

From Mayor Nick Cox

By Will Phillips Specht Newspapers ayor Nick Cox has been dedicated to optimizing city op-

erations and enhancing the quality of life in Minden. Over the past year and a half, the administration has implemented significant changes and initiated numerous projects, all aimed at fostering a more efficient and vibrant community.

"There are countless ways to improve efficiency, and that's been our primary focus," said Cox. "I'm incredibly proud of the progress we've made in such a short time. We've come a long way in just a year and a half."

Mayor Cox attributes much of the city's progress to the collaborative efforts of a dedicated and intelligent City Council. "Our council is filled with wonderful, smart individuals who view the city as a whole. They not only represent their districts effectively but also support each other's initiatives. We're fortunate to have this team."

KEY ACHIEVEMENTS AND PROJECTS Hiring a Lobbyist

One of the significant decisions highlighted is hiring a lobbyist, Caroline Mladenka, to represent Minden in Baton Rouge. "Without a seat at the table, we become the meal," said Cox. This strategic move has already paid off, bringing home \$4.5 million for improvements to Minden through collaboration with our Representative Wayne McMahen and Senator Adam Bass.

Public Works Control Center

A major initiative is the creation of a Public Works Control Center, which will allow for greater efficiency through the pooling of manpower and equipment. "For example, instead of one department having two dump trucks and another department having three, the new plan is for the City of Minden to have five dump trucks that can be utilized wherever they are needed," explained Cox. "These assets and employees are for the benefit of the citizens." This consolidation will also save the city significant money. "We have public works departments spread all over town. From the old armory building, to the street department on Talton Street, to the systems monitoring on the third floor of the old steam plant. All of these buildings are very old and not energy efficient," Cox noted. "Consolidating projects will save the city significant amounts of money."

Infrastructure and Community Improvements

We have also been focused on improving the city's infrastructure and community facilities. Completed and ongoing projects include:

•New lighting and road striping in Beaver Creek subdivision

- •Fundraising and planning for a new animal shelter
- •Airport taxiway expansion
- •Condemnation clean-up efforts
- •Street and water main improvements
- •Remodeling of the Community House

•Expanding the airport hangar capacity at Minden Airport

•\$3.7 million for much-needed road repairs over the next two years

•Nearly completed construction of new bathrooms on High Street

LOOKING FORWARD

Looking ahead, we are excited about several projects in progress, including upgrading the audio and video equipment at the Minden Civic Center. We are also dedicating over a million dollars to do updates at the Minden Recreation Center. We are also actively pushing LaDOTD to repair state highways that run through the city, such as Homer Road and Lewisville Road, which are in desperate need of attention.

"We're just getting started," said Cox. "The synergy between the council and our administration is incredible. We're achieving a lot with the same resources we had before, thanks to a shared vision and responsible financial management."

Mayor Cox remains committed to making Minden a better place for all its residents. "I'm proud of our progress, but I know there's always more to be done. Let's continue moving forward, together."

Sheriff Jason Parker...

dedicated to serving the parish

m ost recent elec-

tion, Webster Parish Sheriff Jason Parker ran unopposed, and in fact was the only sheriff in the region to do so. In a recent interview with Parker, it's clear that his dedication to serving the parish remains a top priority moving into his second term, showcasing some of the reasons Webster citizens are happy to have him continue in his role as sheriff.

"It's been an honor for me for the last four years. I truly mean this, every morning when I get up and have an opportunity to come to this office or out into

the parish to serve the citizens, I think it's the best job in the world," said Parker.

While law enforcement and preventing crime is a big part of his role as sheriff, Parker also highlighted the importance of helping people with more personal issues too.

"I love helping folks," said Parker. "It may be a civil matter, it may be a child custody matter. Whatever the problem, I'm willing to lend an ear to someone, listening to what their situation is, and offering some guidance or a reference on which direction to go," said Parker.

"My doors are always open. If people call and make an appointment or leave me a message, I make it personal to at least return the phone call or find a time to be accessible to the people."

Sheriff Parker emphasized the importance of ensuring his deputies are as educated and well-trained as possible.

"We're going to go into this next term and continue to make progress not only for the Sheriff's Office but anything we can do here to make ourselves better to serve the public, that's what we're going to do, we're not going to be stagnant," said Parker.

"Education and training are very important to me.





We make sure that we have enough money in the budget each year so if we have an opportunity to send a deputy off to specialize in something that we know is going to make us better at serving the citizens, then that's what we're going to do.

"Even after four years as sheriff, I'm still learning.

The things that have helped me over the last four years are the relationships I have developed with other sheriffs across the state and our elected officials."

Parker talked about how much he valued the network both for the aid that they provide and also for being able to help other departments when they're in need. These relationships that the sheriff has developed over the past few years also help in the sense that Parker has the proper connections so that, when the parish needs something, he can contact the right people, giving an example of when Governor Landry called to check up on him and his office.

"As a sheriff, it makes me feel good that he is checking on our parish and making sure we have what we need, it means a lot," said Parker.

Coming into his second term, there are twenty-plus new sheriffs who have been elected, so now, instead of being one of the new guys, Sheriff Parker is one that other sheriffs may be coming to for some guidance.

"I've offered every one of those new sheriffs my phone number and told them if they need someone to call they can reach out to me. It's always good to have someone to bounce stuff off of, especially if you have a situation that you're really not sure of, you have someone you can call who has been there, done that, and can share some guidance," said Parker.

Despite the challenges, Sheriff Parker expresses his dedication to serving the community for years to come. His active involvement in community activities and his commitment to accessibility distinguish him as a sheriff deeply rooted in his community.

"Being sheriff is an honor and I appreciate the citizens' confidence in me. If we were to have one, I'm going to continue to do all I can to be here and serve until I think it's my time to go or the citizens think it is," said Parker.

Webster Parish Tourism hears plans for Miller Quarters Park development

By Amber McDown Specht Newspapers he Webster Parish Convention and Visitors Commission met on May 16 for

their quarterly board meeting, where they reviewed plans for the redevelopment of Miller Quarters Park. The architects from Parish Line presented their comprehensive design for the park, which incorporates elements from a project by design students at Louisiana Tech.

Miller Quarters, purchased by the Commission in 2022, dates back to the 1930s when Joe Miller built 60 low-income houses and rented them for \$5 a week. The new development plan includes a small museum to educate the public about this history.

The proposed design features a promenade at the main entrance and various walking and biking trails offering different experiences throughout the park. Water features such as bridges and low-head dam barriers will help with flood management and provide crossing points. An amphitheater, playground with a water fountain pad, and multiple restroom facilities are also part of the plan. The design includes entrances from various sides of the park and explores additional parking options.

Shaded areas at a food truck pavilion, a dog park with separate zones for small and large dogs, and the use of natural materials like bald cypress and raw steel aim to create a cohesive look that reflects the area's history. The architecture will mirror local styles, including

shotgun houses and butterfly roofs.

Projected costs for the park range from \$7 million to \$10 million, with the project designed to be built in stages. Executive Director Serena Gray is researching grants and potential sponsorships to fund the project. "We went into this project saying, 'Let's dream big, and if we need to scale it back, we can," said Gray.

A mural celebrating Miller Quarters will soon be painted on a wall along Lee Street.

Tourism plans to present the project to the mayor, city council, and planning department before surveying the public for input on prioritizing development phases. A public forum will also be held on July 18 for community members to review the plans and ask questions.

Following the youthful energy, the 10K race unfolded, witnessing Keith Pitman of Minden seizing the victory, trailed by Anna Lake Watts, also of Minden, in second place, and Kenichi Pass from New Boston, Texas, securing third.

The momentum continued with the commencement of the 5K race, where Nathan Vogel of Campti led the pack, followed by Graham Gordy of Shreveport in second place and John Hiltom Ferguson III, also hailing from Shreveport, in third.

Another big event for the weekend was the Minden St. Jude Chili Cook-off which raised a total of \$16,245 to go towards the Auction.

In the main competition, the judges selected Big Jon's Big Eats with head cooks John and Nancy Rogers as the winners for the 2024 Chili Cook-Off.

The People's Choice Winner and Best in Show awards both went to Wookie Chow, with head cooks Scott and Josh Spillers.

The Young Women's Service Club (YWSC) of Minden always loves the opportunities to be as involved in the community as much as possible and St. Jude Kids Day is no exception. This year the event was able to raise a total of \$1155 dollars for the auction despite being pushed indoors

due to the weather.





immy Williams, a cherished figure in Webster Parish, renowned for his multifaceted roles as a

father, grandfather, mayor of Sibley, businessman, and friend, passed away on Saturday, January 20, 2024, at the age of 68.

Williams, born in Minden in 1955, dedicated the last two decades of his life to the Town of Sibley, where he served as mayor since 2009. His profound impact on the community manifested through numerous achievements, including enhancements to the Sibley water system, facilitation of economic growth, and the establishment of a new subdivision at the town's north entrance.

Notably, in 2019, Williams was elected as President of the Louisiana Municipal Association (LMA), assuming a pivotal role as an advocate for villages, towns, and cities statewide. His exceptional leadership during the challenges posed by the COVID-19 pandemic earned him the LMA's prestigious President's Award in 2022.

Beyond his professional and athletic endeavors,


Williams's devotion to his faith was palpable, as he actively participated in the Minden Presbyterian Church and generously shared his handyman skills to enhance its facilities.
