Cullen man arrested for unauthorized entry after refusing to leave residence

A Cullen man was arrested Wednesday night after repeatedly refusing to leave a residence on Shreveport Road, according to Minden police.

Officers responded to the 1300 block of Shreveport Road at 10:55 PM on September 25, following a report of a verbal disturbance. Upon arrival, officers spoke with the homeowner, who stated that a male subject, identified as Nathan Thomas, 29, was involved in the disturbance and had refused to leave the property despite multiple requests.

Thomas had reportedly packed his belongings, preparing to leave, but informed officers that he was unwilling to do so due to work obligations the following morning. Police

said Thomas exhibited belligerent and aggressive behavior, prompting the homeowner to ask that he be removed from the premises.

Although officers spoke with Thomas at length, he initially refused to leave but eventually complied and left the residence. However, less than an hour later, officers were dispatched to the same location after Thomas reentered the home without permission.

Thomas was taken into custody without incident during the second encounter. He was advised of his rights and transported to the Minden Police Department, where he was booked on charges of unauthorized entry of an inhabited dwelling.

All subjects are considered innocent until proven guilty in a court of law.

Miss Juneteenth raises awareness on sickle cell anemia

Avionna Smallwood, the 8-year-old Miss Juneteenth of Minden, Louisiana, has been using her platform to raise awareness about sickle cell anemia. After being selected as Miss Juneteenth this summer, Smallwood took an interest in the disease and spent time researching its effects, particularly in the African American community.

"As you may know, September was Sickle Cell Awareness Month,"


know much about it, so I got help and found some helpful information I'd like to share."


Smallwood highlighted that sickle cell disease (SCD) affects approximately 100,000 people in the United States, with more than 90% of those affected being African American. She also pointed out that the disease develops when both parents carry the sickle cell gene and can cause significant pain for those diagnosed. Additionally, she shared that the disease also imranean and Middle Eastern descent.

"There is no cure, but treatment does include medications, blood transfusions, and rarely a bone marrow transplant," Smallwood explained. "Let's be aware."

Her efforts are aimed at increasing public knowledge of the disease, which is critical for early detection and management.

Jann Aldredge-Clanton

Jann Aldredge-Clanton, an ordained minister, theologian, author, loving wife, mother, and grandmother, and pioneering voice of progressive Christianity who touched thousands with her life

and work, died of ovarian cancer on Sept. 20 in Dallas. She was 78.

Jann's life was defined by tireless advocacy for gender equity, especially in the church, and a deep faith, uncommon kindness, and boundless optimism that never left her. In her work and writings, she stressed the importance of using feminine images and language for the Divine as a foundation for equality, justice, and neace

"My vision is of a church where the Divine Feminine and women ministers don't have to be defended or marginalized but are fully and equally included throughout every worship service and every activity of the church," she wrote in "Changing Church: Stories of Liberating Ministers," her 2011 book profiling progressive women ministers.

She spent much of her adult life working to fulfill that vision, but the foundation for it was laid much earlier.

Jann was born in Abilene, Texas, and grew up in Minden, La., where her father, the Rev. Henry Truman Aldredge, pastored the First Baptist Church and her mother Eva pushed the bounds of what it meant to be a preacher's wife in the 1950s.

In high school, Jann graduated as valedictorian and turned heads as a baton-twirling majorette before attending Louisiana Tech University. It was there that she met her future husband, David Clanton, a kind and funny Baptist kid from DeRidder, La., who kissed her on their first date and recognized her brilliance early, telling her she was "Ph.D. material."

After marrying David in 1968 and moving to the Dallas-Forth Worth area, Jann acquired a master's degree and a Ph.D. in English Literature from Texas Christian University and taught for several years at Dallas Baptist University. Then, like her father before her, she felt called to the ministry and began a Master's of Divinity from Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary in Fort Worth.

It was still rare for women to pursue a theology degree in those days, and the coursework took several years to complete. Jann was a mother by then, raising her two sons, Chad and Brett. And a family move

to Waco, Texas, had complicated things even further, with Jann having to commute back to Dallas to finish her degree. Nevertheless, she persisted. And in 1985, she became one of the first women to be ordained as a minister in the Baptist Church in the South.

After finding professional doors closed to her in the church of her upbringing, she joined the staff of St. John's Methodist Church in Waco as an associate minister, and later became a chaplain at Hillcrest Hospital. It was around this time that her true calling in ministry began to emerge.

While juggling family and work, she returned to scholarly research and to the original biblical texts in Hebrew and Greek that she had studied in seminary. The scripture, she discovered, was full of feminine references to God that she argued had been suppressed to maintain a patriarchal power structure over the church.

She decided to start writing about it — and she never stopped.

Over the years, she authored eleven books, six songbooks, a children's musical, and a children's songbook. She was working on her next collection of hymns, with collaborator Larry E. Schultz, the week before she died.

As a chaplain at Baylor Medical Center in Dallas, where she worked for 17 years until her retirement in 2009, Jann counseled and supported cancer patients, especially women living with the same illness that later would take her life. She was also one the founders of New Wineskins, an inclusive worship community in Dallas, and was a regular attendee of The Gathering, a Womanist Church, which prioritizes racial equity, social justice, and LGBTQ+ equality.

But perhaps her greatest achievement — and joy — was her family.

Jann was married for 57 years to David who stood by her as she evolved from a pretty, small-town Baptist girl to feminist theologian and who faithfully cared for her over the last four years as she privately dealt with her illness. She called him "Angel David."

She also loved being a mother and was deeply proud of her two sons. Before she died, she was able to tell each of them that, even after she went to heaven, her love would not end.

Jann is survived by David, her son Chad, his partner Maura Mullins, her son Brett, his wife Beth Lousteau and their three sons -- Lyle, Emmett, and Paul -- her sister Dr. Anne Morton and her brother-in-law Bill Funderburk.

A memorial service for Jann Aldredge-Clanton will be held at 1 p.m. on Saturday, Oct. 5, at Wilshire Baptist Church in Dallas.

Man arrested on multiple felony charges after standoff

Minden police officers, along with deputies from the Webster Parish Sheriff's Office, arrested a man at a residence on Shreveport Road after a brief standoff. Michael Wayne Steveson, 48, was taken into custody following an incident involving domestic abuse and threats against the victim

Officers were patched to the 1500 block of Shreveport Road to serve a warrant on Steveson. Before they arrived, a call came in to the police department from the victim, who expressed a desire to drop the charges. Upon arrival, officers and deputies secured a perimeter around the residence. Steveson briefly exited the house but quickly re-entered, disregarding officers' orders to remain outside.

Steveson reappeared several times, only partially exiting the home, before finally coming out onto the porch with the victim in front of him. The victim was directed

to secure the dogs, after which an officer deployed a taser on Steveson. The taser failed, and Steveson retreated into the house. Officers then entered the front porch area and demanded Ste-

veson exit. After complying, Steveson was ordered to the ground and placed in handcuffs. He was advised of his Miranda rights and transported to the Minden Police Department, where he was placed in a holding cell. Officers were unable to locate the firearm Steveson allegedly used to threaten the victim. According to the victim, Steveson had threatened her with bodily harm if she did not contact the police to drop the charg-

Steveson faces multiple charges, including second-degree battery, domestic abuse battery, domestic abuse aggravated assault with child endangerment, witness intimidation, and being a fugitive from the Webster Parish Sheriff's Office.

Tommy loved his family, his cowboy boots, and sharing jokes and stories with anyone willing to listen. Prior to his passing, his vehicles ranged from a Cadillac to a restored Model A Ford to a John Deere tractor, but he likely put more mileage on his lawn mower while immersed in what may have been his favorite past-time of mowing. His surviving family members are comforted knowing that he is with his Lord and Savior in Heaven, where grass may no longer need mowing but where the kitchens are always stocked with homemade chocolate pies and chicken and dumplings.

Biden Celebrates His "Accomplishments" in the Waning Days of His Presidency

These past few weeks, Pres. Biden has touted socalled successes of his Administration. The first involved his speech at the United Nations in which he highlighted his purportedly successful use of diplomacy to strengthen global democracy. The second involved how, he argues, his Administration has reduced crime while seeking, as always, to limit the constitutional right to keep and bear arms. In both instances, I shook my head and wondered if he still had a grasp of reality.

(I think Biden's touting of his "accomplishments" could not come at a worse time for VP Kamala Harris as Biden publicly claims 'she was the last person in the room' on all of his major decisions, as she desperately tries to deny the last four years—and the numerous disasters and policy failures in which she played a central role.)

First, in his final address to the United Nations, Biden endeavored to underscore how his Administration's foreign policy had ensured "the center has held." What center, I thought. and held, how? Our nation and the world are both increasingly chaotic and the possibility of both a recession and economic collapse, as well as a regional conflict becoming a world war is more likely now than it's been since World

reports "the latest evidence ... is that Iran is helping to broker the delivery of Russian antiship missiles to the Houthis in Yemen." Specifically, "Iran is engaged in secret talks to help the Houthis obtain advanced Yakhont missiles ... from Moscow. These would help the terrorist group more precisely

the large ballistic and cruisemissile inventory the group has fielded from Iran." (WSJ, 9-26-2024). This development simply highlights "the utter failure of American de-

keep firing at merchant ships in the Red Sea." (WSJ). Weakness invites aggression and the Biden Administration response has been the "equivalent of strongly worded letters—small missile strikes on Houthi launchers that do no lasting damage to the group's ability to hold shipping hostage." This "U.S. passivity" has done nothing but encourage "a growing regional

conflict." (WSJ).

WSJ concludes by noting "the Iran-Russia cooperation underscores the extent to which these regional powers are becoming a global menace. China, Russia, Iran, and North Korea are working as a de facto axis, arming, and assisting each other to threaten their neighbors and spread mayhem. NATO has called China a 'decisive enabler' of Russia's war in Ukraine, and Russia is helping Iran sow chaos in the Middle East." (WSJ, Id.)

Second, in a similarly disconnected manner Biden seeks credit for supposedly reducing domestic crime while also seeking to limit gun rights. By use of an executive order, Biden and VP Harris supposedly aim to "reduce gun violence," referencing school shootings, with Biden stating that "guns are the number one hard to believe—they're the number one killer of children in America. More than any other cause—accidents—more than any other cause. It's almost unbelievable - it's sick." Biden said.

Well, firstly, the number one killer of children in America is abortion. Second, school shootings are far more attributable to the moral and cultural cesspool in which young people find themselves today than the availability of guns. Guns have always been available, but we certainly never had the school shootings we have today. Biden's analysis also ignores the killing fields of major American cities that defund and hamstring the police while Leftist DAs coddle criminals, all the while threatening law abiding citizens for wanting to arm themselves and protect their families.

Gun-rights advocates responded that "Biden's executive orders are an effort to distract from his poor record when it comes to reducing crime in major metropolitan cities. ... 

DALLAS — Grambling State dropped its Southwestern Athletic Conference opener to Prairie View A&M, 36-34, in a five-overtime marathon last Saturday in the 99th State Fair Classic at the Cotton Bowl Stadium.

The game went into overtime tied at 24 after the Tigers scored a touchdown with 38 seconds left in the game.

In the first overtime, GSU (3-2) started on offense. On third down from the PVAMU 1, Dedrick Talbert scampered into the end zone to GSU a 31-24 lead.

PVAMU (2-3) responded with a 4-yard TD pass to Jaden Jonson to send the game to a second overtime period.

After both teams made field goals in the second OT, the game was decided by two-point conversions.

Both defenses made stops to keep the game

In the fifth OT, after GSU's offense was stopped, the Tigers' defense seemingly made another stop, but pass interference set the Panthers up just outside the 1-yard line. Lamagea McDowell burst into the end zone for the game winner.

GSU led 17-7 at halftime but couldn't find its rhythm in the second half, allowing PVAMU to rally for its first conference win of the year.

Offensively, Grambling State outgained Prairie View A&M 386 to 303. Myles Crawley accumulated 286 of those yards through the air. He completed 29-of-48 passes with two touchdowns and two interceptions.

Crawley's top targets were Javon Robinson and Julien Lewis who both caught six passes. Robinson had 48 receiving yards

Facebook has a neat feature. From time to time, a photo appears on your page of a person or event that took place at some time in the past.

Last week, I enjoyed a photo that cropped up on my site that triggered a special memory. When my grandson, Max, was just a little kid and he and his family lived nearby, he enjoyed hanging around with me trying to emulate what I was doing, and this was particularly noticeable when I took him fishing.

I remember taking Max to a neighborhood pond where I was bass fishing. While I was fishing for bass with my spin-cast reel, Max was fishing with his little Zebco 33 and he hooked and landed a bass, the first one he ever caught. The photo of Max proudly holding his first bass was the image that popped up on my screen last week.

Ironically, my Facebook page this week contained a photo of Max taking his 5 year old son, Beorn, fishing and showing the big bluegill his son caught. It's sort of a generational evolution where the son grew up to become a dad and had the experience of doing for his son what had been done for him when he was a kid.

Dennis Tietje lives in the community of Roanoke in southwest Louisiana and his family is in the business of raising crawfish on their property. I have been intrigued by the reports Tietje has had on Facebook over the past couple of weeks of the outstanding teal season he has had on the property.

Our crawfish farm holds water through crawfish season and we keep it watered all the way to teal season. What this means is that when teal start arriving this time of year, they

He has really gotten a kick out of getting to hunt with me and before season opened when we would go out just to see the birds working, he jokingly asked if we could open season a few days early," he chuck-

Not only do they teal hunt together, they have

war being waged on our hearts, souls, and lives without God's guidance and protection. Guidance and protection are provided by the armor of God which is composed of 6 characteristics: truth,


righteousness, readiness from the gospel, faith, salvation, and the word of God. Lately, life for many has been hard and, in some ways, it feels like a losing battle
