Springhill man arrested on multiple drug and firearm charges

Webster Parish narcotics officers and deputies arrested Jaquan Lee, 29, of Springhill after a traffic stop on Wednesday led to a significant drug and firearm seizure.

Lee faces multiple charges after authorities found illegal drugs in his vehicle and additional narcotics and firearms at his home.

"We were involved in a joint investigation with the Louisiana State Police narcotics unit, targeting this suspect," Capt. Bobby Igo III explained. "Sgt. Josh McCormick initiated a traffic stop, and the vehicle stopped at the suspect's residence where we received consent to search.

McCormick, along with Lt. Coby Barton, Sgt. Shawn Jenkins, and Dep. Damian Christian, discovered a suspicious item in the vehicle, which Lee denied knowing about.

"We called for a K9 unit from Minden PD, and the dog alerted on the vehicle," Igo said. "After obtaining a warrant, we searched the vehicle and found approximately 560 grams of marijuana. This led us to get permission to search the suspect's home.

At Lee's residence, officers found more marijua-

curred at the corner of South Gum Street and M.L.K. Boulevard. The officer detected the odor of alcohol emanating from the vehicle upon approaching the driver, Eric Robinson, 57, of Minden. When questioned, passenger Kenneth Carter admitted to previously drinking but denied any

present in the vehicle.

Robinson consented to a search of the vehicle. Backup officers arrived, and both Robinson and Carter were frisked for weapons. During the search, an open Bud Light can was found on the front passenger floorboard, and a vodka bottle was located in the driver's side door. Additionally, a pipe commonly used for smoking crack cocaine was found in an eyeglass case in the center console. Robinson admitted the case and glasses were his but denied ownership of the pipe.

A more thorough search of Robinson revealed a gie with a small amount of cocaine in his coin pocket. Robinson was arrested for possession of Schedule II drugs, drug paraphernalia, and open container violations.

Dispatch informed the officer that Carter had an active bench warrant for failure to appear for

arraignment. Both Robinson and Carter were taken into custody without incident, advised of their Miranda rights, and transported to the Minden Police Department for booking.

Monroe man arrested on multiple charges

A Minden police officer arrested a Monroe man for speeding, leading to the discovery of mariiuana and a child without proper restraints in the vehicle.

While stationed on the I-20 on-ramp at mile marker 47 westbound, the officer clocked a ve-

hicle traveling at 87 mph in a 70 mph zone. Initiating lights and sirens at mile marker 45, the driver ignored the signals and continued until pulling over at mile marker 41.

Upon contact, the officer identified the driver as Justin Banks, 28, of the 1200 block of Georgia Street in Monroe. A strong odor of marijuana emanated from the vehicle,

prompting the officer to place Banks under arrest for flight from an officer.

During a vehicle search, the officer discovered Banks' approximately three-year-old son without a car seat. Banks was transported to the Minden Police Department, where he informed the officer of having concealed an item in his groin area. The officer retrieved 8.2 grams of suspected marijuana from Banks.

Banks was charged with exceeding the speed limit, taking contraband into a penal institution, flight from an officer, no child passenger restraint, and manufacturing/distribution/possession of a Schedule I controlled substance (marijuana).

na, a bag of white powder on a 9MM handgun, an AR-style rifle with extended magazines, and containers with pills.

Lee is charged with possession of a controlled dangerous substance Schedule I (marijuana) with intent to distribute, possession of a controlled dangerous substance Schedule II (cocaine), possession of a controlled dangerous substance Schedule II (Oxycodone), and possession of a firearm in the presence of a controlled dangerous substance. He is currently held at Bayou Dorcheat Correctional Center with bond pending.

"This successful arrest highlights the cooperation between the Louisiana State Police narcotics unit, the Minden Police Department's K9 unit, and our narcotics officers and patrol deputies," Igo said. "Collaboration like this is crucial in addressing drug-related crimes."

This case underscores the effectiveness of joint law enforcement efforts in tackling narcotics distribution and associated offenses.

Harrison Butker Kicks a Field Goal Against the Bullying Thugs of the Cancel Culture

You may have heard of the speech of Kansas City Chiefs' kicker, Harrison Butker, to the graduating class of Benedictine College.


The speech and Butker have been attacked and criticized nationally for his supposedly "chauvinistic" and sexist

As such, it's only fair to review the speech but before I do, I point out that Butker was not making the speech on national TV or radio. He wasn't even addressing a Facebook or X audience and he clearly wasn't "at the office in his uniform" representing the Chiefs or the NFL.

In contrast, it was Colin Kaepernick who, on the sidelines of games in his San Francisco 49ers uniform, representing his team and the NFL, knelt down during our National Anthem and disrespected our flag and the 1.1 million American soldiers who fought and died in defense of our country and who were laid to rest with the American flag draping their coffins.

Also, while Butker spoke lovingly and respectfully of the role of women and mothers, the NFL rebuked him for his lack of "diversity." This is the same NFL whose rampant domestic abuse problem by its players is so bad the league was forced to set up a National Domestic Violence hotline to try to salvage its reputation with pro football fans, particularly women.

Again, Butker offered his remarks at Benedictine College, a small Catholic school where principles like the ones he shared serve as the central purpose of the school's existence and why parents send their children to it. This is, again, a distinguishing fact

tire nation

to the world.

So, at a Christian Catholic college Butker spoke out against LGBT Pride month stating he preferred "Godcentered pride." He also specifically addressed the women graduating from the college: "I think it is you, the women, who have had the most diabolic lies told to you. Some of you may go on to lead successful careers in the world but I would venture to guess that the majority of you are most excited about your marriage and the children you will bring into this world."

Butker praised his wife, Isabelle, explaining that he is

"able to be the man that I am" because his wife has taken on a role as a homemaker. He also encouraged the men to "be unapologetic in [their] masculinity" and spoke out against "the tyranny of diversity, equity and inclusion," arguing, "we fear speaking truth because now, unfortunately, truth is in the minority."

Millions of Americans agree with these remarks.

I was delighted to witness the courage and outspokenness of Tavia Hunt, the wife of Chiefs co-owner Clark Hunt, who took to Instagram in response:

""I've always encouraged my daughters to be highly educated and chase their dreams. I want them to know that they can do whatever they want (that honors God). But I also want them to know that I believe finding a spouse who loves and honors you as or before himself and raising a family together is one of the greatest blessings this world has to offer."

Directly addressing Butker's remarks she stated that "affirming motherhood and praising your wife, as well as highlighting the sacrifice and dedication it takes to be a mother, is not bigoted. It is empowering to acknowledge that a woman's hard work in raising children is not in vain. Countless highly educated women devote their lives to

nurturing and guiding their children."

Beautifully stated.

However, these timeless truths are not the reason I write today.

I write to highlight the fact that no one is required to agree with Butker. People are free to disagree, and many have in a vicious and vitriolic

My point is that he was addressing a specific audience with a specific message and every reason to believe that audience was open to hearing and considering his message. Unfortunately, what he stated is apparently too faith-based and moral to even be uttered and must be torn down.

This is the Cancel Culture. This is what unvarnished censorship looks like. Butker's ideas are so powerful that they must not be voiced.

On a side note, the sale of Butker's NFL jersey has skyrocketed to the top of NFL sales.

This kind of censorship simply cannot be allowed if the freedoms guaranteed by our Constitution are to endure..

His kind of preaching pricked a ten year old child's heart. His sermons made me sit up and know the reality of it all. I would later become a Christian at fourteen as a result of those memories!

And then in September 1958 Wayne is called to leave our small church and to move to Florida.

The reality of their move became surreal when Brother

Earnest came to visit us on the last Sunday night after church on September 21, 1958 to celebrate my sister's thirteenth birthday.

He must have spent a couple of hours but it was never long

A look back at the 2023-24 high school sports year

Now that the 2023-24 high school sports season is in the books, it's time to take a look at some of the highlights from the past nine months.

We can start back in the fall with football season. The biggest story was probably North Webster's turnaround. The Knights went from 2-8 in 2022 to 7-5. They reached the second round of the non-select Division III playoffs, losing to eventual runnerup St. James.

Of course, before the school year was out, Head Coach John Ware would be named to the same position at Lakeside, ending a 12-year run.

While the season didn't go the way he wanted it to after some close early losses, Spencer Heard became Minden's winningest head coach. He'll take a 64-56 record into his 12th season as head

Glenbrook completed its first season under Reagan Smith with an 8-3 mark. The Apaches reached the second round of the non-select Division IV playoffs.

Also in the fall, Glenbrook finished fourth in the Division V cross country girls state meet in Natchitoches.

Boys basketball hasn't been the parish's strong suit in recent years but that could be changing.

Doyline continued its strong run under Michael Normand. The Panthers went 23-3 in the regular season and won the District 1-B title. They finished 24-4 after failing to Hicks in the second round of the non-select Division

V playoffs. Minden came very close to earning a share of the District 1-4A title under first-year head coach Iacob Brown, Technically the Tide finished tied for fourth. But at 4-3 Minden finished just one game behind tri-champions Bossier, Evangel Christian and Huntington.

Minden finished 15-8 overall after falling to No. 3 Carroll in the second round in Monroe. It was the Tide's first winning season since 2016 when they went 15-13.

That was also the last time Minden made the playoffs. The Tide's firstround victory over Leesville was their first playoff win since 2011.

Parish teams and athletes had a very strong showing in spring sports. In baseball, Glenbrook

won the District 1-1A championship then had a remarkable run through the select Division IV playoffs. The Apaches defeated the No. 6, No. 3 and No. 2 seeds before falling to No. 1 Opelousas Catholic in the title game.

Minden had a very good season in Cody Davis' second year as head coach. The Tide finished tied for second in District 1-4A and took a 21-8 record into the non-select Division II playoffs.

They defeated No. 19 Beau Chene in the first round then upset No. 3 Brusly in the second to reach the quarterfinals for the first time since 2012. Both best-of-3 series went the distance.

Minden finished one victory short of making the state tournament, falling to No. 6 North Vermilion two games to one in the quarterfinals. The Tide completed the season 26-12.

Lakeside made a run to the non-select Division IV quarterfinals before falling to No. 4 seed De-Quincy.

In softball, Minden went 18-12 in the regular season and won a nonselect Division II playoff game. Minden Head Coach Shelby Leach resigned after the season to take the head coach position at Benton.

Lakeside finished 16-17 in Brittany Frazier Smith's first season as head coach. The Lady Warriors won a non-select Division IV playoff game before losing a 3-2 heartbreaker to No. 6 Merryville in the second round.

Glenbrook won the District 1-1A championship. The Lady Apaches reached the second round of the non-select Division V playoffs before falling to No. 4 St. Frederick.

In track and field, Doyline's Izayla Harris capped her brilliant career by winning four events in the Class B state meet. She was named MVP for the third consecutive year.

A player must be a first-team All-District selection to be eligible for the LSCA teams. Coaches nominate players then the membership votes on the teams.



New book covers from Tensas to turkeys

The small Concordia Parish village of Ferriday has received national if not worldwide acclaim for three reasons. Jerry Lee Lewis, Mickey Gilley and Jimmy Swaggart. Three cousins, who grew up in Ferriday would become known across the globe for Lewis' and Gilley's piano-pounding music and Swaggart's preaching.

Seven miles up the road from Ferriday, the Franklin Parish hamlet of Gilbert has produced another notable figure who's behind the scenes work with his video camera has made his name known throughout the outdoors industry. He is John L. Brown, Jr. who for some 20 years worked as videographer for the National Wild Turkey Federation, eventually being named Executive Producer.

For more than two decades, his expertise with the camera put him in close quarters with every well-known name in the outdoors industry.

Brown has now retired and has moved back home to his north Louisiana roots. He finally had time to put together a wonderful hard cover book, "Gathering Light" that covers his life from growing up along the Tensas Basin to his years of loading up and packing his camera gear to film hunts with the most notable outdoors personalities across the country.

"Gathering Light" begins as Brown, a youngster, watched and lamented over the destruction of the thousands of acres of prime hardwoods in his beloved Tensas Del-

tion had to do with the fact that the fertile land along the Tensas could grow soy beans, a crop seen at the time as more valuable than oak trees. Soy beans could grow back every year while you could just about forget about ever replacing the hardwoods.

At the age of 24, Brown and his roommate, Rex Moncrief were working at a lumber yard when an earlier chance encounter with the promotions director of a local NBC affiliate led to an escape from loading lumber for customers. Brown and Moncrief pitched the idea of producing a local outdoor program for the station. Long story short, their program, "The Outdoor News" was born and enjoyed success for several years.

From "The Outdoor News" came the opportunity to do free-lance work for companies such as Knight and Hale, Primos and others.

"Gathering Light" cov-Brown's eventual expertise with his video camera to capturing the attention of other companies. He was slowly but steadily climbing the ladder to his eventual landing a plum of a job with the National Wild Turkey Federation, a position he held for some 20 years until an unceremonious release from the organization.

One thing that led to his success probably more than anything else was imparted to him by wellknown outdoors video producer, Ron Jolly, a fellow Louisianian.

"John", Jolly told him, "there are two things that I'll tell you about this business that are absolutes regarding the job. One, you must be an eternal optimist. You must believe

that without a doubt that the buck you're hunting is about to walk past your stand, or that the next yelp will elicit a gobbler. Number two, you must enjoy seeing others succeed."

Brown writes that as time passed, he understood what Jolly was saying as he saw the failure of others who couldn't derive satisfaction seeing someone else pull the trigger.

Personally, I finished my copy of "Gathering Light" in one sitting. It brought back memories of the times I was privileged to visit with John over the years and as an outdoors writer, my association with so many he writes about. If you have any interest at all in the outdoors, I'm convinced it's a book you'll thoroughly enjoy.





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

Upon initial adhesion to a vehicle windshield, the "26" sticker has a yellow background. Due to sun exposure, the sticker may potentially fade from yellow to clear or white.

MVI stickers from January 1, 2024, until the present date may experience fading. It is important to note that despite the fading, these MVI stickers will remain valid. No action is required by the vehicle owner. The Louisiana Office of Motor Vehicles (OMV) is aware of this issue, and is working to replace the current unissued inventory.

BEDDING PLANTS... AN EASY WAY TO ADD MORE COLOR

ttractive colors generally catch the eyes of nearly everyone regardless of the source. And certainly the blossoms of plants (especially bedding plants) offer eye-catching color. However, even non-gardeners seem to appreciate landscapes that provide a variety of colors. But it's not surprising that bedding plants are more often the site where the color is most concentrated and where it usually lasts the

Probably a majority of gardeners have planted most of their bedding plants for the summer season, but they will be busy with grooming and possibly replacing a few plants. Plants are dynamic always increasing in size, producing blooms or making colorful fruit or seed pods. Most do all of this in a relatively short period of time. Also, they may change form and will lose tissue to hungry insects. The level of light, the quality and kind of nutrients they receive during a given period of time will determine how they respond in providing color.

Most gardeners usually desire to maximize color in their landscapes and to have it last for a full season. Good bed preparation is very important for bedding plants to do their best and choosing proven plant materials also plays a major role.

One practice that often eliminates common plant



problems is the construction of raised plant beds. Should a storm drop an excessive amount of rain over a short period, most of the water will drain off and out of the bed and damage to plants will be very little or none. When building a raised bed for flowers, getting a soil test on the media is highly recommended. It provides the information needed to adjust nutrient content (if necessary) and lets you know the level of acidity. (Some plants do best in a highly acid soil while other prefer a more alkaline soil.) Once a bed has been completed and its media adjusted, it's a good

idea to spread two or three inches of an organic material over the surface of the bed and lightly mix it into the surface.

The colors and textures you want in summer bedding plants are available in a number of different species and to get the look you want you may have to use a combination of species. A factor of importance sometime overlooked is the amount of light each species you wish to grow can tolerate. The following is a partial listing of bedding plants divided by light tolerance:

Full sun to part sun: ageratum, cosmos, gomphrena, zinnias, lantana, periwinkle, ornamental peppers, salvia, scaevola, tithonia, portulaca, sun coleus and wave series of petunias.

Moderate shade to part shade: impatiens, caladiums, begonias, coleus and torenia

Do understand that there are other good bedding plants besides those listed. You may have found other kinds of plants suitable (and have under your landscape conditions discovered that they have performed beautifully). So, you may not want to change and there is no need to make a switch.
