Minden hosts "Colorful Cottages" event, showcases historic charm and transitional housing project

On September 21, Minden partnered with Simply Southern Cottage to host Cottages & Bungalows magazine for a one-day event celebrating the town's historic charm. The event, titled "The Colorful Cottages of Minden," drew visitors from across the country, including attendees from California, South Dakota, and Florida, to tour local properties and shop.

Fans of Sara McDaniel, owner of Simply Southern Cottage, were able to meet Wendy from Chair Whimsy and interact with the editor-in-chief of Cottages & Bungalows. The event featured a vintage market at Academy Park and a curated market at The Villas at Spanish Court, along with food trucks stationed along West Union Street.

Highlighting the event were tours of iconic Minden properties, including the Fuller-White House, The Villas at Spanish Court, Phillip's Cottage, and McDaniel's own home. McDaniel shared her excitement for the event and noted that part of the proceeds will support Phillip's Cottage, a newly established 501(c) (3) nonprofit providing transitional housing for women graduating from the Adult & Teen Challenge (ATC) program.

Named in honor of



Sara McDaniel, owner of Simply Southern Cottage, hosted the "Colorful Cottages of Minden" event on September 21. McDaniel is also spearheading the renovation of a 1920 craftsman-style home, named Phillip's Cottage, which will serve as transitional housing for women graduating from the Adult & Teen Challenge program. Proceeds from the Colorful Cottages event will support the Phillip's Cottage project.

McDaniel's father, Phillip Carroll, a longtime educator and pastor in Springhill, Phillip's Cottage will offer housing for up to three women and their children after completing the faith-based recovery program. The craftsman-style home, located across from the Fuller-White House, once belonged to piano teacher Kuma Shealy.

"This is a stepping stone between rehabilitation and independence," said McDaniel. She aims to have six bedrooms and three bathrooms in the home, providing each woman with a private bedroom—a resource not available in the ATC program.

McDaniel is currently

accepting donations to support the project, which can be made at PhillipsCottage.org. All contributions are taxdeductible. Renovation work will begin soon, with tree work and foundation repair planned first. McDaniel hopes to make significant progress by year's end, using her

regular team. "All local

people," she said.

Through her series of restoration projects in Minden, McDaniel has bolstered tourism and the local economy. With Phillip's Cottage, she hopes to further support the well-being and independence of individuals in the community.

Woman arrested for vehicle burglary at gas station

A Minden woman was arrested on charges of vehicle burglary at a local gas station on September 13. According to the Minden Police Department, Stacy Tims, 39, was taken into custody after stealing a purse from a vehicle parked at the Murphy USA gas station on Homer Road.

Authorities responded to the scene after an employee reported the incident. A customer alerted the staff that a female was trying to gain entry into multiple vehicles in the parking lot. When the employee went outside, she saw Tims walking through the lot holding her purse. The employee confronted Tims and retrieved the purse. According to the employee, nothing was missing from her belong-

Upon reviewing security footage, officers observed Tims committing the burglary and removing the purse from the vehicle. After investigating the scene, officers located Tims inside Walmart, where she was placed under arrest. Tims was read her Miranda rights and transported to the Minden Police Department

for booking. During transport, Tims admitted to the burglary, stating her motive was to purchase methamphetamine. Tims was charged with simple burglary of

Lakeside High School FBLA launches shoe drive fundraiser for competition costs

Lakeside Jr/Sr High School's Future Business Leaders of America (FBLA) organization is holding a shoe drive fundraiser to help cover the costs of regional, state, and national competition attendance. The club will earn funds based on the total weight of gently worn, used, and new shoes collected. Funds-20rgs, a company specializing in fundraising, will issue a check based on the weight of the shoes. The deadline for donations is November 22, 2024.

Donations can be dropped off at Lakeside Jr/Sr High School, located at 9090 Highway 371 in Sibley, or the Minden branch of the Webster Parish Library.

Collected shoes will be redistributed to small business partners in countries developing through the Funds2Orgs network. These micro-enterprises help create economic opportunities for families in areas with limited job prospects. In one case, an entrepreneur in Haiti used proceeds from shoe sales to send her son to law school.

"We are extremely excited about our shoe drive," said FBLA sponsor Lesa Ward. "Most people have extra shoes they no longer need, and by donating them, they will help our students attend competitions and provide support to families in developing countries. It's a win-win for everyone."

FBLA, a national career and technical student organization, prepares students for careers in business, with more than 196,950 members across

5,200 chapters worldwide. Last year, Lakeside's FBLA collected approximately 1,000 pairs of shoes, raising an estimated \$850. The funds directly benefit the organization.

Major drug dealer arrested in Dixie Inn after multiagency raid

Officers from multiple agencies arrested a 31-year-old Dixie Inn man early Tuesday morning, ending a lengthy

investigation into a significant drug distribution operation.

Jamal D. Bailey was apprehended on warrants

for distribution of illegal narcotics after Webster Parish Sheriff's Office narcotics investigators, Minden Police Department officers, and the DEA Task Force executed the arrest.

Sheriff Jason Parker said agents seized approximately 401 grams of methamphetamine, 896 grams of marijuana, and 448 grams of THC edibles. Two 9mm handguns equipped with extended magazines were also confiscated.



Myra Sue Howell Towery

Myra Sue Howell Towery, lovingly known as SuSu, beloved wife, mother, grandmother, and educator died on Thursday, September 19, 2024; she was 84. SuSu was born on October 14, 1939, in Minden, Louisiana and was a graduate

of Terrebonne High School, Centenary College of Louisiana, and LSUS.

A lifelong reading specialist and educator, Sue was a pioneer in the development of literacy programs around Caddo Parish. Beginning her career in the classroom of Green Oaks High School in 1975, Sue spent her career blessing her students with the sacred gift of reading. Towery was the teacher and organizer of the first remedial reading classes in Caddo public high schools. Two-time Chairwoman of the Caddo-Bossier Literacy Council, Sue also launched the first literacy classes at the Caddo Detention Center, the JTPA-CPSB reading program for AT-RISK students at Huntington High School, the Adult Literacy Program for the PALS lab to homeless adults, Project Achieve at Booker T Washington High School, and the Hamilton Terrace Adult learning Center.

With her charismatic personality and passion for the underserved, Sue was a specialist in breaking down racial, geographic, and economic boundaries throughout Shreveport and Bossier in her effort to combat illiteracy. Sue also served two years as the Principal of the Southfield Lower School.

In addition to her remarkable career as an educator, Sue was also known for her impeccable sense of style and fashion. A Beauty Queen at Terrebonne High School, Sue went on to become Miss Terrebonne Parish that same year. Her accolades didn't stop at the Parish line, as Sue went on to become a Centenary Beauty before a career as a professional model at the Dallas Fashion Market throughout the 70's. In the 1980's Sue was known as one of the leading fashion consultants and influencers in Shreveport as a franchisee of the International Fashion Movement, Color Me Beautiful.

Nicknamed "SuSu," her greatest joys in life were experiences outside of her professional life. She adored her husband, W.H. "Bill" Towery, to whom she was married for 45 years. She relished in laughter and time shared with her three children, cherished the companionship of her many friends, and loved hosting parties, book clubs, and birthdays. But perhaps nothing gave SuSu greater joy than a day spent with one or all of her grandchildren.

SuSu is preceded in death by her parents, Gus Howell and Myra Rae, her husband W. H. Towery, and her sister Evelyn Camille. She is survived by her children, Sigrid Rasmussen Williams, Johnny Rasmussen, Paul Rasmussen (Ashley), stepchildren Michael Towery and Stephanie Towery Hollis (Ted), and her five grandchildren - Grace Williams Bulin (John), Lila Williams, PJ Rasmussen, Arden Rasmussen, and Luke Rasmussen. And Madeleine Hollis, Emma Hollis, Carla Hollis Wellborn (Cody), Cassie Hollis, and Alisha Myers. Also survived by brother Eddie Howell (Carolyn), their children Rachel, David and Kimberly, and brother Ted Howell (Janet) and their children Clarcie and Jessica.

Whitley "Whit" **Robert Graves**

Whitley "Whit" Robert Graves, 69, of Bossier City, La., passed away peacefully in his home with family on September 14, 2024.

Whit was a stranger to no one and always "wonderful," when asked

about his day. His family and closest friends remember him as jovial, boisterous, giving, and an all-around presence in the room. A public servant at heart, Whit worked tirelessly to improve the lives of others around

Whit enjoyed many hobbies throughout his life: hunting in Colorado with close friends, maintaining one of the best lawns in the neighborhood, woodworking, playing pool at Bilbo's, making others laugh at parties and gatherings, NASCAR races, camping, boating, telling family stories, traveling around the world, and making new friends.

Whit was born in Shreveport, La., on October 29, 1954, to Bonnie Dell and Kenneth Graves, Sr. (both deceased). His mother went into labor near the Louisiana Fairgrounds and walked to Willis Knighton to give birth on a hot October day, a precursor to the adventurous and fascinating life he would lead.

In his early years Whit helped to care for his "Grandmother Mommie," Lena Whitley (deceased). He often shared stories about Mommie and his close relationship with her and his grandfather, H. H. Whitley (deceased). As a child, Whit would frequently hop on the back of the T&P Railroad train to visit his grandparents in Waskom, Tx., an easy feat as he knew all of the conductors and crew members.

As a teenager, Whit worked at the old Ellis Grant Esso Station rebuilding engines to make extra money and buy his first car so he could confidently take the girls at school on dates. He simultaneously attended Airline High School and LSUS, and helped to support his brother, Kenneth, Jr. (deceased), as he progressed through dental school.

At 19, Whit became the youngest-ever Louisiana State Trooper and spent 11 years with the State Police,

not including his four years as a Criminal Investigator working undercover and two years with the Federal Drug Enforcement Task Force. Whit told many fantastical stories about his time working with heroic (and sometimes rowdy) friends and colleagues. His favorite activity as a police officer was checking and replacing brake lights for motorists on slower days.

After his service with the State Police, Whit put himself through law school at LSU Baton Rouge. Upon graduating, he was hired by then-District Attorney Henry Brown and worked as a Prosecuting Attorney in Bossier and Webster Parishes for 12 years. In 2001, Whit left the DA's office to open his own private practice, focusing on criminal defense for DWI arrests. He quickly earned a reputation as one of the toughest defense attorneys in Northwest Louisiana.

While Whit was a celebrated law enforcement official and attorney, his most notable role was that of husband and father. Whit, his wife, Robin Rue, son Michael Graves, and step-son Garrett Jones, made many memories traveling the world together, visiting more than 10 countries and 48 states in a matter of 10 years. Moreover, Whit was a natural teacher, always cheering along or coaching others in the various activities that made them happy.

Throughout his life, Whit maintained friendships and built a vast chosen family through various fraternities and social and religious organizations, including: DeMolay, El Karubah Shriners, Scottish Rite of Freemasonry, Royal Order of Jesters, Krewe of Justinian, and memberships at various Christian Methodist Episcopal and United Methodist churches.

In death, his friends and family will most miss his wise guidance on the back porch, uplifting spirit in the "bar," and friendly smile everywhere he went.

Whit's family would like to extend a special thanks to friends, staff at Willis Knighton, and staff at Lifepath Hospice for providing special and exceptional care at the end of his life. The family will hold a private ceremony at his family cemetery in Noble, La., to celebrate his life.

gan looking into Bailey's alleged methamphetamine distribution enterprise and, with the assistance of other agencies, uncovered enough information to obtain warrants," Parker said. "This is a major player that is now out of business."

Maj. Bobby Igo III, head of the Webster Parish Sheriff's Office Criminal Investigation Division, credited the collaboration between agencies for the successful outcome.

"We have an outstanding relationship with the Minden Police Department and the DEA, and that plays an important part in our investigations," Igo said. He also noted the expertise of Sgt. Shawn Jenkins, a Webster Parish deputy assigned to the DEA Task Force, as crucial in the investigation.

Parker added that Tuesday's arrest serves as a reminder to Webster Parish residents that law enforcement is committed to pursuing those involved in illegal activity.

"We want people who commit crimes to know that, no matter how long it takes, we will bring you to justice," Parker

Dallas woman arrested for DUI and marijuana possession on I-20

A Dallas woman was arrested on September 15 after a traffic stop on Interstate 20 Westbound led to the discovery of marijuana and signs of impairment.

A Minden police officer initiated the stop near the 48-mile marker after

clocking a silver Ford SUV traveling 82 miles per hour in a posted 70 mph zone. Upon approaching the vehicle, the officer detected a strong odor of marijuana.

The driver, identified as 23-year-old Angela Heymer of Dallas, Texas, exhibited slow responses and appeared drowsy. Hevmer admitted

smoking marijuana the previous morning but denied having any in the vehicle. After stepping out of the vehicle for a field sobriety test, Heymer rated her own impairment as a "3" on a scale of 1 to

During the sobriety test, several indicators of impairment were observed, leading to a search of Heymer's vehicle. Officers found 4.4 grams of marijuana in a jar inside the center console, along with a cigarillo package in her purse. Smoked marijuana cigarillos and ashes were also found on the driver's seat.

Heymer was taken into custody and transported to the Minden Police Department for further evaluation by a drug recognition expert. She submitted to a breathalyzer test, which showed a blood alcohol content of 0.00%, and provided a urine sample that will be sent to the Louisiana Crime Lab for analysis.

Heymer was charged with driving under the influence (1st offense), speeding, possession of marijuana, and possession of drug parapherna-

The case remains under investigation pending results from the crime lab.

America's Founding Remains a Miracle to Reflect Upon

I had previously read Miracle at Philadelphia by Catherine Drinker Bowen. I recently read The American Miracle by Michael Medved. I was blown away by their recounting of our nation's founding. The fact that both books include the word "miracle" in their titles is no coincidence. You cannot accurately describe our nation's founding in any other

Bowen takes us back to the Constitutional Convention from May to September of 1787 in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. It reminded me again that while technology, science, health and medicine may make drastic leaps, human nature never changes. The 55 delegates who participated could be just as noble, or petty and sarcastic; just as cool-headed or given to anger and disagreement as any of us today.

Prior to the Convention, George Washington, who already had doubts about what was going to transpire, "was attacked by rheumatism so severe he could scarcely move in bed. But he recovered, made his journey by carriage, and on his arrival at Philadelphia was at once seized upon by the ladies of the city and invited out." Washington's diary reflects that he drank tea "in a very large circle of ladies at Mrs. Bingham's in great splendor." The author notes that "Mrs. Bingham was young, pretty and vivacious. She had lived abroad and

couldn't determine whether Mrs. Bingham was simply being a gracious hostess to General Washington or flirting with him. Perhaps both.

Bowen reflects that when venerable Washington arrived in Philadelphia "bells chimed and artillery boomed." Bowen also de-

> scribes h o w Washington's first stop upon his arrival in Philadelphia was to call upon Dr. Benjamin Franklin. Franklin

planned to entertain the delegates and had "laid in a cask of porter against the occasion." It seems that regardless of whether the convention was successful, they were going to drink and enjoy it!

When a quorum was finally obtained, "Washington was unanimously elected president of the Convention and escorted to the chair." From that raised dais "he made a little speech of acceptance, depreciating his ability to give satisfaction in a scene so novel." What humility. Washington stated that "as he never had been in such a situation he felt himself embarrassed, that he hoped his errors, as they would be unintentional, would be excused. He la-

liked to entertain lavishly." I mented his want of qualifications."

To his colleagues, Bowen writes, this "must have been reassuring as Washington was everywhere known as "the greatest character in America"—a man of prestige, with a landed estate and a magnificent physical appearance." Bowen explains that Washington would "sit silent in the Convention ... He showed himself firm, courteous, inflexible. In his silence lay his strength. His presence kept the Federal Convention together, kept it going, just as his presence had kept a straggling, ill-conditioned army together throughout the terrible years of the war."

Bowen powerfully captures the challenges, including the heat. "Over Philadelphia the air lay hot and humid; old people said it was the worst summer since 1750. French visitors wrote home that they could not breathe. The slightest movement is painful." She describes the scene inside the convention hall itself. "Delegates sat at tables covered in green baize—sat and sweated, once the summer sun was up. By noon the air was lifeless, with windows shut for privacy, or intolerable with flies when they were open. New Englandmen—'the gentlemen'—suffered their woolen suits. Only the Southerners were suitably dressed in light camlet coats and breeches."

With some of the most famous names in America present—including Washington, Franklin, Madison, Hamilton—Thomas Jefferson, who was in Paris serving as finance minister, deemed it "an assembly of demigods."

In a riveting moment, Medved writes, with the dragging, Convention Franklin rose to acknowledge the "small progress we have made" and then implored the delegates to begin each morning in prayer. "I have lived, Sir, a long time, and the longer I live, the more convincing proofs I see of this truth—that God governs in the affairs of men. And if a sparrow cannot fall to the ground without his notice, is it probable that an empire can rise without his aid?"

It's inspiring to reflect upon America's profound but improbable beginning.

RUSTON – Louisiana Tech overcame a 10-point deficit in the fourth quarter, but the Bulldogs ended up falling to Tulsa in overtime 23-20 Saturday night at Joe

Aillet Stadium. "Our crowd was great," Louisiana Tech Head Coach Sonny Cumbie said. "The atmosphere was amazing. Our student section was phenomenal, and I think there was an advantage

from that standpoint. "It's unfortunate that we didn't capitalize on it as a team. We didn't make enough plays and on offense. We did not play well. We did not improve this week on special teams and defense we flew around and played a physical style of football."

An unsuccessful PAT

after Tech cut the lead to 17-13 also played a big role in the outcome. It allowed Tulsa (2-2) to kick the game-tying 45-yard field goal with 32 seconds left instead of having to score a touchdown.

"The little things are going to determine games in CUSA," he said.

Tech (1-2) used three different quarterbacks throughout the game. A pair of redshirt freshmen — Blake Baker and Evan Bullock — each led touchdown drives in the fourth quarter.

The quarterback changes were to try to find a spark offensively. Down 17-7 heading into the final stanza, the offense had only 155 total yards and was just 1-of-9 on third down.

The first spark was provided by Baker who connected on three straight passes - 14 yards to Eli Finley, 53 more yards to Finley, and 19 yards to Solo Lewis.

The trio of completions put Tech on the 1-yard line. Baker scored on a sneak on third down. But the PAT was unsuccessful and Tech trailed 17-13.

NATCHITOCHES – In the first two games of the Blaine McCorkle era of Northwestern State football, the Demons made a habit of scoring quickly.

Northwestern State (0-4) scored 70-plus-yard touchdowns on the second play of the season opener at Tulsa and on the first play from scrimmage in the Sept. 7 home opener against Prairie View A&M.

For about 15 seconds Saturday night, it appeared the Demons had outdone themselves as Myles Kitt-Denton returned the opening kickoff from Weber State 91 yards for a touchdown only to see it undone by a holding call.

The negated touch-down became emblematic of the night for the Demons, who fell to the visiting Wildcats, 39-0, at Turpin Stadium.

"The opening kickoff was indicative of our offense the entire game," McCorkle said. "We return the opening kickoff for a touchdown, and you have a holding penalty that may or may not have affected the play.

"The first drive or two drives were the same way. You get a first down on a quarterback sneak where you make it and the ball pops out. You get a first down and you get a silly penalty. Those are things you just can't do."

Weber State (2-2), a perennial power from the Big Sky Conference, brought the No. 11 rushing offense in the Football Championship Subdivision with it for its first visit to Natchitoches.

It was the Wildcats' passing game, however, that set the tone for Weber State.

Sophomore quarterback Richie Munoz threw for 266 yards and two touchdowns in the first half as the Wildcats put together the type of complementary football McCorkle has looked for from the Demons.

Memories of the Harris Hill Boys

Some kids are more fortunate than others. I can't help but feel a tiny bit sorrowful for those youngsters who were raised in urban settings where concrete, police and fire sirens, heavy traffic were a part of life. I was blessed to be reared out on the rural route, along-side a gravel road where the half dozen cars traversing the old road daily would stir up either dust or mud, depending on weather conditions.

I read about city kids who have their milk delivered by the milkman and who know to head back home when street lights came on. We got our milk from our milk cow that our mom was glad to turn over milking duties to us kids when we got big enough. Street lights? We didn't have street lights growing up because for the first few years, we didn't have electricity.

have electricity.

We had kinfolk like grandparents, aunts, uncles and cousins who lived on the same hill we did. Because there were so many of us there, the hill was called "Harris Hill".

I had a brother, Tom, who was two years younger than me. Living over on another part of Harris Hill were our two cousins, Doug, a year younger than me and Sambo, a year younger than Tom. It was special to have a brother to do stuff with but it was extra special when Doug and Sambo were added to the mix. It was like instead of cousins, we were more like brothers. Some folks called the four of us the Harris Hill Boys.

Thinking back the four of us enjoyed special times together although we didn't necessarily think we were special because all the kids we knew grew up just as we did.

We had a couple of water sources that attracted our attention when it was

warm enough to swim. We usually started our swimming earlier than our moms thought we should. That's why we'd sneak off to the Tank Pond or Molideaux creek without asking for permission; we just did it and didn't tell anybody.

Our growing up years together were extra special to us but with the passage of time, we grew up and went our separate ways. I graduated from college and became a teacher and social worker and eventually an outdoor writer. Doug graduated and became involved in the oil and gas industry. Tom got his degree in forestry and for years, worked as a forester. College wasn't in Sambo's plans so he

joined the Marines and af-

ter serving his time, worked as a logger.

One day, Doug, who owned property which included a fine fish pond, got in touch with the other three of us and suggested that rather than us just rely on memories, how about we get together on his pond, catch fish and catch up with all we had done since we grew up and scattered. We jumped at the idea and on June 19, 2007, the four of us met at his pond for the first annual Cousin Fish Fest. For the next 15 years, it became an annual event for us that we looked for-

ward to each spring.

We were all growing older and with age comes infirmities. Tom was the first to leave us as on April

30, 2015, he passed away. Doug, Sambo and I continued our annual Fish Fest until 2022 when Doug began having health problems that curtailed our gatherings and on January 6, 2023, Sambo and I were there to honor Doug at his funeral.

That left only two of us

left, Sambo and me and last week, a heart attack ended Sambo's life. He died on September 11, 2024.

That leaves only me to keep the memories of the Harris Hill Boys alive and so long as the Lord keeps me upright, I'll hang onto those special memories of four country boys who spent their growing up years living a special country life.

WAYS THE GOSPEL CAN CHANGE OUR LIVES AND THE WORLD AROUND US

Millions have committed their lives to a man who lived 2,000 years ago. They celebrate His birth and commemorate His death every year. People gather weekly to sing His praises and read words about Him. They quote His teachings like no other teacher. They treat His Word as if it is the GOSPEL. Well, It is!

It has been asked: How can the ripple of one solitary life grow to become exponential proportions two millennia later? How could one life have such a profound effect on so many people around the world? What kind of man was this? What kind of wisdom did He possess? Where did this wisdom and power come from to settle into the person of one man? Well, we look to the New Testament of the Bible and read the eyewitness accounts of four men whose works have been preserved thorough the years and are referred to as THE GOSPELS. They give the best of details of the life and ministry, the teachings of parables and wise sayings as well as the many miracles He performed to show how great, powerful and loving His Heavenly Father is to all.

Christopher Hudson has organized some "50 ways the Gospel can change a person's life"**, reflecting on the inspired words of Christ. I want to only touch on five of these here, praying we will apply them to our lives today where we are in our search 'to touch the world in our closing days here on earth.'

1. Shine a light on the dark corners of life: Jesus promised the Holy Spirit would convict, make known and create an awareness of things that needs to be changed (John 16:8). "The Spirit will come and show the people of this world the truth about sin and God's justice and judgment. The Spirit will show them that they are wrong about sin, for they did not have faith in Me. The Spirit does not speak on His own. But he will tell you only what He has heard from Me, and He will let you know what is going to happen." He shines that spotlight on the areas of our lives we would prefer to keep hidden. It reveals the ugly things that

cause us to feel guilty and shameful. Not to wreck our self-esteem, but to make us healthy and whole - spiritually, emotionally and physically.

When we become aware of our faults and sins, the Light of the Spirit shines in those dark corners of our lives - our actions, attitudes, thoughts and struggles we are too ashamed to reveal ourselves - this is our great opportunity to ask for forgiveness and invite God into our struggles to overcome them. This can make all the difference in our world around us...each day.

2. Realign our priorities: Many of us believe we can set our priorities in life just by making a list of them. We all have done something of this nature, I am sure. We may contend that God or family is the highest priority in our lives, despite all evidence points to something of selfish nature. Good intentions are not the same as priorities. We know from time-management studies priorities are determined by time, focus, and attention devoted them. The areas of life that get the most of these things are our highest priorities.

If we spend 6 hours each week in Bible Study, prayer and meditation, 60 hours a week watching TV, playing golf, or other types of entertainment, we have decided that this is 10 times the priority of 'staying in touch with God.' Jesus said, "Do not store up for vourselves treasures on earth, where moth and vermin destroy and where thieves break in and steal. But store up for yourselves treasures in heaven - for where your treasure is, there your heart and priority will be also.' (Matt 6: 9-21). Priority listings to consider: Our relationship with God and His Word; relationships with others; or work on behalf of the poor and needy - then we will be on the right road in realigning our priorities that is pleasing to God. We never grow too old or worn-out to realign our priorities with Him.

3. Rebuild burned bridges: When Jesus told his disciples the time had come for him to be handed over to his enimies, Simon Peter boldly vowed never to desert Him, no matter how dangerous it proved. But we know what happened a few hours later and we are reminded of that boast every time we hear a rooster crow. Peter denied everything about knowing Jesus. But the relationship between them did not end there. Peter probably could not envision the bridge he burned that day would ever be rebuilt. But notice what he did: A) He allowed himself to feel the gravity and deep inner agony of what happened, and B) he built a physical distance, staying close to Jesus until the time was right for reconciliation. Peter felt the pain and guilt, but he didn't distance himself from Jesus just to ease the agony. C) Their reconciliation was a special moment. When Jesus approached Peter, it was at the water's edge, just like when they first met; Peter was fishing with his brother. He had promised to 'leave all and follow Jesus'; now he was having a second opportunity to rebuild the bridge he had burned. When Jesus pressed him on the subject of 'loving Him,' Peter was highly

perplexed and grieved that He would keep on repeating this question. (John 21) Each time Peter answered Him, he was paying the way for reconciliation, building a bridge.

The Gospel allows us to rebuild burned bridges with God and our fellowman. Perhaps there are some bridges we need to rebuild, fences we need to mend, apologies to make, confessions to share! Let's not slip off into eternity with unfinished business that needs to be taken care of with another. One day... may be too late. Don't deny yourself the joy of building a new bridge in relationships. Go ahead and take the first step.

4. Cement your friendships: John 15:13: Jesus said: "There is no greater love than to lay down one's life for one's friends." He was showing us what sacrificial friendship truly is. But Jesus did not just give his life for his friends, but for the whole world: his enemies, strangers and the billions of people yet to be born. He took the punishment of death so that we all could have eternal life. None can follow that example to this extreme, but we can show difference-making friendships by laying down our

lives in other ways. Sacrifice our time and resources to help others in need: Invest ourselves in the lives of others, share their burdens, lift up the weary, soothe the bereaved and hurting, feed and clothe the poor. We can refuse to settle for mere surface relationships, but engage people in conversations about things that matter to them (not the weather, football, hunting, etc); step out of our comfort zone if we have to, in order to do these things. Jesus set the bar for true friendship pretty high and though we can never reach His heights, we can be the kind of friends people will never forget.

5. Look beyond our immediate circumstances: Remember the encounter Jesus had with the Roman centurion, a commander of 100 soldiers? The commander approached Jesus by telling Him about his sick servant, paralyzed and in great pain. He looked beyond the circumstances and saw the potential in Jesus. He recognized something in Jesus that convinced him that his servant's condition was 'changeable.'

Jesus told him: "I will come and heal him." At this point the centurion showed how deep his understanding of the situation really was. He said, "Lord, I am not worthy to have you come into my house. Just say the word from where you are and my servant will be healed." (Matt 8:8=9). His circumstances were subject to Jesus' authority, not His presence. Just a simple word from Jesus was enough to change the circumstances. This should be encouragement for each of us. No circumstances we face can be considered unchangeable. With God, all things are possible.

So, we can change our world under God's leadership. Our responsibility is to 'rise up, today, walk out into the world around us, carrying the Light of the World (Jesus Christ) with us.' We can light candles in the darkness around us and be like a city set high on the hillsides of life, giving eternal hope and God's grace to all around us. I debated with myself quite a bit about what I would say in this week's message and the topic of change comes to


