Webster Parish Schools proposals on April 27 ballot: What voters need to know

The upcoming Municipal General Election on April 27, 2024, holds significant importance for Webster Parish schools, with three key propositions on the ballot. These proposals aim to renew millages and issue bonds crucial for supporting public education in the parish. Here’s a breakdown of the propositions:

Parishwide School District Proposition (Millage Renewal): The Webster Parish School District seeks to renew a special tax of 2.81 mills on all taxable property in the district. This tax, estimated to generate \$743,102 annually, will provide essential support for maintaining and operating public schools across the parish, covering expenses such as cleaning supplies and fire alarm testing. The renewal period spans 10 years, from 2026 to 2035.

Springhill School District No. 8 Proposition No. 1 (Millage Continuation): Residents of Springhill School District No. 8 will decide on continuing a special tax of 7.69 mills, estimated to yield \$328,450 annually. This

Webster Parish Sheriff’s Office receives grant for enhanced body protection

Webster Parish Sheriff’s Office deputies and investigators have welcomed a bolstering of their body protection gear, courtesy of a grant facilitated by the Webster Office of Homeland Security and Emergency Preparedness (WOHSEP).

Eight armored vests, valued at approximately \$8,000, were procured through funds administered by the Governor’s Office of Homeland Security and Emergency Preparedness (GOHSEP), as disclosed by WOHSEP Director Brian Williams.

“The Sheriff’s Office presented their needs to us, and we diligently searched through our grant resources to secure the necessary funding,” Williams remarked. “It’s gratifying to provide assis-

tance to our deputies with this essential equipment.”

Webster Parish Sheriff Jason Parker emphasized the superior quality of the acquired vests, highlighting their capability to mitigate severe injuries from higher caliber ammunition.

“These vests differ from the standard issue worn by most deputies,” Parker explained. “Their plating is specifically engineered to halt more potent rounds, which is invaluable when confronting potentially heavily armed individuals. This acquisition significantly enhances our operational readiness.”

Parker further revealed forthcoming enhancements to his office’s equipment inventory courtesy of the Webster homeland security office. An additional \$6,000 in grant funds will be allocated towards procuring upgraded radio equipment, facilitating seamless communication among deputies during critical incidents.

37th annual Hungerfest raises over \$15,600 for Minden’s UCAP Program

The Minden UCAP hosted its 37th Annual Hungerfest this past Thursday at the First Methodist Church where a plethora of desserts and baked goods were up for auction. The year also marks the 40th anniversary for UCAP in Minden, having been founded in 1984.

“We’re really excited to have this Hungerfest, and we have this awesome array of desserts

and hams. This is one of our two fundraisers, and we just want it to be a big success,” said UCAP Director Charlotte Jones.

The proceeds from these fundraisers go toward the program’s roughly \$70,000 annual budget, which helps UCAP to fulfill various services for local citizens in need. Last year UCAP saw 497 food requests, 1,062 requests of clothing or household goods, spent \$2,200 on rental assistance, and spent \$59,368 on utili-

ties, the biggest service UCAP provides locally.

Tracy Campbell served as the auctioneer for the evening. The auction itself raised about \$7,300. More donations came in from people who couldn’t attend, which brought the total to a little over \$15,600.

“We appreciate all the people who come out, the bakers and people who made the goods, and the community for their continued support,” said Jones.

Webster Parish Police Jury greenlights water project and plans vibrant April initiatives at recent meeting

The April 2 meeting of the Webster Parish Police Jury (WPPJ) proceeded smoothly with all board members in attendance except Bruce Blanton. The session saw unanimous approval on all agenda items.

Following the endorsement of minutes and invoices, the board greenlit a cooperative endeavor involving the WPPJ, the Town of Sibley, and the Saltworks Water System. The WPPJ will serve as the sponsor for the Saltworks

block grant, allocating funds towards the construction of a new water well on Sibley-owned property, as Sibley’s water system merges with the Saltworks Water System.

In the committee reports segment, Savannah Jones, representing Webster Parish Libraries, provided updates on the forthcoming Discovery Camp, the digital year-book project, and a refrigerator upgrade for the Stewart Center.

Serena Gray, representing Webster Parish Tourism, informed attendees

that the installation of the anticipated kayak dock launch was postponed due to high water levels. Additionally, she announced an \$800 rebate for the procurement of the next kayak launch dock. Gray highlighted April as a bustling month for tourism, inviting individuals to refer to their Facebook page for event listings, including a “Love the Boot” after-party on April 25.

The LSU AgCenter anticipates a busy month ahead with openings in their Master Gardeners

class, the Trails and Trelises event scheduled for April 27, and forthcoming activities such as the Northwest Region Wildlife Forum and a homesteading workshop. John Monzingo emphasized the plethora of upcoming events and encouraged interested parties to reach out to the Webster Parish LSU AgCenter for further details.

Brian Williams from the Office of Homeland Security reported progress on a cyber security assessment for the parish and the completion of grants

earmarked for the Sheriff’s Office and the Minden Police Department. Additionally, the acquisition of new body cameras for School Resource Officers was made possible through a grant.

Angie Chapman, director of Webster Parish 911, noted a decrease in 911 calls for March while maintaining a 100% rate of calls answered within 10 seconds. She also alerted the public to an upcoming transmission line trimming operation by an energy company utilizing a helicopter and an

extended saw from April 15 to 26, anticipating an uptick in emergency calls during this unusual event.

Jessica Gorman of the Dorcheat Museum reported a surge in visitor numbers and increased donations to the museum. She highlighted the “Night at the Museum” seminar on April 15, focusing on cemetery preservation.

The WPPJ convenes on the first Tuesday of each month at 10:30 AM at the Webster Parish Courthouse Annex, located at 401 Main Street.

levy, also for a duration of 10 years from 2025 to 2034, includes a .60 mills increase due to reappraisal.

Springhill School District No. 8 Proposition No. 2 (Bond): The Springhill School District No. 8 proposes issuing bonds not exceeding \$11,000,000, with a maximum 20-year term and interest rate not exceeding 7% per annum. The purpose of these bonds is to finance capital expenditures for school purposes, including repairs, upgrades, and improvements. The bonds will be payable from ad valorem taxes, with an estimated increase of 12.75 mills in the first year above the current 28.50 mills being levied.

The capital would be used for much needed repairs and upgrades to the two elementary schools in Springhill: Browning Elementary and Brown Upper Elementary. Both schools have serious roof issues that have gone years with patch jobs, and both schools need more parking. Beyond this, there is a need for

new windows, awnings, woodwork, and paint.

This money would also be used to make improvements to the athletic facilities at North Webster High School. The facilities there were not updated when the new school was built over a decade ago. Projects include upgrading the running track, which the school and community use, building a new field house and adding some visitors' restrooms and concession area for the football program, as well as renovating the backstops, restrooms, and concession area at the baseball/softball facilities.

Superintendent Rowland and the Webster Parish School Board are urging voters to support these propositions, emphasizing the critical need for these improvements in Springhill.

Early voting will be April 13-20 from 8:30 AM to 6 PM, and on election day, April 27, the polls are open from 7 AM to 8 PM. Voters are encouraged to participate in this election to support the improvement of education and facilities in Webster Parish schools.

Biden Declared Easter Sunday to be ‘Transgender Visibility Day’ While Also Prohibiting Religious Themes at White House

I was stunned this past Easter weekend to learn that President Biden had declared Easter Sunday to be “Transgender Visibility Day.” Easter, the highest, holy day of the Christian year for millions of Americans and still billions more around the world. That’s the day President Biden thought best to endorse and highlight transgenderism.

U.S. House Speaker Mike Johnson (Shreveport, LA) responded that the White House “betrayed the central tenet of Easter—which is the Resurrection of Jesus Christ.” He further stated, “banning sacred truth and tradition—while at the same time proclaiming Easter Sunday as ‘Transgender Day’—is outrageous and abhorrent.”

The Heritage Foundation responded on X that “Easter Sunday is the holiest day of the Christian calendar, celebrating the resurrection of Jesus Christ. Transgender Day of Visibility is a sacrilegious invention celebrating the mutilation of healthy human bodies. That it would exist at all is a disservice to Americans. That it would attempt to usurp Easter is unacceptable. The Biden administration should recant and apologize to America for its perversions.”

As always, the media rushed out to defend Biden stating that the fact that his proclamation fell on Easter was merely coincidental. We know better.

Recall that this transgender insanity was first advanced

when the Biden Administration made a striking departure on Title IX, a federal education law that prevents discrimination based on sex—meaning biological males and females—with his Executive Order on “Preventing and Combating Discrimination on the Basis of Gender Identity or Sexual Orientation.” The language sounds benign but it allows biological males who “identify” as females to compete in girls’ and women’s sports and use female locker rooms and restrooms.

and, therefore, to “ban men from participating in women’s sports.” President Trump also specifically reaffirmed the position that public school districts may exclude students from athletic teams based on “gender identity” and could require students to use bathrooms based on biological sex, rather than gender identity.

Recall the Transgender LGBT community already has two full months to celebrate their personal choices—LGBT Pride month is June, and LGBT History Month is in October. Biden could have easily pro-

tected and respected Easter Sunday—the holiest single day on the Christian calendar for the past 2000 years.

Wow. But Transgender Day is not all.

At the annual White House Easter Egg Roll, officials banned submissions with religious symbols or “overtly religious themes” from the children’s Easter egg art design competition. (The Biden White House states that the non-religious theme requirement had been in place for many years but that’s beside the point).

So, on the most sacred day of the year for millions of American Christians, the President of the United States elevates the mental disorder of transgenderism and at the same time prohibits religious imagery from the Easter Egg celebration.

Did Biden really have to choose Easter Sunday to take this action? Does he not understand the deep offense taken by millions of Americans?

Let me include one more indication of the difference in Biden and Trump on such issues.

Mick Mulvaney, who served several roles in the Trump Administration, recounts in the Wall Street Journal “What Trump Did for the Faithful.”

He describes a situation in 2018, when he was Director of the Office of Management and Budget, in which he realized that several members of his

budgeting team would not be able to leave the White House to attend Mass and/or Ash Wednesday because the budget deadline was approaching. He asked President Trump if a Catholic Mass could be held at the White House at the Old Executive Office Building. Trump approved the request. “More than 100 people showed up to the first Mass in history in the White House compound” Mulvaney recalls. He further states “after the Mass started, Protestant, Muslim and Jewish services were also held on the White House campus grounds.”

Mulvaney also shares that when Pres. Trump was leaving the White House, Mulvaney encouraged new Biden staffers to continue the tradition. Unfortunately, “neither the Mass nor any of the other religious services have resumed.” (Wall Street Journal, 4-4-2024).

This is the conclusion. You either respect and support the exercise of religious faith and practice, or you don’t. At different times, Pres. Biden and his Administration have expressed both indifference for, and hostility to, the Christian faith. We should not forget.

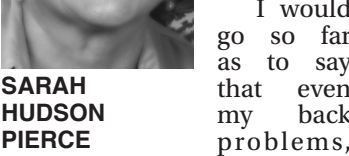
Having had rotator cuff surgery on August 28, 2018 I continue to ponder the connection of the mind and body.

I would go so far as to say that even my back problems, which led to a fall causing my shoulder injury may also be linked to a psychosomatic illness -- which isn’t to say that the pain hasn’t been real.

Since that time I continue to think most of my illnesses have been psychosomatic because I don’t know how to truly relax and let go and let God take over. Life isn’t easy.

It’s like the renowned artist, the late Jerry Wray, often said “we all have something” which could mean many things.

I ponder how our mind and our bodies are connected.

I think if we could ever gain control of and become master of our thoughts most of our illnesses would be eliminated.

Since my colon surgery I’ve talked to two friends who experienced the same colon surgery I did after they each experienced one too many traumatic blows to their emotional system. They underwent surgeries identical to mine, including the doctor who performed all of our surgeries.

How or why we have this strong mind body connection I do not understand but I sense it is true. I also believe that if we understood and followed God’s plan for our lives everything would fall into place but I know that most likely that will never happen because we are either too stubborn or weak willed to give into divine guidance for our lives.

The Bible also says “it is not

in man to direct his own steps.”

How true -- how very true!

The Bible also says “the fool hath said in his heart there is no God.”

Maybe I am just a simple minded person but when I observe the universe and my own body I know there is just too much evidence going on here to not believe in a higher power and I know that we are often too weak willed or to stubborn to turn our lives over to Him completely because we want to hold the reins of our lives, not submitting to His will -- yet I know that He doesn’t want a puppet but children who want to listen -- to obey but we most likely are a far cry from getting there but this body is physical and one day we will shed that which causes us much unnecessary pain because we are human.

But Jesus is the same yesterday, today and forever and He always gets me to the right place at the right, even though I never seem to get it all figured out.

I do enjoy being me, the girl from the backwoods of Arkansas!

Sneed: ‘I left everything in God’s hands’

Former Minden star discusses trade to Tennessee

Former Minden star L’Jarius Sneed met with the media at an introductory press conference in Nashville last week after being traded from the Kansas City Chiefs to the Tennessee Titans.

According to media reports, Sneed signed a four-year contract worth \$76 million with \$55 million guaranteed.

But the cornerback said money wasn’t the most important thing.

“The money don’t change anything,” said Sneed, a former Louisiana Tech standout. “I love this game for the game. The money, you know, for my family, to get them right, take a little pressure off my shoulders. Now I can do what I love and play ball.”

Sneed spent four years in Kansas City. He played in three Super Bowls and his play was instrumental in the Chiefs winning the last two.

He said he prayed about the trade and signing with Tennessee.

“Oh man just say God honestly,” he said. “I left everything in God’s hands you know during the whole entire little situation. Whatever was going on I just stayed

prayed up and just let God do his work.

“It was kind of nerve-racking I can say because me and my agent, it was a lot of back and forth. My agent was telling me to be calm and let everything come out. Last Monday (March 25) is where I realized I’m going to get the trade.”

Sneed is coming to a team that went 6-11 last season. He was asked what he was bringing from the winning culture in Kansas City.

“Just bring my swagger you know,” he said. “Just bring what I learned, what the coaches over there installed in me, and bring it here. And I think we’re going to be OK.”

The Titans are expected to have a young secondary and Sneed wants to help his new teammates by imparting what he learned in Kansas City.

“I can say I know what it took,” he said. “It’s not only in the building. We took time out of the building coming together as in praying or coming together as one, as a whole, and that’s what I’m going to try to bring here, just try to pull us together. And I think when we’re together as a whole we can play good coverage.”

Sneed said he wants to

continue to be a leader.

“I wouldn’t say that I’m very very vocal,” he said. “I’m not the ra ra guy. I’m not going to be all down your neck. I might pull you to the side, say work on this, work on that, or even work with you to get better.”

Sneed was a fourth-round draft pick. He said he has continued to grow and learn over the years and that gaining confidence in his abilities was a process.

“Each year I go back and watch my film,” he said. “Whatever I can get better at that’s what I try to do each year and this year I’m going to do the same.

“The confidence built over the years and it got better and better over the years. Coming as a low draft from a small school, I know everybody didn’t believe in me. But I stayed down and kept working.”

Sneed said confidence, resiliency and relentlessness are his hallmarks now.

“I’m a hell of a player. I love my game. I don’t fear anything. I’m not afraid to lose but I’m going to win most of my reps.”

That attitude has helped him shut down some of the NFL’s top receivers. It’s something he takes pride in.

“I wanted to follow the number one guys and the best guys on the field,” he

said. “That what I want to do. You know each year I try to make new challenges, challenge myself.”

“If I can eliminate one guy, the best player on the field, it helps everybody else around us,” he said later in the conference.

Titans General Manager Ran Carthon sat beside Sneed and also spoke at the press conference.

Sneed toured the team’s practice facility at Ascension St. Thomas Sports Park with his mother, Jane, and his 6-year-old son, according to a report on tennesseetitans.com, the team’s official website.

“It’s great,” he said. “I feel a connection already. I feel like family. He’s (Carthon) making me feel comfortable already in this facility and it’s my first time to meet him and the whole organization.”

Sneed was known for giving back to the community in Kansas City. He said he plans to continue that in Tennessee.

“God used me in Kansas City,” he said. “I’m going to make sure He uses me here in Tennessee.

“Giving back to the community, whatever I can do, whatever God has planned for me in my life, in Tennessee. That’s what I’m bringing here.”

Things looking up for turkey season

There is no way I could ever forget my introduction to hunting wild turkeys. I had actually tagged along years ago behind Blue Parkman, a veteran turkey hunter from Ruston who had several years of chasing gobblers under his belt. Back then, turkeys were scarce only being found in isolated areas such as the Jackson Bienville wildlife management area where I followed Parkman. The hunt ended without success although I got to hear a turkey gobble for the first time.

It was years later, 1994, that my addiction to turkey hunting began when I accepted the invitation to hunt turkeys in Alabama. I was reluctant at first because I had never turkey hunted and the date of the invitation coincided with bream bedding season here at home. I rather reluctantly accepted the invitation, shot my very first gobbler and I was instantly hooked. Some 20 years later before age and infirmities halted my ability to chase gobblers, I was able to bring down 41 gobblers from around the country, collecting my coveted Grand Slam in the process.

I would love to still be able to hurry across the woods to be sitting within 100 yards of a roosted gobbler before it flew down. Since I can’t, I enjoy talking about them, writing about them and supporting them by my membership in our local chapter of the National Wild Turkey Federation.

Now that turkey season is kicking off – opening day in Area A this year is April 6 – I visited with the state’s top wild turkey expert, Cody Cedatol, to get his thoughts on what the turkey situation looks like this year in Louisiana. For the past several years, things have not

been quite so rosy as they have been in earlier times.

“Based on all we have been able to tell,” Cedatol began, “things are looking better than they have over the last decade or so. We have had a good hatch two years in a row and we have determined that the gobbler harvest was up again last year so we’re excited about that.”

My next question had to do with the reason or reasons that things are looking better for our state’s turkey population.

“There are at least a couple of reasons,” said Cedatol. “A few years ago, we delayed the opening of turkey season to give gobblers and hens a bit longer to get together and breed and

this has resulted in better hatches of young turkeys. Another reason is an environmental one. For the past couple of years, we have had better weather during the nesting and brooding season. Turkeys need a relatively dry period from April to June and that’s what we’ve had and turkeys have responded.”

Cedatol noted that there were reports of a good population of juvenile males (jakes) last year which means those that carried over will be adult gobblers this season.

I wondered what plans if any were on the drawing board going forward from this year as regards management of wild turkeys.

“We have a proposal

before the Wildlife and Fisheries Commission that would prohibit the harvest of jakes except by youth hunters. Lots of hunters have expressed a desire for us to do this and in fact, many private hunting clubs already prohibit the taking of jakes. It’s not a done deal as the proposal is out for public comments and Commission won’t be acting on it until their April meeting,” he said.

Public hearings will take place around the state prior to the meeting giving hunters the opportunity to express opinions as to whether or not the prohibition of taking jakes will become law. Have an opinion? Let the Commission know what you think.
