of people and circumstances that you'll have to tackle. It also taught me to be even more of a leader. It brought out things in me that I didn't know I had. People will tell me I'm doing great things, but I feel like God is just doing His thing, and I'm just trying to please Him. "When I get kids who

"When I get kids who become officers or who inbox me out of the blue and tell me that I really made a change in their lives, it makes what you do go through worth it. And I like to focus on the positive; if you dwell on the positive and you keep your mind set there, you make what your day's going to be. You make how your life's going to go with how you think.

"Another way that being an SRO prepared me is by helping me build relationships with students and their parents. Knowing people helps because they trust you."

Harrison takes her new role very seriously. She wants to learn everything she can to help the department become more professional and to strengthen the trust of the com-

munity. She looks forward to being Chief McIver's right hand and supporting his initiatives for the department. Harrison wants to find more ways for the community and individuals to interact with the police department in positive ways. She's very open to people giving suggestions or pointing out problems.

"Come in and give your suggestions because it might be something that helps our department," said Harrison. "It might be something we don't know is going on. I want to be someone who listens and who lets people know that they're being heard."

If you want to make a complaint, Harrison will be there to listen to you. "I'm going to get both sides, and I'm going to investigate it. You're going to get a thor-ough investigation of your complaints, no matter how minor it is. Whatever actions need to be taken will be taken. What can be known will be known, but we have HIPAA." This means that they are not permitted, under federal law, to disclose certain things such as details pertaining to the disciplinary actions taken. "If I can't tell you, I can't tell you. But just trust that it's being handled."

ust that it's being handled." As deputy chief, Harrison will be available to make decisions when Chief McIver is not, which can speed up how quickly some situations are addressed. She also takes the wellbeing of her fellow officers very seriously, and wants to look out not only for their physical safety but their mental and emotional health as well.

"One of my roles is to make sure that officers are okay, so they can make good decisions in that split second," said Harrison. "You've got a normal level of adrenalin. We're always above that. It takes about 24 hours to reset your body [from an adrenal crash], but we've got to be back to work before that." For this reason, she's always on the lookout for officers who seem to be under additional stress.

When asked what she wants out of this position, Harrison said, "I just want to make my family, especially my daughter and my husband, and my babies [former students] all proud, and give them something to look up to. I want the community to know that I'm going to do the best I can to the best of my ability. I'm here for them. Community is number one. Anytime you need me, you can always reach me."

n an exclusive interview with the Minden Press-Herald, State Representative Dr. Wayne McMahen shed light on the imminent legislative agenda set to unfold in Baton Rouge. Anticipating a three-week special session closely followed by the regular session, McMahen delineated key topics earmarked for deliberation.

Crime, touted as a paramount concern, tops the legislative docket. "We have a high crime rate across our state and, if you don't have a safe state, it's hard to keep your kids here when they graduate from col-lege," stated McMahen. Gov-ernor Landry's past tenure as attorney general augurs well for having a deep understanding of the problems of crime in Louisiana. "I think he understands the issues that we're dealing with in this state."

In the most recent election, Webster Parish Sheriff Jason Parker was the only Sheriff in the region to run unopposed. In an interview with Parker, the dedication to serving the community shines through his every word, showing why the community is happy to have him continue in his role. "It's important for me to be open to the public," Sheriff Parker emphasizes. "My office and I, we work for the citizens of the parish. They elected me to be here, and being transparent with them, letting them know what's going on in the department, it's important to me."

Ône of the recent strides towards transparency and effective communication with the community is the appointment of Pat Culverhouse, a seasoned Public Information Officer with extensive experience. "Pat has got a ton of experience. He was the Public Information Officer for Caddo PA's Office for many years as well as the Bossier Parish Police Jury," Sheriff Parker stated.

"I could see that there was a need for us to improve on our social media and outreach to the community. My door is always open anytime people have questions or concerns or having issues out in the parish. We're here for the citizens."

Reflecting on the responsibilities of his role, Sheriff Parker likens it to running a business, emphasizing fiscal responsibility and public safety. "It's like running a business being sheriff," he notes. "You're dealing with a 30 million dollar budget where you're dealing with the taxpayer's money. That's a big responsibility on my part, to be able to utilize that in a way to not only help my office to function, but also keep the citizens safe, as well as my deputies."

Sheriff Parker's commitment to improvement extends beyond community engagement to infrastructural upgrades. "We've been working in conjunction with the police jury, and we've broken ground on the women's facility this past year," he shares. "Hopefully by the middle of this year, we'll be in the construction phase of the building going up. We're excited to be able to do something like this."

This new facility wouldn't only help local law enforcement, but also agencies

from the surrounding area. "Normally we average around 60 to 65 females. Only about 15 of those are Webster Parish females. We house females for other

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local agencies around like Bienville Parish, Claiborne Parish, Red River Parish. A majority of those females are from other agencies that have no way to house them."

The Sheriff also spoke of a new firing range that his office has invested in. This won't only be a benefit to his office and deputies, but to other local law enforcement agencies and citizens as well. The facility, along with getting one of his deputies a training to be a POST certified range instructor, will allow the Sheriff's Office to train officers and citizens alike.

"We are very proud to be able to offer something, not only to the deputies within the department, but also to the citizens," he emphasizes.

"It keeps things in house, it keeps us from having to ask to borrow another range facility from another parish, another agency. We will also be able to assist other agencies inside the parish if they need some assistance in training and re-certifying.

Additionally, the sheriff's office has acquired drones through a state grant, enabling efficient responses to emergencies and enhancing search and rescue capabilities. "If we have a hazmat incident on I-20 or 371 in the parish, instead of sending deputies into harm's way, we can launch that drone to get a survey of the site," said Sheriff Parker. "All done through a grant from the state, so it didn't cost the citizens."

Despite the challenges, Sheriff Parker expresses his dedication to serving the community for years to come. "If the Lord blesses me, I'd love to stay another 12 years," he shares. His active involvement in community activities and his commitment to accessibility distinguish him as a sheriff deeply rooted in his community. "I haven't really slowed down," he says. "I'm actively staying involved with community activities and functions. I can leave this office at lunch every day and go out visiting with folks, letting them know that I care about them, and I think that's what's gonna keep me here."

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Denise Edwards and her staff continue to provide exceptional service to the citizens

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enise Edwards, Webster Parish Assessor and her staff of Deputies continue to provide exceptional service to the citizens of Webster Parish. In 2023, Denise again lowered the millage rate of the Assessment District saving the taxpayers another ¹/₂ million dollars and bringing the total since she became Assessor to 1.5 million dollars. "We plan to continue to be fiscally responsible and good stewards of taxpayer money and strive to keep the millage rate for our office as low as possible. Our office completed the digitization of old records for attachment to our assessment program for easy reference. We also finished a complete update of our online GIS parcel data throughout the whole parish and purchased a new map printer to begin updating our in-office hanging maps.

We completed an audit of Cell Towers and equipment which resulted in a huge increase in our taxbase of over \$14 million in assessed value. These additional funds will help our law enforcement, schools, fire districts and other taxing bodies. We are continuing to audit Homestead Exemptions to identify parcels which do not qualify but also those that do and have not currently signed up for homestead.


parish must be revalued to its current Fair Market Value. Reassessment will be the main focus of 2024.

Real Estate prices have escalated greatly over the past four years which will increase the Fair Market Value substantially, but I can assure our taxpayers that we are working hard to keep their assessments fair and equitable in accordance with state law," says Edwards.

The only exemption to this is properties that have a Special Assessment freeze on them. They will remain the same assessed value. If you are at least 65 years old, permanently and totally disabled or a disabled veteran AND have an adjusted gross income of less than \$100,000, you qualify for a Special Assessment Freeze. If you are a disabled veteran, 50% or more, there are additional homestead exemptions that you may qualify for. We want to make sure our taxpayers are aware of any assistance that might be available. Please come by or call our office and we will be happy to help you with this.

"For the last four years under my administration, we have been proud and grateful to provide outstanding resources and services to the citizens of Webster Parish. I assure you that for the next four years we are dedicated to continue on this same path of excellence. Our door is always open! We look forward to serving your assessing needs," says Edwards.

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

He also set up another score with a long punt return and kept a TD drive alive with a fourth-down catch.

Sanders also had a very good game. After completing passes of 14 yards to Sentell and 12 yards to Powell, he scored on a 1-yard run and then hit Sentell for the two-point conversion, putting the Apaches up 30-6.

Smith also praised tight end Garrett Brown, who had a 54-yard catch on Glenbrook's first touchdown drive.

"Garrett Brown had a helluva game catching the football," Smith said. "He had two or three catches and they were big."

Glenbrook's final TD came on an 11-yard pass from Sanders to Preston Frye.

The defense gave up an 80-yard catch-and-run touchdown in the second quarter. But other than that, the Apaches dominated, getting sacks and other stops behind the line that put the Trojans in some tough situations.

If there was any negative, it was the early fumbles. That's something that has bitten the Apaches this season. It didn't matter Friday, but it could as the competition gets tougher.

"We've talked about how important it is in the grand scheme and outcome of games," Smith said. "I'll look at it this weekend and see if there's some other way I can address and remedy that situation.

"Ultimately it did not impact the outcome of the game. We were able to settle in and play our football and do a really good job and win the game."

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weeks now. He said things have gone smoothly so far.

"It's just a really good fit," he said late last week. "The kids are very coachable. They're used to winning. They're learning my way of working out. And it just seems to be going really positively."

Smith was officially named head coach on May 11. The Apaches started summer workouts on June 1.

This is Smith's first head coaching job after a highly successful career as an assistant with stints at North Caddo, Parkway, Logansport, Evangel Christian and West Monroe.

He spent the last four seasons helping North Caddo enjoy unprecedented success.

"I felt like I needed a new challenge," he said. "When I stepped back and analyzed what all had occurred in my career I felt like I needed to try it.

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I needed to kind of expand on what I had already done. And I didn't know what that would look like. So far I feel

really good about it." Glenbrook hasn't played 7-on-7 games against outside competition. But the Apaches have competed against each other.

"We probably won't participate in any tournaments," Smith said. "But we have done a little bit with each other and it has been really positive. It's good or better than I expected."

Besides regular workouts, weight training has been at the forefront.


A former offensive line coach, weight training is something that's especially important to Smith, who is an expert in the area.

Jacob Brown takes reins of Minden boys basketball

inden didn't need to look far to find its new head boys basketball coach.

After 14 seasons as the girls head coach, Jacob Brown is taking over the boys program.

He replaces Rennie Bailey, who resigned after seven seasons to become an assistant at Southern University.

Brown is a 1999 graduate of Minden where he was a multi-sport athlete.

In 14 seasons, he posted a record of 242-173. From 2015-19, Minden went 107-27 in four seasons. The Lady Tiders reached the Class 4A quarterfinals in 2018 and the semifinals in 2019. Minden also won the District 1-4A title in the 2018-19 season.

The Lady Tiders have made the playoffs seven of the last eight seasons.

Brown's roots in Minden run deep. His grandfather, the late Clyde "Buster" Carlisle, had a very successful run as the Crimson Tide head coach from 1970-80. He won more than 1,000 games in a legendary 41-year career in Louisiana and Texas.

His mother Debbie and father Teddy are both Minden graduates. His uncle, Randy, Buster's son, was a star basketball player at Minden and a very successful high school coach with seven state championship and almost 1,000 wins to his credit.

Brown coached boys at Webster. While he's enjoyed and had a lot of success coaching girls basketball, he said it's been a goal of his to coach boys at the high school level like his grandfather.

"It's always hard to leave any position you're in, at least the ones I've been in anyway, just because of the investment in the kids that you interact with on a daily basis," he said.

"It was a career goal of mine, not one that I've really tried to rush. But it was a career goal of mine to get back to the boys coach. And yes, my grandfather was the boys coach here at Minden from 1970 to 1980. "He experienced a lot of success here before he went over to the state of Texas. So for me to have this opportunity is very special for me and my family."

Brown said following in his grandfather's footsteps might seem like a lot of pressure to some. But he sees it as an opportunity and a blessing.

"And being able to sit and talk basketball throughout the years I no doubt feel that he would be thrilled and excited," Brown said.

Brown said he appreciated the faith Robin Tucker, Minden's principal at the time, showed in bringing him to Minden from Webster 14 years ago. And he appreciates the support and trust Becky Wilson, Minden's current principal, has given him.

"You never know what's going to happen when you get in the profession of coaching," he said. "To be honest with you Minden has been really good to me. It's a special place. You never really kind of expect to go back home.

"But it happened early and it happened early for me when I began coaching at Webster Junior High School. And all I kind think of it is is opportunity and being blessed. After four years of being at Webster it was an opportunity to go to the high school as a head girls coach. I was blessed. My principal at that time was very proud of me and still is but she always told me it was great to be able to see people grow in that aspect."

Brown doesn't see any big issue transitioning from coaching girls to boys.

"What allows you to win basketball games, first it's about winning young people, winning in the game of life," he said "But yes, we obviously know in the sports aspect of it we're trying to win games."

Brown said it all goes back to fundamentals.

"That's your foundation," he said. "You have to be good at those things. I'm sure when I get back into it — you know, it's been 14 years — I'm sure there are go-

ing to be some details that are different. Ain't no doubt, it's going to be faster.

"But as far as the things that'll allow you to be successful I just think it happens on both sides, boys and girls."

Minden hasn't had a lot of success in boys basketball recently. The Tide play in one of the state's strongest districts. Over the years, District 1-4A has included teams like Bossier, Huntington and Woodlawn which have been state champion contenders year in and year out.

Of course Brown wants Minden to reach that level but he said it's a process.

"Obviously, the ultimate goal is, yeah, the state championship," he said. "I think there is a process and steps you have to take. You have to get in the playoffs to win that state championship. But we're going to take it step by step.

"What really makes that intriguing is that is for years it's been the same way on the girls side. Huntington, Minden, Woodlawn, Benton at times ... You were prepared for that playoff run in your district.

"Every night you had to be prepared to play. You couldn't let up. And so that'll transition over to the boys."

Brown is excited about the new challenge.

"Ĭ've already squeezed in some meetings with the guys and tried to really begin to emphasize what we want to accomplish and try to set a vision and provide expectations as to really what the program expects," he said. "I'm just excited about being able to create a vision for these players and for their vision to align with mine."

For Brown and his family, including wife Rachel Hollingsworth Brown and children Hudson, 15, William, 13, and Anna Beth, 9, Minden has always been a special place, both the town and high school.

"I mean it's just this is all I know," he's said. "Crimson red, columbia blue and white. And I'm just thrilled to be able to lead these young men."



FORMER MINDEN HIGH AND LOUISIANA TECH STAR L'JARIUS SNEED IS A TWO-TIME SUPER BOWL CHAMPION

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Sneed's Kansas City Chiefs defeated the San Francisco 49ers 25-22 in overtime in Super Bowl XLIII Sunday night at Allegiant Stadium.

In four seasons in the NFL, Sneed has played in three Super Bowls. The Chiefs are the first team to win back-to-back titles since the New England Patriots in 2003 and 2004.

Sneed, a cornerback, was credited with two solo and three total tackles along with one pass defended.

The Chiefs sent the game into overtime tied at 19 on a 29-yard field goal by Harrison Butker with 3 seconds left in regulation.

The 49ers took the lead on their first possession on a 27-yard field goal by

Jake Moody with 7:22 left in overtime. Kansas Čity drove 75 yards in 13 plays

for the winning touchdown. Patrick Mahomes completed a 3-yard pass to Mecole Hardman for a walk-off touchdown with 3 seconds left.

Mahomes, who completed 34-of-46

passes for 333 yards and two TDs, was named the Super Bowl MVP.


Sneed finished the full season with 72 solo and 92 total tackles. He had 12 solo and 14 total tackles in the postseason.

If not for Sneed, the Chiefs may not have even made it to the Super Bowl.

Game. On the first play of the fourth quarter and Baltimore facing a second-and-8 at

the Kansas City 9, Lamar Jackson completed a pass to Zay Flowers.

Just before Flowers crossed the goalline Sneed slapped the ball out of Flowers' hands. Sneed's team-mate Trent McDuffie recovered the ball in the end zone for a touchback.

"He had a step on me," Sneed said in his post game press conference. "All that was in my mind was step up, make the tackle. That's what I did and I see him stretch the ball out and I punched the ball and it came out."

Not only did Sneed, a cornerback, make

Flowers caught a 54-yard pass against Sneed. He stood over Sneed after the catch and was penalized for taunting.

"I didn't know that he did that," Sneed said. "If I did I would've said something. The guys were telling me he stepped over me.'

Sneed will be a free agent in March. He recently told ESPN he wants to stay with the Chiefs.

Doyline star Harris dominates Class B girls State Track and Field Meet

Doyline junior Izayla Harris won three Class B girls events and finished second in another in the Ochsner LHSAA Outdoor Track & Field State Meet last Thursday at LSU's Bernie Moore Stadium.

Harris successfully defended her titles in the 100-, 200- and 400-meter dashes, setting class records in all three events. She also finished second in the triple jump.

The Panthers finished tied for 14th with 14 points. Episcopal of Acadiana won with 91, 30 more than runner-up Castor.

Glenbrook sophomore Vivian Still finished fifth in the Class 1A girls 800 in 2:31.65. Louise S. McGehee's Kali Magana won in 12.20.63.

Still only began competing in track in the district meet. She was named the co-MVP on the All-District 1-1A softball team.
