The 16th Annual Car & Bike Show brought vintage vehicle enthusiasts together in downtown Minden on September

14 with the town's streets lined with classic cars, trucks, and motorcycles. Hosted by the Vintage Car Club, the event attracted participants and spectators from across the Ark-La-Tex region for

a day filled with competition, entertainment, and family fun.

The event featured various classes of vehicles, with entries ranging from antique cars to modified muscle cars and motorcycles. Among the day's winners, Danny and Shelley Francis

took first place in the Antique Class A2 (1926-1959 Original) with their 1931 Ford Model A, while Charles Morganthall's 1970 Chevy Chevelle earned him first in the SMCI Sport & Muscle (1960-1975) class. Morganthall also took home the prestigious Best of

SEARCH AND RESCUE

10-year-old Peyton Saintignan found safe after daylong search in Webster Parish

Ten-year-old Peyton Rose Saintignan, who was reported missing from her home on Magnolia Road in Dubberly, was found safe late Sunday night after a massive search effort involving multiple law enforcement agencies and hundreds of volunteers. The Louisiana State Police had issued a Level II Endangered/Missing Child Advisory earlier in the day, prompting a swift response.

Peyton, last seen around midnight on Sunday, September 15, was discovered missing at approximately 11:30 AM. She was believed to be on foot, wearing blue Frozen pajamas, and was found asleep in dense woods, roughly 300 yards from where a trail camera had recorded her earlier that

Herd of goats found grazing at Minden Medical Center

On September 9, a herd of 44 goats was discovered grazing in the parking lot of Minden Medical Center (MMC), surprising patients and staff. The goats had escaped from a nearby property owned by Sara McDaniel, proprietor of Simply Southern Cottage, where they had been hired for "goatscaping."

The animals, supplied by Northwest Louisiana Goatscaping, had been clearing brush at McDaniel's Fuller-

White House property on Union Street when they wandered off to do a little pro bono work at MMC. McDaniel was alerted to the situation after police were called to investigate.

"Honestly, I was afraid they were going to take me straight to jail, but they were very kind and considerate and helped me corral the goats," said McDaniel.

By the time Lane Coleman, the owner of Northwest Louisiana Goatscaping, could arrive, the goats were safely herded back into

their enclosure. "They said it was easy as could be, and they had a good time doing it," Coleman said of the police officers and medical staff who helped round up the goats.

Coleman uses a portable electric fence to keep the goats in the designated area, and the herd likes to stay together, so just one goat getting out is usually not a problem. "Where one of them goes, the rest of them go. So if one gets out, it won't leave; it'll just stay on the other

KEEPING MINDEN BEAUTIFUL

Webster Parish project awarded KLB beautification grant

The City of Minden is one of 16 organizations across 12 parishes to receive a 2024-2025 beautification grant from Keep Louisiana Beautiful (KLB). The KLB Beautification Grant program awarded a total of \$113,500 to support projects aimed at improving public spaces throughout Louisiana.

Minden's Parks and Beautification Department will use the \$3,500 grant to upgrade city signage, improve the irrigation system, and install native Louisiana plants. Mayor Nick Cox expressed the city's gratitude for the grant, saying, "The City of Minden is honored to be awarded the 2024-2025 Keep Louisiana Beautiful Beautification Grant. This \$3,500 grant will allow us to revamp city signage and install irrigation and plants, improving both the appearance and environmental sustainability of Minden. We're excited to see how this project will enhance the beauty of our community for residents and visitors alike."

Lt. Governor Billy Nungesser also praised the efforts of the recipients. "We commend these organizations for taking pride in their communi-

ties and improving public spaces through beautification. We are fortunate to live in Sportsman's Paradise, and we need to do everything we can to keep Louisiana beautiful," Nungesser said.

KLB Executive Director Susan Russell emphasized the impact of beautification projects, highlighting their role in improving residents' quality of life and reducing litter. "First impressions count, and this grant program helps communities look their best," Russell said.

The KLB Beautification Grant covers projects that enhance public spaces, including planting trees and native plants in highly visible areas such as community entry points and major roadways. Funded projects are expected to be completed by May 2025.

Fibrebond begins construction on new electrical integration facility

Fibrebond has commenced construction on a new 297,000-square-foot electrical integration facility, which was first announced in April 2024. Expected to be fully operational by July 2025, this expansion will boost the company's total space to over 1 million square feet on its 254-acre site.

The construction of this facility will bring over 100 additional workers to the Fibrebond site, increasing the total number of individuals on campus to ap-

proximately 1,000, which includes direct employees, contract workers, and the construction team.

Fibrebond specializes in the manufacturing and integration of sophisticated electrical and mechanical systems for data centers, fiber, industrial, and utility sectors. The growing demand for Fibrebond's electrical solutions is fueled by advancements in artificial intelligence, cloud services, and increased investment in energy infrastructure. This year, over 90% of the company's production will be shipped out-

side of Louisiana.

From 2022 to 2025, Fibrebond is investing \$125 million in capital expenditures, expanding its capacity by 200%.

Preparation for the project began in February 2023, with 20 acres of land undergoing precision leveling to accommodate the "M3" facility. Local firms Aillet, Fenner, Jolly, & McClelland, Inc. and Kevin Bryan Architect were responsible for the design and engineering aspects. After a competitive selection process, Brinkmann Constructors, a St. Louis-based firm listed in the



ENR Top 100, was chosen as the general contractor. Several subcontractors

Webster Parish students shine at national Educators Rising conference in D.C.

During the September Webster Parish School Board meeting, three pre-educator students and their sponsors, Mrs. Amy Phillips, a French teacher at North Webster High School, and Mrs. Ashanti Cooper, assistant principal at Webster Junior High School, presented on their recent trip to Washington, D.C., where they attended the Educators Rising National Conference in June.

Educators Rising, a national movement under PDK International, focuses on increasing teacher diversity and quality by guiding students from school-based chapters into teacher preparation programs at institutions of higher education. With support from local funders and state departments of education, the initiative provides a clear pathway for students to

pursue teaching careers.

The students, enrolled in dual-enrollment education courses through the University of Louisiana at Monroe, had the opportunity to compete at the national level after placing at the state Educators Rising conference. Out of 3,300 aspiring educators in attendance, two of the North Webster students placed in the top 10 in their respective categories.

"They were able to learn so much," said Phillips during the presentation. The conference experience not only broadened the students' knowledge of education but also solidified their passion for pursuing teaching careers.

Mrs. Cooper announced plans to launch an Educators Rising club at Webster Junior High School, stating, "We're here to grow our own. Get them excited about teaching, so when they go to 9th grade and they can start working on

those credentials for high school, they already have a background, they already have a foundation."

Phillips elaborated on the significance of the program, noting that students take dual-enrollment courses titled Multicultural Learning Communities and Foundations of Education under the guidance of Dr. Amy Weems. Successful completion of the courses results in two college credits. Through this program, the students also joined the National Educators Rising Club, which led them to the national competition.

The five students who attended the conference were Cailey Nail, Callie Lewis, Allison Lorenz, Gabrielle Cooper, and Abrianna Gardner. Lorenz competed in the Children's Literature category, where she wrote and illustrated a children's book. Nail and Lewis, referred to as the "Dynamic Duo"

at North Webster, placed 10th nationally in the Inside Our Schools category with a video on innovative technology at their school.

"We in Webster Parish are committed to the 'Grow Our Own' philosophy," said Phillips. "We seek to inspire our students to embrace the love of learning and joys of teaching, in order for them to hopefully return as educators to our parish."

Beyond the competition, the students visited several historical landmarks, including the Smithsonian Museums, Mount Vernon, and Ford's Theater. Each student left with a favorite memory of the trip, enhancing their educational journey.

With the success of this year's participants, Webster Parish is optimistic about the future of the Educators Rising program and its potential to cultivate the next generation of educators.

morning.

The search, led by the Webster Parish Sheriff's Office, intensified throughout the day. Sheriff Jason Parker confirmed that Peyton was found at around 11 PM with the help of thermal imaging drones provided by Drone Management Services LLC, a Magnolia, Arkansas company that offered

assistance after hearing of the search.

"We had the DeSoto Parish helicopter in the air, and when it was possible to use drones, Josh Klobner, Matt Ramos, and Micah Carter brought their equipment and successfully located the young girl," Parker said. "She was asleep when we found her. EMS checked her, and she's fine—back home and hungry."

The search involved multiple agencies, including the Minden Police Department, Minden Fire Department, Homeland Security, and sheriff's offices from DeSoto and Bienville parishes. Other participants included the Louisiana State Police, Webster Parish School Board, Advanced Ambulance, Crossroads Canine Search and Rescue, and numerous drone and dog

teams.

"I can't tell you how thrilled we all are to have a happy ending to this," Parker said. "A lot of prayers were answered today. We are grateful to all the agencies and volunteers who helped bring Peyton safely home."

Peyton was found safe after a daylong search that ended just over 24 hours after her disappearance.

side of the fence." Apparently, on Monday, they all decided to tour Minden.

Goatscaping is a new business for Coleman, although he's been raising goats for around 15 years. He first got the idea after using a small herd to

clear an overgrown arena. "In about three days, the brush was gone, just down to dirt," he said.

The Spanish goats, which Lane primarily uses, are known for their ability to clear difficult terrain. The goats can eat most plants found lo-

cally, including poison ivy. Once the goats have eaten all the leafy parts, the humans come back through and cut the tough vine stems. "It takes about three to four days to clear an acre," Lane said.

The unexpected adventure at MMC showcased

the goats' usefulness, as well as their willingness to return to work, thanks to a helpful group of community members.

Who won the debate?

No real surprises came from the candidates, media

Along with millions of Americans, I watched the Trump-Harris debate this past Tuesday night. I generally saw what I expected to see.

After the Trump-Biden debate in June with Biden being exposed as the addled stammerer he has become, the bar for Vice President Kamala Harris was a low one, which she met. President Trump performed as I expected he would and if he came across as somewhat defensive it may be because the debate was essentially 3 on 1 with debate "moderators" David Muir and Linsey Davis not challenging the Vice President past their initial questions while simultaneously purporting to "fact check" Trump. The bias was transparent but that also didn't surprise me.

What I found interesting was two different things: 1) what both Trump and VP Harris needed to accomplish in the debate; and 2). How Independents viewed the debate.

Firstly, the Harris presidential campaign has labored mightily to protect her from any unscripted moment with the media. While the Trump-Vance team has done over 60 wide ranging interviews together and separately, the Harris-Walz team has done only a handful, and they were not substantive or policy-based but showcased the "vibes"

and "joy" of the Harris candidacy.

Nevertheless, the VP stated, "my values haven't changed." However, with no specifics about her policy positions all a reasonable undecided voter can do is conclude from this statement that she embraces the Biden policy, or she still embraces the views she has held for years in her Leftist California. Neither is good for her politically.

This is my point. The questions a voter may include whether she still favors banning fracking; whether she still favors unlimited abortion; whether she still supports a single-payer (i.e., government run) health care system in which private health insurance is abolished. Whether she still supports the invasion of illegals on our southern border; whether she still favors mandatory gun buybacks and/or maintains her general hostility to the right to keep and bear arms? Or, what she proposes to do about the inflation that is still punishing average Americans daily; How does she view the debacle of the U.S. withdrawal from Afghanistan? Perhaps most

importantly, voters may wonder what she means when she speaks of all of the things she will accomplish "on day one" when she has been Vice President for almost 4 years? In the debate, she provided no guidance.

To my second point: did the debate affect the view of Independent voters of Harris? I reference the remark of political pundit Charlie Kirk who stated on X that "Reuters interviewed 10 undecided voters after the debate. Six said they are now voting for Trump or leaning that way. Three said Harris. One remains unsure. This wasn't a debate about who delivered the zingers or one-liners. It was about who could move the middle. Trump won."

I also found it interesting how closely Independents aligned with Republicans—at times even overlapping—as they watched the debate in real time using knobs with colors; blue (Democrat), red (Republican) and yellow (Independent) to register agreement or disagreement as the candidates spoke.

Post debate, a focus group was hosted by Fox News journalist Harris Faulkner who was joined by pollster Lee Carter. Carter stated that "I didn't expect this. Independents are tracking very much with Republicans. They're looking for a couple of things. They're looking for answers on immigration,

they're looking for answers on the economy. (And also fracking and abortion). They want to hear that things will get better for them, and they also want change from what is happening right now." Carter continued. "One of the most important things they were looking for last night from Kamala Harris is 'how are you going to make it different?'"

This is why the uber-liberal tool of the Democrat party, the New York Times, concluded, 'Pundits Said Harris Won the Debate. Undecided Voters Weren't So Sure ... They want to see the fine print.' Further, the highly regarded Democrat data analyst and statistician/pollster, Nate Silver, gives Harris a slight boost to her chances of winning after Tuesday's debate. Changing seasons brings back childhood memories

I woke up almost freezing and realized that our electricity was off due to surrounding storms.

My memory flashed back to January, 1962 when we lived in the country, often without heat after our daddy died.

I was thirteen and living two and a half miles out in the woods from Noel, Missouri.

I found myself in what I sensed as a dangerous situation

with some older teenagers in an apartment in town. With no cell phone, home phone or means of transportation for my mother to come and get me I saw only one way of escape.

I put on my coat and scarf, bare-legged, and headed home on the dark country road, which fortunately had no turns as I sped home to our house in the woods. With no street lights and only three or four houses on that road I looked straight ahead being able to follow my sense of direction because we walked the road to buy groceries in town.

Getting home is still fresh in my mind now over sixty-three

years later. My poor child-like mother, who had suffered a head injury as a child, was so scared she hardly knew what to say when she saw me standing there barely able to talk. I asked her to fix me something hot to drink.

I was just grateful to have arrived safely with no physical harm.

Within a few hours I was really sick and my mother headed down that same road at night to call Doctor Silas Fountain, our family doctor in Noel, Missouri, who had delivered me at home in 1948 while we lived five miles from South West City, Missouri in the same backwoods country area.

The little red-headed, mustached country doctor put us in his car and took us into town to further check me out, giving

me shots and medicine, before taking us back home.

Those were the days when doctors made house calls.

A few days later I made my decision while sitting on the floor in the unheated cabin in the woods when I said "I will rise up from whence I came," not knowing where those words came from or what that would entail.

My mother and I were in town getting ready to carry our groceries home when Earnest and Natalie Young, a young Christian couple, asked if they could take us home and then if they could come back and take us to church the next day. The answer was yes. Within about a month I made my decision to be baptized at the Grove, Oklahoma church where Fred Webb was the minister.

It took courage for this underweight, shy girl, to have the courage to answer the invitation but that simple decision wasn't simple after all!

That decision made all the difference in our lives because Fred Webb and Earnest Young came to my school in Noel and

asked to take me out for a conference in their car and asked me if I would like to go to an orphanage because they sensed the danger that our family was in due to our mother's inability to function as a mother.

It's difficult to raise yourself. My immediate answer was yes.

At the age of seventy six, 1962 seems as though it were yesterday and I know that God wants me to share my story because He has always pulled me through the tight places in life when I have gotten in over my head and faced situations that were daunting.

I tell my stories to not only leave a legacy for my friends and family but to give you the courage to share your life experiences because we never know who may just need to open up to others.

We all have a story. Jesus always gets me to the right place time. Without Him I can do nothing.

Giles' new book for turkey hunters a must-read


I have known Mike Giles since he first tried his hand at writing outdoors columns. I have followed his path and watched him progress from a fledgling writer into a genuine professional who not only writes columns for newspapers and magazines but has successfully delved into writing top notch books.

Passion of the Wild was Giles' first book published in 2013 and he has just released his second book, Legends of the Spring, Masters of the Call.

Not only is he a fine wordsmith, Giles is an avid hunter and fisherman with his love for turkey hunting emerging as his favorite thing to do in the realm of hunting. Personally, I have been amazed not only in his ability to outsmart a number of wary gobblers but by the fact he could leave his turkey calls at home because he can make all the calls necessary to fool a gobbler without the use of mechanical calls. He can produce them all with his voice.

His latest book involves his interviewing some of the best turkey hunters around the country and having them share with him a favorite hunt they may have had. The stories that emerged have been translated into 21 chapters with some of the best known hunters telling about what they did – or didn't do – to waylay gobblers.

Avid hunter and renowned wildlife photographer, Tes Jolly, tells a story that will tug at your heart strings. We first learn who she is, having been reared by parents who were avid

hunters and her frustration at a hunting club rule that was for men only. A "tomboy" at the age of nine, Tes' parents came up with a ploy that enabled her to get to hunt. They dressed her in oversized clothes and a floppy hat and was given the nickname of "Harvey",

enabling her to fit in undetected with her brothers as she enjoyed success as a hunter.

Jolly's interest over the years has zeroed in on mentoring and passing on the hunting tradition to women, youth and the physically challenged. In 1998, she

was introduced to Ashley, a 10 year old girl, who had endured surgery for a brain tumor but wanted to turkey hunt. Jolly was able to travel to Florida to take Ashley hunting and watched her down a big gobbler. Sadly, she returned to Florida a few months later to pay last respects to Ashley who lost her battle with brain cancer.

There is a story about avid turkey hunter and writer, Jim Spencer describing his frustrating hunt for a hard-headed Texas Rio Grand gobbler. The way Spencer tells a story will captivate the reader as he overcame all sorts of obstacles to finally at the last minute, bested the stubborn Texas gobbler.

Then there's Med Palmer's story about hunting with his son, Gunner, who was lost in a boating accident. The following season was rough on Palmer but he felt he had to go hunting in honor of his son.

"What are the odds of me going into the woods before daylight and realize I was sitting against the same tree Gunner had sat by on his last hunt when he killed his last gobbler," said Palmer.

Space limitations prohibit me sharing some of the other fascinating stories but you can get your own hard cover copy of "Legends of the Spring; Masters of the Call by finding Michael O. Giles on Facebook or emailing him at mikegiles18@comcast.net.

If you're a turkey hunter, this is one book that is hard to put down once you start reading and one you absolutely must have for your library.

Little Jimmy Dickens sang about 'taking an old cold 'tator and waiting' until the adults ate at the table. Reba McIntyre sang about "living on love, hope and a hand-me-

down.' And who can forget the songs of Dolly Parton and Loretta Lynn and their childhood struggles?

I don't know how it is these days 'growing up in the country, being a poor dirt farmer,' but as a young kid we learned to be survivors, picking up crumbs, eating left-overs and stretch-it gravy! (add more water). With older

brothers and sisters, we learned early in life, that 'new is not always the best'. I don't remember when I first got new 'britches' to wear to school. It fell my lot to get all the clothes James (two years older) outgrew. Hey, these gifts came quite often throughout the year. I got new shirts, overalls, underwear and shoes.

What more could a kid want or need? The same was true for my sisters. Maybe a patch here and there transformed an old worn skirt or blouse into a 'outfit of many colors'.

Go, count the pairs of shoes, the jackets or suits you have in your closet; browse through your dresses, belts and dress pants....then count your blessings for how the Lord is blessing you. Think back and count the number of nights you have gone to bed 'hungry'...can you count a few more blessings.

After school an afternoon treat was to take a cold biscuit, make a hole in it with your pointer finger, fill it with syrup and eat it on the way to the cotton patch. At night, there might be left-over baked sweet potatoes, sliced and fried in butter, with a sprinkle of sugar to dress it up. "Food for angels," grandma would say. When we ran out of fresh sweet milk, there was al-

ways a jug of buttermilk for us. Crumbled left-over cornbread in a tall glass, topped it with cold buttermilk - a great supper 'float' to prepare us for a good night of sleep.

Using 'left-overs' - in the Bible is referred to as gleaning. (Lev 19:9; Deut. 24: 20-22; Judges 8:2). We read of Moses providing a liberal treatment of the poor at harvest time. The owner was not to 'wholly reap the corners of the fields' but offer it to poor and distressed. Ruth, the Moabite daughter-in-law of Naomi, returned to Judah with her to live. She was sent to glean the fields of Naomi's relative Boaz, for grain for their use. Boaz was so impressed with her diligence and manner in which she worked, he offered her to join the reapers and take some of the fine grain to use. (Ruth 3: 1-13). Later they married and she is mentioned in the lineage of Jesus Christ.

I learned early to hustle the berry patches around our farm for dewberries, blackberries, mulberries, mayhaws, huckleberries, muscadines, and gather figs, pears and peaches. All of these were treats to eat or make wonderful jellies and jams. When the Good Lord makes bountiful harvests of such, how can we not pick up the leftovers to use and share with those in need. What better gift than treats from the Mother Earth?

Don't throw out those leftovers! Put a sprinkle of honey, syrup or sauce on them and treat them as a gift from God Himself --it really is that. Be thrifty and thankful!

Proposed Constitutional Amendments to be voted on at the Open Primary/Presidential/Congressional Election November 5, 2024

CODING: Words which are struck through are deletions from existing law; words in boldface type and/or underscored are additions.

Proposing to amend Article VII, Section 10.2(E)(1) of the Constitution of Louisiana, relative to federal proceeds from alternative energy production on the Outer Continental Shelf; to provide for the disposition of revenues; to provide for submission of the proposed amendment to the electors; and to provide for related matters.

Section 1. Be it resolved by the Legislature of Louisiana, two-thirds of the members elected to each house concurring, that there shall be submitted to the electors of the state of Louisiana, for their approval or rejection in the manner provided by law, a proposal to amend Article VII, Section 10.2(E)(1) of the Constitution of Louisiana, to read as follows:

§10.2. Coastal Protection and Restoration Fund
Section 10.2

(E)(1) Subject to Article VII, Sections 9(B) and 10.1 of this constitution, in each fiscal year, the federal revenues that are received by the state generated from Outer Continental Shelf energy production, including but not limited to oil and gas activity, wind energy, solar energy, tidal energy, wave energy, geothermal energy, and other alternative or renewable energy production or sources, and eligible, as provided by federal law, to be used for the purposes of this Paragraph shall be deposited and credited by the Treasurer to the Coastal Protection and Restoration Fund.

Section 2. Be it further resolved that this proposed amendment shall be submitted to the electors of the state of Louisiana at the statewide election to be held on November 5, 2024.

Section 3. Be it further resolved that on the official ballot to be used at the election, there shall be printed a proposition, upon which the electors of the state shall be permitted to vote YES or NO, to amend the Constitution of Louisiana, which proposition shall read as follows:

Do you support an amendment to require that federal revenues received by the state generated from Outer Continental Shelf alternative or renewable energy production be deposited into the Coastal Protection and Restoration Fund? (Amends Article VII, Section 10.2(E)(1))
